GROUND BREAKING

This is an exciting time for Benilde-St. Margaret's! On Friday, June 15, we officially broke ground on new construction at school. By the spring of this coming school year, students will be learning in three new science labs and listening to musical performances and speakers in a new tiered classroom.

While updates and maintenance happen every year at BSM, the last major construction was in 2008 when the athletic fields were updated. And it was back in 2000, when we added the chapel, theater, and library.



"Knight by Knight,"
BSM's Capital Campaign
Becomes Reality

As the school year ended, Opus construction crews set up shop in between the Moore Library and the Hamburge Theater. Less than a week into summer, construction began on phase one of the Imagine. Innovate. Inspire. Knight by Knight capital campaign. Three state-of-the-art science labs and an amphitheater-style performance and classroom space are scheduled to be complete later this upcoming school year. It's an exciting time to be a Red Knight!

Construction for new learning spaces could not be possible without our community of parents, alumni, and friends investing in current and future students. The Imagine. Innovate. Inspire. Knight by Knight capital campaign kicked off in November 2016 with a goal of \$8 million to fund facilities redesign, curricular enhancements, and scholarship development.

We are very proud to announce that we have raised \$6.2 million towards the campaign goal. Currently, more than 90 families have pledged or paid commitments to this campaign. And, the BSM faculty and staff have generously donated \$62,000 to this project. The campaign's momentum and commitment are great and continue to grow!

Reaching the \$8 million campaign goal will allow BSM to complete:


Phase One Construction: Three science laboratories, one specially equipped for biomedical science courses, and a fourth tiered classroom and performance space. (*Construction has started with anticipated completion spring 2019.*)

Phase Two Construction: A new innovation learning and support center and 10 updated, modernized classrooms. (*Anticipated to start construction summer of 2019 for student use in 2019-20 school year.*)

Curricular Enhancements: Addition of AP Physics, AP Chemistry, and BioMed Research 1 & 2 courses for senior high with new STEM course offerings for junior high.

Scholarship Development: Increasing our endowment (currently near \$11M) for tuition assistance to ensure more families have access to a BSM education.

As our school looks toward the future, we want to ensure the BSM experience evolves so that we can continue delivering an exceptional education. From time to time, this requires a significant and thoughtful investment in our facilities, programs and endowment. Because of the support from our entire community, we are able to make this happen.





I want to thank everyone involved in the campaign thus far for getting us to where we are today. We will continue our one-on-one meetings to get to the \$8 million goal and give our students everything they deserve. I look forward to witnessing new student experiences and celebrating the success of the campaign with you. 2018 Al Reger Award recipient Maddie Schafer recently contributed to BSM's weekly blog with her post "Looking Back: Six Years as a Red Knight." Now that those years have come to a close, she says it is bittersweet. "I will miss always being surrounded with a positive environment and a supportive community that fostered empathy, service, leadership and growth to be creative. I will also miss the friends I've made, BSM's music and drama departments, decorating Miss O's office, and Taher cookies!"

Schafer was known at BSM as a go-getter. In the junior high, she was willing to give anything a shot. She was in pop choir, tried out for both junior high musicals, and was even on the soccer and basketball teams. She is grateful for her fearless demeanor to try anything once because "it helped me find myself and my passion for performing." Discovering her love of music and the theater gave her opportunities to star in many leading roles in almost every BSM production. Schafer starred as Morticia in *The Addams Family*, the Fairy Godmother in *Cinderella* and Janet in *The Drowsy Chaperone*. She was also one of the original Red Knotes (BSM's acapella group) and was in "all the choirs" (pop choir, girls pop choir, and the madrigal singers).

Schafer's faith and desire to help others was evident during her time at BSM, and she served as an excellent reflection of BSM's mission, using her many talents and Catholic identity to better the community. In addition to spending many of her summer days performing at the Lundstrum Center for the Arts, she also helped teach singing and dance classes. If that wasn't enough, she also worked with Dance Mania, a musical theater and dancing class for kids with Down Syndrome.

Her dedication to her faith and her classmates did not go unnoticed. "Maddie has a very loving, outgoing, spunky personality. She is truly one of the most genuine, humble and caring students I have ever known. She has an incredible sense of humor and is so fun to be around. Furthermore, she has a deep faith that she puts into action every day of her life," said guidance and college counselor Amanda Anderson.

Whether in the choir, theater, cafeteria, or classroom, Schafer always exuded a joyful personality and a humble presence. "I feel honored to be named one of the Al Reger award winners. I've heard many times of the heroic actions Al took to save this community I've called home, and I'm grateful for his contributions. My hope is to honor his legacy and always remember my home at BSM." As a strong leader, tenacious learner and an incredibly talented musician and actress, she has already honored all that the Al Reger award represents.

Before she heads off to the University of Minnesota Duluth in the fall, she had some parting words to share: "It's pretty simple – never let anyone take away your sparkle!" She will undoubtedly "sparkle" in UMD's prestigious musical theater program and beyond.

Ben Larson - Al Reger Award

If there was one word to describe 2018 Al Reger Award winner Ben Larson, it would have to be involved. At Benilde-St. Margaret's, Larson made it his goal to take advantage of as many opportunities as possible, and it is safe to say he accomplished that goal. Wherever he went or whatever he did, Larson made a positive impact on the Red Knight community.

As a freshman, Larson was not sure what interests to pursue, but he knew there were plenty of opportunities he could explore at BSM. "I figured all I had to do was look around, and I could find something to do outside of class. If nothing else, I knew I could ask any of the faculty or staff, and they would help me get involved. I just wanted to get to know as many people a possible and participate in as much as my schedule would allow," he said.

While a student, Larson was involved in numerous co-curricular activities. He was in Speech, Mock Trial, Student Council, Medical Club, Link Crew, and Red Knight Volunteer Corps, to name a few. He particularly shined as a captain on the Speech and Mock Trial teams where he made it to the state tournaments in both activities. His prowess in both activities was obvious, but as Speech Adviser Maura Brew pointed out, it was his "mature composure and ability to take charge of anything that truly set him apart from others and earned him the respect of teammates, coaches and opponents alike."

Though not a member of an athletic team later in high school, he could always be counted on as a superfan. "I had so much fun going to as many games and events as I could. I went to all the football games my senior year, and we had a group of us that went to a bunch of away games for other teams. It was just fun to see my classmates compete in things they loved doing," recalled Larson.

Despite a busy schedule outside of the classroom, he remained committed to his academics and was recognized as a valedictorian for the Class of 2018. His proudest academic achievement came just weeks before graduation when he and classmate Alexa Reynders went to Pittsburgh to compete in the Intel International Science & Engineering Fair. They won a spot to present on their idea for a new lung cancer detection test. Whether it was AP classes or a science-heavy schedule, Larson was on top of it.

Behind it all, Larson credited his faith. "Growing up Catholic, I had a good set of values and beliefs. Even so, I have 'improved' a lot over the last four years. Whether it was meditation with Ms. Barry or Christian Prayer class with Ms. LeBlanc, BSM gave me a stronger faith foundation that will help me as I go on to college."

As he prepares to take on a mechanical engineering degree at the University of Wisconsin – Madison in the fall, he shared what he'll miss most about BSM. "More than anything, I'll miss the people. Getting to have different conversations with so many different people every day made my BSM experience. I just hope I find something as great at Wisconsin." We have no doubt he'll make the most of his college experience just like he did at Benilde-St. Margaret's.

Leaders On and Off the Field

Madison Stoks - Athena Award 2018

Since an early age, Madison Stoks has taken on the tough athlete role, even if some of it was for show. "I used to wear a brace or bandage for each game. In every photo taken of me from the ages 4-8, I was always suited up in a jersey and an Ace bandage because I wanted the other team to think I was tough," she remembered. Well, her tough mentality and physicality proved to be successful in her later years as a BSM athlete. Stoks was named a captain of the BSM girls' soccer team, was nominated as a Ms. Soccer Finalist, received All State and All Conference countless times, and was named this year's Athena Award recipient.

Stoks was a two-sport athlete at BSM, participating in both lacrosse and soccer. She has been playing soccer her entire life and will continue next year as a Division1 student-athlete at the University of Memphis. She picked up lacrosse, however, to try something new. As Stoks shared: "Soccer has always been a great break from everything else going on in my life, and it has continuously pushed me to work harder. I decided to mix it up with lacrosse because I loved all the people on the team and I love running, so I figured why not!"

Being an athlete does not define Stoks's success. She also spent her days as a Red Knight participating in a multitude of co-curricular activities. She was the Editor in Chief of the yearbook, a member of the Medical Club, a Link Crew commissioner, a Knightlife member, a student ambassador, and she was also a eucharistic minister. Outside of school, Stoks has volunteered at St. Therese nursing home, works as a nanny and server at the Copper Hen, and coaches for youth soccer programs. To top it all off, she plays for the Minneapolis United Soccer Club.

When asked how she manages it all, she gave credit and thanks to BSM and her teachers. "I have learned how to better organize my time, social life and academics while at BSM. I can't thank the teachers enough for meeting with me before school or staying after when I needed the extra help."

During her tenure on BSM's varsity soccer team, Stoks had the opportunity to win not one, but two state championships – the first as a sophomore and the second as a junior. "The feeling of going all the way and scoring in the championship with the student section cheering us on is a pretty crazy feeling that I will never forget," she recalled.

Winning two state championships and being named Homecoming Queen are just a few of Stoks's many memories as a Red Knight. Being named the 2018 Athena Award winner is another in the long list of proud moments for Stoks. "I was shocked and slightly confused when I was named the Athena winner. I was honored at the fact that BSM awarded me with this title. I am thankful for the recognition."

Throughout her four years as a Red Knight, Stoks said she has become "more aware of and grateful for the work that goes on behind-the-scenes to make it all happen." She was also quick to mention her teammates and coaches for helping guide her throughout her time at BSM saying: "The mentoring from my coaches has helped me be a better leader and to be an encouraging, honest, and good example for the younger players. At the same time, my teammates inspired me to be the best version of myself."

Before Stoks heads down to Tennessee, she has some advice to leave her fellow Red Knight athletes. "To the underclassmen: have fun with your time at BSM, give all you got, and don't give up. To everyone: play for your team, and wear your BSM jersey proud. It goes by quick, so appreciate all that the school, your teachers, coaches and administration do for you along the way."

Quinn Ehlen – Al Blasing Award 2018

He knows it sounds cliché, but this year's Al Blasing award winner, Quinn Ehlen, says "hard work" is what it takes to be successful. As a kid, Ehlen claims his athletic abilities were subpar, but he was determined to become a great athlete. "I started running and working out more. I put in the work to be better and continued to pursue that goal." Ehlen's hard work has paid off, both on and off the field.

Ehlen was primarily a lacrosse star at BSM, but he also played club hockey for the Park Flyers and decided, after an eight-year hiatus, it was time to return to the gridiron for one last season. As a senior, Ehlen wanted to give football another shot having not played since the 4th grade. "It was so fun to learn the game all over again and have a fresh slate to try and gain a spot on the team. It was a super fun and rewarding process for me to work my way up," he explained.

Off the field, Ehlen kept himself busy and was quite successful as a Red Knight student. He was named a salutatorian for the Class of 2018, maintaining the second highest GPA throughout his years at BSM. Ehlen was the student council Executive President, a commissioner for Link Crew, and an NHS member. He also participated in Math League, Red Knight Volunteer Corps, Medical Club and Knowledge Bowl. According to Ehlen: "I've always been one to think that when I'm busier I perform and work better in school. Staying busy allows me to manage my time better."

Ehlen is an All-Conference and All-State
Academic lacrosse player and All-State
Academic football player. In addition to the
Al Blasing Award, he has also received the
John Haider Career Achievement Award in
mathematics and the Lynch Leadership Award
for his involvement in student council. After

all his awards and accolades, Ehlen describes receiving the Al Blasing award as shocking. "I know how many great athletes we have here at BSM. I was looking at the past recipients and thought that there was no way I was as good as them. So I was very surprised and honored to receive the award," he said.

Sports have always been a passion for Ehlen, and he thanks his brother and coaches for pushing him to succeed. "My brother Griffin '16 is my biggest role model. I have him to thank for pushing me to become a better lacrosse player. My coaches also always pushed and encouraged me to be the best I could be and be the person they think I can be." Ehlen is an exceptional role model himself, confirmed by his teammates naming him a captain of the varsity lacrosse team as a junior (one of Ehlen's proudest moments).

Lacrosse coach Rob Horn sums up his leadership both on and off the field perfectly. Horn was quick to share: "Quinn is one of the best student-athletes I have ever had the privilege of coaching. It's his work ethic that sets him apart. Quinn isn't satisfied with good; he wants to be great, and he attacks every challenge with that mindset both on the field and in the classroom."

Next year, Ehlen will move on to the University of Minnesota's Carlson School where he wants to pursue both business and science (pre-med). That said, he assures he will not be forgetting his Red Knights roots. "I think the most important thing about playing sports at BSM is how the coaches not only push you to become better athletes, but also better people. Being an athlete at BSM has made me realize what kind of person I want to become, and I know that will help me in the future." Parents' Choice



It was by no means easy, but this familial approach proved effective. As past parent Flora Potter (Armando '03, Luca '04, Stefano '06, Gabriella '07, Matteo '13) shared: "We were part of the BSM community for over 15 years, and Mary earned our respect during the good and challenging times. She was a true leader who was willing to partner with you for the good of your child. We cannot thank Mary enough for touching our family in a very special way."

Over the years, Andersen no doubt helped countless students navigate their way through BSM and beyond. LaToya Williams '07, stated it perfectly: "I remember walking into BSM my first day, so afraid of the unfamiliar, my first thought was to escape. Outside the front doors, I remember trying to flee, but you wouldn't let me. You stood there with me for almost an hour convincing me to give BSM a chance. You not only gave me your word, but your actions showed me you wanted the best for me. You made a difference in my life, and for that, I am forever grateful."




