# African-American students inspired at BSM diversity forum

On March 10, BSM held its first
Diversity Career Forum for all
African-American students. Senior
Adrienne Vickers coordinated the
event, inviting three successful
African-Americans to share their stories
of achievement. The presenters included
Kevin Warren, Vice-president of Legal
Affairs and Chief Administrator for the
Minnesota Vikings; Selwyn Vickers,
Chairman of the Department of Surgery
at the University of Minnesota; and Deo
Lubala, a missionary from Tanzania.

Adrienne says that the goal of the presentations was to allow African-American students "to see how those with high jobs get to that position." One message that was reinforced for her was the idea that "there is always room at the top."

BSM Diversity Coordinator Lidibette Rosado-Guzman hopes that BSM can offer more presentations like this in the future. She says that in addition to repeating an African-American session, presentations for Latinos, Pacific Islanders and females could be available.



## Students travel to Rwanda

A group of students and chaperones are spending part of June in Rwanda. Students are witnessing firsthand the effects that the 1994 Genocide had on this beautiful country and will be

immersed as much as possible into Rwandan culture. Participants earn high school credit for taking the class and completing the necessary academic activities. Pre-trip classes focused on the history and culture of Rwanda, the 1994 Genocide and pre-trip planning.

While in Rwanda, students are visiting the town of Ruhengeri, where they are participated in five different cultural activities: making traditional Rwandan baskets, forming mud bricks, visiting Imbabazi Orphanage, helping build a house for a widow of the Genocide and her foster children, and seeing the mountain gorillas. The second week is being devoted to visiting the Kigali Genocide Memorial, the Nyamata Church massacre site, and the Murambi Technical School massacre site. Survivors from the 1994 Genocide are sharing their stories with the group.

This is BSM's second student trip to Rwanda. The first trip was in 2009, after junior high teachers James Cave and Dave Kuntz traveled to the country. They decided that experiencing Rwandan culture would be an important experience for BSM students and their development as global citizens.

## BSM's library changing with the times

Due to the ever-increasing use of technology, the BSM Moore Library will soon look a bit different. Most of the books that have been housed in the library are being removed to allow more emphasis on using computers as resources. Faculty members were invited to select any of the library books to transplant as classroom resources. Other books were sold at the annual Treasure Hunt garage sale. Some, however, will remain in the library as part of department

resource centers that will be set up in the library. The familiar bookshelves will be rearranged to section off BSM's new English resource center and math resource center. Students can get help from department teachers on duty in the resource centers.

The majority of the books will be replaced by e-books and online databases. Since all students now have individual laptops, they are carrying around their own library. Librarian Lynn Bottge explained that many more reading and research options will be available to students, giving the library a much-needed upgrade. She also said, "The library won't be just a physical place anymore." Students and faculty will be able to access resources from home or from the classroom.



## International spring break trips

During the week of March 28, BSM sponsored two international trips, one to Guatemala and another to Italy.

Travelers to Guatemala included 31 juniors and seniors, 10 of whom had already participated in a similar trip. During six of the past summers, BSM has taken a group of students to visit and volunteer at Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos (NPH), an orphanage in Guatemala. This was the first time the trip occurred during Spring Break. This summer, Red Knights will visit another NPH orphanage in the Dominican Republic.



In Guatemala, the students and chaperones played and read with the children, painted buildings, worked in the fields, hiked, hosted an ice cream social, toured a local coffee farm, and had an opportunity to discover the rich and colorful history and culture of the country.


Six boys took part in the Italy trip, led by Latin teacher Rob Epler. The itinerary included overnight stays in Venice, Florence, Sorrento, and Rome, with morning or afternoon jaunts to Orvieto, ancient Pompeii, and the island of Capri. Trip highlights included seeing the ancient core of Rome (including the Roman Forum – the geographical, political, and religious center of the ancient city), the Palatine Hill, and the Colosseum, attending Italian Mass in St. Mark's Cathedral, and preparing their own dinner at the Apicius Culinary School, under the guidance of its chef instructors.

## **Relay For Life**

An important part of the mission of Benilde-St. Margaret's School is our commitment to social responsibility, extracurricular activities, and faith formation. That includes offering ways for members of our community to help others in need. Our community again supported the American Cancer Society by participating in the Relay For Life this spring on the BSM campus.

The Relay For Life is an annual, international initiative that brings together millions of people to celebrate those who have battled cancer, honor those who have been lost to the disease, and raise needed funds for research. BSM is proud to be a part of the Relay For Life for a third time.

This year, 517 participants on 47 teams registered for the event. The walkers raised in excess of \$100,000. Thanks to all of them for supporting the Relay For Life at BSM. By participating in, giving to, and/or wishing the BSM teams well during the Relay For Life, you are sharing in the spirit of community and the generosity of giving.





With the end of the school year comes the retirement of three friends and valued members of the Benilde-St. Margaret's faculty – Jan Johnson, Alicia Laporta-Orange, and Michael (Mick) Hawkins.

Jan Johnson has been teaching art at St. Margaret's Academy and Benilde-St. Margaret's since September 1, 1968. As an important part of the SMA and BSM community for 43 years, Ms. Johnson served on strategic planning committees and the committee searching for a principal to replace Stacey Furness. "I also facilitated a human relations workshop that was required for certification at the time. It was similar to today's diversity initiatives."

Ms. Johnson was the only member of the SMA art department and acquired the first kiln, which led to the introduction of pottery classes into the curriculum. She has seen the BSM Fine Arts Department grow from a small faculty and facility to a nine-member team offering a variety of classes, including

pottery, painting, photography and music. She began teaching girls at SMA. Today, the gender balance in the various art classes at BSM is usually 50/50.

Ms. Johnson earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in studio art and art education from the College of St. Benedict. In 1996, she received a Master of Arts degree from the University of St. Thomas. For 14 years, Ms. Johnson attended National Art Education Association conferences held across the country. She is an active member of the Northern Clay Center, Walker Art Center, and Minneapolis Institute of Art. She was listed in the 2000 edition of Who's Who in American Education, and she received an award from Scholastic Art Competition for excellence in teaching art in 2008.

Alicia Laporta-Orange, a Spanish teacher in the World Language Department, has been a part of the BSM community since the fall of 1979. Along with verbs and vocabulary, she has been teaching students for 32 years to be global citizens who are committed to social justice.

Ms. Laporta-Orange earned a Bachelor of Science degree with distinction in history and social studies in 1978. She earned a second B.S. degree in Spanish from the University of Minnesota in 1984. Her studies continued from 1985 to 1994 when she did graduate coursework in Spanish literature at the U of M and completed the SEED program in 1995 at the College of St. Catherine. Ms. Laporta-Orange earned a Certificate of Recognition from the Council of the Teaching of Languages and Culture. She was a presenter at the Minnesota Council of the Teaching of Languages and Culture. She's a member of the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese and the Minnesota Council on Teaching Foreign Languages. Ms. Laporta-Orange was the BSM Diversity Coordinator from 2001 to 2003 and a Minnesota Independent School Forum Honor Teacher Award Finalist in 2010.


"I have enjoyed working at BSM all these years," said Ms. Laporta-Orange. "I always felt a sense of community, especially in times of need. I am proud to have been a part of a great department, and of having had the opportunity to work with great colleagues. I also really enjoyed working with the youth; they keep me young. During my retirement I plan to travel to South America and volunteer as a translator."


Michael (Mick) Hawkins announced that he will be graduating with the Class of 2011. He prefers to call his retirement "a graduation" because, he says, that's what seniors do in June.

Mr. Hawkins has been on the English faculty since August 1996. He reflected on his classroom experiences here. "I have really enjoyed teaching English. I like the discussions and stretching of horizons through the literature that we read; I also like teaching writing very much. One of the frequent questions I have asked returning graduates is about their college writing experiences. To a person, they have said that they felt very prepared for their college writing. That's a great commentary on what is done at BSM."

Even those who have not had Mr. Hawkins as a teacher recognize him as the PA announcer for many of BSM's sporting events. Since 2000, he has been the Voice of the Red Knights for soccer, football, and hockey. In the past five years Mr. Hawkins has worked with more than 25 students and TV-16, St. Louis Park's cable channel, to do broadcast commentary for various BSM athletic activities.

Mr. Hawkins says he'll miss the daily interaction with the BSM community. "We have a great group of parents. Since the apple doesn't fall far from the tree, we also have a great group of kids at BSM. One of the things I will really miss is the banter, the energy, and the enthusiasm of our student body."

In the fall, Benilde-St. Margaret's is launching the eight period day in senior high. This exciting, new scheduling initiative, featuring the BSM Hour, will bring into sharper focus our commitment to meeting students' needs.


"Every day, we work to make BSM the school of choice for families who value a Catholic, college preparatory school for students in grades 7 through 12," said Dr. Bob Tift '71, BSM president. "We maintain an environment that develops engaged, intelligent servant leaders. And, we are embracing the needs of learners in the new millennium."

Our students need to be interactive and participatory during the school day in order to learn. Problem solving, creativity, collaboration and flexibility are essential skills that need to be taught and nurtured in high school. Giving students time during the regular school day to make choices regarding academic work, progress, and growth enhances the educational experience. Our new schedule, including the BSM Hour, supports this approach to education.

"Students told us they are increasingly being pulled in many directions," noted Dr. Sue Skinner, senior high principal.

"These days, more and more young people are out of balance and struggling to manage the daily routine of faith, school, family, work and extracurricular activities."

In fact, 65 percent of our senior high students report being stressed or under pressure at school. Freshmen are least stressed (42 percent) and seniors most stressed (70 percent). Our students report that the main causes of their stress are "classes and pressure I put on myself." Recent research and feedback from students and faculty also indicate that the schedule change will help with the pressure associated with the demanding academic and extracurricular program that BSM offers.



While the creation of the BSM Hour is not entirely motivated by students' stress level, the new schedule will help students take care of themselves and maintain a better balance of school, family, friends and God.

The BSM school day will be 10 minutes longer and rearranged to give senior high students an extra 40-minute period we're calling the BSM Hour. Students will take advantage of additional resources for academics, wellness, fitness, spiritual growth as well as college counseling and guidance services. Once or twice a month, classes will be 65 minutes long, allowing students to receive certain course material in expanded units. The new schedule allows theology classes to meet five days a week while protecting the option for elective classes.

"The new schedule will allow students to make choices about how to manage their day," said **Steve Pohlen** '86, director of technology and learning. "Seniors will discover in a few months that they'll need to manage their time in ways they haven't done before. This will give them a little taste of the responsibility they'll experience in college."

The value of the eight period day and the BSM Hour is most evident through the convergence of three concepts that are central to our work: BSM's Catholic Identity; Academic Rigor; Body-Spirit-Mind.

#### **Catholic Identity**

Benilde-St. Margaret's is committed to promoting the teachings of the Catholic Church and nurturing our students' faith life. For some time, BSM has been phasing in the new program based on the United States Conference of Catholic Bishop's *Doctrinal Elements of a Curriculum Framework for the Development of Catechetical Materials for Young People of High School Age.* The new curriculum is a national initiative that has been supported by the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis.

The new eight period day makes it possible to offer students a variety of opportunities for spiritual and intellectual growth, prayer and meaningful reflection, and service activities on and off campus. The days when students are not in PE/Wellness, they also may take advantage of retreat follow-up with either a campus minister or peer ministers.

By scheduling theology classes to meet five days a week rather than three, we can deliver the new curriculum without taking away students' elective options, including art, music, business, languages and Advanced Competitive Science.

## **Academic Rigor**

The new schedule is the result of taking five minutes from each of the periods in the old schedule and combining them with an additional 10 minutes at the end of the day. Far from cutting the curriculum short to fit into the new schedule, the BSM standard of academic rigor and our college-preparatory program will be enhanced.

"We believe the best practice in curriculum and pedagogy is to design lessons that are based on learning outcomes and skills," said Dr. Skinner. "The addition of the 65-minute blocks will allow for the development of higher-order thinking skills. It will also provide time for more creative, inquiry-based, project-based, collaborative and in-depth engagement with each other (student to student and teacher to student) and the content. Students will gain the ability and time to focus on specific subjects that may be more difficult or challenging. Teachers will continue to align courses with benchmarks and standards that are found in the PLAN, ACT, PSAT, SAT and AP tests."

Each senior high student will be scheduled for a BSM Hour during the regular school day for both semesters. Students will earn their PE/Wellness credit through activities scheduled one day per week. On other days, students will have access to resource centers in various disciplines (e.g., math, writing, science, world language) as well as expanded opportunities for peer tutoring, music sectionals, college and career planning, fitness activities, technology assistance, meetings with counselors

or the campus minister and time for individual and group work.

**Emily Busch** '11 followed the development of the eight period day. She says her first reaction was to "hate the idea." She questioned the way the new free hour would be used.

"Why couldn't I use the time to take another AP class? I've taken four already. Another one would add more strength to my GPA," she noted.

The more she learned about the new schedule that students behind her will follow, the more she understood its benefits.

"Now, more than ever, I appreciate the free hour," she said. "It would have been nice to have the extra 40 minutes to fill in with college prep work." As a senior, Emily would "do homework until late at night. It would have been good to have more time

during the day so I could get better sleep." She added that she needed "to stop for 40 minutes and say 'I don't have to do something.' You don't realize how much you need it until you have it. I'm pretty good at time management, but I could work on my skills."

Emily encourages school leaders to reaffirm the value of the new schedule to students. "Administration needs to explain it to all senior high students at the beginning of every year. It's like the backpack issue: The reason behind the policy needs to be explained; opportunities for value need to be presented. There will be issues. Administration needs to listen to student feedback. Culture change will happen; but they need to listen."

Dr. Skinner and the administration agree with Emily and are taking every opportunity to explain the new schedule. They point out that additional benefits of the BSM Hour to students include:

- Communicating with teachers on an individual basis
- Working with other students
- Studying alone in library or other quiet study hall
- Receiving help with technology/laptop
- Receiving grade level specific guidance and counseling curriculum

Furthermore, observed Dr. Skinner, "The quality of the faculty is a key component when it comes to student achievement. A strong, engaged and dynamic faculty provides the environment students need to reach their highest potential. The eight period day provides expanded opportunities for faculty as well. The eighth period allows faculty to meet individually with students, to meet collaboratively with each other and to engage in professional growth opportunities."

For senior and junior high faculty, the adjustment in the teacher load permits five classes, two professional hours, and one prep hour. While teachers will have expanded opportunities to work with students, the new schedule also includes an enhanced professional development requirement for faculty that will lead to a more engaged experience for students. Other benefits to faculty include:

- Professional learning community time
- Peer to peer coaching
- Classroom observations
- Professional development around curriculum and instruction
- Technology integration
- · Data driven decision-making

#### **Body-Spirit-Mind**

The third motivator for implementing the eight period day is the need to strengthen the connection among mind, body and spirit, a field in which BSM is a pioneer. Wellness Director Connie Fourré is recognized as an author and national leader in educating students in service-learning and Catholic social teaching. The wellness

model she has developed for BSM seeks to balance intellectual, spiritual, emotional, social, physical and environmental wellness. She is confident we will be sharing the results of this initiative with others beyond our doors.



The movement from balance to being out of sync can be slow, but not completely imperceptible. "We've been watching how a student's pace – the effort to get higher grades and be a competitive athlete and participate in a variety of activities – has picked up," said Ms. Fourré. "Our research shows students can name their stressors, but they are so busy they don't have time to reflect. Students need time to take stock. Some are asking "What's wrong with me?""

Sleep deprivation is a big problem, as is poor nutrition. Ms. Fourré observed, "Students are absorbing pressure from the environment to achieve standards we haven't fully examined. One teacher, after a faculty meeting, said she's finally feeling permission to say 'enough is enough."

Starting in 2011-2012, the Wellness credit will stand apart; sophomores, juniors and seniors will earn .25 PE/Wellness credits per semester. The curriculum addresses the many different components of wellness (with a focus on the balance of body, spirit and mind). Students will have choices regarding fitness and movement activities. There is considerable research that shows the importance of fitness and movement during the school day as it relates to academic performance.

Through the eight period day and the BSM Hour, students will be more immersed in our Catholic learning community and they'll benefit from best practices in teaching. They'll sharpen their time management skills and focus attention on what they need in terms of body, spirit and mind to be successful. Both college and career require a level of independence and responsibility that we feel students should start to learn and practice while they're in high school.

## Math curriculum gets personal

Calculators, protractors and compasses have long been known as common math classroom tools. Meet the latest: Sophia. Sophia is a social media website, specifically designed as an educational resource that we're using at Benilde-St. Margaret's.

The Minneapolis-based inventors of Sophia say the new technology "provides an academic community where everyone has access to learning that surrounds and supports the traditional classroom. [Sophia] encourages variety and creativity in teaching so that everyone can learn in a way that makes sense to them."

Similar to Facebook and Wikipedia, Sophia allows users to post material to be shared with other site users. The difference is that the posts don't relate to someone's slow commute that day, their vacation photos or their family member's latest antics. Sophia's posted items enhance classroom studies. Users can publish lessons, also known as learning packets, and/or review multi-media lessons that others explain on the site.

Last summer, the Sophia leadership team asked BSM junior high math teacher Fred Hennen to be part of a pilot program. Fred said "yes" and has since been featured on Minnesota Public Radio and WCCO TV News. Believing that "teaching is the best way to learn," Fred explains that Sophia "allows students an alternative way to show what they know."

Students have been along for the fun ride and enjoy being able to use Sophia as a resource. Certain school days are considered "Sophia publishing days" in Mr. Hennen's classes. Students even intentionally publish errors in some math problems, challenging classmates to locate the mistakes (or earning extra credit if they successfully trick other students).

Sophia is not just for math, and anyone can log on and review materials. The site is still in its early stages and has some limited access. However, since technology is not known for its slow pace, Sophia will likely explode onto the curriculum scene quickly.

#### Here's what some of Mr. Hennen's students are saying about Sophia:

I like Sophia because when using it we are the teachers. It expands our way of learning and helps others. If one person learns better visually by seeing people do the problems in a video, another might learn better by seeing it explained in text...Sophia provides all ways to learn.



In a democracy, every citizen has a voice. On March 15, several BSM students, led by senior high faith formation faculty members Zach Zeckser and Alison Frank, spoke up in favor of the Pain Capable Unborn Child Protection Act, a bill under consideration by the Minnesota Legislature. The bill, as proposed, would outlaw abortion after the point when the unborn child begins to feel pain – largely accepted by the scientific community to be at 20 weeks of gestation. Exceptions to the ban include abortions that are necessary to save the life of the mother or to avert a serious risk of substantial and irreversible impairment of a major bodily function.

"From my perspective," said Mr. Zeckser, "the goal was to empower BSM students who feel passionately about the abortion issue. We wanted them to better inform themselves on the issue and to learn first-hand how they can put their faith into action and make a difference."

The students spent the morning learning about the bill and picking up tips on how to effectively present their arguments to lawmakers with varying positions on the bill. Here are some of the students' impressions of their experience as citizen lobbyists:

We questioned, confronted, and stumped some of Minnesota's greatest pro-choice legislators. As high schoolers of the next generation, we are more prepared than we think.

Meeting with the pro-choice senator and representative showed me why I am pro-life: 1. Because God created everything with a purpose and He wanted them to keep on living; 2. To share my views with others and try to change their minds; and, 3. To show the representatives who's boss.

I didn't think I had much of a voice on this issue. I'm a Republican and almost all of my friends are Democrats. This leads to most of

them being pro-choice and disagreeing with me. But, today, my voice could be heard along with fellow students. We want the preservation of human life, even at its earliest stages. Meeting with Representative Winkler and watching him struggle to argue with a few high schoolers really is the best feeling – knowing that your cause is just, not only logically, but morally; seeing that our voice could affect someone who might never agree with our side. We are all pleased that we could show him that we will not back down.



## Myles Barnes wins Al Blasing Award

Aim high. That's the motto for the United States Air Force, and it's one that Myles Barnes, this year's Al Blasing Award

winner, will soon know well, when he begins school at the academy in the fall. Already, it is a philosophy that he has proven to understand.

Myles came to BSM in ninth grade after attending a much larger public middle school. He explains, "When I first came here, I wondered why the teacher was talking to me so much and trying to build a relationship?" It was something he wasn't used to. But Myles quickly got his footing and

became a star football and basketball


