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HEAD'S UPDATE

LOT has happened in School since our last edition of King's Colours, including the publication of the results of our full school inspection. Whilst we knew an inspection was on the horizon, schools only get 24 hours notice and so when you 'get the call' it always elevates the heart rate! We were judged to be fully

compliant and 'Excellent' in all areas of school life, the highest possible rating, which represents an outcome of which we can all be proud.

The ISI report is well worth a read as it emphasises much of what we aspire to achieve through our school aims. In particular, it highlights that pupils have an extremely positive attitude to learning and demonstrate a high level of self-understanding, self confidence, discipline and resilience. We won't be resting on our laurels, and will use the report's positive impact to increase the momentum of forward development and into our Strategic Development Plan for the next five years. The document describing our plan, 'Making a Difference' - now available to read on our website - is the result of a wideranging consultation process and outlines strategic priorities which have been identified and now form the basis for the School's further development. It signals an exciting time with plenty of ambition.

We continue to inch ever close to normality after the disruption of the last two years and a significant step has been the reintroduction of school trips. Every year group within the Junior section has now taken part in an overnight trip and, whilst some anxieties have been present (with this being the first stay away from home with school for many), the activities and excitement have been thoroughly enjoyed. Special mention must go to the Ski trip, which took pupils to Italy from across all Divisions. This trip had to be rearranged several times, yet everyone (staff in particular) coped incredibly well and the outing was a huge success.

As I write this introduction, pupils in Year 11 are 'deep' into GCSE exams and Year 13 A Level exams are underway. Hosting external exams is another 'first' on the new site and these pupils are coping with the intensity of an external exam period for the first time, given that external exams haven't happened for the last two years. They are well prepared and well placed to succeed. We will all look forward to receiving – and celebrating – their results in August. I am immensely proud of pupils as well as staff for the manner in which they have approached these exams under challenging circumstances.

This edition of *King's Colours* is a busy one; enjoy reading it, and thank you for your continued support of School.

During the day, pupils in Years 7 - 10were introduced to the sport Harry loves during PE and Games lessons. Chair and player coach of Stoke Spitfires, Andy Flower, brought down more than a dozen wheelchairs and gave coaching sessions to various age groups. Andy, who then



refereed a highly competitive Staff v Pupils match, said "The secret is to learn to move the chair and control the ball at the same time. It's a bit like tapping your head while rubbing your belly and, as Harry says, takes a lot of practice."

TRIP-tastic fun for Year 6 pupils



URING the first half of the summer term, all seventy Year 6 children embarked on a residential trip to the Hollowford Centre in Castleton, in the Peak District. On arriving, they had the task of making their own bed; life skill number one ticked off! Then, over the next 48 hours, the children took part in caving, cycling, raft-building, zipwire, hiking and abseiling.

Caving really made children face their fears – the cave quickly narrowed down with some parts a real squeeze to pass through, and became darker and deeper until only headtorches cast light. Stalactites and stalagmites were a plenty as well as the chance to crawl through a worm hole!

The raft-building involved two teams working against each other to build a substantial, pond-worthy raft with a race to the finish. They were given four barrels, six planks of wood and a crash course in rope tying to get them started. It was fantastic to watch the children collaborate. problem solve and use their initiative to build the best raft. They then had to sail their raft with half the team, pick up the other members,

row to a middle island before managing the home straight.

There was much hilarity as everyone started rowing, screaming, laughing and falling off – with the apparent real point of the activity to get as wet as possible! The abseiling saw the children descending 60 metres to the ground from a local viaduct. Again, the bravery shown was phenomenal, and every child had two goes; despite some initial wobbles!

Seventy children returned more resilient, more determined and more capable and proud of the many achievements they had made.

Summing up their trip, the children said it had been: "Fun, exciting, hard, brilliant, amazing and epic."

national nomination with natural heat project

From over 350 entrants, the King's team of A-Level Physics students are shortlisted for the Teamwork Award, after designing a system to convert the natural heat from compost into an energy source to promote seed germination.

Working under the guidance of King's Head of Physics, Dr Hartnett, and John Blackwell, the Engineering Director of Opus Technical Ltd, the team produced a full design and prototype to impress the regional panel of judges.

For their six-month project "harnessing the energy from composting to accelerate seed germination" the team determined the ideal blend of compost material, type of composter, and methods to convert and control the resulting energy before managing the heat transfer to the horticultural system.



Peach for the STARS

A key part of the School's Strategic Development Plan, published earlier this year, is challenging our most able pupils in all aspects of the curriculum. Whilst this is not a new concept at King's, it is one that we are keen to develop yet further. Mr Griffiths, Deputy Head (Academic) and our Challenge and Enrichment Coordinator, Miss Soutter, have recently overhauled our Challenge and Enrichment provision for Senior and Sixth Form pupils and launched King's very own SPACE programme: Stretching Pupils through Academic Challenge and Enrichment.

TAKE OFF

Aiming high and being academically ambitious from the get-go is key to establishing a learning culture soaked in question, challenge and discovery. Preceding the SPACE programme in the Infant & Junior Division is an exciting programme providing opportunities for our younger pupils. Pupil progress is monitored very carefully and exceptionally able pupils are highlighted across all curriculum areas. Infant and Junior Heads of Department ensure that tasks are set to enhance and stretch talents, nurturing an inquisitive approach and a culture of self-study and practice from a really young age.

Specific opportunities are provided to extend learning in and from the classroom with specific clubs running at lunchtime, local and national competitions and experiences outside school with other schools via the North West Junior Gifted and

Talented Programme. Inclusive to all pupils in the Division is a dedicated programme of special enrichment focus teaching weeks, competitions, speakers, trips and projects - all designed to ignite ambitious learning and endeavour.

The Learning Challenge Curriculum, which runs in all year groups, encourages a question-based approach to learning, incentivising pupils to find out more and be tenacious in their study of particular subjects.

The Infant & Junior Division provides a wonderful platform for pupils to develop a thirst and energy to ask, imagine, question and find out. This culture promotes a strong ethos of limitless learning for our younger learners, helping them brilliantly to take their next steps with confidence as they move to the Senior Division.

Entering SPACE

The SPACE programme in the Seniors and Sixth
Form works on a number of levels. At the first level, we want to ensure that pupils are challenged and stretched academically in those subjects where they are particularly able. Some students may be gifted in one specific area, and it is important that they are given the opportunity to develop their talents and their passions in that field.

Each subject has its own coordinator whose role is to ensure that particularly talented students are being challenged in their subject area. Challenge tasks are set by the teacher to be completed in the lesson or in homework and pupils may also attend lunchtime clubs that allow scope for going beyond any curriculum and exploring their passions and talents.





Nearly all departments also participate in competitions, either organised by King's or hosted by industry partners or fellow schools to give pupils the opportunity to compete on a larger stage. Maths, Physics, Chemistry and Biology Olympiads are held, but lesser-known competitions include the Education Engineering Scheme, Mace Debating Competition, STEM Olympics, BIMA Digital Day, Barclay's Tech Innovation Challenge, National Cipher Challenge and the Living Edge Art Competition, to name just a few.

There are also other opportunities for the pupils to go beyond the taught curriculum, such as King's own Percyvale Prize, which sets a range of tasks on a particular theme to allow the students some free expression.

King's provides Senior and Sixth Form pupils with a Challenge and Enrichment section of our VLE (virtual learning environment or portal). This offers pupils the opportunity to select and complete a range of tasks set by departments. These are made available to all students as we want to encourage aspiration and interest amongst all our students. Awards are given to those pupils who complete Challenge and Enrichment tasks.

At the second level, from Year 9 upwards we provide those students who are academically at the very top end of each year group with a teacher mentor. Each mentor will typically have two or three students and they will meet as a group three or four times each term. This is an opportunity for the students to meet with similar-minded peers and mentor sessions will focus on developing their interests and passions and encouraging them to go beyond the curriculum in their favourite subjects.

They will also practise discussing and debating current issues and students in Year 10 will complete the HPQ (Higher Project Qualification), which is a level 2 qualification and a stepping-stone to the EPQ (completed in Year 13). Attendance at the mentor sessions is voluntary and parents are informed of their attendance. The emphasis is on academic aspiration, scholarship, and super-curricular study to complement the enrichment on offer from the co-curricular programme.

EXPLORING THE UNIVERSE

Once students are in the Sixth Form, the SPACE programme naturally segues into the Sixth Form 'Aspire' programme as preparation for competitive entry universities. Students attend weekly Masterclasses designed to widen their academic horizons, develop higher order thinking and analytical skills, and give them key preparation for university interviews.

Oxbridge applicants and aspiring Medics and Vets are also given departmental mentors in Year 12 to prepare them for the university interview process. Our academic clubs and societies, such as Debating Society and the 1502 Society, develop students as thinkers and intellectuals, whilst the EPQ allows them to demonstrate and pursue their own interests in their chosen topic area.

Of course, the standard at King's is very high and while all of our pupils have the opportunity to be challenged and enriched, the SPACE programme means that there is also specific provision for those who are consistently performing above King's high academic expectations. It is safe to say that all pupils are given the chance to reach for the stars and to 'fly' as high as their aspirations and ambitions can take them!

ATHLETICS

The summer has seen a welcome return to the Athletics track and field after two years of the pandemic. The Stockport Grammar Relays event got the season off to a good start. It was a very close competition, with only 1 point separating each school. The Year 10 athletes put on an impressive display of athleticism to win all of their races and, overall, King's finished 4th.

Year 7 athletes competed well in the Macclesfield & District Athletics Competition to finish in second position overall, with the Girls' team winning and the Boys taking 5th place. There were some superb individual performances with 7 of our athletes qualifying to represent Macclesfield at the Cheshire Minors County Championships: Sophia Heywood (100m), Hattie Usher, (200m) Lola Bianchi (800m), Grace Taylor (1500m), Bobby Tomlinson (1500m), Rocky Maguire (Shot) and Dylan Fineberg (Discus).

In Round 1 of the ESAA Schools' Cup, our Junior Girls' team (Years 7/8) was 3rd, the Junior Boys' team 7th, Inter Girls (Years






AJIS Athletics

"This year, it has been a pleasure to help those less fortunate than us. Often, I feel it is too easy to forget all we have and take a step back to be grateful. I believe King's always strives to exceed expectation and we often raise more money than ever expected. None of this would be possible without the immensely supportive parent

body, nor without the various extremely hard-working charity teams that make events happen.

Throughout the year, the Senior Division Charity Prefects and I have taken part in many activities to raise money for our charity of the year, Visyon, a local teenage mental health charity. We met Kerry and Linda, who came in to tell Senior and Sixth Form pupils what Visyon does and how our money will support them. So far, we have raised over £6,000 for Visyon in six months!
