





GAINING RESPONSIBILITY AND SELF KNOWLEDGE

In Middle School, we are committed to building on our Lower School foundation and continuing a single-sex academic experience in grades 5-8. The Middle School years are transformative, both academically and socially. When boys and girls step into our classrooms, they are able to shed gender expectations, find their unique voices, and develop a strong sense of self.

In Middle School, we emphasize both the process and the content of learning, recognizing that the skills students build through their search for knowledge are as important as the knowledge attained. Students manage their own schedules as they move from class to class, develop an increased level of independence, and learn important lessons about organization and time management.

While Middle School is a time to solidify foundations through core studies, it is also a time for students to explore new horizons and discover budding passions. Under the skilled guidance of our Middle School faculty, students develop the confidence to branch out socially and intellectually, manage an increasingly challenging curriculum, take healthy risks, and exercise empathy and respect for others. Over the four years, students analyze literature, build solar cars, craft their own poetry, lead probability carnivals, participate in math and reading competitions, and use Sketch Up to design 3D models, among countless other learning experiences. Our 8th grade students move on to Upper School empowered to tackle increased academic expectations and take the reins of leadership.

MIDDLE SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

ADVISORY

At the start of every school year, each student is matched with an advisor who acts as a trusted advocate and mentor and serves as a liaison between the family and school. Advisors play an integral role in the day-to-day life of their advisees and oversee the experience of the whole child—academic, social, and emotional. Students meet in their advisories twice a day. Advisors are also regularly updated about their advisees' progress through faculty grade-level meetings, which enables them to always support the growth of the whole child. The relationships between advisors and their advisees are special, and students often return to visit them throughout their years at SCH, even after they have moved on to Upper School.

STUDENTSHIP

An important part of Middle School is learning to organize one's time and materials, ask for help, plan ahead, and advocate for one's self. Faculty recognize this and integrate these skills into their class lessons. SCH believes so strongly in the development of these skills that we have built an "Extra Help Period" into the schedule. Students report to their advisory where they have the opportunity to complete homework, meet with a teacher to ask questions and review material, or spend time in our wonderful student-centered library.

BUILDING AN INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY

One of the highlights of Middle School is our unique AEIOU programming, which advances SCH's mission to create an inclusive community. AEIOU stands for Awareness, Empathy, Inclusion, Opportunity through differences, and Understanding. As a community, we care deeply about celebrating diversity in all its forms and recognize how important it is in today's world to be able to consider perspectives other than our own. Students engage in regular lessons

through advisory and the academic curriculum that enable them to explore myriad backgrounds, values, identities, and perspectives in order to build empathy and awareness. The dialogue and personal growth that result are powerful.

ELECTIVES

Students have many opportunities to explore their passions in Middle School. Each trimester, they choose from different activities, ultimately participating in 12 over the course of their Middle School experience. Recent offerings have included Stop-Gap Animation, Student Council, Cooking, Improvisational Theatre, Independent Science Experimentation, Community Service, Student Newspaper, Theatre Technicians, Chess, Hiking, Debate Club, Book Club, Service On Campus, Chinese Calligraphy and Origami, and Drawing from Nature.

OPPORTUNITIES TO SERVE AND CARE

In Middle School, students continue to explore their role within the larger community and the different ways in which they can contribute through opportunities to serve. Service activities within and outside the school range from collecting recyclable trash from classrooms and offices to making sandwiches for a homeless shelter to delivering goodie bags to a local Ronald McDonald House.

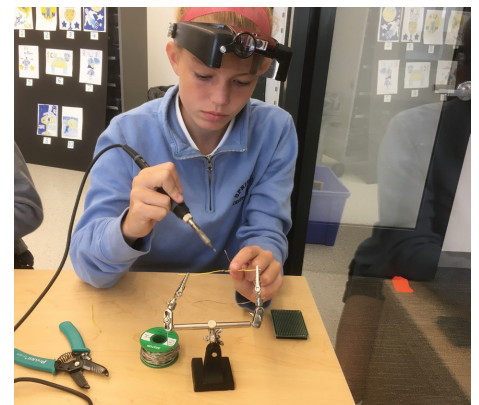
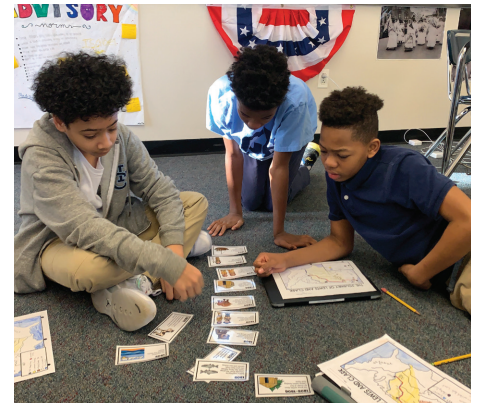
OVERNIGHT TRIPS

One of the most memorable experiences in Middle School is our overnight trips. At various points, students go away with their advisors and their classmates to locations ranging from the Poconos and Maryland to Washington, D.C. Activities range from zip lining and navigating high rope courses to exploring our nation's capital, but the common thread among them all is the focus on team building, class spirit, and collaboration. Even upon their graduation, students often still share stories and happy memories from these special trips.

BECOMING SKILLED PROBLEM SOLVERS

Middle School students build important 21st century skills through our Center for Entrepreneurial Leadership (CEL). A complement to the core Middle School curriculum, CEL classes introduce students to a wide range of applied subjects, such as coding, new media, social entrepreneurship, finance, data analysis, design, and fabrication. While gaining a foundation in these subjects, they also further strengthen their

problem-solving, communication, presentation, and collaboration skills. In the 6th grade, students engage with the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Students craft presentations on the goals, create a profile of an SDG "hero," and generate interest-driven projects that raise awareness about these global goals.
