

DCS Team Participated in Odyssey of the Mind World Finals

From Monday, May 21 through Friday, May 25 six students from Durham Community School participated as finalists at the Odyssey of the Mind World Finals at Michigan State University in Lansing Michigan. These students were Emma Jenusaitis, 5th grade, and 4th graders Finn Conway, Isaiah Helfrich, Jordyn Powell, Lexi Ritchson, and Luana Sena. This DCS team joined nearly 6,000 students (grades 3 through college) who made up 889 teams from 16 countries! It was a truly incredible experience!

The Worlds began with an amazing opening ceremony that took place in the Breslin Arena. A single student from each of the 889 teams kicked off the celebration as they paraded into the arena with other students from their own states and nations. Emma Jenusaitis did a wonderful job representing DCS in the parade.

On the second evening the DCS team members joined 16 other students in representing the State of Maine in a Float and Banner Parade. Wearing Yeti masks, they marched alongside Maine's enormous Yeti float. Many of the international teams, like South Korea, Japan, China, Poland, India and Togo, used their floats, banners and costumes to teach about their countries. It was a fascinating evening of culture.

Throughout the week, the Michigan State University campus was all Odyssey all the time. Dorms, dining halls, classrooms, theaters and stadium were all given over to the World Finals and one could find and watch competitions and performances from early morning well into the evening. Our team spent their days practicing for their own competitions and watching as many teams as we could, from the youngest to oldest competitive levels, and from all over the world. Seeing the many different approaches teams could take to solve the same problem was inspiring.

On Friday, our own DCS team competed in both their spontaneous and long-term problems. Coaches and parents are not allowed to observe the spontaneous competition but the team emerged from it with big smiles on their faces (and into a barrage of silly string per tradition!) and reported that it was the most fun spontaneous problem they'd ever faced. Later in the afternoon they performed their long-term problem solution before a theater audience. Despite competing against some of the best teams in the world, our team made themselves proud by giving their best and most confident performance to date and charming the judges with their enthusiasm and joy. They placed 37th out of 78 teams in their grade division and problem. That is a wonderful accomplishment for such a young team!






