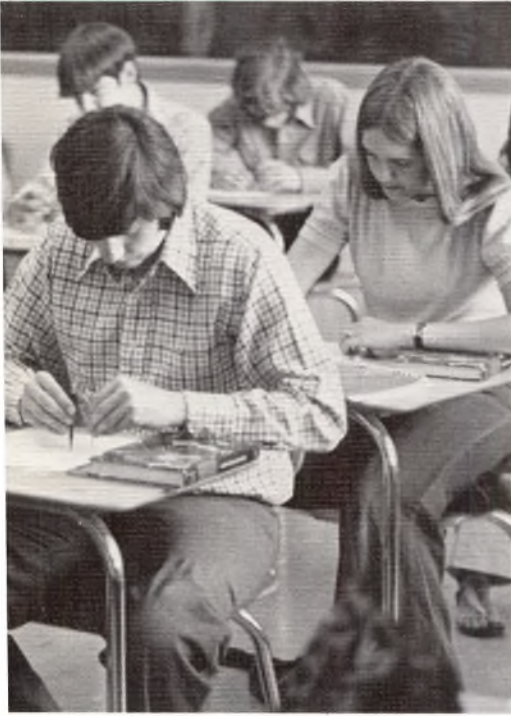


# Math Concepts Explored

Freshman math students studied algebra; this included the study of the real number system beginning with whole numbers and progressing to radicals. Geometry was looked at as a deductive mathematical system by the sophomores. To do this, students learned about congruence, parallelism, constructions, and geometric figures. These topics were then applied to the physical world.

The juniors faced another year of

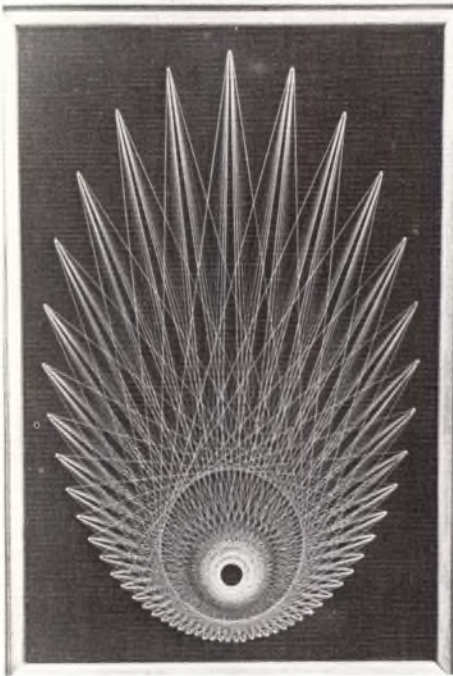
algebra. The second time around included a review of first year algebra and an extension of the real number system to the complex numbers. Other topics studied were logarithms, truth tables, conic sections, and modular systems. Seniors who were interested took advanced math. First semester included the study of trigonometry and matrix algebra. Second semester was devoted to elementary calculus and probability.



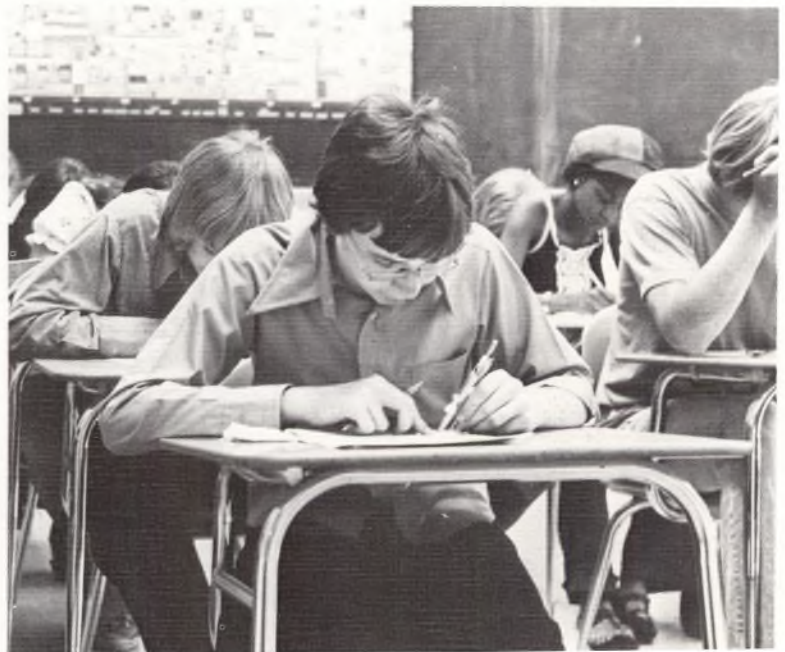

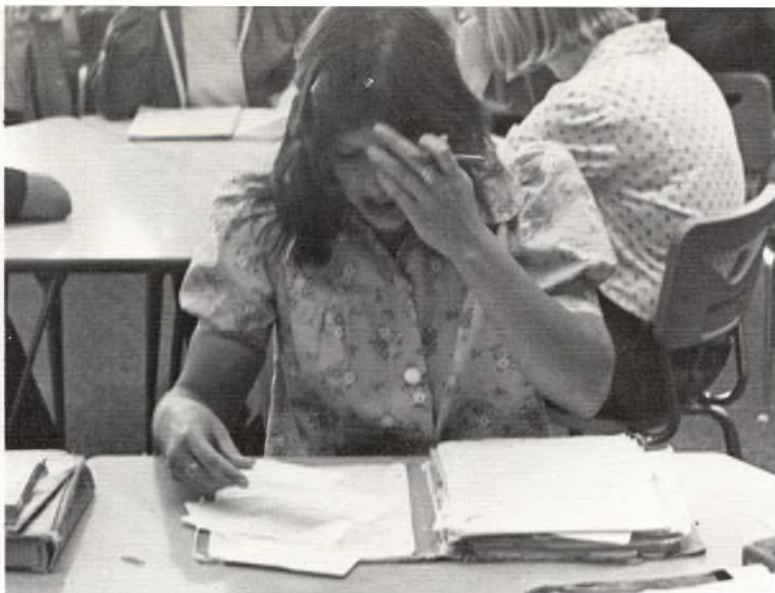

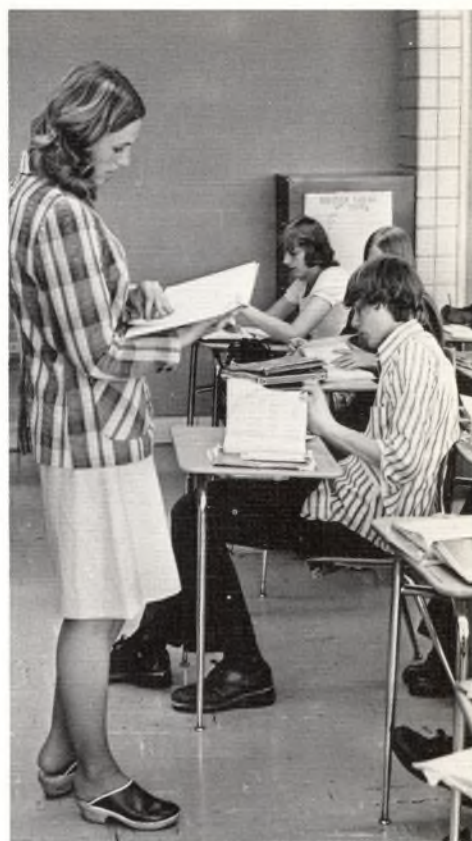

## Variety Characterizes English

The study of literature increases our interest in and appreciation for God's world and the people around us. Based on this idea, the English curriculum gave students a variety of experiences.

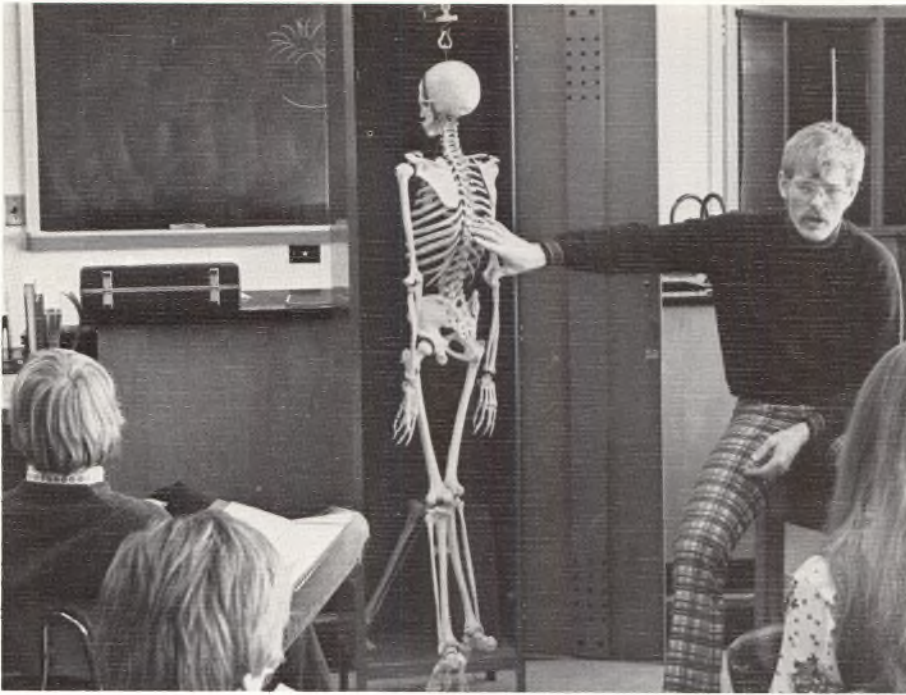
Novels, poetry and cinema arts were a few of the areas introduced to freshmen. Sophomore literature classes studied humor, realism and romanticism as found in works by American authors.

A number of nine week courses

were offered to juniors. Mechanical aspects of the English language were included in these as well as the study of short stories and novels such as *THE ODYSSEY*, *ANTHEM*, and *HUCK FINN*. Students with more unusual interests chose cinema arts or drama electives.

Senior classes covered old and modern periods of English literature, from *Beowulf* and medieval ballads to *Macbeth* and H. G. Wells.

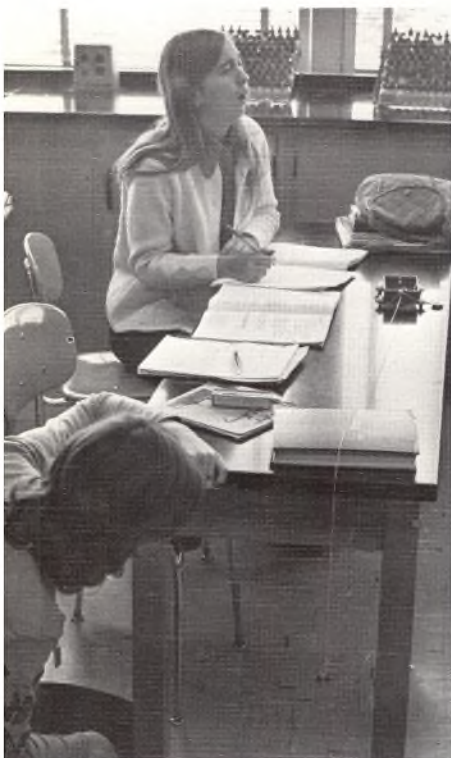

## Classes Examine Environment

Biology classes dealt with human anatomy, genetic reproduction and a Christian evaluation of evolution. At the end of the year time was spent on ecology and bird watching with labs held outside. Chemistry students looked at the structure of atom and its properties. Lectures and labs were used to cover the scientific principles. Physical science students studied principles behind the production of energy and worked experiments to demonstrate them.

The first semester of advanced science was spent on nuclear chemistry, including a tour of Argonne National Laboratory. The semester ended with qualitative analysis which involved experimenting to find ions in unknown solutions. Second semester, students dissected a fetal pig; anatomy and function of the fetal organs were covered. The year ended with an in-depth look at biochemistry and ecology.

## Literature Emphasized in Language Program

Freshman interest in Latin resulted in two first-year classes. Using a text called *PRINCIPIA*, Latin for the "beginnings," students learned basic grammar and vocabulary. Sophomores studied the adventures of a Roman boy in *PSEUDOLUS NOSTER*, then translated parts of Revelation. The third year Latin class translated portions of Virgil's *AENEID*.

German bound freshmen

became familiar with the language by using a text and audio-visual aids. Sophomores continued with this, translating more difficult passages. Juniors and seniors studied German literature, reading "Der Besuch der Alten Dame." The classes also worked on reports dealing with authors, cities, or history. Many of the students went to Calvin College to see a performance of "Der Besuch."

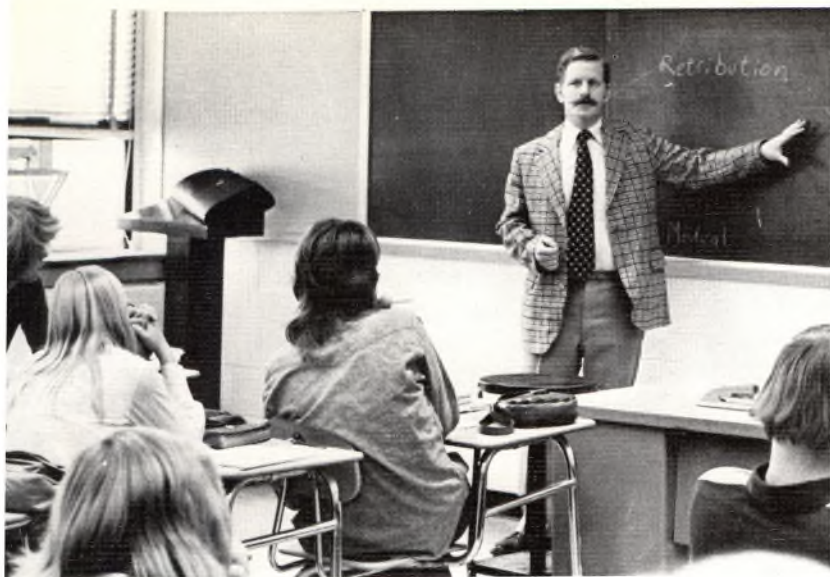

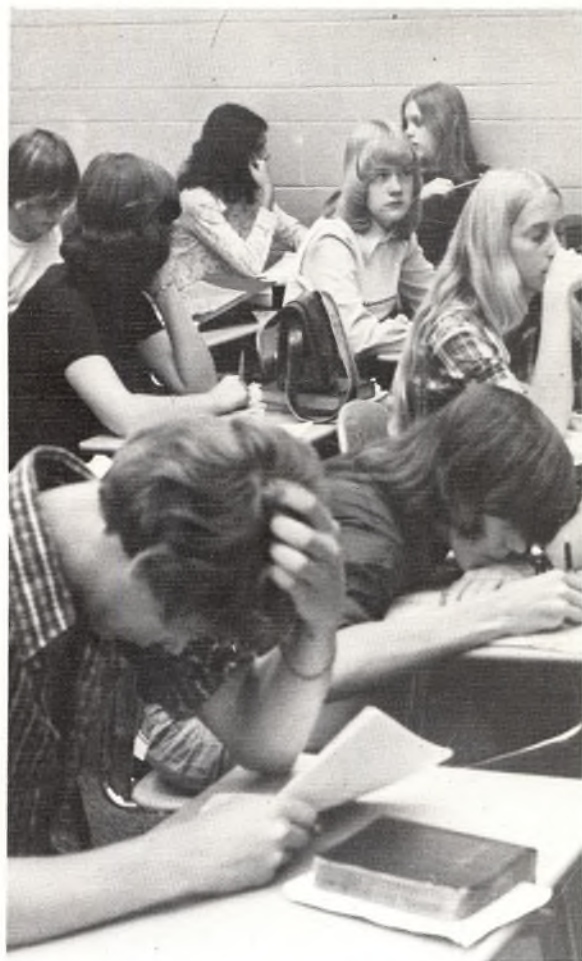

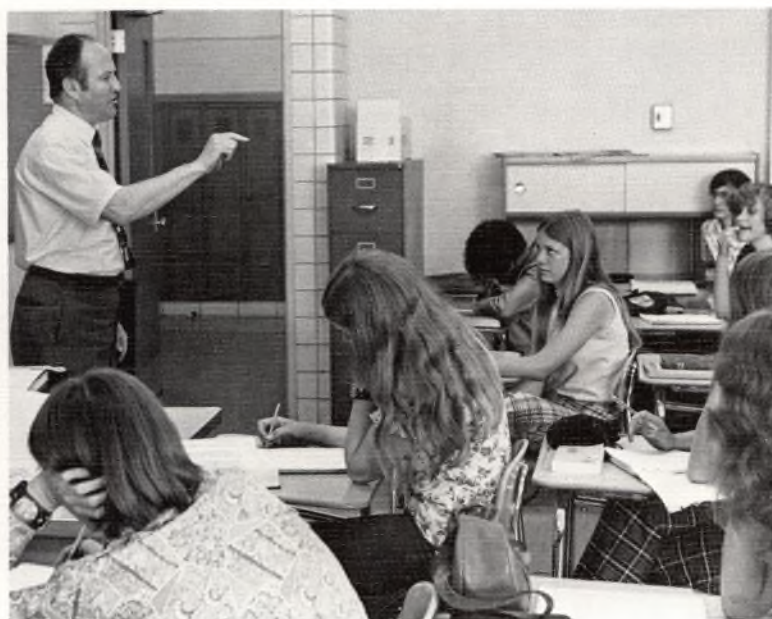

## Bible Program Changes Hands

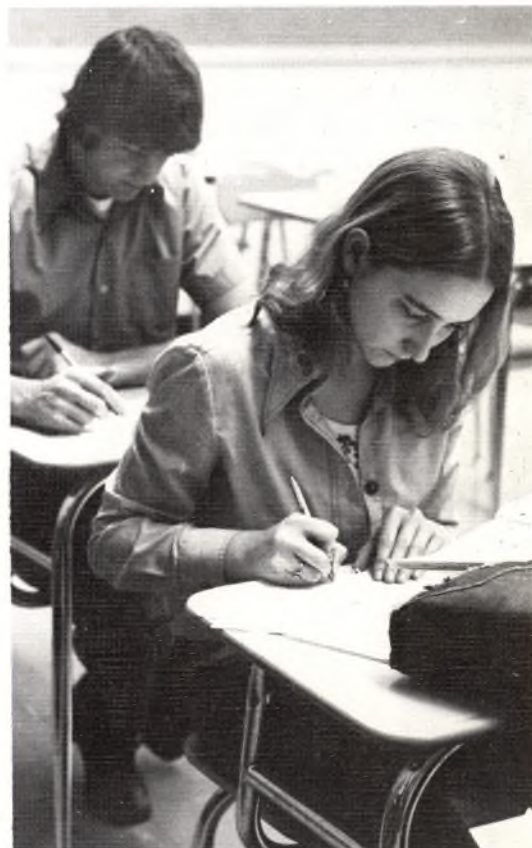
Freshmen approached the Old Testament in a different way with group discussions led by Mr. Bruchan. The topics ranged from creation and capital punishment to the occult.

Mr. Reitsma, a new teacher, brought some new ideas to the rest of the Bible classes. In studying the New Testament sophomores looked at Paul's missionary journeys and their relevance to Christians today.

Through the study of church history, juniors came to understand

reformed background. To see how a church operates, students attended a classis meeting of the Christian Reformed Church and a meeting of the General Assembly of the Orthodox Presbyterian Church.

Seniors who took ethics considered how the Christian faith applies to moral decisions and social problems. Those who took religions examined Buddhism, and Hinduism, among other world religions, and reviewed the beliefs of many cults.

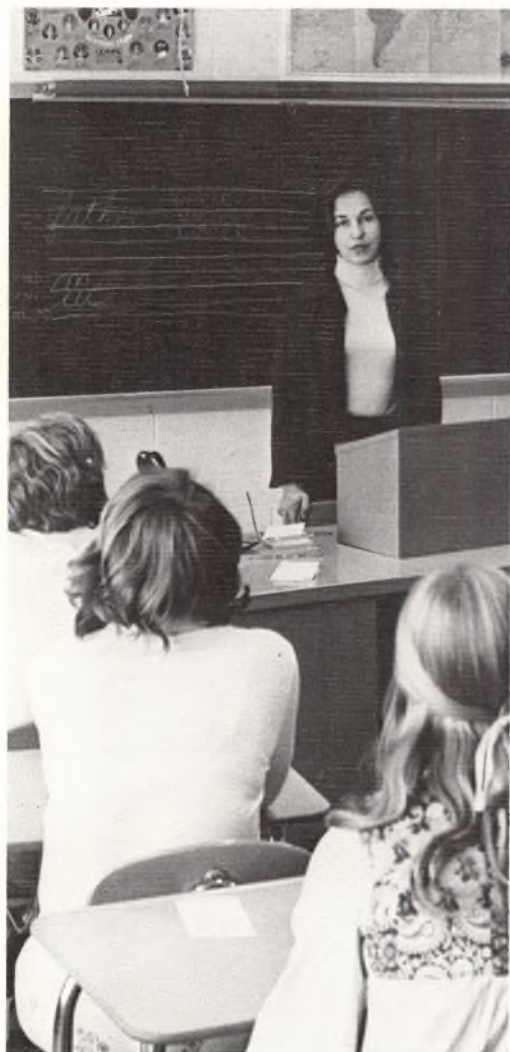

## Students Gain Social Insight

In sociology seniors researched for panels on problems facing today's society. Current affairs students discussed political and social aspects found in the daily newspaper.

Juniors studied the history of the United States, making use of textbook, outlines and movies. Government class familiarized seniors with basic government structure. The Watergate affair was discussed, relating government to current events.

Modern history concentrated on Western culture from the Middle Ages to the present. Freshmen took world history and then speech communication, where they used the video tape machine to see and correct mistakes. Psychology students tried to understand themselves by taking part in group activities. A trip to Elgin State Hospital enabled them to understand the mentally disturbed better.

diminished chords.

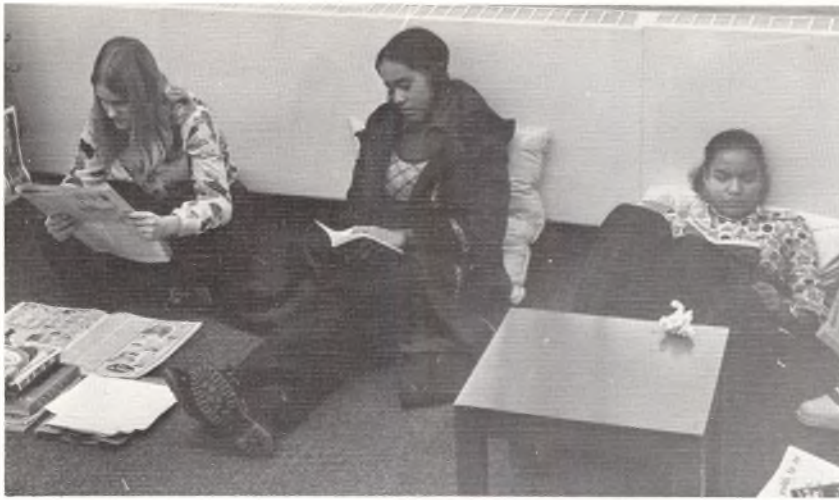
Stage band was a group of students interested in playing jazz and rock music. Thursday was rehearsal night for the group, which performed before basketball games.

Chorus was geared toward teaching freshmen the basics of choral singing. Many chorus members were trainees for concert choir.

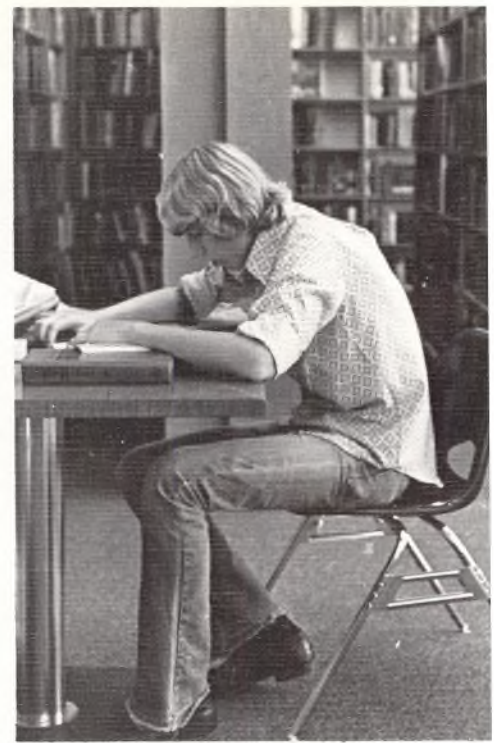

American lit and seniors papers for English lit and government.

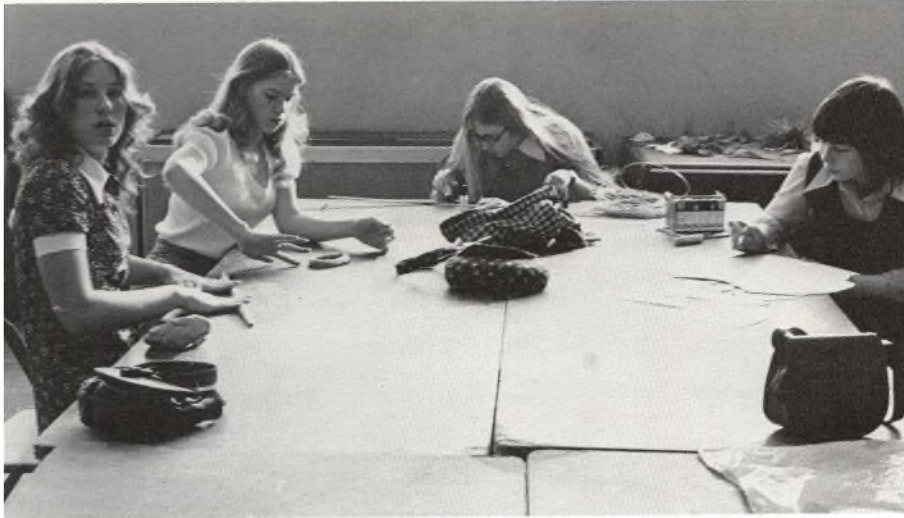

Advanced art classes also worked with linoleum-block printing and fingerpainting and constructed mobiles. Students worked on individual projects varying from weaving and decoupage to sculpting. Second semester was devoted to ceramics, and the year ended with students constructing their own kites.

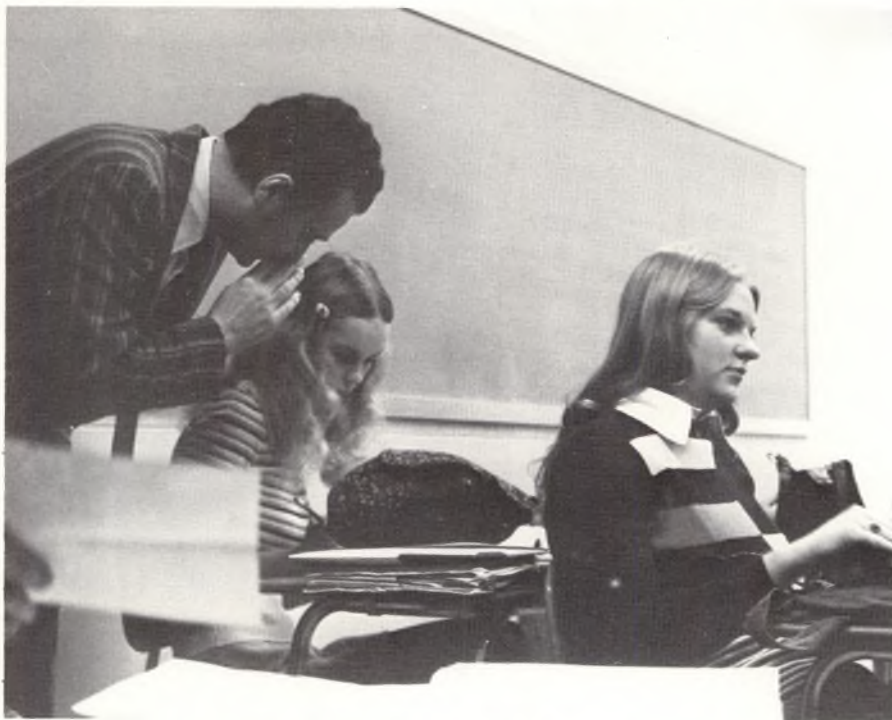


## Business Skills Sharpened

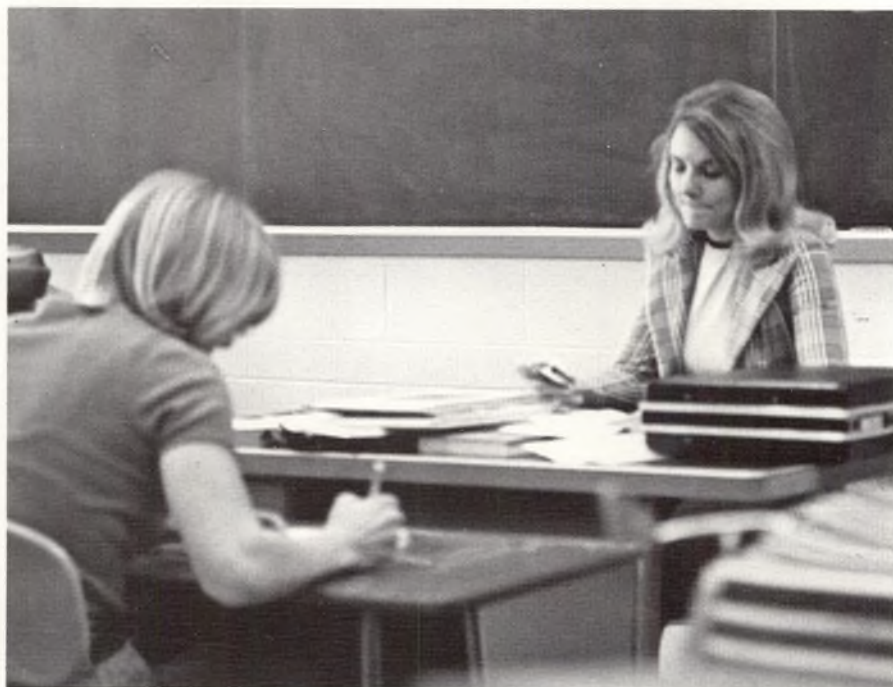
prove skills.

This year saw the first girl in mechanical drawing class. Students got used to drawing three-dimensional shapes, such as pipes, screws, and geometric figures, striving for neatness and accuracy. Architectural design emphasized creativity through the designing and building of houses made of balsa wood.

Girls in first year home ec learned the basics of cooking, meal planning and sewing. The second year class improved their skills and studied interior design. They furnished a home by creating a floor plan and collecting pictures and samples; visits to furniture stores and model apartments helped.

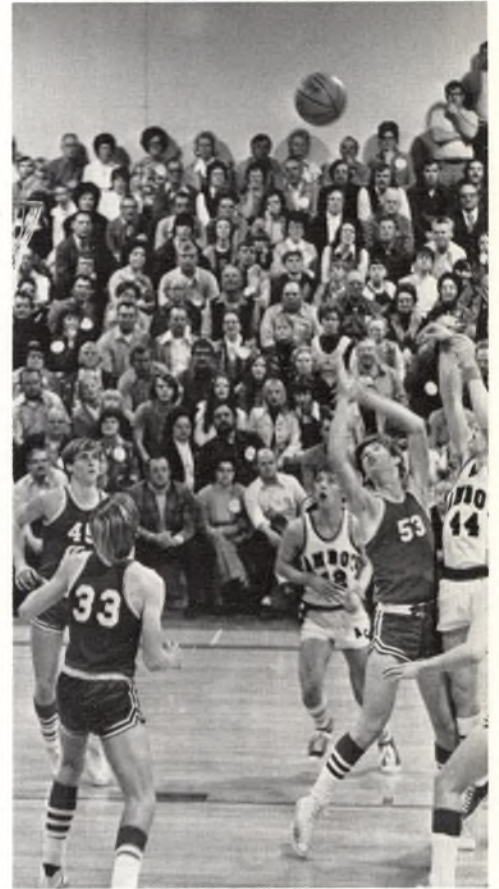

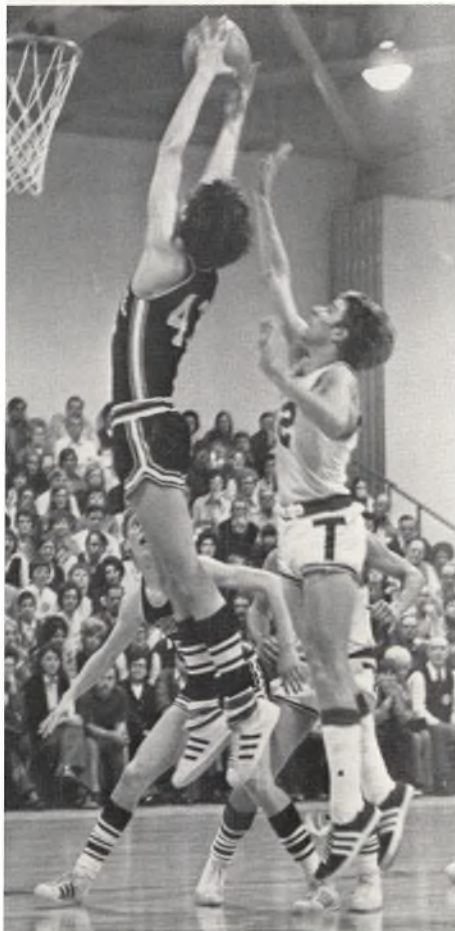

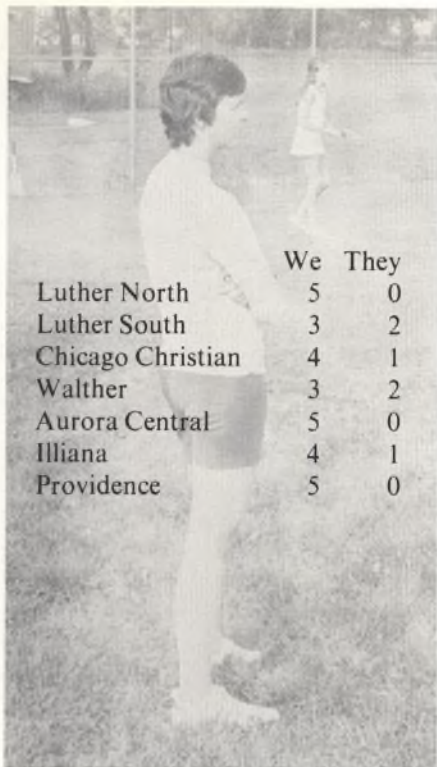

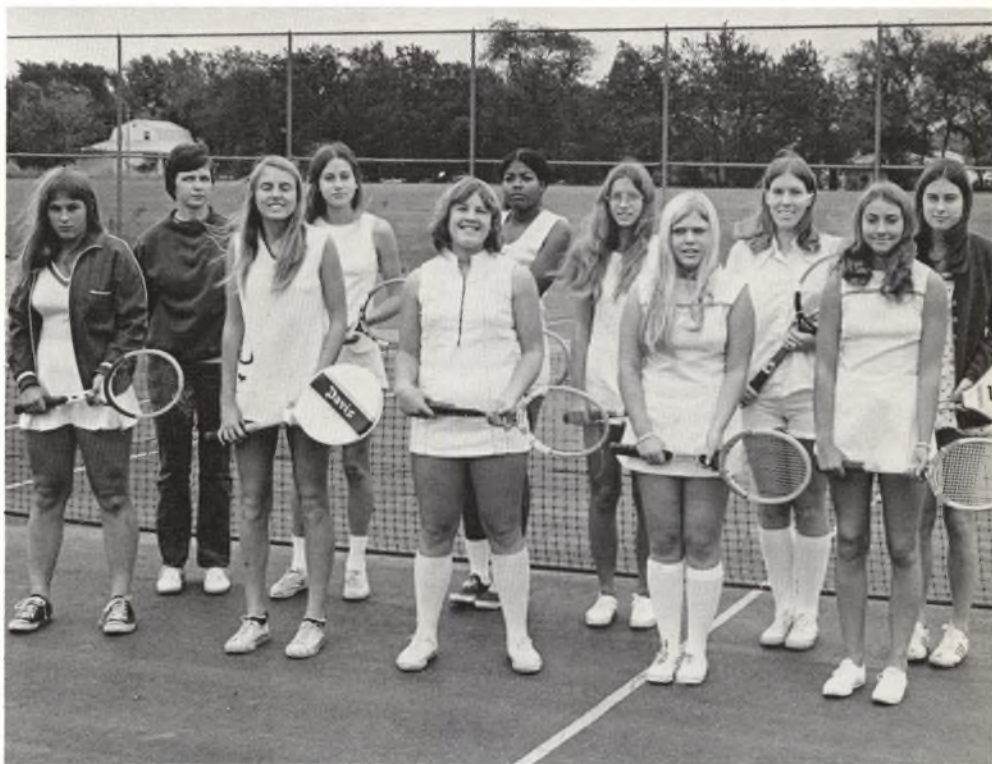
Timothy's second girls' tennis season was a successful one as the team took first in the Private School League with a record of 7-0.

the first three singles and the first two doubles counted in the match score.

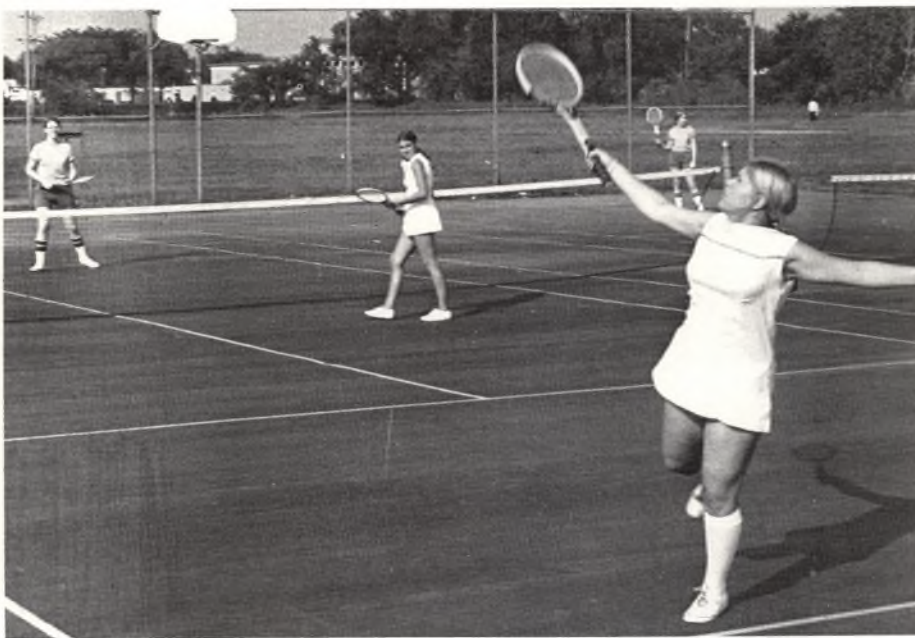
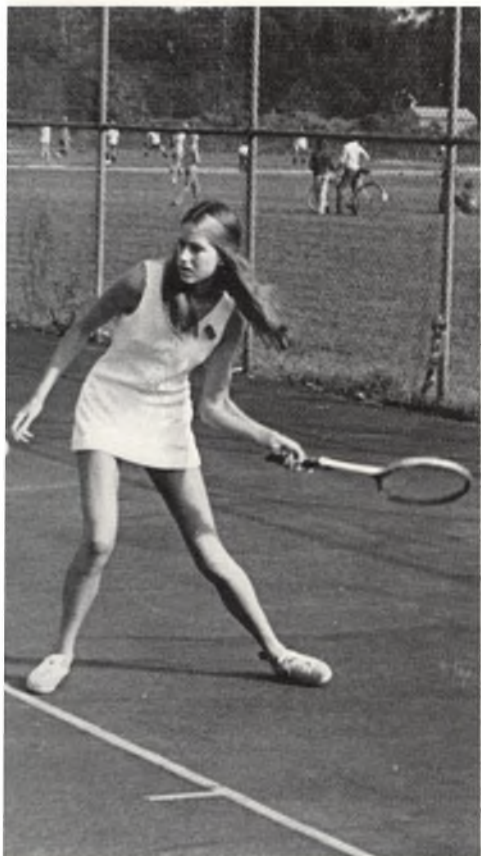

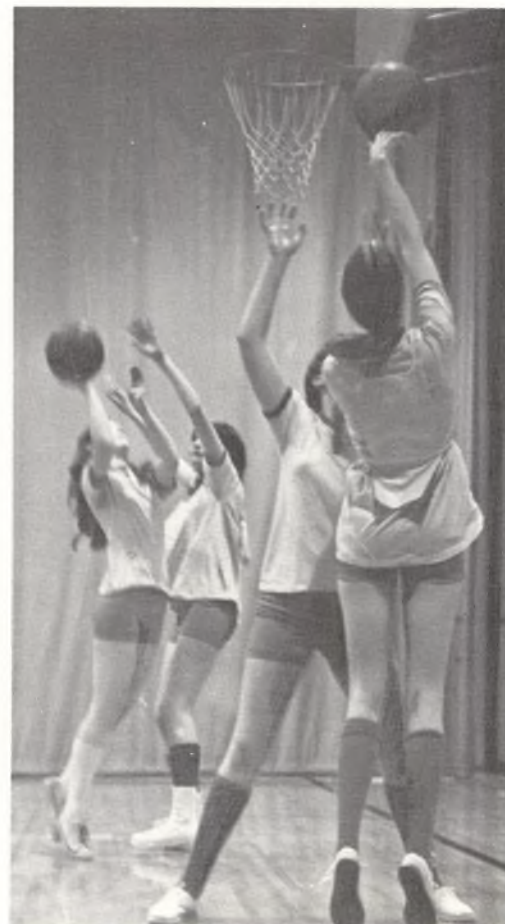

The guys' intramurals were supervised by Mr. Slager and Mr.

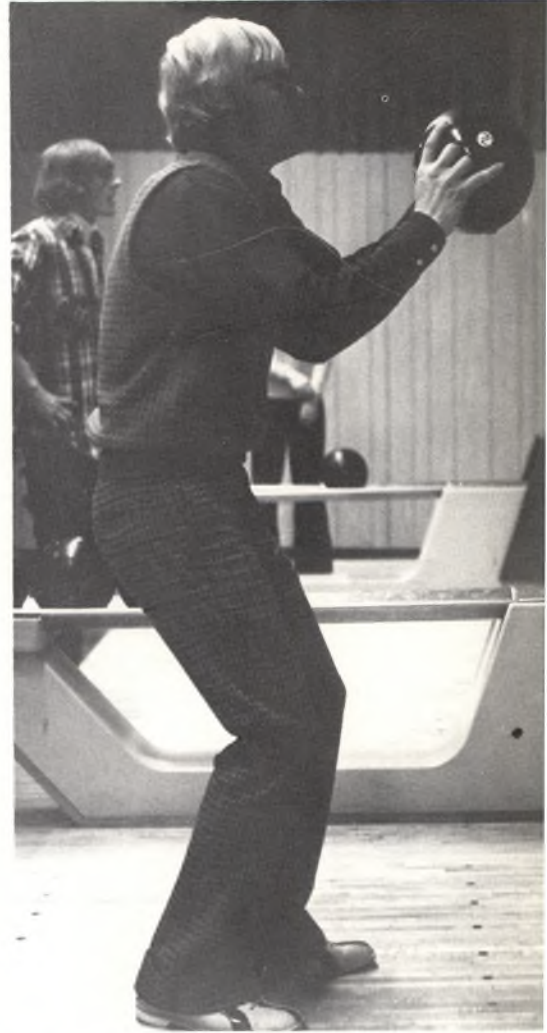

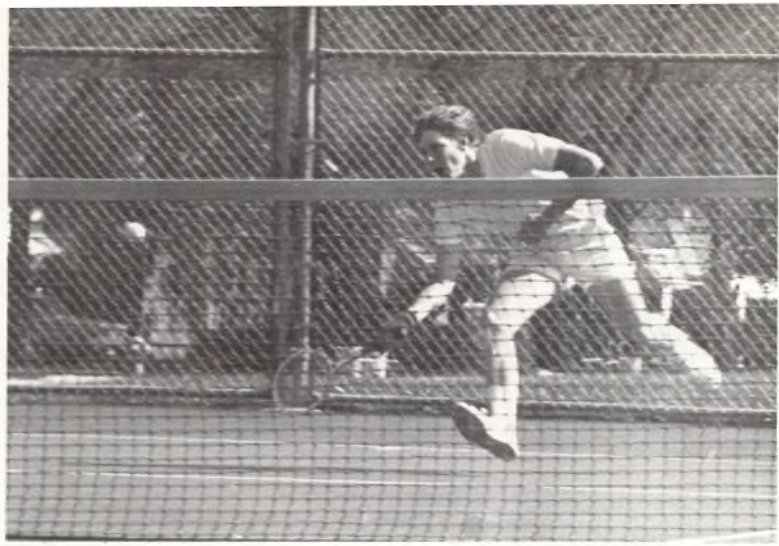



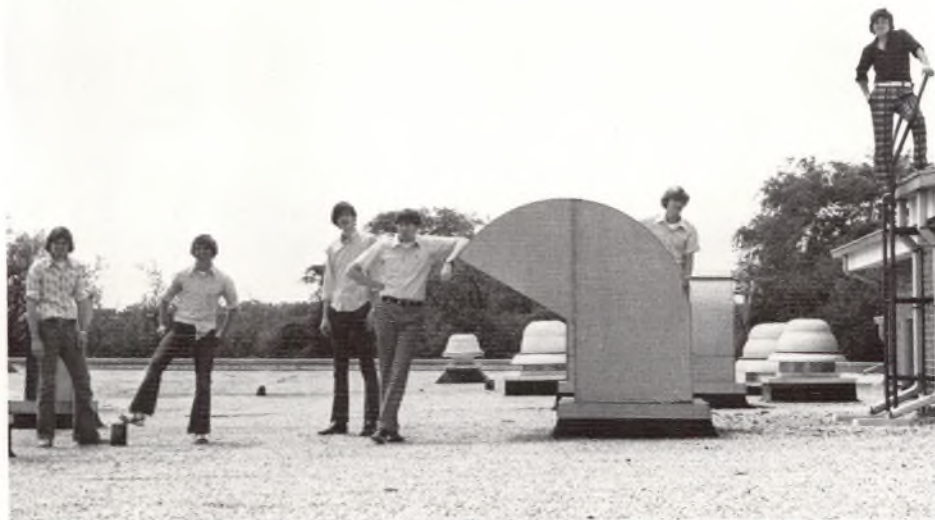

## Choir Claims Superior Rating

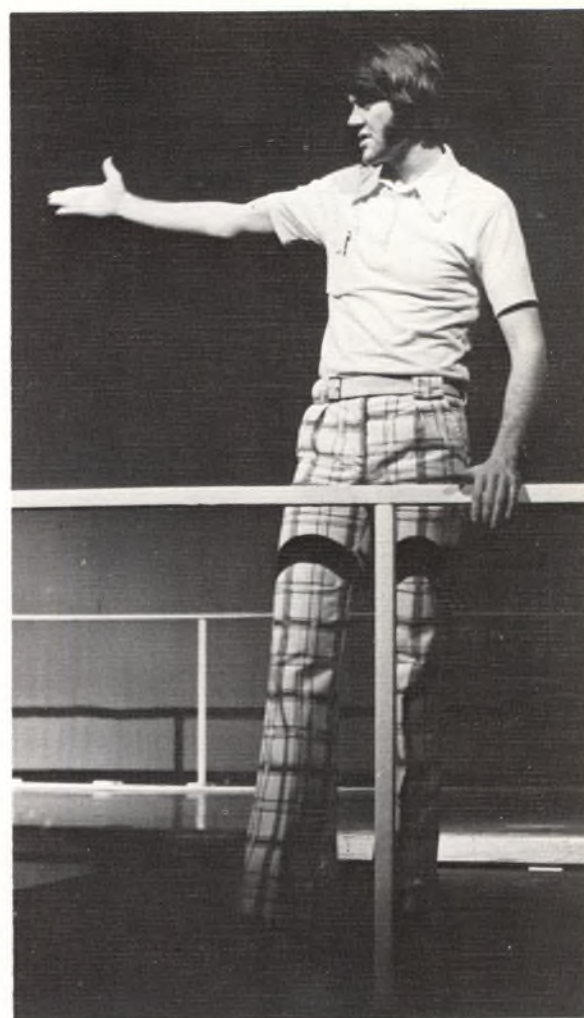

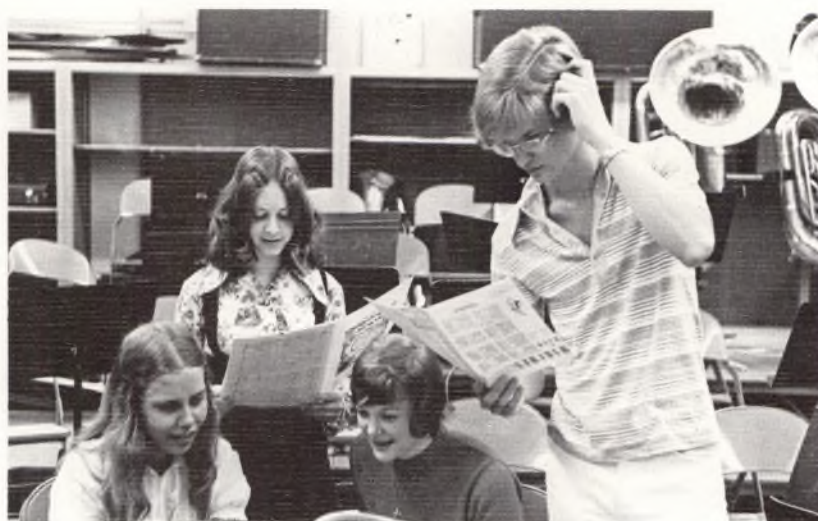

Chuck Slinkman, as the familiar stage manager, successfully assumed an aloof perspective as he filled the audience in on the facts and trivia of

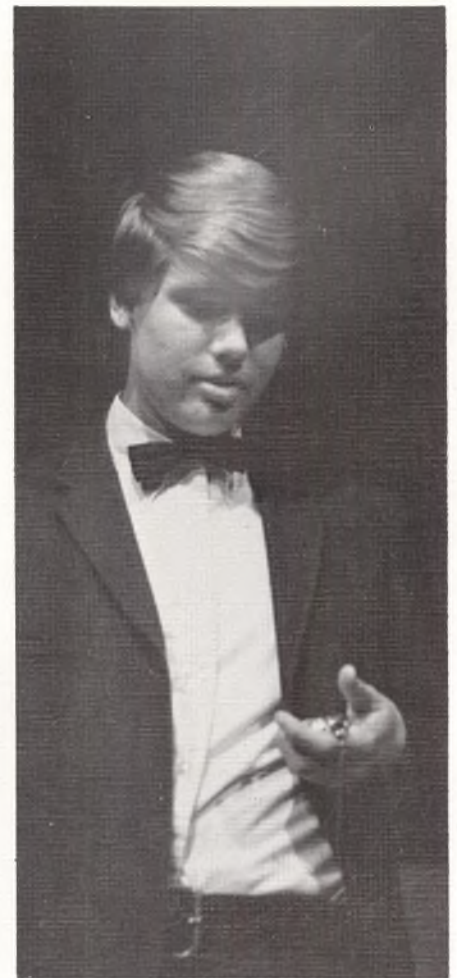
the town, the two families, and the love and marriage of Emily and George.

Bob Hoving, the conceited Sir Joseph, competed with Mike Van Denend alias Ralph Rackstraw, an able

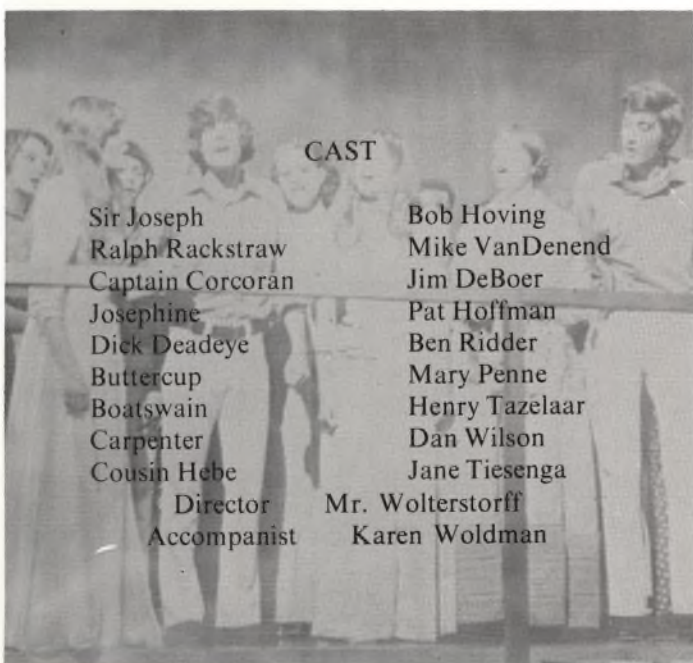

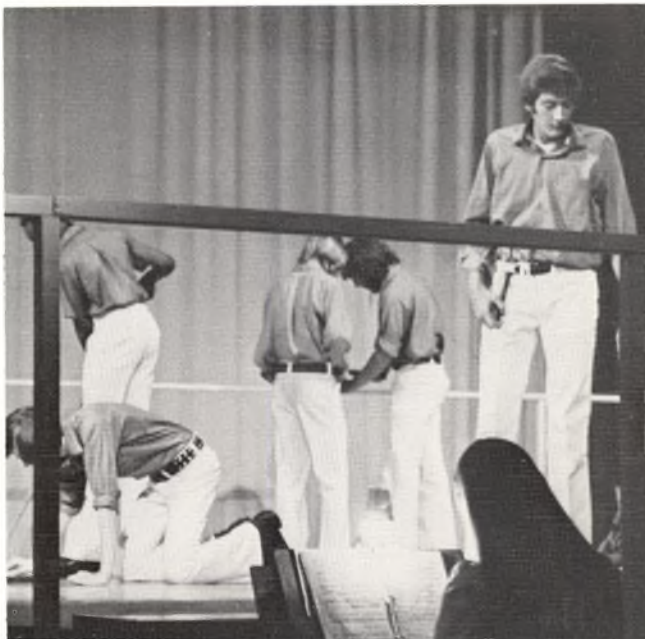

raising activities were also planned.

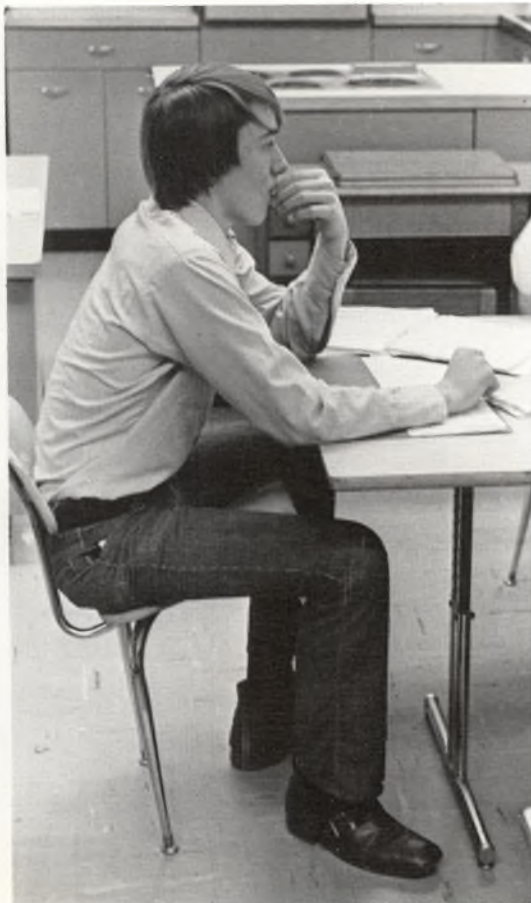

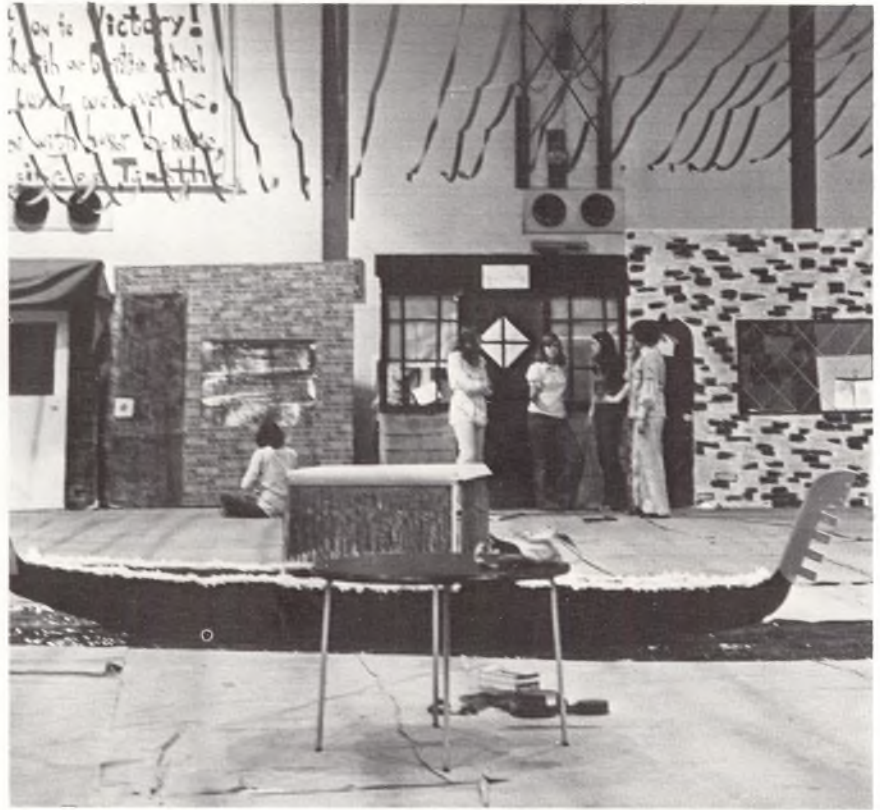

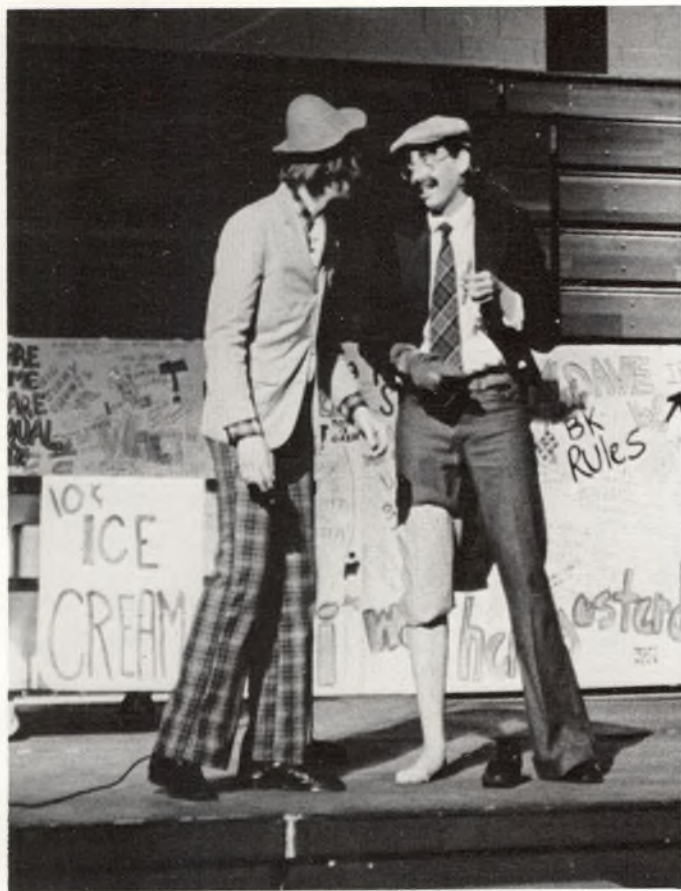

## Humor Highlights Awards Banquet

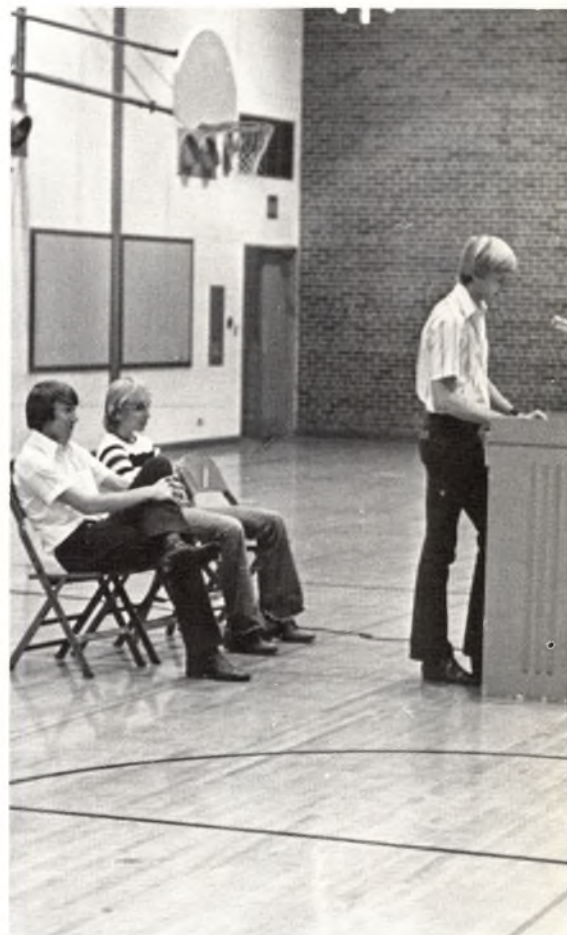
