## From the School Counseling Department

Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are off to a great start in the School Counseling Department. We have scheduled a College Application Day, Parent Nights for all grade levels, a Financial Aid Night, and the Scholarship Bootcamp.

College Application Day is a time for students to come into the media center to receive help on completing their college applications. Parent Nights provide graduation requirements and other pertinent high school information to parents. Financial Aid Night will provide information to parents on completing the FAFSA and other resources. The Scholarship Bootcamp is tentatively scheduled for January 18, 2018. Volunteer community members will be available to help students with their scholarship applications and essays. Please contact me at 424-2555, ext. 38544 if you are interested in volunteering for the Scholarship Bootcamp.

College bound students should be working diligently on their college applications. Some deadlines have passed and others are fast approaching. It is important that students meet with their school counselor for a graduation credit check. They should also be sure to have SAT/ACT scores and community service hours completed and turned in to the school counseling office. Lastly, students should make sure that they have personally contacted the colleges they are interested in for specific requirements.

The FAFSA application for the 2018-19 school year opened on October 1st. The quickest way to apply is online using FAFSA on the web at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov). This application must be completed to apply for federal student aid.

Lastly, please check the "Counselor" section of the school website for important information. Community Service Workshop dates, scholarship opportunities, and graduation dates and requirements are all listed on the website.

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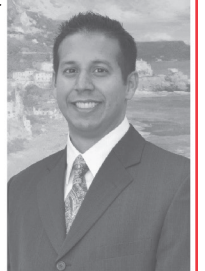

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## What is Bullying?

### Information for Parents:

Bullying shall be defined as systematically and chronically inflicting physical hurt or psychological distress on one or more students. The term “bullying” includes cyber-bullying”, as defined in School Board Policy 208, Code of Student Conduct and Discipline. It is further defined as unwanted and **repeated** written, verbal, or physical behavior, including any threatening, insulting, or dehumanizing gesture that is severe or pervasive enough to create an intimidating, hostile, or offensive educational environment.

Students may anonymously report any incident of bullying by completing a form and placing it in the reporting box located in the school counseling office. All reports will be reviewed and shared with a school administrator.

Please encourage your students to **“Take a Stand – Be the Change”** by committing to the following:

- Stop Rumors;
- Think before speaking;
- Rip up hurtful notes;
- Say hello to a new student or someone who is alone;
- Join up with someone who is being bothered and take them away from the conflict;
- Let an adult know when someone needs help, **even the offender**; and
- Discourage peers from using social media to hurt or humiliate others.

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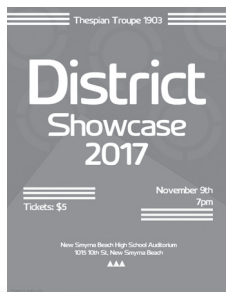
### Aquaculture 3

Students in Aquaculture 3 participate in a yearlong internship with the Marine Discovery Center (MDC). During the internship, students maintain all aquatic systems including husbandry and water quality. Here students are measuring pH, nitrates, nitrites, ammonia, temperature, and salinity of each of the marine animal exhibits at the MDC.



### District Thespian Competition

Thespian Troupe 1903 will be representing New Smyrna Beach High School at the District 3 Thespian Festival at Lyman High School from November 15-18. This competition brings together 29 high school theatre troupes to compete in events like acting, musical theatre, technical events and one acts. 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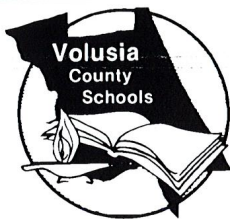


## The State of Florida Seal of Bi-literacy

Last year was the first year that the Seal of Bi-literacy was awarded in Florida. NSBHS had 14 graduates last year that received this distinction. This esteemed award really helps graduates stand out to future colleges and/or employers. It tells them that this student has intercultural competency, which is one of the top 10 employability skills in today's job market according to the U.S. Department of Labor. Dear Parent/Guardian:

The School District of Volusia County policy is to provide information to you regarding your child's teacher and paraprofessional qualifications in a timely manner upon request.

You have the right to request the following information:

- Whether the teacher has met state licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas for which the teacher provides instruction.
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status by which state qualifications of licensing criteria have been waived.
- The baccalaureate degree major of the teacher and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification or degree.
- Whether your child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications.

Please be assured that the School District of Volusia County is dedicated to providing our students with a quality education. The information regarding the qualifications of your child's teacher and/or the classroom paraprofessional may be obtained by contacting the principal of your school.

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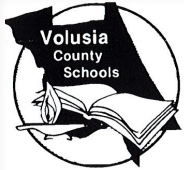
