

Students Tackle **Technology During Summer Vacation**

Fore than 200 elementary school students in Grades 3-6 tapped into their ingenuity and sharpened their science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) skills this summer when they participated in a robotics camp hosted by the Saugerties Central School District. The camp was held at the Saugerties Junior-Senior High School.

Originally scheduled to run for eight days, the camp was extended to 12 days to accommodate additional students in Grades 4, 5, and 6.

According to Dr. Darlene Westinghouse, the District's Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum, Instruction, Assessment & Data, the robotics camp was supported by a \$35,000 grant secured by the office of New York State Senator George Amedore, Jr.

Throughout their summer learning experience, students engaged in hands-on activities and

Jr/Sr HS Tech Students + Cahill Sixth Graders = Astronomy Learning & Fun

Teamwork was the name of the game recently when Cahill sixth graders visited the Junior-Senior High technology department. The students used software and a 3D printer to design a prototype of a moveable platform for a telescope that will be set up in the school courtyard this fall.

The Orion SkyQuest telescope, filters (including one that will allow students to safely view the sun), and other gear and supplies were purchased through a \$5,000 Lowe's Toolbox For Education grant.

The project isn't just a fun, deep dive into astronomy, however. It's also a collaborative effort. The sixth graders got help with the software from the Junior-Senior High School technology students, who will also help build the platform in the fall.

One sixth grade student said that having a telescope at school will be "really awesome." We'd bet a binary star that she's right!

were introduced to various robotics coding programs including SeaPerch, TinkerCAD, Vex Robotics, Finch, Scribbler, and Hummingbird Robotics, said technology teacher Bryan Van Vliet, who supervised the program. Campers were encouraged to employ creativity, innovation, problem solving, and teamwork to make their projects come to life.

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Students learning to build and operate SeaPerch underwater robots used PVC pipes and zip ties to attach the pieces and assemble a control panel, and stripped wires to connect them to propellers. After they constructed the machines, they used remote controls to operate their underwater vehicles in inflatable pools.

Jake Meyer, who teaches Technology and High School

Principles of Engineering, said it's all about engaging the students at a young age. "It excites them and leaves them wanting to know more," said Meyer. "They have to use critical thinking skills to get their robot to do what they want it to do, and they teach each other along the way as well."

Saugerties High School junior Ethan Christiansen served as one of the camp's student volunteers. Christiansen said introducing the young campers to STEM is important since jobs in the field are abundant and growing. "I think it can pique their interest in the tech industry," he said.

"Members of the Class of 2018 performed over 4,000 community service hours this year," he said. "Our backpack program led by the Key Club and their advisor Ms. Greco


supported by \$30,000 worth of donations from this community. These are the acts that develop a sense of pride and faith in our hometown. Everyone came together

The Ulster County Superintendents' Council





Pictured at right are seven of the eight students from Central America who graduated from SHS. The students demonstrated unparalleled work ethic and perseverance to overcome their unique challenges.





Steve Mower, a longtime supporter of athletics in the Saugerties Central School District, has received the Ulster County School Boards Association (UCSBA) Distinguished Friend of Education Award. The annual award honors 10 residents from the county's school districts and Ulster BOCES for their dedication and commitment to students and schools.



Mower is well known among athletes and coaches throughout the Hudson Valley for his ardent support of students. A Saugerties Athletic Hall of Fame member and Special Olympics medalist, Mower has volunteered as manager for Sawyer teams, making sure students and coaches have what they need to be safe and successful during both home and away games. Mower has attended innumerable Saugerties sporting events over the years.

"The players on other teams know who Steve is. Everybody knows who Steve is, and Steve knows everybody. And they all have fond memories of the way he impacted them," said Joe Defino, a Saugerties teacher who presented Mower's award at the UCSBA dinner on May 24. Defino said that while Mower has "never stood in front of a classroom, never given a lecture, and never had his name in a scorebook, he has had the deepest impact on our community of anyone in the last 50 years. I'm honored to say that Steve Mower is the best teacher I've ever had."

SHS Students Excel At 10-Day Film Challenge



Saugerties High School Computer Video Production and Broadcast Journalism students rocked the 10-Day Film Challenge competition in May. One submission, "Past is Present," placed 7th in the New York State finals. The film was also runner-up in the Best Use of Genre category.

Participating students picked a genre at random, and were given a prop, line of dialogue, and characters' names. They had 10 days, working during school hours only, to brainstorm, write, film, edit, and score their movie, and make a poster for it.

Two other SHS films made the finals, earning all three a May screening in New York City before an audience of more than 500 people. "Withdrawal," a disaster film about trouble brewing during a coffee shortage, was runner-up for Best Use of Sound, and "Pushing Daisies," a romantic drama, earned runner-up for Best Use of Props.




