Message from the **Superintendent & Chair**

Dear Members of the Lyme-Old Lyme Communities,

As we bring this school year to a close, we wish to thank the community for their ongoing support of our schools. While COVID restrictions still played a part in the first half of our school year, this year saw the return of much-loved activities across all schools including concerts, sporting events, and award ceremonies with parents and extended family in attendance. Our students saw the return of field trips, school dances, and many other activities that made school feel "normal" once again.

On May 3, 2022, the towns of Lyme and Old Lyme voted to adopt a budget of \$34,830,464 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023. The budget represents a 0.13% <u>decrease</u> from the previous year. When comparing this budget to the budget from four years ago, we are spending \$254,294 less than what was spent in 2019-2020. This represents a 0.7% decrease over four years while maintaining our award-winning academic and extracurricular offerings.

Enjoy your summer and we look forward to welcoming back our students and staff in August.
