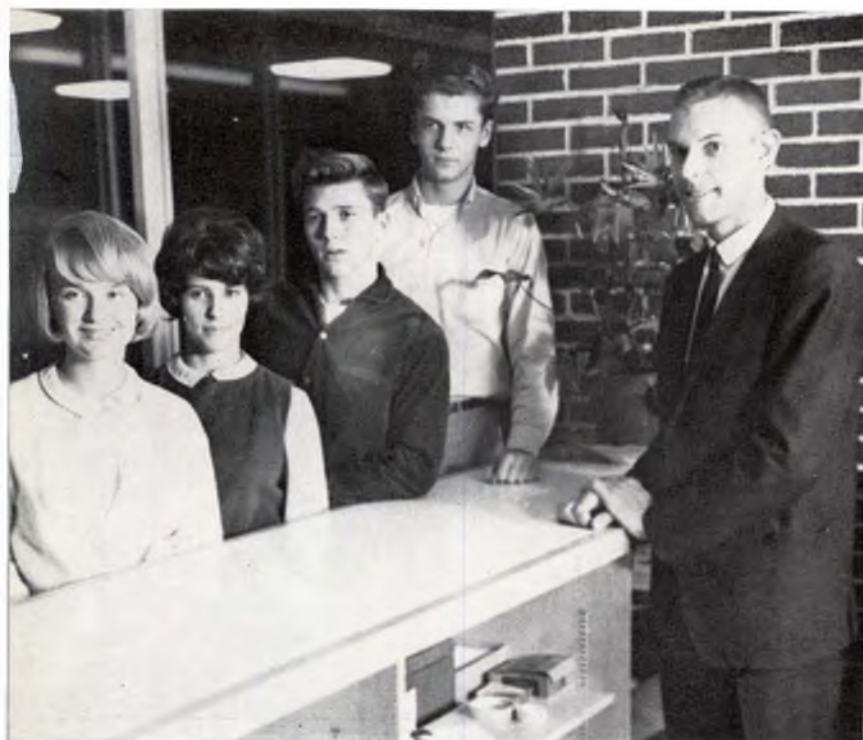

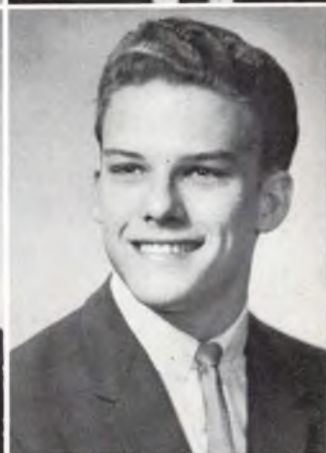

CLASS HISTORY

there was the beginning of class unity and loyalty. As a class we enthusiastically attended the first all-school bonfire. We were proud that members of our class won so many "firsts" at Timothy's First Annual Fine Arts Festival. And when the honor roll was printed in the *Trumpet* it seemed that our class always had the longest list of names. We had our first taste of Shakespeare when we read *Julius Caesar* in Mr. Hoekstra's English class. In the spring we had our class picnic—those who didn't fall in the lagoon got soaked when it rained, but we sang all the way home on the bus.

We had, of course, been looking forward to the junior-senior picnic, which would officially make us upper classmen, but somehow the plans were mixed up, the beach was closed and most of the new juniors were left behind. In spite of this, we were glad to be juniors. Early in the school year our class officers were elected and committees were formed. We readily found ourselves a more important part of the school: we joined clubs, gave barbecues, and worked in producing the school paper and the *Saga* of 1964. Our new class rings were symbols of our unity.

At our third all-school party we sat on the floor in room 10 and saw the movie *Anne Frank*. We took the National Merit Scholarship Tests. The highlight of the year for us was the Junior-Senior Banquet. We collected old bottles, driftwood and barrels to make our theme, "A New England Fishing Village" truly authentic. A newly organized folk singing group, dubbed "The Barnacles" impressed the senior class and received requests to provide entertainment for other school activities.

We all took part in the presentation of "The Green Bough" and were excited by the close race between Dirk Pegman and George Vande Worken for the Student Council Presidency. It was a difficult decision for the voters with two well-qualified candidates but at the Awards Banquet we learned that Dirk was our new president.

It hardly seemed possible that our junior year was over when we found ourselves seniors, but our other years of high school had brought fun, understanding and unity, and our last year was sure to be the same. "The Mouse That Roared" was as successful as our first play had been. Because of the huge cast and large numbers of people needed for production, almost the whole class was involved. Our senior year brought more fun and harder work. It seemed that there was always an English theme due. We attended our last all-school party. In September we carried copies of *Wuthering Heights* and tried desperately to finish reading it before the deadline. November brought the homecoming game . . . a proud evening for us; our queen, Carol, was radiant in a long blue gown, and our varsities defeated the alumni. We all took Bible with Rev. Shell. We sponsored a successful pancake breakfast and a talent show and gave numerous barbecues. As spring arrived, announcements of scholarships received were frequent. We also heard the news that Dr. Youngs would be leaving with us in June to accept a position at Calvin College. Committees planned our class trip, a trip by jet to Washington, D.C., for April 19th. Two days after our return we attended another Junior-Senior Banquet but this time relaxed because all the planning had been left to the juniors. The end of April brought the Fine Arts Festival for which many of us had been preparing for months.

Senior Night, a formal evening, and Ditch Day, a casual gathering, are spring traditions for the seniors of Timothy. These were the class of 1965's two last official activities as a class.

Graduation: June 11, 1965—we had known the date all year and yet it came all too soon. Timothy, for four years, had been the most important factor of our lives. At Timothy we gained knowledge, friends, fond memories and fun, and we gained all of these things in the perspective of Christianity. Graduation came, and with it the realization that although we must look forward and separately make our lives, we, the Class of 1965, will always be united in our memories.

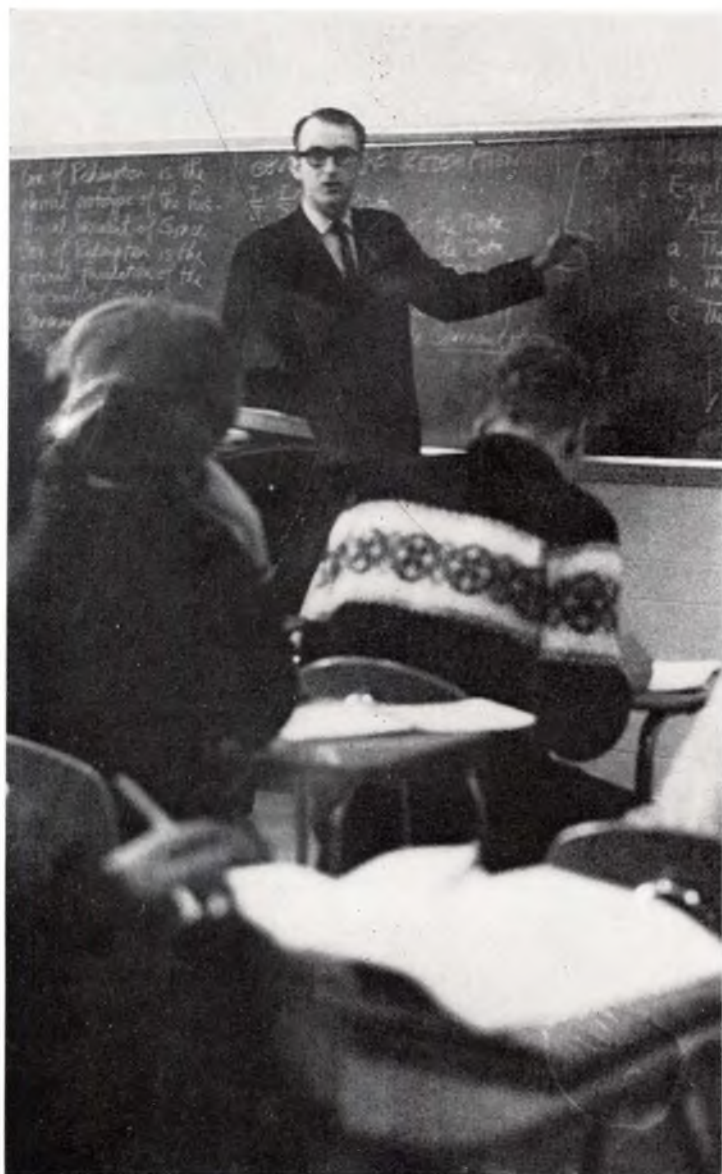

BIBLE

As Christians, one of the main goals in our lives is to learn about God through His Word. Each student at Timothy takes four classes in the study of the Bible: Old Testament, New Testament, Church History and Reformed Doctrine. By studying each book of the Bible and learning the Church's history from its beginning to the present, he is fulfilling this ideal. Finishing Bible IV, the senior better understands the doctrines of Christianity.

LANGUAGE

Four years of Latin and four years of German are offered for College Prep students. After the first two years of learning grammar and building a vocabulary, on-going German students read history and famous German authors while Latin scholars translate works of Roman writers.



ENGLISH

The English courses which students take throughout their four years are varied and comprehensive. Great poetry, novels, plays and other important literature become familiar to the student. In addition, there is an emphasis on self-expression through the various types of writing.

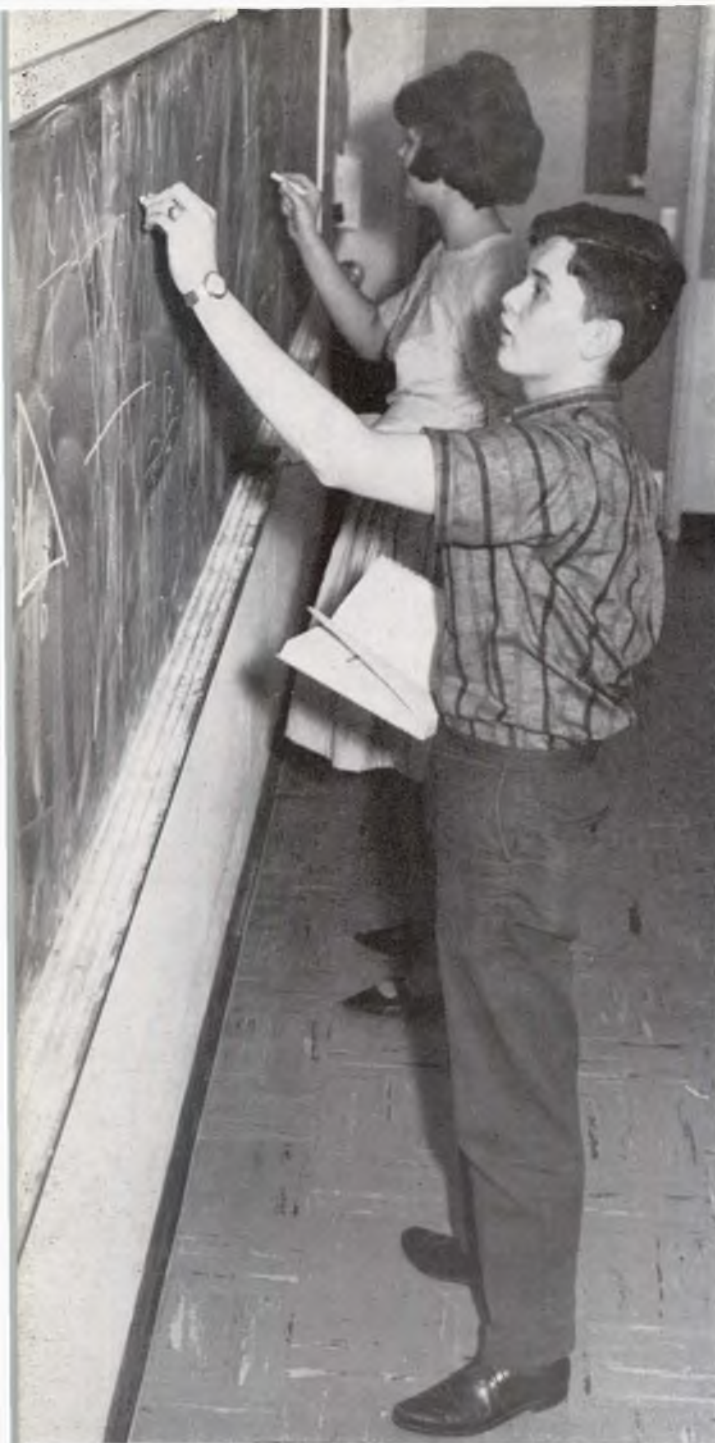

MATHEMATICS

Since a knowledge of mathematics is necessary for today's graduates, freshman algebra and sophomore geometry are requirements in each student's schedule. Many go on to advanced algebra, where they progress into the study of conic sections and logarithms. Advanced math, a semester of trig and one of analytic geometry, puts to use all the concepts previously learned. Through the study of math, the students are more aware of the logic and order of God's world.

SCIENCE

The mysteries of the atom, the fascination of living organisms, the immensity and the minuteness of our world—all of these areas reveal God's greatness and power. General science and physical science cover these facets in general, but the BSCS Biology, the PSSC Physics, and the CHEM Chemistry courses consider them in depth. Special films and experiments by the students themselves are a regular part of the science class. Questions are raised and teachers answer, always with the realization that science is progressing and expanding as new theories are adopted.

SOCIAL STUDIES

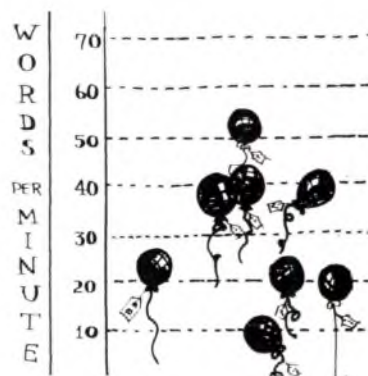
The social studies classes of world and American history expand our knowledge of 20th century culture back to ancient Egypt, Greece, and Rome. Through the accomplishments of great men, and of small men too, we can better understand our own times. With a semester's study of Communism in modern history, a probing of the challenges facing our society in "soc," and an awareness of our government's functions through American Government, students are better prepared to take their place in society after graduation.

COMMERCIAL

The commercial courses include two years of shorthand and typing and a year of bookkeeping. In these classes, students who plan to enter the business world after graduation receive training for secretarial and other office work. After a year of concentration on basic skills, second-year classes learn filing, the use of dictaphone, and methods of filling out various forms. This, of course, is in addition to their basic goals of improving their shorthand speed and typing accuracy.

PRACTICAL ARTS

HOME ECONOMICS

"Who says we can't cook?" is a valid question, if that questioner happens to be a home ec student. She studies cooking from vitamins to calories, from frying to baking. In her sewing class she studies clothing from design to fabrics, from cutting to finishing the garment. Home ec provides girls with the necessary background and knowledge to one day run a home efficiently and economically. The study of cooking, sewing, and interior decoration are all invaluable aids to this.

MECHANICAL DRAWING

Open to all sophomore, junior, and senior boys, mechanical drawing is a class to teach designing and blueprinting. For boys going into building trades and drafting, this class is important. The main emphasis is upon reading and understanding plans, while neatness and accuracy in work are especially stressed. Second year students are taught to letter expertly; they also must design and build a model home to their specifications.

FINE ARTS

ART

Art class, a new addition to Timothy's curriculum, was formed to discover and develop creative talent in students. The classes met every Wednesday and were open to all who were interested. Art, as the young artists quickly learned, is more than painting in oils or water colors. The class, with teachers Gurt Purins and John Rinkuss, also covered the techniques for chalk, charcoal, linoleum prints and collages.

MUSIC

Music is important in school life; the bands and choirs do not lack enthusiasm or members. Each student is introduced formally to musical study in music appreciation, a required class for the freshman year. Beginning with thirteenth century baroque, music is chronologically traced to modern times. The major compositions are studied for style and content.

MATH CLUB

Math Club gives its members an opportunity to investigate specific areas of mathematics and to acquire a true appreciation of that science. The primary project this year was the study of non-Euclidean geometry. Under the leadership of Mr. Hoving and Miss Lubbers, each member investigated a certain area of this subject. Combining their reports at the end of the year the Math Club had a booklet on non-Euclidean geometry for its own future use. There were also movies and a guest lecture on computer programming to point out the many fields and opportunities in mathematics.

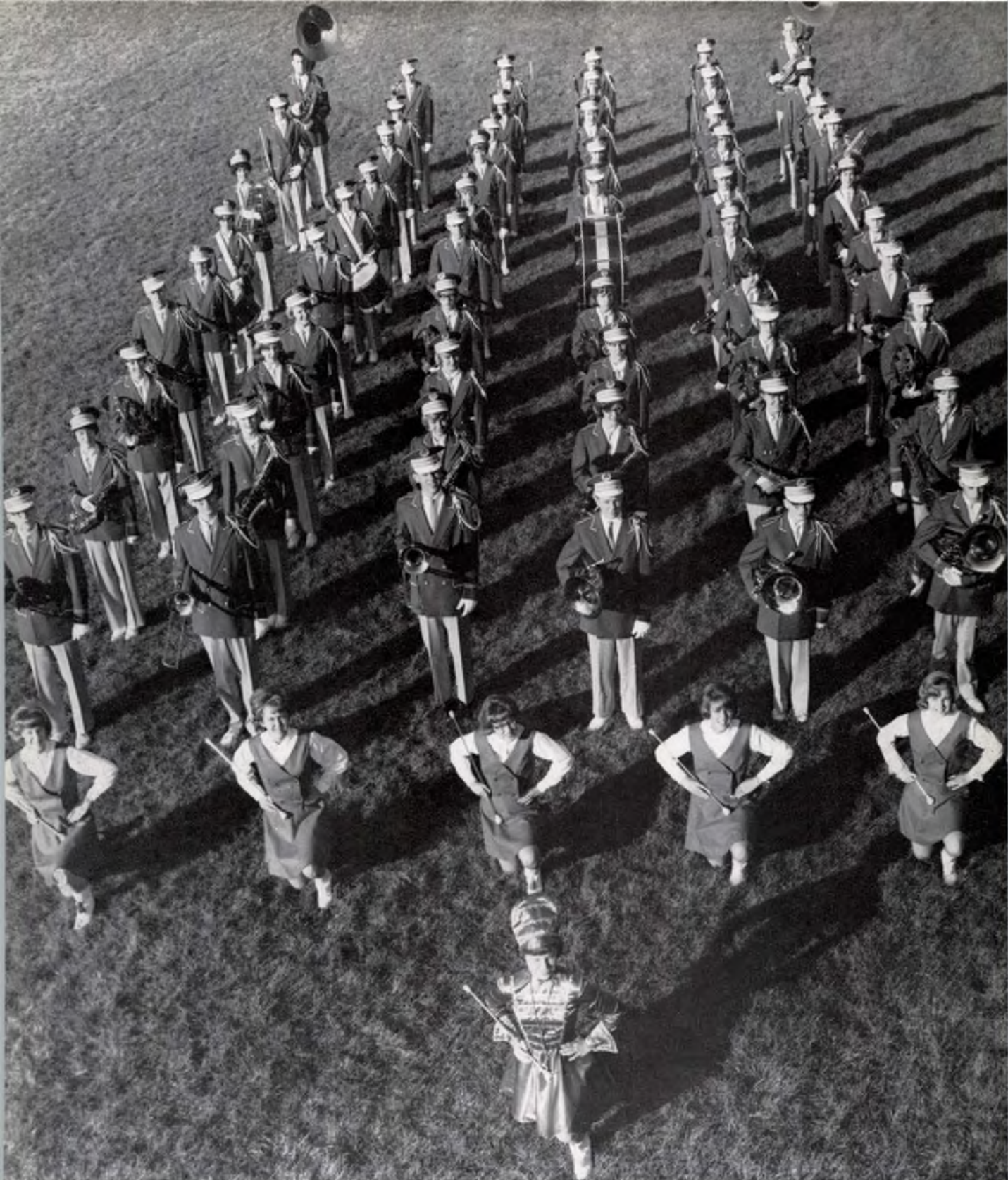

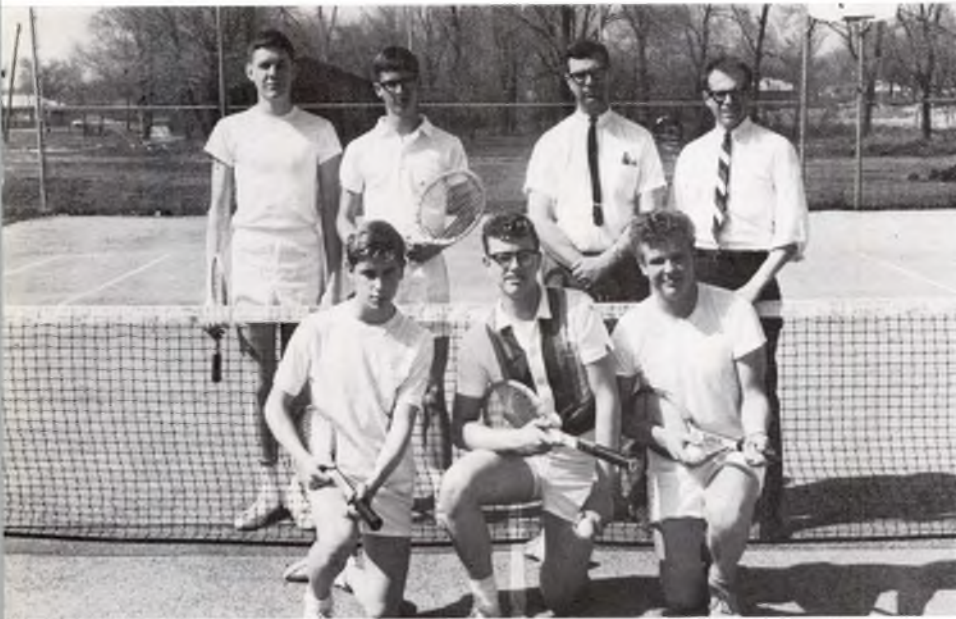
