Ken Pauly

The Red Knight journey of Ken Pauly began with many twists and turns that included stops as a JV coach, an admissions assistant, and a part-time teacher. However, in 1990 the path straightened and he has been the head boys' hockey coach for 22 seasons and he is currently the chair of the social studies department.

Ken's leadership has positioned our boys' hockey program as one of the elite programs in the state. The records in his tenure as coach speak for themselves in that area: three state titles, 10 conference championships, and a 369-168-19 record. He is the winningest coach in the program's 55-year history.

In 2012 he received the Mariucci Award as the state's Class AA coach of the year and twice he received the Minnesota Wild 3M Excellence in Coaching Award. He also served as President of the Minnesota Hockey Coaches Association.

Coach Pauly's leadership is also evident in many ways not measured by wins and losses. His confident, passionate, and caring manner nurtures young athletes and young students. In 2012 Ken was honored as the Faculty of the Year. A man of strong faith and high standards, Ken is an exemplary model for Red Knight student athletes.

Gene Merriam '62

After graduating from Benilde, Gene did a stint in the Marines, earned a business degree from the University of Minnesota, and landed a job as an accountant with Arthur Andersen.

Gene's career as a public servant began in 1973 when he ran for a seat on the Coon Rapids City Council. Two years later, he was elected to the Minnesota State Senate where he served for 22 years.

An avid outdoorsman, Gene took his passion to work. He played a pivotal role in drafting legislation responsible for setting Minnesota's first environmental standards in recycling, landfill use, and water conservation. Remembered as one of the great environmental champions of his era, Gene was ranked as the 5th most influential senator in the last 50 years by Twin City Law and Politics Magazine.

Seven years after leaving his post in the senate to work in the private sector, Gene was asked to be the Commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources, a post he held for four years. Gene is recently retired, but continues to serve on many volunteer boards and committees, keeping a watchful eye over our state's natural resources.

Elizabeth Rogers '94

Over the past twenty years, Liz has differentiated herself from her classmates and colleagues alike by her academic achievement and giving spirit. Graduating from Harvard summa cum laude, Liz went on to earn her medical degree from Stanford and completed her training in pediatrics and neonatology at the University of California San Francisco (UCSF).

Liz is currently an assistant professor of pediatrics and neonatology at UCSF, the director of their Intensive Care Nursery Follow-Up Program, and assistant director of neonatal clinical programs. Dr. Rogers has won more than ten service, academic and teaching awards and she has volunteered on well over 20 university, professional and public service committees and boards. Liz has also received multiple grants and has compiled an extensive published body of research.

Constantly striving for excellence in a challenging and demanding profession, and relentless in her pursuit of medical innovations, Liz manages to beautifully balance the roles of doctor, teacher, mentor, researcher, volunteer, wife and mother of four with her trademark sense of humor and quiet confidence.

BSM Reflections: What Do We Learn From Their Work?

His name was Mr. Lockhart, and I ended each day my sophomore year in high school in his eighth period English class. He was an amazing man who shared with us countless life stories and encouraged us to write and to create our own. He was a deeply caring man who was able to weave his calling as a minister very easily into the English classroom and curriculum. He saw each of us as a gift from God and taught us to never let life or people pass us by unnoticed. He and my other high school English teachers were the inspiration behind my choice of an English major in college; and although the English major never became a reality, their teaching shaped and helped to make me who I am today.

My life is different today because of Mr. Lockhart and because of all those who took the time to offer lessons of life, regardless of the subject matter. It's that kind of difference that we hope our ministry here at BSM makes in the lives of our students. Having been a part of this community for so many years, I truly enjoy seeing the changes and the growth that take place in all those who, though moving on in life, continue to remain Red Knights. While we take great pride in their accomplishments, large and small, we are particularly proud of those who choose to give their lives to Catholic education . . . those to whom the gauntlet has been passed in continuing to teach as Jesus did.

Through email and personal conversations, alums have shared stories about who and what led them to their current work in Catholic schools. The path was not the same for everyone. A junior from my first year at BSM, **Perry Reinhardt** '77, joined the education field later in his career. His story is wonderful.

"I followed my father's career and worked for IBM for 22 years fixing all sorts of computer equipment after receiving a civil engineering degree from the U of M. The IBM job allowed me to make enough money to give my four kids a Catholic education through St. John's in Savage and Holy Angels. Two of the four kids also went to St. Bens/St. Johns University.

"When the kids were done with college, my wife (who graduated from St. Catherines) of 33 years said I could go back to school to become a math teacher. It was something I thought I was called to do. My idols and favorite teachers were Mr. Periolat at Most Holy Trinity and Mr. Steve Dahlman at Benilde. Both math teachers. I went through the teacher licensure program from St. Scholastica.

"I am very happy about my decision to be doing something as important as educating children and it is especially gratifying to be involved in Catholic education."

On the flip side, **Bruce Becker** '82 knew early on that he wanted to be a teacher. He began at St. Margaret Mary in Golden Valley and then in 1989 moved to St. Joseph's School in West St. Paul where he has been ever since. Mathematics and religion are the "classes" he teaches, but the lessons he teaches reach far beyond that.

His summer adventures in engineering, space, marketing, and education bring valuable insights to his students and his continued study enhances his teaching. He is grateful for the influence "of some of my own teachers at Benilde-St. Margaret's School. I have very fond memories of my time there with Mr. Sylvian Sundrum, Mr. Michael Jeremiah, Mr. Ron Kretsch, Cesar Lewandowski, Herr Ebensteiner, and Mr. Haider, among many others. They meant a great deal to me."

"As the years have passed, I have remained in the Catholic school system because I still believe in the revolution started two millennia ago by Jesus. The challenge to humanity is still great... to act out of love, mercy and forgiveness, instead of fear, jealousy, greed and violence. As a young man I wanted to do my part to energetically and enthusiastically change the world for the better, and this is a calling that remains with me today. In my school, I can do my small part to witness my faith and make what I hope to be a significant difference in young peoples' lives."

On the other side of town, **Mollie Sieve Olsen** '89, armed with a master's degree in teaching, began as a volunteer art teacher at St. Joseph in Waconia when her oldest son was in kindergarten. Aidan is now in 7th grade and Mollie is the art teacher at St. Joe's. Mollie tells us that "I have enjoyed the journey more than I could

have ever imagined! I love the enthusiasm and energy that fills the art room...it's contagious and keeps me energized."

Mollie credits Sue Jacobson and Jan Johnson with her love of art. "I feel my Catholic education at Benilde-St. Margaret's was instrumental in my development as an art teacher. It is there that I first really appreciated the art of teaching and the joy art teachers could share in my life. Today I am on a new journey in which our school has become a C-STEM school...Catholic,

Science, Technology, Engineering & Math. I'm learning more than ever how to integrate the arts in all of these amazing areas. I would have never guessed I'd be building robots that could make art."

We are blessed at BSM to have 19 graduates who are doing their part in our school. They too are hoping to make a significant difference in the lives of the young Red Knights. They have great memories of their high school years and they shared some thoughts about those teachers who inspired them.

We asked the question, "Who, in your years at BSM, inspired you to become a teacher and to return to you alma mater? It took **Kari Koshiol** '99 a nanosecond to reply to the question. "Hands down, it would be Tom Backen."

Claire Shea '05 had no trouble recalling her aha moment. "I was asked, at some point in my high school career, to interview a teacher and ask them about their profession, field of study, etc. I interviewed Becca Walsh, and I distinctly remember during that interview saying, 'Wow! I'd love to become a religion teacher.' So naturally, I went off to college, and entirely forgot about this. I entered as an English major, and after my first semester in college, and taking one required theology course, quickly changed my major to theology, and never looked back."

Claire spent four years teaching Bishop Byrne High School's Red Knights in Memphis, Tennessee, but stayed in touch with Becca and was ready to move back to the Red Knights at BSM. It has been a great move for Claire and Benilde-St. Margaret's.

With an undergraduate degree in mechanical engineering it is no wonder that **Steve Pohlen** '86 listed another science guy as his inspiration. "Jim Wander had a great knack for combining physics content with the application of that knowledge in hands-on, real-life scenarios. And then of course there were the stick figure drawings. Jim inspired a love of learning, science, and curiosity in me that I wanted to share with others."

Amy Jo Reinhart Hyde '89 does a flashback in preparing for her students. "When I plan my lessons, I still ask myself, 'What would Madame Cipolle do?' French was my favorite class at BSM

because Madame Cipolle did so many fun, engaging activities. She inspired my love of the language and culture....I am thrilled to be carrying on that tradition here at BSM!"

In the case of **Jean Hromatka Nightingale** '80, not all of the inspiration came from the classroom as she mentioned Mickey Scott, Jim Wander and Mary Fran O'Keefe. "They each made school challenging but fun, and showed by example that a great school combines a strong classroom environment with outstanding extracurricular activities."

Each year, Catholic schools across the nation celebrate Catholic Schools Week (CSW) and this year the alumni department hosted a special evening at the Golden Valley Country Club for those local alums involved in the field of Catholic education. There was lively conversation and great stories about many teachers at SMA, Benilde, and BSM.

The theme for this year's CSW was "Communities of Faith, Knowledge and Service." That fits perfectly with our mission at Benilde-St. Margaret's and with the work of those alums who continue to share their gifts with the students in area Catholic schools. Mollie Sieve Olsen expressed the view of many when she said, "I am so very proud of my Catholic education. I am blessed that my parents believed in its importance too. My hope is that our children will appreciate and enjoy the gift we have passed on to them so they too will share it with future generations!" Amen, Mollie!

As for me, I regret never taking the opportunity to let Mr. Lockhart or many of the other teachers in my grade school and high school know how greatly they influenced my life. Much of what I am today is because of what they were. A lesson I've learned and tried to pass on here at BSM is never let people go unnoticed or without knowing the difference they make. For each of us, whether we are in a classroom or office, we must also consider the difference we make in the lives of the people we encounter. You just never know how the future will be impacted because of the difference you make today.

Dan Lundberg '12 developed an interest in muscular dystrophy when he first volunteered at the Courage Center as part of his Service Leadership class at Benilde-St. Margaret's in 2010. From his experience working with children at the Courage Center, Dan's interest in progressive muscle disorders like muscular dystrophy grew, leading him to participate in a research project at Gillette Children's Hospital while still a student at BSM.

Curiosity and Concern Create Change

His research furthered his curiosity about muscular dystrophy and led to an interest in how disease progression and access to health care in other parts of the world differ from those in the United States. Dan applied for and received a grant to travel to Ghana, West Africa, to research muscular dystrophy cases. In Ghana, he was introduced to an organization called Share Care Ghana, a society for people with severe autoimmune and neurological conditions. His contacts there led him to a unique African family not only living with muscular dystrophy but also working single-handedly to educate others about disabilities in surrounding areas. Through his research with this family, Dan gained a deeper understanding of the poverty, poor quality of life and true discrimination that people with disabilities face in third world countries.

Inspired by what he had learned in Ghana, Dan embarked on a fundraising mission in the U.S. Running six marathons, speaking to groups and presenting his story to BSM students for a Common Basket collection, Dan raised several thousand dollars. He elected to take a one-year leave from his studies at Boston College to work full time on disability rights in Ghana and began using the money he raised to educate and change cultural beliefs and stigmas.

While it seems Dan's curiosity has opened the door for change in the underserved population in Ghana, Dan's story does not end here. His curiosity in social enterprise prompted him to launch Ghana Strong Books, a publishing organization that produces books for young people. Ghana Strong Books commits 70% of profits or \$5 per book toward developing initiatives that empower marginalized people with disabilities living in Ghana. Dan's first book is titled, I Found the World Inside My Mother's Coffee Mug. Dan was inspired to write this young adult novel while living in Ghana and completed his writing in just 40 days. The book is self-published and available at ghanastrong.org. Dan plans to publish more books to create a sustainable income to further his efforts in West Africa.

According to Dan, the real value of service work is reflecting on what you learn from your experience and transferring that knowledge to help other underserved groups. As a student at Benilde-St. Margaret's, Dan was given many opportunities to serve, which allowed him to understand the need for social change. Through his experiences in the classroom, on the soccer field, on the speech team and with RKVC, Dan discovered how to be a leader and how to articulate his passions. With a major in biochemistry and a special interest in human development at Boston College, Dan hopes to go to medical school someday. For now, however, he is too busy writing, teaching, advocating and changing the world.

Striving together to solve problems that matter

Innovation is the Heart of the Matter

What problems are you solving? For 2007 graduate

Ellie Hawkinson O'Brien, the answer to this question
is an easy one. Ellie is an innovations design engineer
in the Innovations Lab at Northwestern University's
Feinberg School of Medicine. Using a variety of
3D printing methods and state-of-the-art materials
and techniques, Ellie creates and produces real-world
training models for medical students and physicians.
These models teach pediatric surgeons how to navigate
inside patients using surgical simulators, resulting in better
patient outcomes. The lab collaborates with faculty members
and medical educators to provide teaching tools that will
improve surgical techniques for students.

Although her work is featured in many of the lab's surgical simulators and training models, a tiny, pediatric heart is Ellie's proudest accomplishment. She created the 3D-printed heart, based on actual patient data, using hundreds of traditional 2D scans to replicate the exact pediatric heart being studied. The tiny heart was the first of its kind manufactured as a training tool for pediatric surgeons.

The capability to produce neonatal-sized models opens up a new world for surgical training in pediatrics. With only 900 pediatric surgeons in the U.S. and Canada, pediatric surgery models are nonexistent. Manufacturers do not develop surgery simulators for this market because the number of customers is relatively small for their industry. Therefore, researchers are turning to new problem-solving methods to train medical students and surgeons.

As a freshman at BSM, Ellie admits she was forced to think outside the box when she was placed in Mr. Jump's freshman biology class. Mr. Jump's nontraditional way of teaching presented Ellie with new ways of problem solving that spurred her interest in science. She went on to participate in BSM's Advanced Competitive Science program that provided her with rigorous coursework and a strong academic foundation. Ellie decided to major in biomedical engineering at Marquette University, where she combined a bachelor's degree with valuable work experience at the VA Medical Center in

Milwaukee and Boston Scientific in Minneapolis. After graduating from Marquette, Ellie took her resume to Chicago where she was offered a job in the Innovations Laboratory at Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine.

Recently married to husband Pat and living in the Chicago area, Ellie is a great example of a BSM alum using her knowledge, skill and aptitude for solving problems in her community. While she thoroughly enjoys the challenges and problem-solving nature of her job, she sees herself returning to school someday to possibly pursue an MBA. Armed with the skill to manufacture real-world teaching tools, the patience to perfect her craft, and the creativity to tackle new opportunities, there is no limit to what problems Ellie Hawkinson O'Brien might solve next.

Even with this generosity, there are still other families who need assistance to obtain one of the best educations in the Midwest. The amount required to meet the total demand for demonstrated need by these qualified families would be \$2.3 million.




