This book is a <u>humorous</u> look at the real events from the author's childhood.
	<b>Scary Stories for</b> <b>Young Foxes</b> by Christian McKay Heidicker	The haunted season has arrived in the Antler Wood. No fox kit is safe. When Mia and Uly are separated from their litters, they discover a dangerous world full of monsters. In order to find a den to call home, they must venture through field and forest, facing unspeakable things that dwell in the darkness: a zombie who hungers for their flesh, a witch who tries to steal their skins, a ghost who hunts them through the snow and other things too scary to mention.

ALL WAR ATTRACT	<i>I Will Always Write Back</i> By Caitlin Alifirenka & Martin Ganda	Caitlin, from Pennsylvania, chose Martin, from Zimbabwe, as her pen pal when she was 12. This memoir, written in alternating chapters by both pen pals, recounts how they became best friendsand better peoplethrough their long-distance letter exchanges.
LEGEND AUNTIE PO SHING THE ROOM	<i>Legend of Auntie Po</i> By Shing Yin Khor	Aware of the racial tumult in the years after the passage of the Chinese Exclusion Act, Mei tries to remain blissfully focused on her job, her close friendship with the camp foreman's daughter, and telling stories about Paul Bunyanreinvented as Po Pan Yin (Auntie Po), an elderly Chinese matriarch.
	<b>The Thief</b> By Megan Whalen Turner	Gen flaunts his ingenuity as a thief and relishes the adventure which takes him to a remote temple of the gods where he will attempt to steal a precious stone.

## Reading Response Choices: Please choose <u>one</u> activity for <u>one</u> book you read this summer.

**1**. Write a 1-2 page response. Select an important event in the book. Describe why it was a turning point in the character's life. What was it that the character decided or learned to do? Use details from the book to support your opinion. See associated rubric. (#1)

**2.** Write a 1-2 page response. Identify the narrator. How does the author's choice of narrator (or choice of multiple narrators) influence the story that the reader experiences? How might the story be different if told from another point of view? Use details from the text to support your answer. See associated rubric. (#2)

**3.** Create a test for the novel. Your test must have 10 questions. It should include a combination of multiple choice questions, short written response questions, and one essay question. You must also provide the answers. See associated rubric. (#3)

**4.** Create a 30 second video summarizing the novel. Consider this a video trailer for the novel that would make others want to read it. It should provide only the most important information. See associated rubric.(#4)

**5.** Create a soundtrack (song list) for the novel (minimum 8 songs). Each song should have a 3-5 complete sentence explanation on how the song fits to the book. See associated rubric. (#5)

6. Compare and contrast the main character to someone in our society. Choose 2 of the following:

- Write a 1-2 page response.
- Create a venn diagram. Use words, pictures, and photos for both individuals.
- Make a video. Write a script and film an interview between yourself, the main character, and the person you've selected from society.

## Extension:

The first 15 books on the list are part of the Pennsylvania Young Reader's Choice Award Program. This program allows students across the Commonwealth to vote for Pennsylvania's favorite books each year. Any student interested in participating in this program must commit to reading at least 3 books from the list by the time we vote in January 2023. Any books read from the list over the summer count toward this goal. Participants will have a chance to meet with each other when we return in the fall and throughout the year to discuss the books they have read for the program. Additionally, students will have the opportunity to suggest books of their choosing to be part of the next year's Pennsylvania Young Reader's Choice reading list.

## **Reading Olympics**

Reading Olympics is a year-long competition for students in grades 5-12. As a team, students read 40 books throughout the year with a culminating game-show style event bringing together teams from across the county.
