- Honors Programs
- School Climate/Feel

- Career Services



Minimum Requirements to enter a Florida Public University

- 4 English Classes
- 4 Math Courses Algebra 1 and above, to include Algebra 2
 - Should have Math every year
- 3 Natural Sciences-2 with a lab
 - 4 recommended
- 3 Social Sciences
- 2 World Languages sequential, in the same language
 - 3 looks better
- 2 other Academic Electives

Admission into Florida's public universities is competitive and students should be doing more than the minimum



Requirements to enter a Florida Public University

Universities like to see rigorous coursework

The more academic and weighted classes, the better

Pre-AICE = .5 weight

Honors = .5 weight

AICE = 1 point

AP = 1 point

Dual Enrollment = 1 point



College Search Process

- Big Future
 - Allows you to put in criteria that you want in a college
 - Example search
- https://www.floridashines.org/
- Research on the specific university websites
- Attend college visits through SHS (virtual)- Ms. Coy in Guid.
- Schedule official college visits on own





College Entrance Exams: SAT and ACT

- Universities require the SAT and/or ACT*
 - *Because of COVID, some schools became test-optional for 2020-2021
 - *Check with specific school to see if require
 - All FL public universities still require test scores
- AICE Diploma does not exempt you from taking these exams for College Admissions
- Recommended to have taken the SAT and/or ACT by December of Junior year
 - Allows you time to retest



SAT

Two Sections

- Evidence Based Reading
- Math

Optional Third Section

- Writing/Essay
 - Some universities want at least 1 Writing score
 - Check with specific schools

Score Range

Reading: 200-800

Math: 200-800

Total: 400-1600

Writing: 2-8



- Can retake the SAT until you get your desired scores
- Many colleges will Super Score
 - Take the highest section score from multiple tests
 - Check with specific schools to ensure they super score
- Fee waivers for students on free/reduced lunch
- Encouraged to answer every question
 - No penalty for guessing
- SAT Subject Tests
 - Math, Biology, Chemistry, US History, Spanish, etc.
 - Take <u>only</u> if your college requires it
 - Check with specific schools most don't require it (some Ivy/Elite do)

The ACT

Four Sections

- English
- Math
- Reading
- Science

Optional Fifth Section

- Writing
 - Some universities want at least 1 writing score
 - check with specific schools

Total Score Range

1-36 per section

Writing: 2-12



The ACT

- Can retake until you achieve your desired scores
- Many colleges will super score check with specific schools
- Fee waivers available for students on free/reduced lunch
- No penalty for guessing
- Offers Section re-testing
 - Must have taken full test at least once to be eligible
- Online test option- check if test center offers
 - Will get results faster

 It is recommended to take both the SAT and ACT, then retest on the one you scored better on.



The PSAT

- Total Score range: 320-1520 **Scores available in December**
 - Reading: 160-760
 - Math: 160-760
 - Look at your National Percentiles to see how did compared to others who took test
- On a different scale than SAT but the total PSAT score is a direct indicator of SAT score
- PSAT is Not used for College Admissions but is used to compete in the National Merit Scholarship Program- Juniors ONLY
 - The exact PSAT score needed varies from year to year and by State, but it's always the Top 1% of students in each State (about 16,000 juniors) who qualify as **Semifinalists**
 - Notified in September if Semifinalist
 - Semifinalists then apply to see if qualify as **Finalists** to earn Scholarship money
 - Use a mathematical equation called the Selection Index to determine who falls in the top 1% in each State

Ivy & Elite Universities & Military Academies


- Highly competitive test scores and GPA
 - -Check individual school websites to see averages and requirements
 - -Average SAT at Ivy's: high 1400s-mid 1500s
- Average acceptance rate at the Ivy's in 2019 was under 7%
- Essay very important: They want to see how you would fit into their campus environment


Students should email Mrs.
Villafane to set up a time to talk individually about applying to an Ivy, Elite, or Military school as soon as possible.






















Three Main Things Colleges Need

Application

- Most schools include an **Essay** in their application
- What type of application accepted?

Transcript

- How does the University want to receive it?
 - Self-reported (SSAR) vs. Request for SHS to send to school
- Request all transcripts via email with our Registrar
 - Comitale-Dahms, Patricia A. PAComita@volusia.k12.fl.us
 - Student name in Subject Line
 - List of schools in body of email
 - Unofficial sent to you

SAT/ACT Scores

- Most universities want scores sent directly from the Testing Agency
- Test optional because of COVID? Check with specific schools
- All Florida Public Universities still require SAT/ACT this year



- your individuality
- Don't use the essay to repeat your resume. Write about something that reveals another dimension of your life or personality
- Be descriptive and give details that appeal to the senses
- Don't say what you think the Admissions office wants to hear
- Make sure to get it proofread by parents/guardians, teachers, and/or peers.
 - Do this early on as you all have the same teachers





Essay

Examples of prompts

- Tell a story from your life, describing an experience that either demonstrates your character or helped shape it.
- Describe a time when you made a meaningful contribution to others in which the greater good was the focus. Discuss the challenges and rewards of making your contribution.
- The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience.



Honors Programs

- Florida Public Universities have an option to apply to an Honors College
- Additional Essay is typically required
- Profile of an Honors Student at UF for 2020
 - GPA: 4.6–4.7
 - SAT: 1490 1550
 - ACT: 34 35
 - 11,337 Applicants- 1508 Admitted



Perks of an Honors Program

- Priority Registration
- Special Courses and Seminars
- Exclusive/Separate Housing
- Strong Support System



Common Application

- Common App Website
- More than 900 colleges and universities use this application
- Extremely user-friendly
- Dashboard helps you easily track deadlines and requirements
- Only fill it out once and then any member school can access it
 - Some schools might require supplemental information/parts
- Easily invite teachers, recommenders, and counselors to submit their information



START NOW

- Eases the application process later
- Provide good details
- Quality over Quantity
 - Be involved in things that are meaningful to you
 - Take leadership roles
- <u>RESUME TEMPLATE</u> included in handout packet
- Give a resume to those you ask to write a letter of recommendation on your behalf



Letters of Recommendation

 Check if your school requires any letters of recommendation from teachers/staff

 Give teachers/counselors ample amount of time to complete your letter

 Be prepared with your Resume when you ask your teacher



Florida Bright Futures Scholarship

- FL Academic Scholars Award
 - Pays for 100% of FL State tuition plus \$300 for books per semester
- FL Medallion Scholars Award
 - Pays for about 75% of FL State tuition

FAFSA – Federal Student Aid based on financial need

- All colleges take it and all students encouraged to complete it
- Available October 1st of Senior year- can create your PIN earlier- DO THIS!

Bright Futures Scholarship

- Successfully completing the AICE Diploma = Florida Academic Scholars Award
 - If you have 100 volunteer hours documented and submitted
 - If you have completed the Florida Financial Aid Application
- If you do not receive the AICE Diploma, you must qualify the traditional way
- If you do not have the AICE Diploma at the end of your Junior year, you need to plan for the worst-case scenario and try to get the test score and GPA
