`Embrace the Moment' GRADUATION 2014

With diplomas in hand and tassels flipped, the Class of 2014 graduated from Saugerties High School on the morning of June 28, officially becoming what Superintendent Seth Turner called "next in line to bring pride to our community."

Sitting before a large gathering of family members that Board of Education Trustee Robert Thomann described as a "sea of love," the 220-member class heard from its four officers, who reminded them of the many happy moments they've shared and offered words of inspiration for the future.

"As a class, we have carried each other to the top of the mountain," said class president Hunter Igoe. Class treasurer Jessa Chargois said, "There are 25,142,400 seconds in our high school careers. That's

25,142,400 chances to influence, achieve, learn, grow, and strive for greatness." Superintendent Turner, who served as principal to about one-third of the graduates during their early school years at Morse Elementary School, reminded them that they come from a community with many proud distinctions, including a Congressional Medal of Honor winner and a Nobel Peace Prize winner.

> "You'll go on to do incredible things as well," Turner said. SHS Principal Tom Averill shared words from the Optimist's Creed, which he reads each morning when he arrives at the high school for work: "Be too large for worry, too noble for anger, too strong for fear, and too happy to permit the presence of trouble."

Eighty percent of the Class of 2014 will attend either a twoor four-year college and the graduates have received a total of more than \$80,000 in local scholarships.

Before receiving their diplomas and tossing their vibrantly decorated hats in the air, the class got an appropriate send-off from Valedictorian Shannon Averill. Averill, who excelled in running at SHS, said the sport taught her a lot about how to grow by competing against oneself, both in sports and in life.

"There's no telling how many miles we'll go," Averill told her classmates. "Embrace the moment and the challenges that lie ahead. Class of 2014, on your mark, get set, go!"

"Do everything you can to be able to look back and know you did well and had a good time," LaTourette said.



Cahill Elementary School Students Help Launch New Safety Law

Cahill Elementary School students who enjoy walking and biking to school showed their support for new pedestrian safety legislation during an announcement of the law on the school campus in May. Students welcomed United State Senator Kirsten Gillibrand with a homemade sign as she introduced the Pedestrian Safety Act of 2014, which allows states to use federal highway money for projects that make roads safer for walkers and bicyclists.

As part of a streetscape project launched by both the Village and Town of Saugerties, a traffic light will be installed at the intersection of Main Street and Washington Avenue, which is located at the corner of the school property. More than half of Cahill's student body walks or rides bicycles to school and many of them cross at Main and Washington twice daily.

Sofia Williams, a Grade 5 student, is among the walkers and recently took her first bike ride to school as well.

"I tried to stay as close to the curb as I could," she said, describing her biking experience along busy Main Street. She said she's happy about the traffic light, which will make the road safer for her and her classmates.

During Gillibrand's visit, Cahill students also helped promote the new "See Be Seen" initiative sponsored by the Saugerties Police Department and downtown businesses. Cahill Principal Susan Gies reminded the students of basic safety tips for crossing the street.

Also on hand for the senator's visit were Superintendent of Schools Seth Turner and members of the District's administrative team, as well as Ulster County Supervisor Mike Hein, Saugerties Village Mayor Bill Murphy, Town Supervisor Greg Helsmoortel, and Saugerties Police Chief Joseph Sinagra.

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Shannon Averill and Meghan Creen Are Top Two at SHS

A pair of academically talented, athletic, and busy young ladies have earned the top spots in the Saugerties High School (SHS) Class of 2014. Shannon Averill is this year's Valedictorian and Meghan Creen is Salutatorian.

Shannon graduated with a four-year average of 101.055, which she earned through long hours of hard work hitting the books, but she didn't pressure herself to come out on top.

"There are a lot of smart people in our class," she said. "I was OK if I wasn't number one."

Shannon's dedication and work ethic went well beyond the classroom during her years at SHS. She was a member of student government, band, and the Catholic Youth Group, president of the Key Club,

and vice-president of National Honor Society. Shannon also played varsity soccer, basketball, and track, and was captain of all three during her senior year. A scholar athlete and member of two New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA) Scholar Teams, she was named the District's Outstanding Female Athlete of the Year.

As Shannon balanced academics, activities, and sports, she got plenty of help and support from SHS faculty and staff, in particular track coach Steve Eggink, biology teacher Janice Martin, English teacher Adile Jones, and calculus teacher Debra Cacchillo. Shannon said Eggink helped her make her college decision, Martin instilled a love of biology, and Jones often sent her supportive texts before track meets. Cacchillo, she said, is not only an outstanding teacher, but also a "great lady and a great example to us all."

Among Shannon's biggest supporters are two other District faculty members: her parents, Tom and Cathy Averill. Tom is principal of SHS and Cathy is a teacher at Grant D. Morse Elementary School, where Shannon spent the early years of her education. Of being the principal's daughter, Shannon simply said, "He's a principal in school and a dad at home. We have a really good relationship." She is thankful for her parents as well as her four siblings. "Without all their love and support, I wouldn't be where I am," she said.

Shannon will begin her studies in nursing at Monmouth University in New Jersey this fall. She has always been interested in the medical field and enjoys helping other people. Participating in the Ulster BOCES Pre-University/New Visions Health program in her senior year helped clarify her plans for the future.

"New Visions really opened my eyes to what's out there," she said.

While at Monmouth, Shannon will run as a member of the Division 1 lady Hawks track and field team. She said she will miss her SHS track teammates and will always think of high school with fondness.

"The four years I had here at Saugerties were amazing," she said.

Salutatorian Meghan Creen is the daughter of William and Linda Creen and attended both Morse and Mt. Marion elementary schools. She earned a four-year academic average of 100.76 at SHS, but was "shocked and excited" when she learned she was going to be salutatorian.

"It's a great honor," she said.

Meghan was active in many school organizations and clubs, including National Honor Society, Key Club, Spanish Club, Chess Club, the spring musical, and the Sawyer yearbook, for which she was an editor and photographer. Equally busy on the athletic fields, Meghan was a Scholar Athlete and member of the varsity girl's tennis and track teams, both of which were named NYSPHSAA Scholar Teams. Meghan said she enjoyed being part of these teams because she made friends from different grade levels and backgrounds through a shared love of sports.

Among Meghan's favorite instructors at SHS were English teacher Steve Stellavato, who helped her improve her writing, and Debra Cacchillo, who unraveled the mysteries of calculus.

Meghan will attend the University of Buffalo this fall and plans to major in bio-medical engineering with a minor in Spanish. She credits her SHS biology teacher, Janice Martin, for "making bio fun" and getting her thinking about it as a career path. Meghan ultimately hopes to specialize in tissue engineering.

As she looks forward to the next chapter of her life, Meghan is also feeling sad about leaving behind friends and four years of experiences at SHS.

"It's been really great and I'm going to miss it," she said.


