


















"You know," he began, "one of the most interesting things

We weren't as readily convinced of this observation as we were of his "like" hypothesis.


















"And what you guys don't realize is that you weren't the first to use certain words; they keep coming back.

What it is -


is a reaction to the way everything's passing by without time for us to watch what's really going on."












After class, Debi VanPoolen handed me a note that read,










Really, I do love my brother.






















Homecoming
















Spring Play

leave such lasting laughs as that swaying and bumping,



























Girls' Varsity **Basketball**










"As the season went on we respected him more and more as a coach. We all had a good time," said Bill Hopp.





We stapled, and glued, and pressed, and glued again.


We painted the sets and our smocks, and I still have blue paint on my shoes.
