Administration Tackles Problems

The administration must have really felt the need for Christ's supporting strength when they looked at the work ahead of them in this school year. They thought they had to replace five teachers until the Army took Mr. Waltersdorf in August, making it six. But the administration found five new teachers and shouldered some additional classes themselves. Among other accomplishments, Mr. Den Besten started a reevaluation of all the areas of study at Timothy in order to bring to it a broader and deeper Christian Education. Besides Miss Kingma's duties as assistant principal, which meant, among other things, making up the schedule and registering the students, she and Mr. Hoving did a great deal of counseling. Each student had at least one interview with either Miss Kingma or Mr. Hoving to talk about problems in their education or personal lives. They especially helped the seniors by counseling them about their futures after high school.



The second year Latin students, once again taught by Mr. Harkema, reviewed the basics of grammar and then went into readings of ancient history by Cicero and part of Ovid's Metamorphasis. The first level of Latin students learned the basic structure of grammar along with correct pronunciation of the language.

Social Studies Explore Trends

Starting with the world history and U.S. history courses, the social studies department followed a trend towards discussion and away from the memorization of facts so despised by the students. Social studies offered the most variety to seniors. The elective courses to choose from were psychology, the most theorized course, economics, a study of today's world economy, and modern history, a course on present day Europe and Asia. The required social problems class covered subjects like crime, delinquency, and marriage. American government, another required course, gave the seniors a thorough look at the way our government operates; because of the election year, this study was extremely relevant. Tapes and films brought diversity and additional explanation to all the courses.

Christian Guidelines Given in Bible

Each student at Timothy is required to take four semesters of Bible, usually one a year, each directing its attention to a different aspect of spiritual or Biblical learning. Previously freshmen had studied the Old Testament. However, due to changes to be put into effect next year, courses of New Testament Bible study were taught to both the freshmen and sophomores. The general emphasis of these classes was the life of Christ and the early growth of Christianity. Freshmen who took Bible first semester concentrated on studying the book of Acts. In the second semester classes, the emphasis changed and they took up the study of Luke. The third year of Bible concerns itself with the life of the Church throughout history its changing influence and divisions, its champions, and its preservation. The final course that is required is the doctrine class, where the seniors examine their own beliefs and their relationships to the Church. The course tried to answer such thought provoking and important questions as "Who is God?", "Who am I?", and "What do I really believe?"

Labs Challenge Science Students

As a result of an expanded biology department, Timothy had five science courses in its curriculum this year instead of the usual four. The freshmen and sophomores who were not likely to enter the field of biology took a programmed general biology course. The interested student took a more complete and detailed course which included two periods of lab work a week. Physical science and chemistry were the elective courses offered to students who had already taken biology. Biology, chemistry and a good knowledge of math were the prerequisites for those students who took physics. The science department used courses prepared in cooperation with the National Science Foundation. These are challenging programs, demanding much individual investigation on the part of the students.



Students Survey Literature


Different types of literature kept the freshmen busy in their English classes as they studied many authors from different countries. The course was designed to give them a broad understanding of the short story, poem, novel and the play. During the first semester, the sophomores studied the correct application and structure of grammar; their second semester was devoted to the study of early American authors, who wrote about the struggles in establishing a new nation. The juniors spent the first semester in the study of Twentieth Century American authors. In their second semester the juniors chose between a world literature course and speech. Speech students underwent such experiences as charades, drama, debate, and frightening impromtu speeches. The world lit class studied early writings dealing with Roman and Greek history and satire, and modern literature written by well-known authors. English lit gave the seniors a chance to delve into all types of literature as they studied British writings from ancient Beowulf to contemporary Pygmalion.

Upperclassmen Rated on Math Ability

For the students, math, more than most other subjects, has been a constant building process. Eight years of arithmetic was used as a spring-board for the more abstract concepts used in the math courses. Freshmen studied algebraic expressions, equalities, and inequalities in algebra. A study of geometry taught sophomores about points, lines and polygons and their relationships in a plane and space. A second year of algebra, the first math elective, went into a more advanced study of the properties of the real number system, and introduced trigonometry. The seniors who took the advanced math course covered such things as progressions, probability, trigonometry, and calculus; they used the book Elementary Mathematical Analysis for their second semester study. Timothy participated for the first time in the annual test given by the Mathematical Association of America. Given to interested upperclassmen, it rated them nationally on their math ability.


Business Courses Undergo Changes

Due to the lack of a commercial teacher and the limited number of students involved, the business courses at Timothy underwent several changes for this year. Teachers who were not too familiar with typing, taught typing. The major change was the fact that shorthand had to be dropped for a year. However, typing faired much better, acquiring the status of a major subject. Each class had two labs a week in which to do assignments, besides meeting the usual five times a week. Personal typing offered a general knowledge of typing to college prep students. Using adding machines and learning how to keep accounts helped prepare bookkeeping students for jobs in the office or for their own businesses.



HOME ECONOMICS

Cutting, pinning, and stitching were the basics of sewing learned in one phase of home economics. In another phase, the girls were taught cooking skills, which sometimes even brought good results. The more advanced student also tried to develop a talent in gourmet cooking. A field trip to Colby's furniture store taught the girls that developing good taste is important in interior decorating. They were also given demonstrations by speakers such as a representative from the Northern Illinois Gas Company. All these experiences, plus a short course in family planning, provided girls taking home ec with a good background for managing efficient homes.



MECHANICAL DRAWING

The purpose of mechanical drawing was to teach various aspects of this art, such as lettering, and reading and making blueprints. The course was geared to the student who plans to go on into engineering, architecture, or drafting. Timothy usually offers a three-level course in mechanical drawing; however a beginning course was not offered this year because of the shortage of teachers. The more advanced students met with the lower level classes but they worked more on their own. The climax of the year for the advanced students was building a small model house.

Phys Ed Stresses Variety in Sports





This year physical education underwent a number of changes; these were aimed at building a more comprehensive program for developing physical skills. When this new program has been completed, the freshmen and sophomores will concentrate on team play and working with others while the juniors and seniors take on sports where the emphasis is slanted more towards the individual. Another aspect of the program was the step toward achievement of equality between learning a sport and development in it. A variety of sports was offered in relation to this, such as badminton, gymnastics, creative exercise, and track and field events. Physical education was taken more seriously and looked at as a subject to learn about.




MUSIC











Choir Works on Tone and Quality














Class Competition Sparks Up G.A.A.










Frosh-Soph Team Makes Good Effort





After trying the high jump, Bob Keizer decided to return to his favorite competition, the shot put.




Expanded Tennis Team Faces Opponents








"Bumping" the volleyball, Joyce Folkerts makes a vain effort to keep the freshman team from losing another game.


George Huisman's muscles tense as he prepares to return the ball.












a class trip, the junior-senior banquet, ditch day, and graduation.












Doing Together Results in Unity



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
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
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


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
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We are through with grease pencils, crop sticks and layout sheets.
