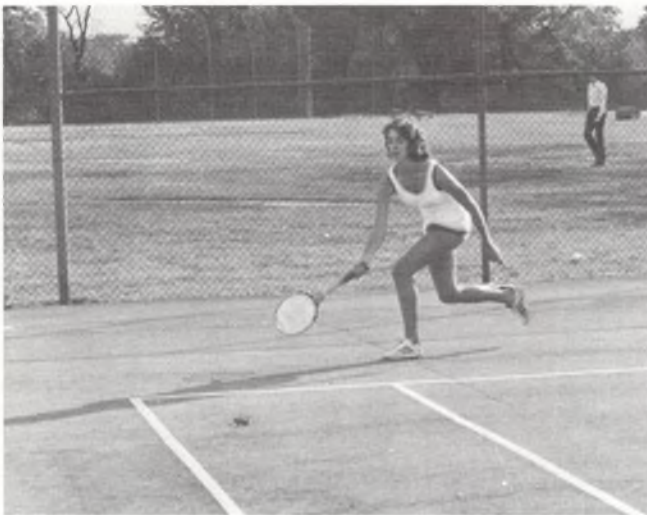
Take second in P.S.L. tennis

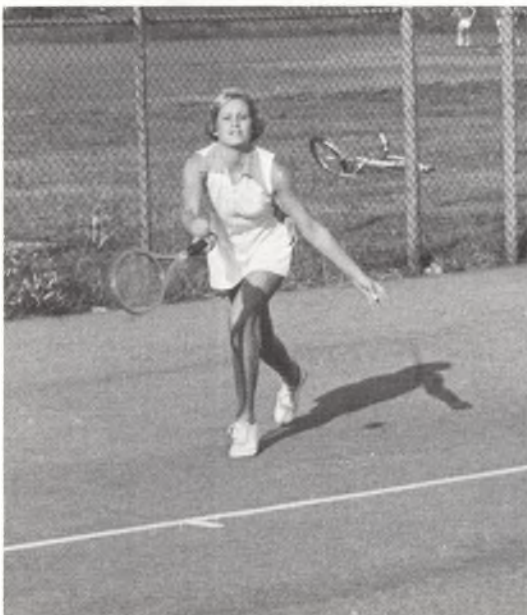

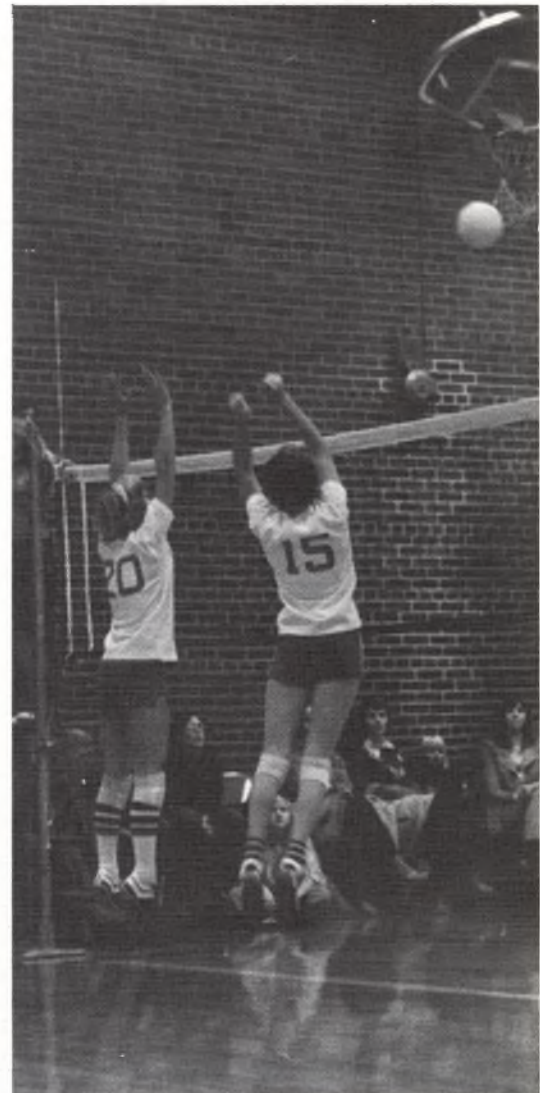
Volleyball has best season ever

Overall, they were 5-4, winning two non-league matches to go with their league wins. Also, the team averaged was 179.0 for the league matches, the best in Timothy's history. In the P.S.L.

finals, the team shot a 366 for 18 holes, ending the season with a fifth place. In the districts, the team did very well, posting a 356 team score and missing a chance to advance to the sectionals by only 6 strokes. Mike Heerdt, however, did advance to the individual sectionals with a score of 81, only to have his bid to advance downstate stopped there.

Unity in cross country pays off

The cross country team had a great year. Thanks to strong unity, good depth from the frosh-soph level and gutty performances from varsity runners, the team went downstate in the new Class A division.

The year started with varsity wins over IC and VanSteuben. The team took eighth in the Warren Invitational, a fifth in the annual Christian High School Invitational at Calvin, and a third place trophy at the Benet Invitational. Varsity took second place in the league, losing to Walther and Luther North, and in the PSL Finals, Walther squeaked by, pushing the varsity down to third.

On the frosh-soph level, even

with three runners pulled up to varsity at times, a fifth place in the league and the PSL Finals was achieved, with good showings toward the end of the year.

Varsity runners, John Munk, Jim Hoekstra, Bob Bollow, Dave Vander Velde, Phil Woldman, Mark Nordman, and Tim Loerop, pulled out a second place in the districts at Chicago Christian, qualifying them for the sectionals. In the sectionals, Timothy ran a strong race and grabbed a fourth place, beating Beacher, the first place team in the districts. Downstate in Peoria, the team finished with a strong fifteenth place, something to be proud of since there are over four hundred Class A schools in Illinois.

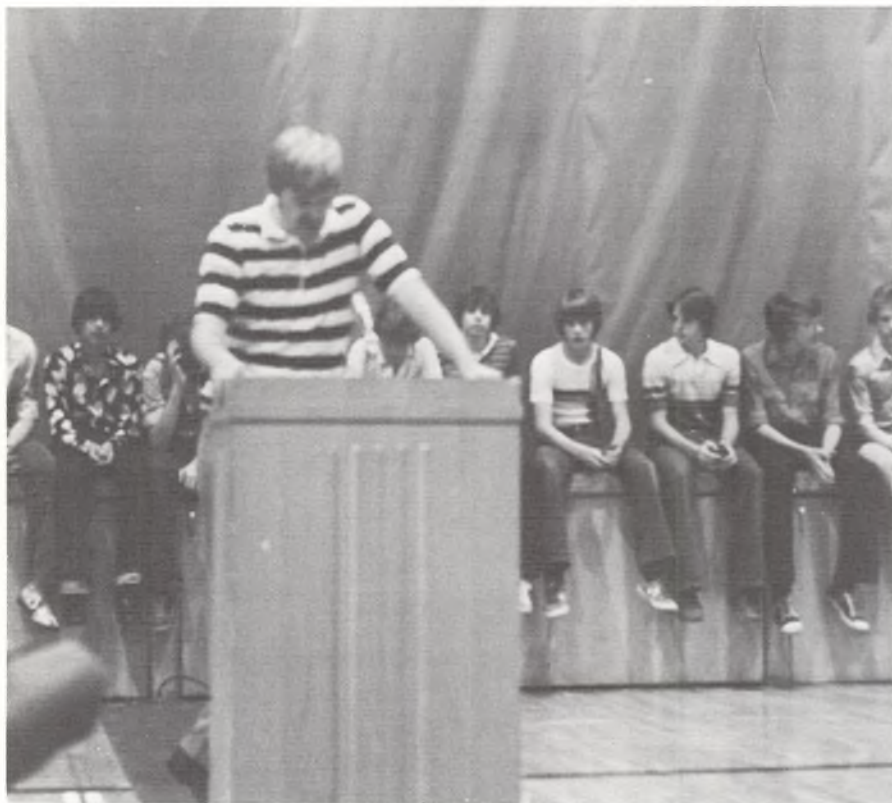
Freshman b-ball has winning season

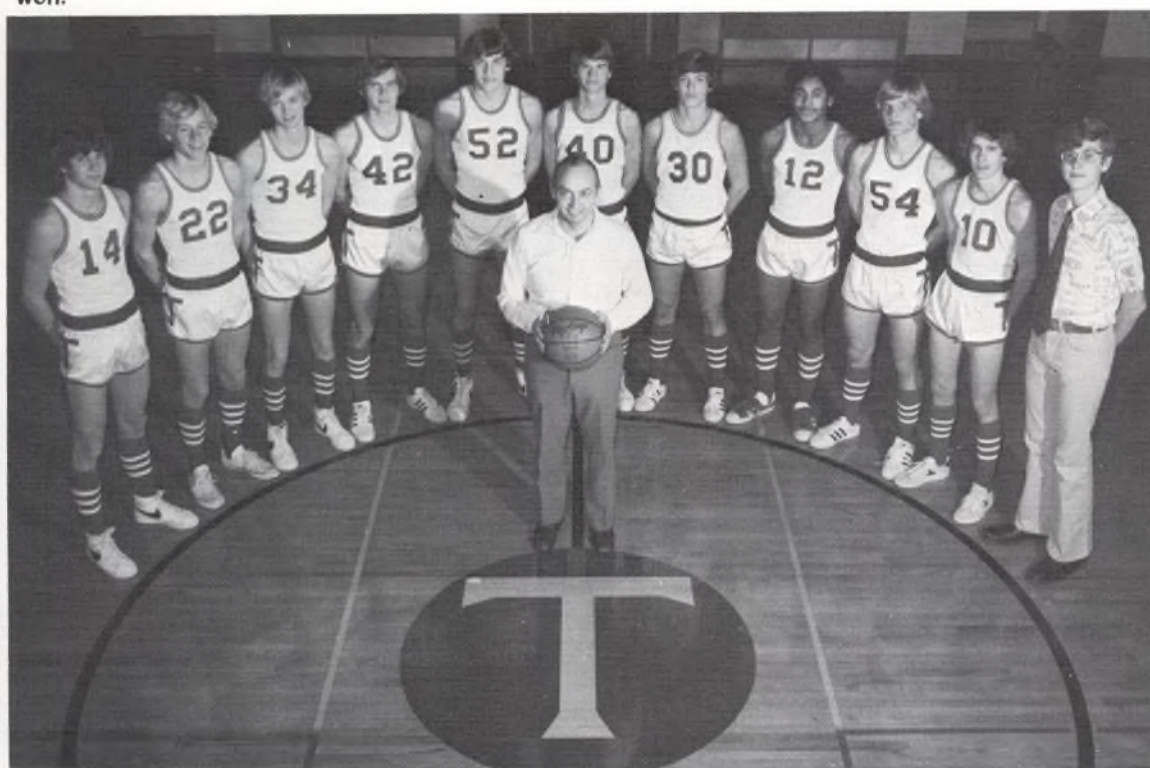


unusual end of basketball season

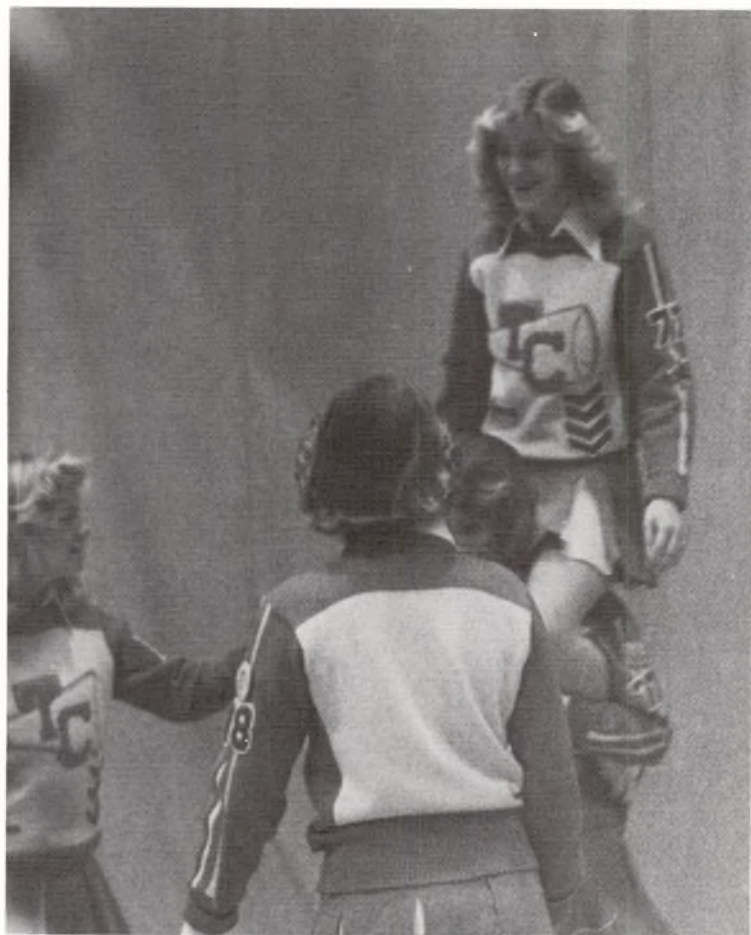

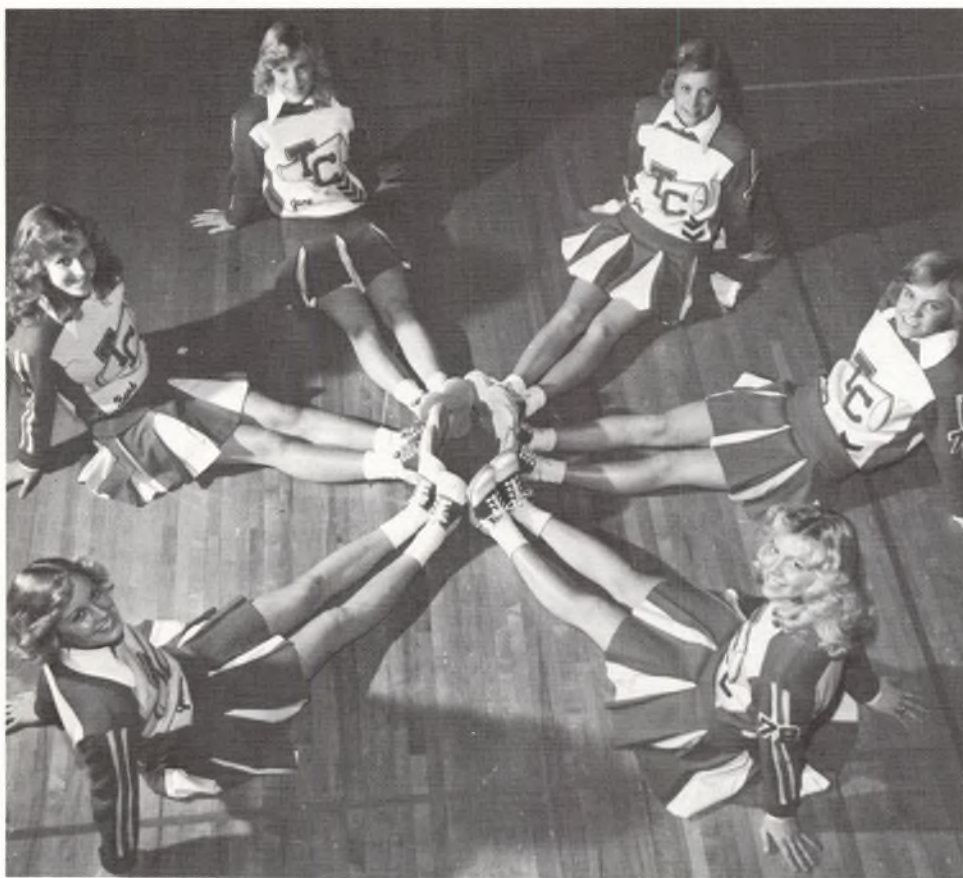

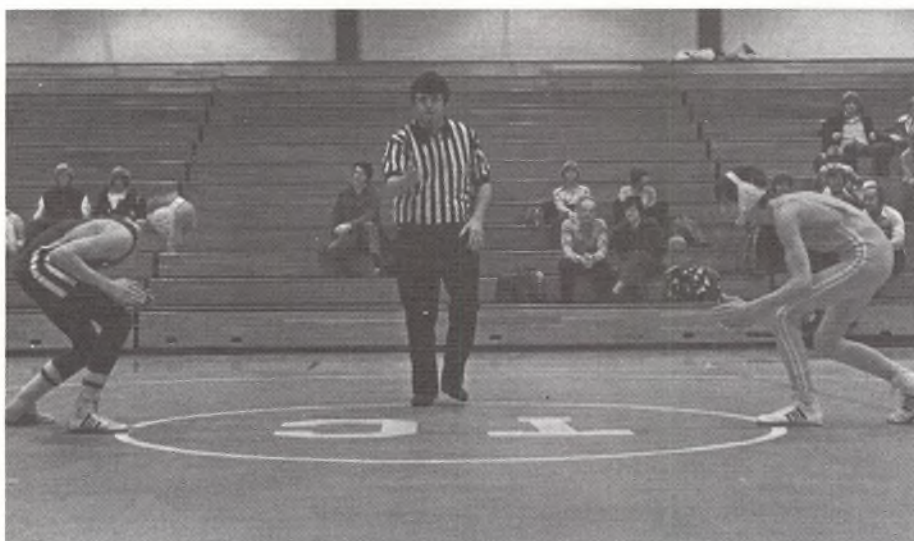
Middleweights make their mark

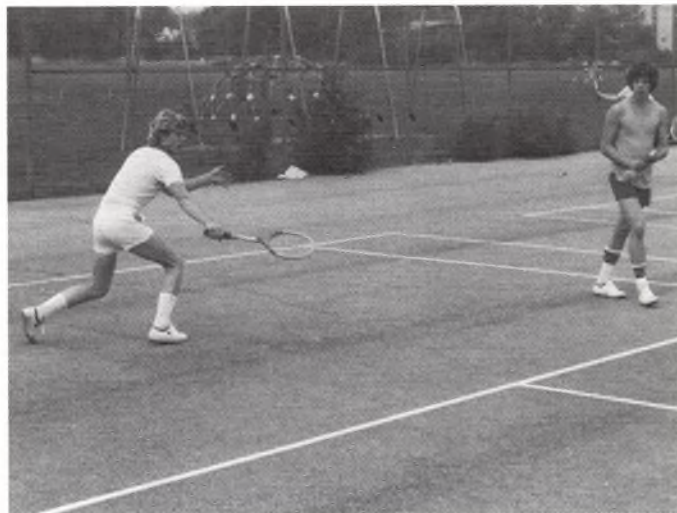

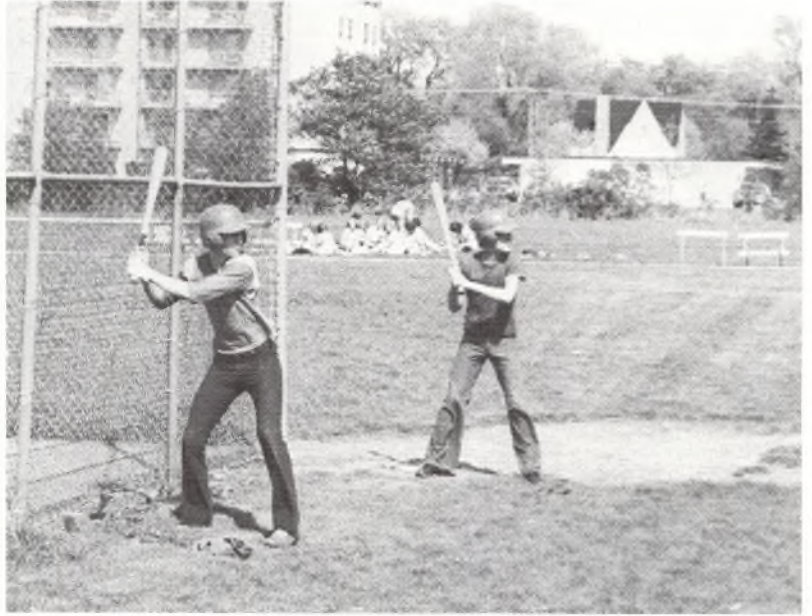
Young J-V team struggles to win

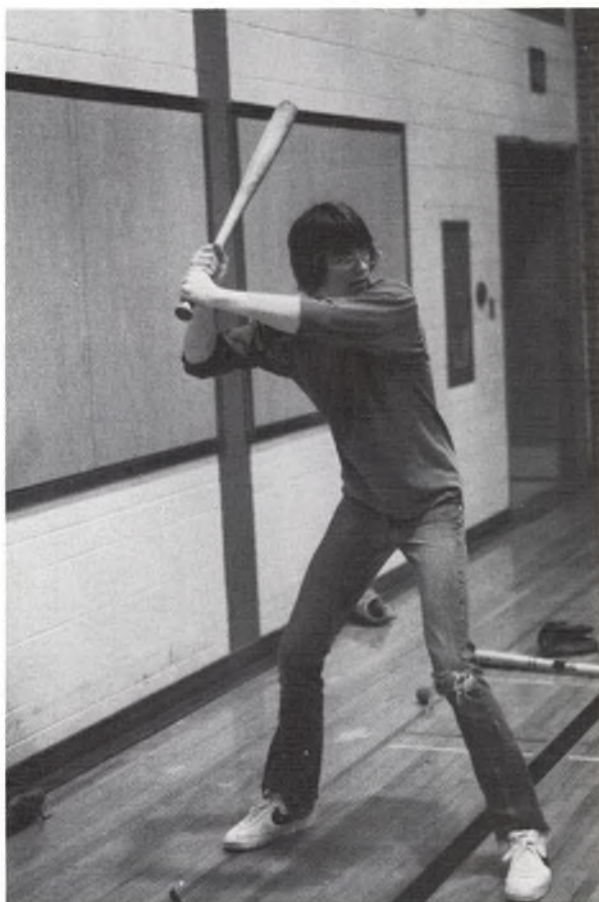
Varsity baseball fights back

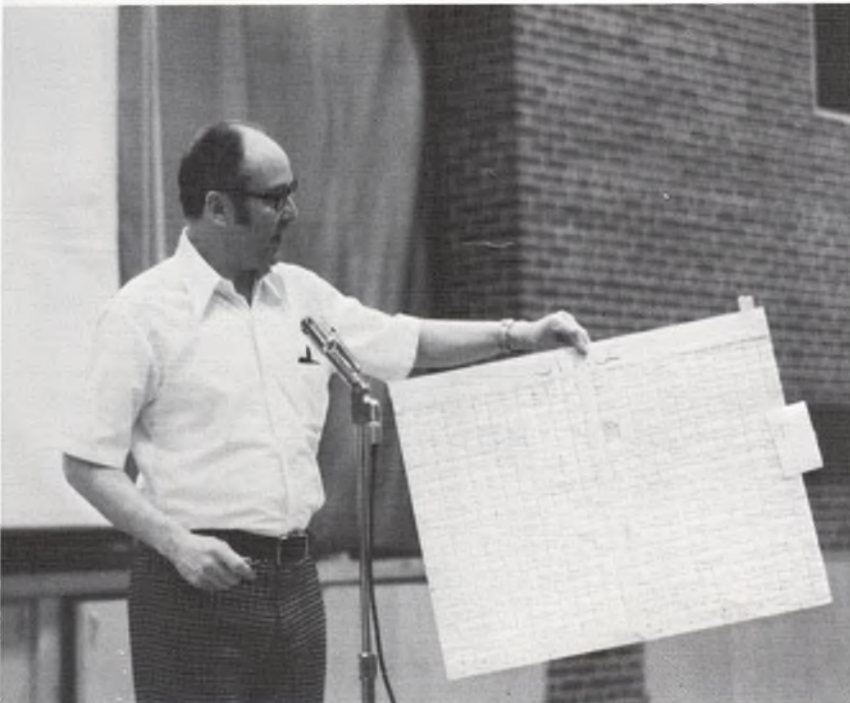

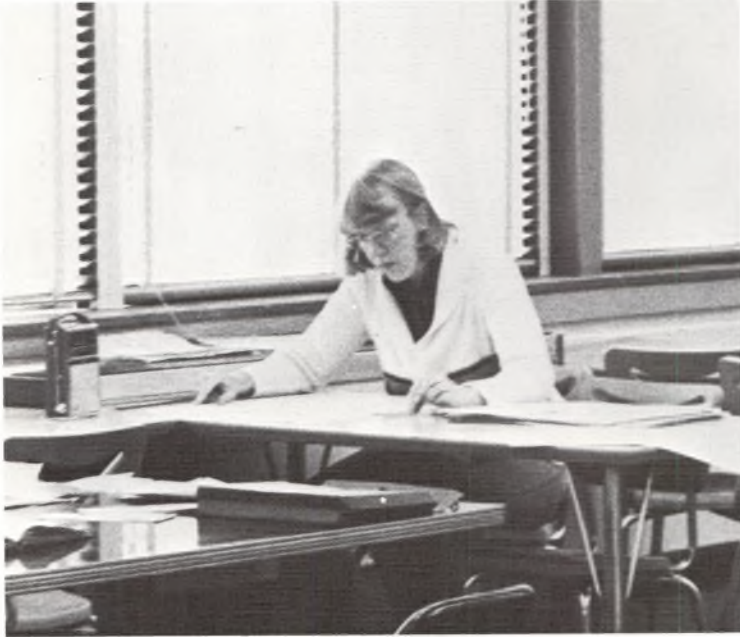

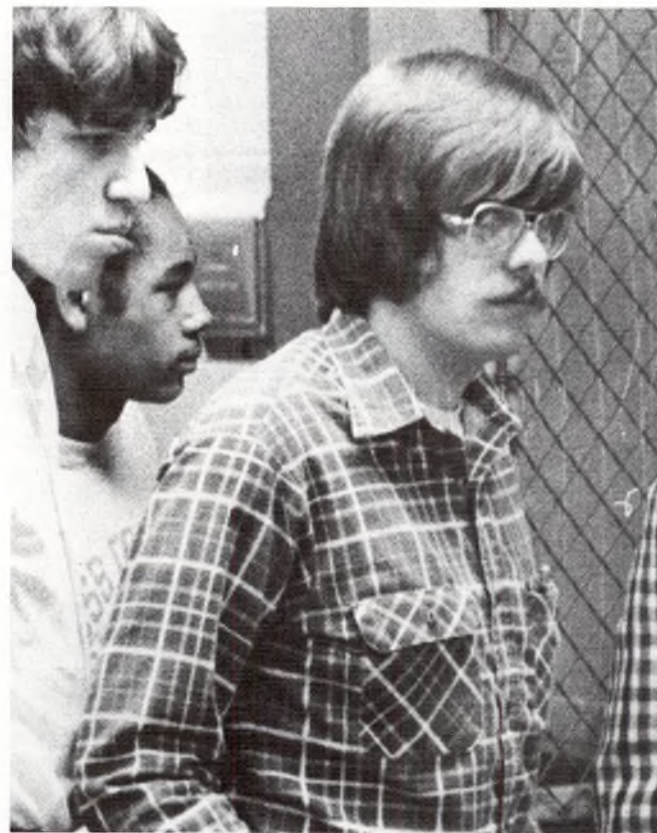
TRUMPET staff works long hours

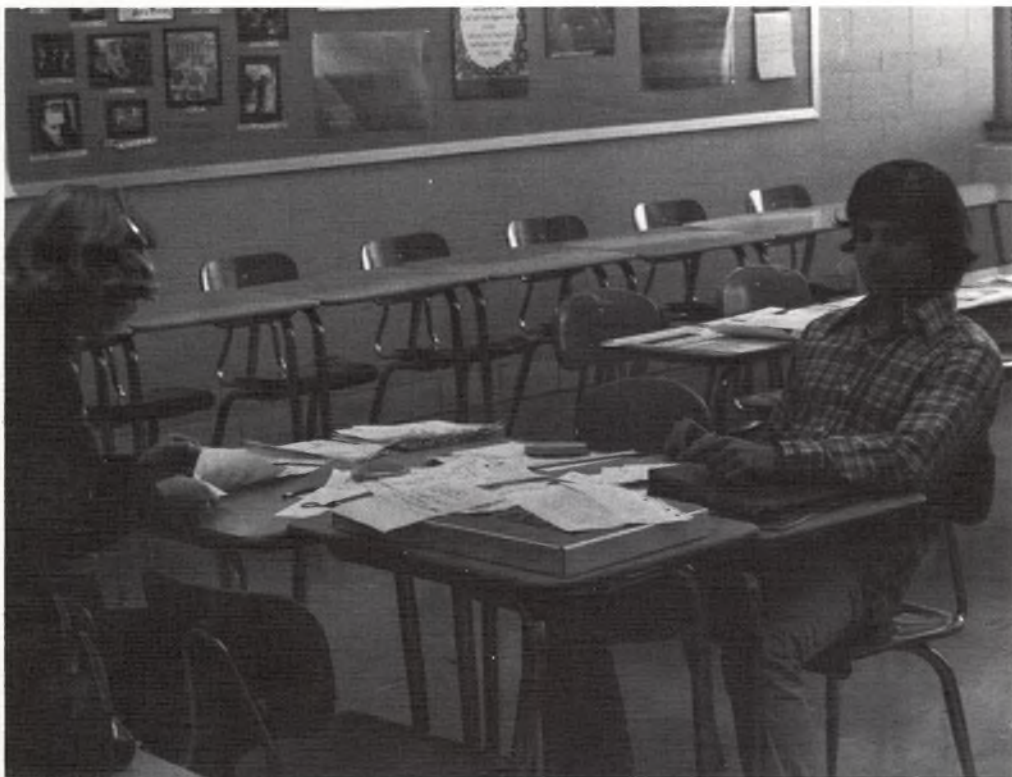

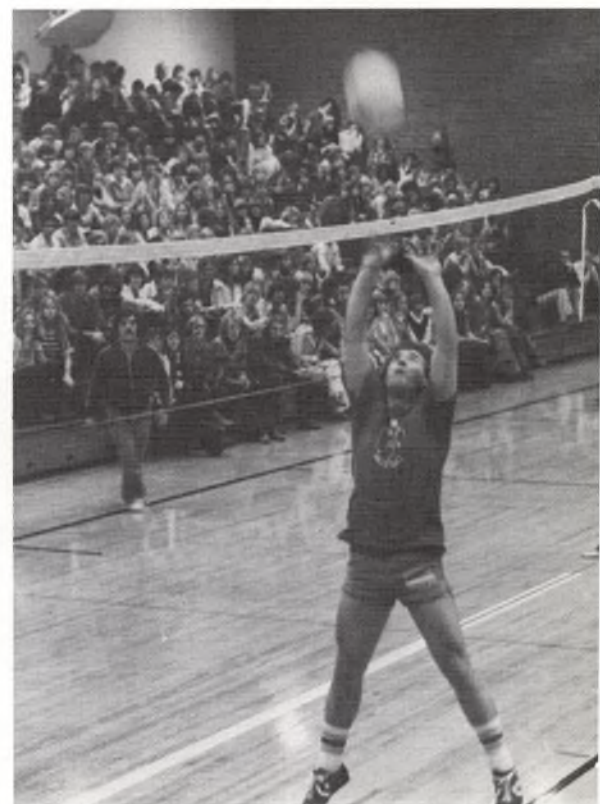

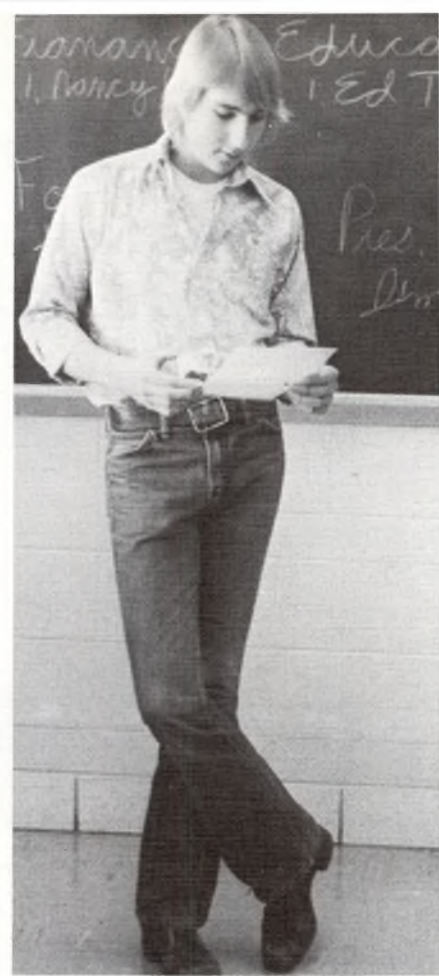
New clubs formed

German students started their program with basic grammar and spent time listening to labs. Second year classes plunged even further into grammar, competed in contests, and performed skits. 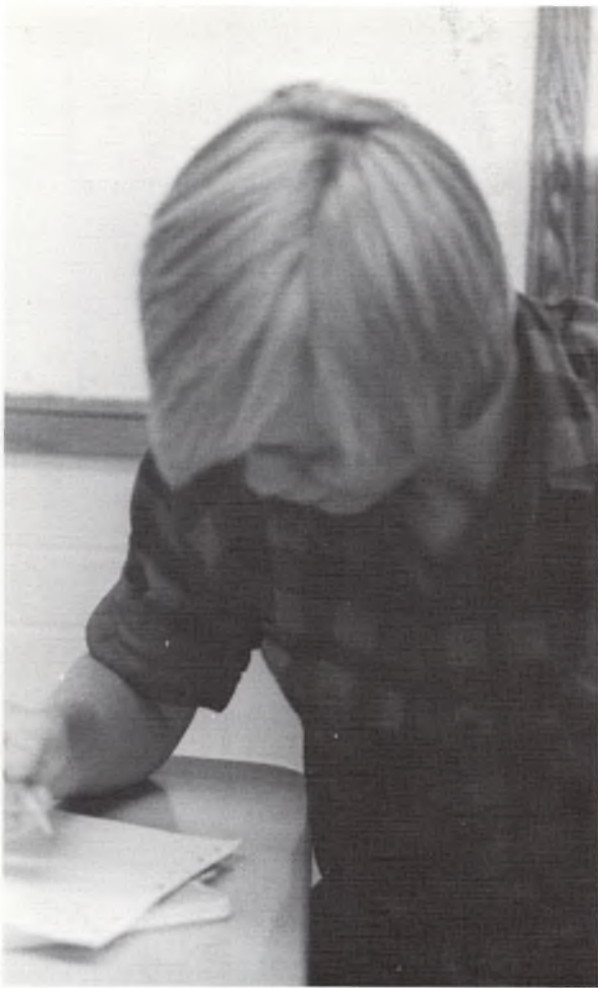

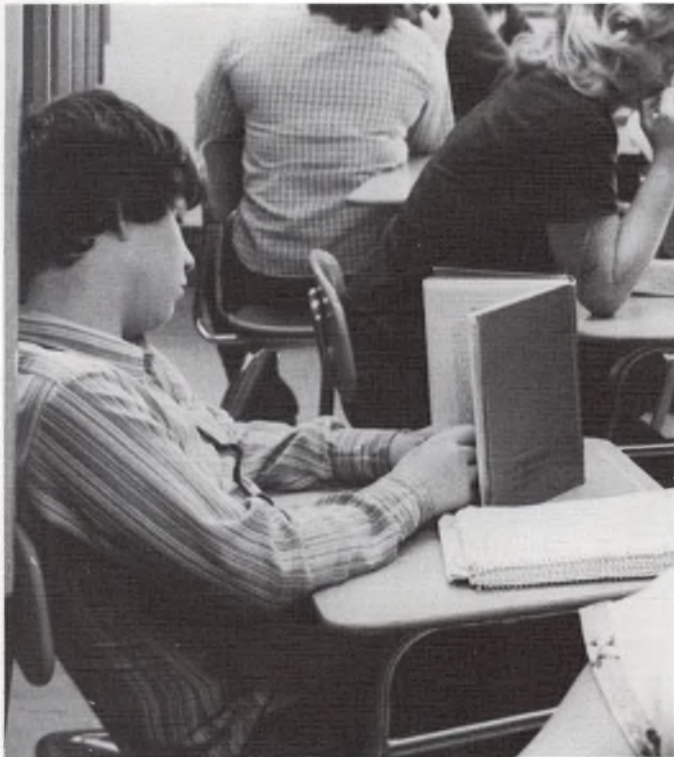

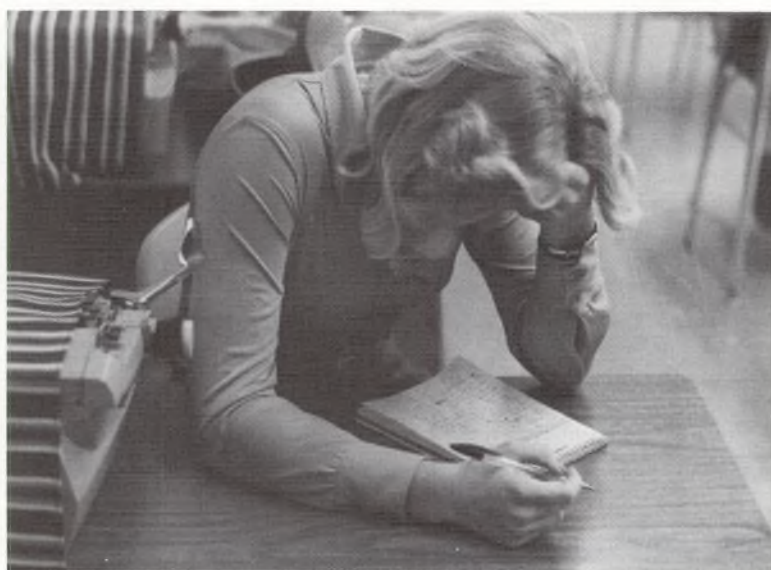

Many areas studied in math

The two-year math requirement was worked on by all underclassmen. In algebra, freshmen tried to fathom the mysteries of the foil method and slopes and intercepts. In geometry, students disliked proofs, tolerated formulas, and enjoyed jabbing each other with compasses. For some students, consumer math provided a refreshing, totally practical, elementary look at daily problems that relate

to mathematics. Algebra III and IV used a new book, covering the concepts of complex numbers, systems of equations and logarithms. Advanced math, intended for college bound math or science majors, gave a foundation in trigonometry, elementary calculus, matrix algebra, and probability. This course was definitely not intended for those afflicted with senior sloth.

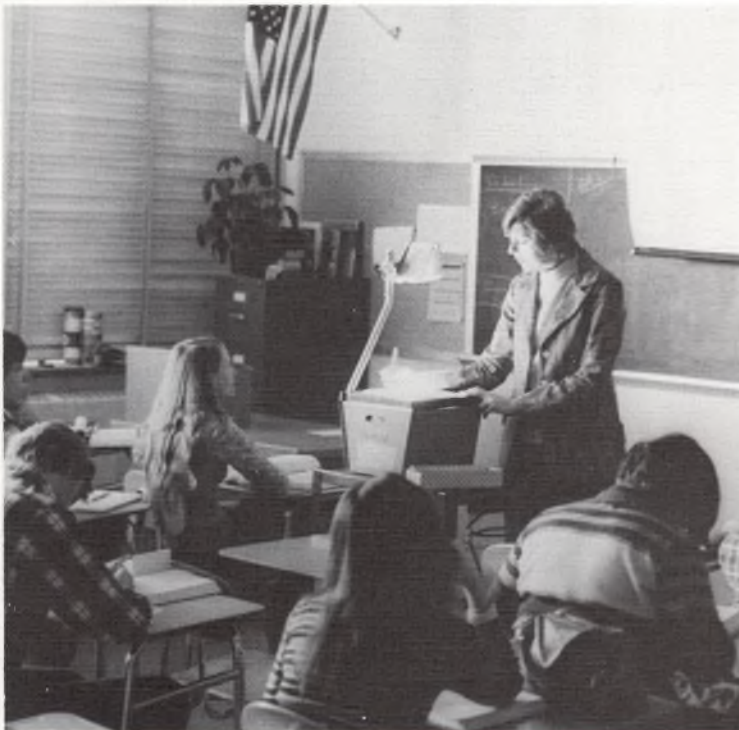

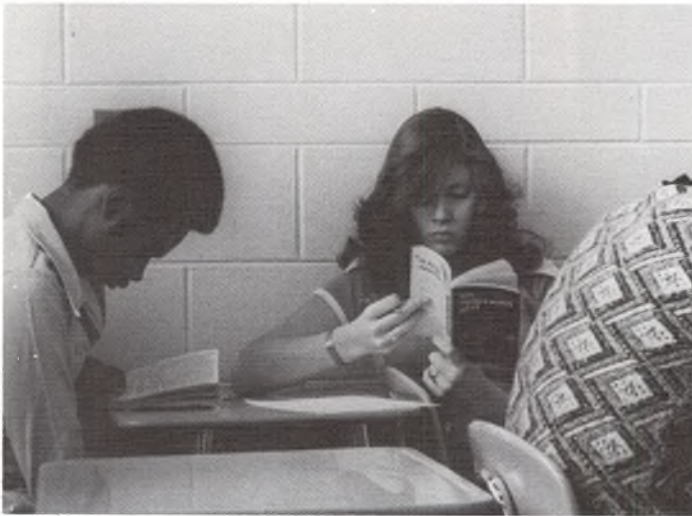

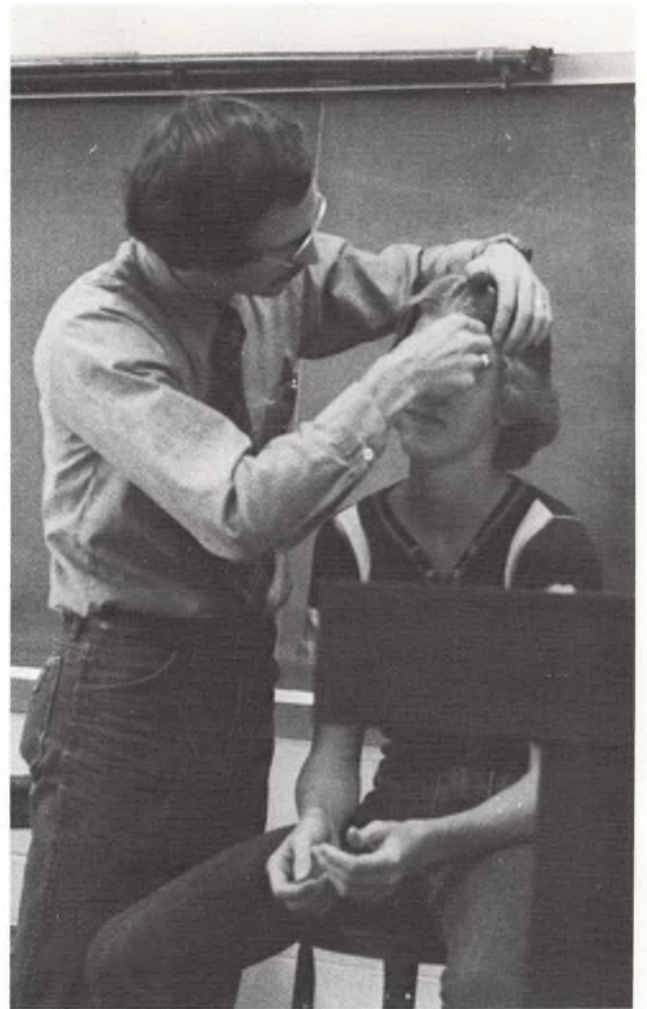
Freshman English was quite varied. Students studied grammar, drama, poetry, and short stories. They were able to try their skills at writing poetry and short stories and participate in improvisations. Sophomores studied *THE CRUCIBLE* and *MY ANTONIO* in their survey of American Literature by time period with Mrs. VanderVeer and by theme with Mrs. Stob. Each student was also required to write a term paper on a specific career. Juniors were able to choose their favorites from nine-week courses in drama, literature, and writing. Seniors who took English literature studied its history and various time periods from the medieval period with Chaucer's *CANTERBURY TALES* to the modern period with its authors such as Mansfield and Lawrence. The goal of English literature was to improve the student's abilities to read, write, and think critically. They were able to show their progress through term paper and book report in which they defended a thesis.

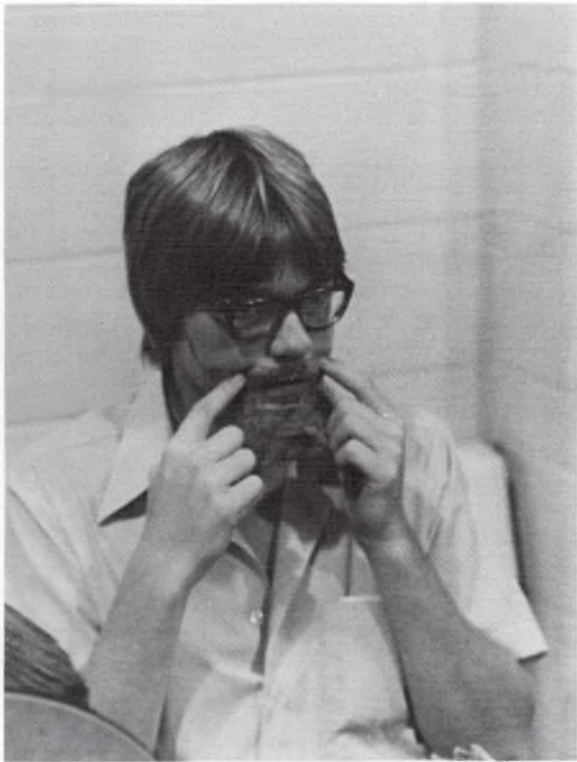

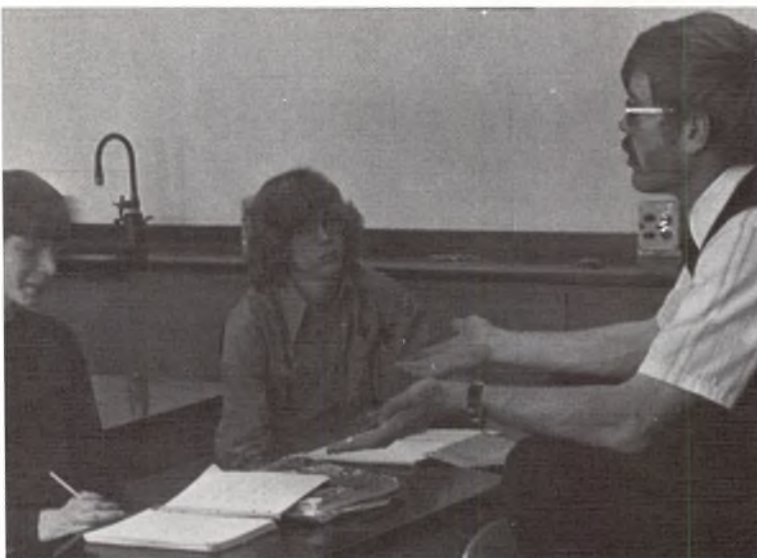

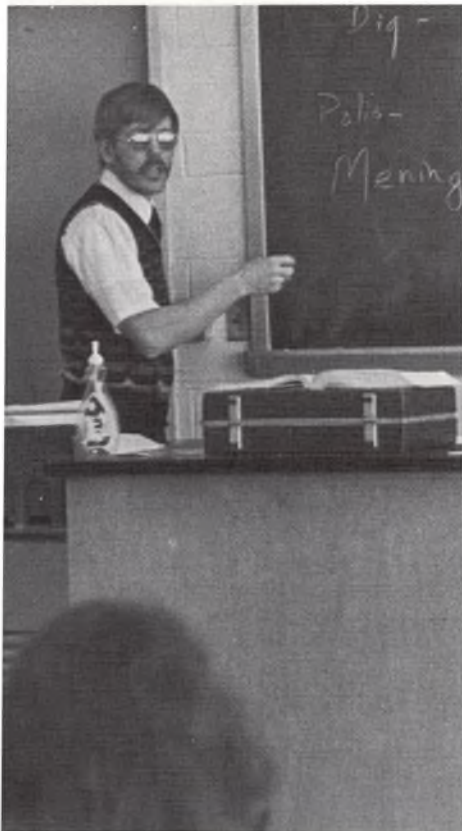

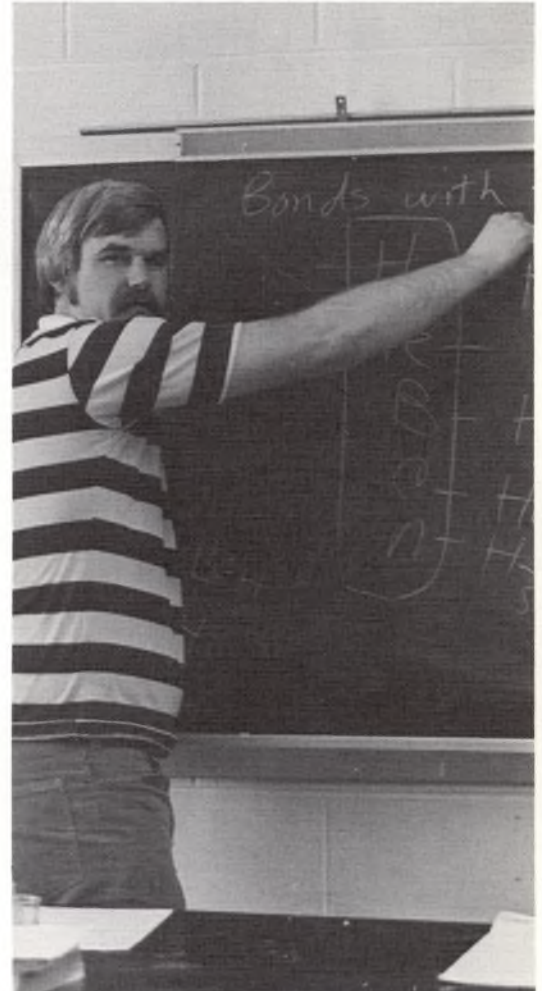

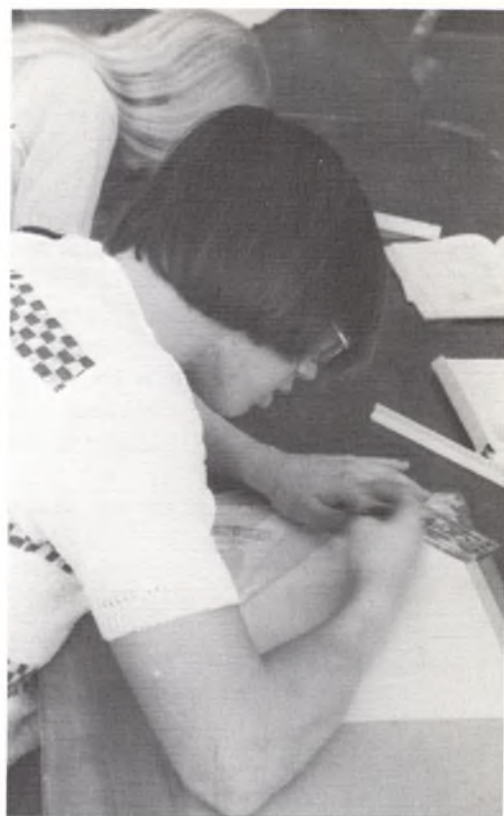
sample. In the sewing class beginners made their first mistakes on aprons for the foods class. All students were graded on the number and difficulty of the items made.

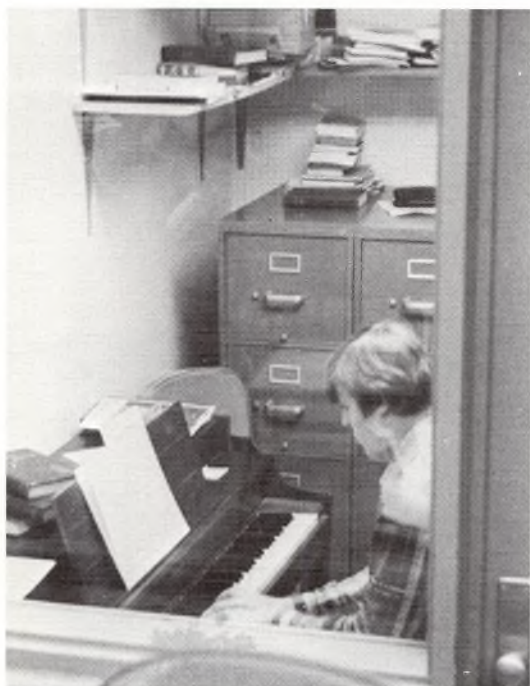

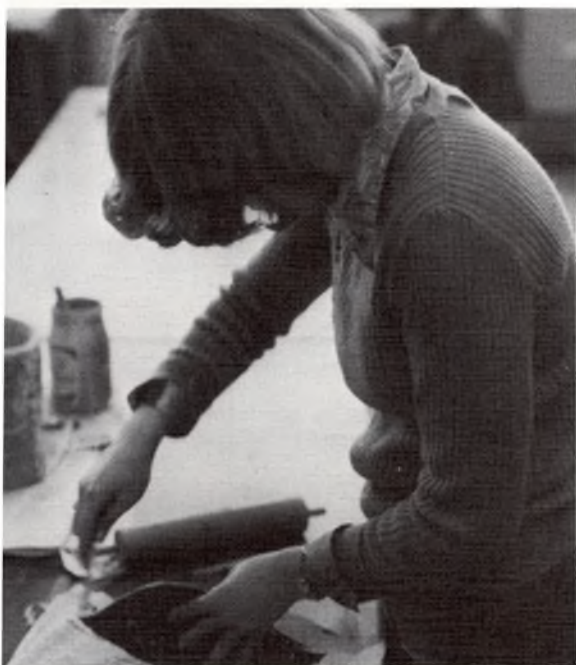

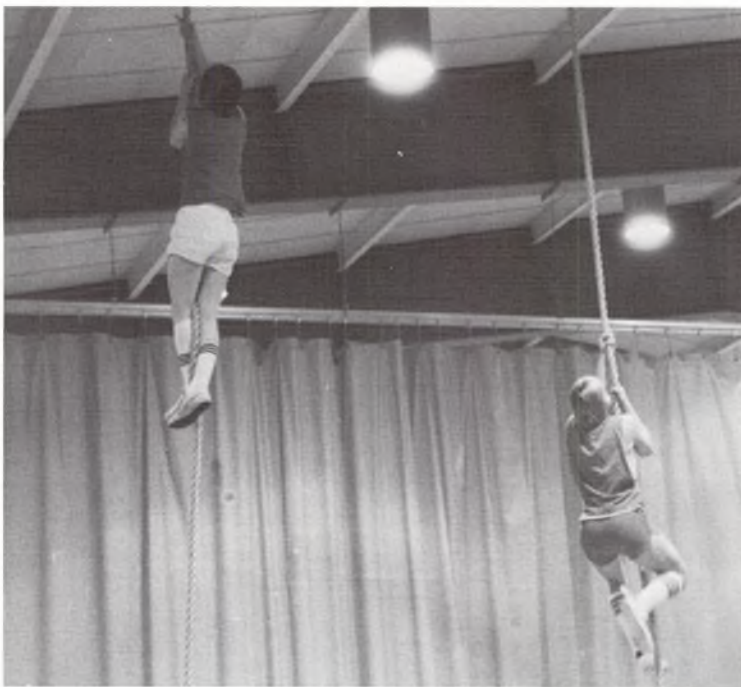

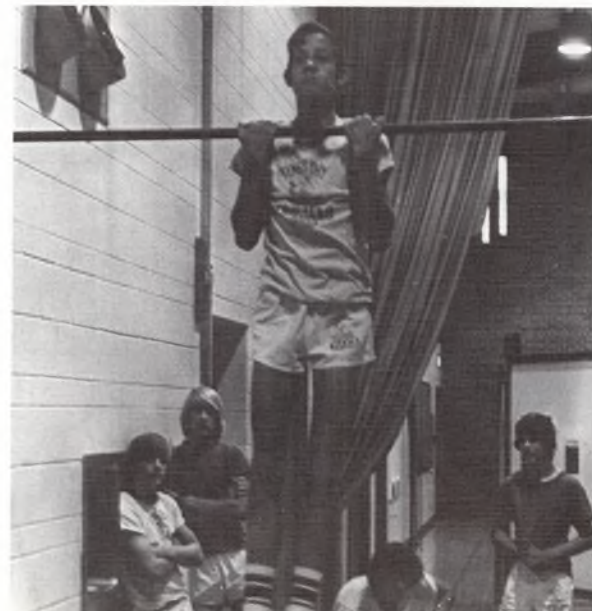

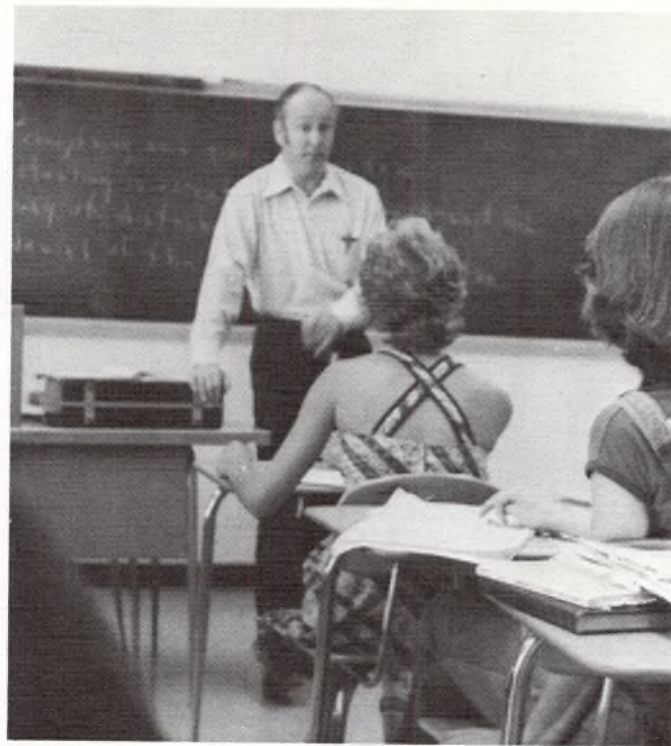

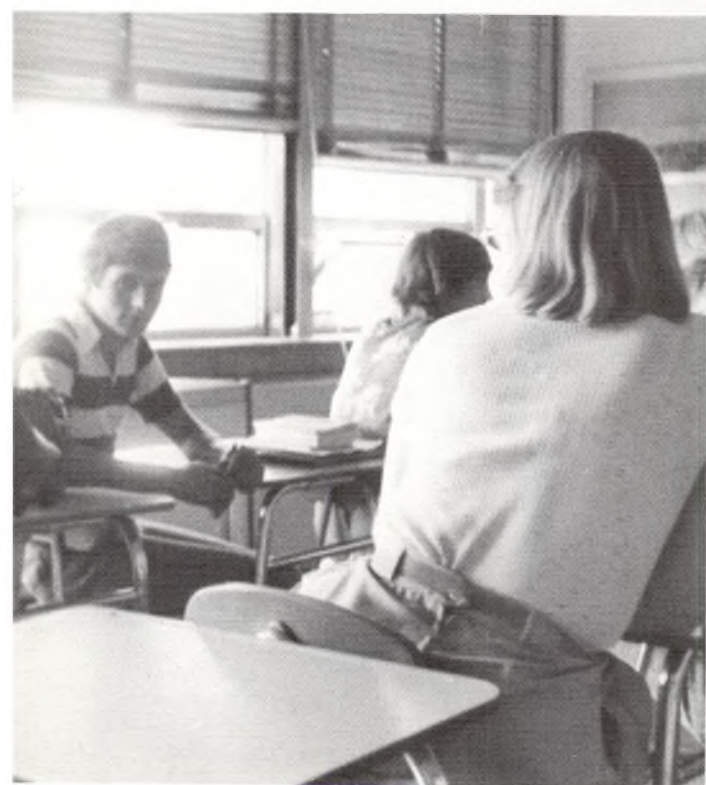
