Girls Varsity Basketball Give It Their All in State Playoff Run

Brentwood Girls Basketball had an incredible year. The Eagles won over 20 games and made it to the semi-finals of CIF 2A! It was an incredible run that was capped off by qualifying and winning a STATE game for the first time since 2018. The Eagles beat CIF Champions Orange Lutheran on the road in what will be known as one of the best wins in program history. This was the highest scoring team in the history of the program averaging 61 points per game. Brentwood shot lights out from beyond the 3-ooing arc making over 350 three pointers this season. They had multiple players average double digits including Junior Amber Furch who was named All CIF, All State, and All League. She led the Eagles in scoring and is currently being recruited by multiple D1 schools. Junior Captain Emma Dudley was also a key contributor for the Eagles. Brentwood returns the core of their scoring unit and should be even stronger in the 2022-2023 season.

"Recognizing and Navigating Mental Health Challenges in Tweens and Teens" TIM and RYDER DAVIS

October 2021

"The Lonely Century: How to Help Kids Connect in an Increasingly Isolated World" NOREENA HERTZ

November 2021

Dr. Mike was joined by Upper School B-Well student leaders Cooper K. and Brandon M. in a Community Conversation with British author and economist Noreena Hertz. Dr. Hertz gave an insightful lecture into our global epidemic of isolation—and what can be done about it. She explored how our increasing dependence on technology, radical changes to the workplace, and decades of policies that have placed self-interest above the collective good are damaging

our communities and making us more isolated than ever before. Dr. Hertz is the author of her best-selling book, *The Lonely Century*, and holds a PhD from Cambridge University and an MBA from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. She is an Honorary Professor at the Institute for Global Prosperity and the University College London.

"How to Raise an Adult" and "How to Become an Adult"

Dr. Mike was joined in Community Conversations with Dolly Klock, M.D. and veteran prosecutor Jonathan Cristall to help us navigate some of the challenges facing today's teenagers. 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

VCRE THE VETERAN PARTNERSHIP IN FOCUS

Through the Veterans **Center for Recreation** and Education at **Brentwood School** (VCRE), we manifest our commitment to serving Veterans. Brentwood's partnership with VA spans almost 50 years and has positively impacted the lives of Veterans and students alike for generations. What follows are but some examples of

Stand Outs

With access to the VA campus limited during the pandemic, the VA's Community Engagement and Reintegration Services (CERS) personnel deployed teams of social and resource workers into the field in an effort to support homeless Veterans. Two large-scale coordinated efforts, called Stand Outs, took place in November of 2020 and March of 2021, sending multiple teams at a time to cover a very broad geographic area of the city. In each instance, Brentwood School's VCRE supported the work by providing backpacks (stuffed with new socks, toiletries, and a blanket), petpacks (donated by the Michelson Found Animals Foundation), breakfasts, lunches, and resource guides to be handed out.

On November 9, 2021, with COVID regulations allowing for limited outdoor gathering, VA hosted a Housing Resource Stand Down at Lot 1 aimed at matching unhoused Veterans with resources and programs to get them off the street. BWS provided a looping shuttle for Veterans between different access points on and off campus as well as hundreds of breakfast burritos, lunches, bottled water, juice, and tea.

Cooking Classes

Prior to the pandemic, Brentwood School's VCRE launched a series of cooking classes at Building 209 and the Domiciliary on the West Los Angeles VA Campus. It was a wonderful opportunity for our faculty and staff to connect with Veterans and provide a culinary lesson and demonstration of an easy recipe, which then culminated in enjoying what had been cooked.

VCRE THE VETERAN PARTNERSHIP



Our faculty and volunteers soon realized that the best part of the cooking class was the connection and conversation between Veterans while sharing a meal together!

Post pandemic, Brentwood School's VCRE now offers monthly outdoor cooking classes for Veterans at the West Los Angeles VA Campus Domiciliary. These cooking classes have included some easy and healthy recipes with an emphasis on cardiovascular health and nutrition, such as Greek garden gazpacho, juicing classes, lemon vinaigrette potato salad with grilled fish, vinegar coleslaw with fish tacos, homemade garlic hummus with kabobs, and homemade salsa with fresh fish. Classes are always very well attended with approximately 50 Veterans each session. We look forward to classes expanding to include CTRS and Building 209 at the West Los Angeles VA Campus as well.

Pallet Shelters

There is something about Thanksgiving that heightens our appreciation of family and home as well as our awareness of those in need. For years, even during the pandemic, Brentwood School's VCRE has provided beautiful and delicious Thanksgiving meals to Veterans living on the WLA VA campus. This past November, we went one step further by sponsoring 20 Pallet Shelter homes for Veterans living at CTRS (The Care, Treatment, and Rehabilitative Services Initiative).

The CTRS initiative is a low barrier to entry pilot program created during the COVID-19 pandemic that provides high-risk Veterans experiencing homelessness with healthcare, case management, peer support, meal services, a clean environment, and transitional housing assistance in a designated area adjacent to Lot 10. Since its inception, we have served lunch and dinner Monday through Friday to its residents and meets requests for supplies of all kinds—from tents and sleeping bags to bottled water and clothing.

The shelters arrived early in the morning of November 20 and were assembled, connected to utilities, and made ready for occupancy just in time for Thanksgiving. In a press release



The shelters arrived early in the morning of November 20th and were assembled, connected to utilities, and made ready for occupancy just in time for Thanksgiving.

As a dedicated partner in VA's mission to support our honored Veterans, Brentwood School was thrilled to provide additional tiny shelter housing for Veterans participating in CTRS, particularly in time for the holidays. We have worked closely with Veterans experiencing homelessness in our community over the past several years, and we hope the shelters serve as a launching pad to help these 20 Vets get their health and their lives back on track.

Veteran Workouts at the VCRE

Seven days a week, Veterans and their spouses/ partners have exclusive access to the 22-acre VCRE athletic complex built and maintained by Brentwood School on VA land. In the late 1990's, BWS and VA entered into a land use agreement that allowed Brentwood School to transform what was a 22-acre

Veterans received fitness training and support from Paul Radenberg, VCRE Fitness Facilitator and Coach, in the work out tent during VCRE hours.

VCRE landfill and ravine into a state-of-the-art facility to be utilized by Veterans and students alike. A new lease formalized in 2016 led to the creation of the VCRE (Veterans Center for Recreation and Education) that includes, among other things, a fulltime fitness facilitator and coach, Paul Radenberg, dedicated solely to Veterans. After a long closure due to COVID, the facility was able to open again in June of 2021 and now receives hundreds of Veteran visits each month. On weekdays, the first wave comes early. often before sunrise, and consists of Veterans from a range of ages, physical conditions, and circumstances. Some belong to residential programs on the VA campus and others live or work in the neighborhood. Beyond being Veterans, they have another common connection—Paul. Paul offers them individualized fitness programs and inspires a passion for wellness. In addition to being a coach and mentor, he is always willing to lend an ear. The first wave is followed

later in the morning by organized groups accompanied by the Domiciliary program's recreational therapists. In partnership with with rec therapists, Paul has created a weekly program that includes free weights and machines, cardio training, agility practice, and a range of team activities like floor hockey and the always popular Friday softball games. It is magical to watch the way that Paul interacts with the range of Veterans who come to the workout tent. yet Paul is the first to say that he receives as much from them as he gives to them.

Job Skills Classes

In an effort to help Veterans navigate the ever changing and challenging job market. Brentwood faculty and staff have led various job skills classes. These classes have aimed to help not only Veterans, but also VA staff members who assist Veterans. Some classes have included: Resume Writing: Advanced Resume Web Training Parts 1 & 2; Interviewing Tips and Skills; LinkedIn Training Parts 1 & 2; and How to Market Yourself to Employers. In addition, our Technology Department has outfitted and maintains three different computer labs, one in Building 257 and two in the Domiciliary, so that Veterans have access to technology that supports resume creation and job searches.

Yoga Classes

Yoga classes provide Veterans an opportunity to increase flexibility, muscle strength, and tone; improve energy and vitality; increase body awareness; relieve chronic stress patterns; relax the mind; and sharpen concentration. Weekly afternoon yoga classes are spearheaded by Brentwood faculty member Tracy Wallace and are held at the West Los Angeles VA Campus Domiciliary.

Veteran Spotlight Board

Building community! Once a month. Brentwood's Middle and Upper School students spotlight an employee at Brentwood School who is also a Veteran. An ongoing and "living" board, US students from the VA Student Support Group interview various employees and share their write-up for all students to read. This spring, College Counselor Mr. J Cole. a Veteran of the U.S. Navy, and BWS Public Safety Officer Mr. Clyde Cross, a Veteran of the Marine Corps, were highlighted, giving students the opportunity to learn more about military experience, the branches of service. and gain a deeper understanding and appreciation of the Veterans within our community.

POLLYANNA at Brentwood School A DAY OF CONVERSATION, COMMUNITY, AND BELONGING

attended my first Pollyanna Conference

along with other administrators, faculty, parents, and students four years ago at Harvard-Westlake. It was a day for constituents in the same role to hear from others in Los Angeles area schools about how we are doing in our commitment to equity and inclusion. It also offered the opportunity for everyone to hear from a panel of students—the most powerful part of the day. Could we replicate this Saturday morning experience for over 1,000 people on a school day at Brentwood? **Yes!**

Pollyanna was founded in 2015 by Casper Caldorola, a parent at an independent school in New York City, with a mission "to advance systemic change by developing stronger communities ... through programs that enhance cultural competency, racial literacy, and equity practices." Pollyanna works with academic and other institutions—through its unique conference models, discussion platforms, and racial literacy curricula—to increase cultural competence. Typically, Pollyanna conferences involve several area schools participating in the event as a group. This was their first conference on a school day which makes it the largest conference they've had.

Calderola says, "This idea of belonging, seemingly so basic and straightforward, is at the heart of the challenges school communities have been trying to address for years: How do we ensure there is space for every person and every identity to feel they authentically belong in our school communities? How do we eliminate identity-based marginalization and promote acceptance and inclusion?"

The night before the conference, parents, guardians, faculty, staff, and trustees had the opportunity to gather in a pre-conference virtual session with keynote speaker Charles Vogl, international best-selling author of several books including *The Art of Community*. Then, when the conference opened the next morning on the Middle School Field, Vogl shared his own story of how he learned to make connections with others in a time when America is at its loneliest moment in history. He challenged the attendees to sit with someone and share a time when we craved community.

Our students were courageous in sharing different times in their own lives where they were not included. Vogl presented the concept that an experience with a small number of people where connection is intentional is similar to a campfire experience. A purposeful invitation is extended, not an announcement made to be somewhere.

Prefect Brandon Melamed '22 explained, "During the keynote speaker's presentation, I was able to connect with my peers about times that I've felt lonely, and also about 'campfire experiences' that I've had. It was really meaningful to learn that I had a lot in common with other students."

As we left the keynote address, students gathered with other students, faculty, and staff with other faculty and staff, and parents with other parents, to respond to the same prompts in a small group setting.

Cecilia Víctor, Trustee and parent of an alum, was the facilitator for a group of parents and guardians during the morning breakout session. "Our parent group was comprised of families from different grades who shared their experiences with each other. As a trustee, it was an honor and a pleasure to reassure them how much work Brentwood is doing on all fronts to bring everyone closer together."

Our student affinity leaders then led identity spaces in the afternoon where conversations continued about existing in the Brentwood community in various identities. Aligned experiences were supported and affirmed.

"At the Pollyanna Conference, I had the opportunity to facilitate a conversation with a group of 7th graders," said Alexandra R. '24. "I had a blast working with this group! When I first entered the classroom, they were a bit shy and nervous to dive into such serious issues, but by the end of our session, I had heard from practically every student and was thrilled to see such respectful and responsive conversations. I am so lucky to have had the opportunity to engage in such thoughtful and meaningful conversations with them."

To close the day, we all returned as a full group to hear from an impressive, diverse student panel. Our two Head Prefects, Sydney Mitchell '22 and Brandon Melamed '22, were joined by the students who represented Brentwood at the national Student Diversity Leadership Conference: Haeley G. '23, Allie R. '24, Donovan Southall '22, Jason Uranta '22, Jade V. '23, and Rahul Y. '23. Students shared about specific places they felt a sense of belonging at Brentwood and examples they've seen from their peers and teachers to help create this. They also shared challenges that exist in their efforts to navigate in an underrepresented group at Brentwood. To solidify a message of community and belonging, we ended the day with Brentwood's Alma Mater.

Following the conference, the founder of Pollyanna noted, "Brentwood School is making an important statement and commitment engaging in these questions and this work, especially during a time when there are those who would argue that these kinds of conversations don't belong in schools."

People leaned in all day to have courageous conversations. Our hope is that everyone can truly feel the slogan printed on our conference T-shirts: "I belong at Brentwood."






SPIRIT OF INNOVATION EXPANDS ACROSS BOTH CAMPUSES WITH NEW SPACES AND PROJECTS

elcome to the Idea Lab! What do you think happens here?" was how we began each of the Lower School grade orientations to the new space in the fall. Without hesitation, the students responded enthusiastically: "We build our ideas!" The students were exactly right—this space was designed as a home for building student ideas on the West Campus.

The return to in-person school combined with the opening of new BCIL spaces this fall bolstered the depth and number of K-12 BCIL projects during the 2021-2022 school year. Across both campuses, students engaged with real world challenges and explored solutions while practicing important skills such as proposing original ideas, collaborating with peers, learning from experts in the field, and iterating after feedback. Below are some examples of how the spirit of innovation that is born in BCIL spaces extends into classrooms and beyond in the life of Brentwood School.

West Campus Idea Lab

Students smiled and jumped out of their seats as they glanced around the room, admiring the stacks of pipe cleaners, construction paper, popsicle sticks, and other making materials. They gleefully asked when they would be able to use the 3D printer, the laser cutter, and, of course, the scary looking metal-cutting shears on the top shelf.

Every grade level in the Lower School visited the Idea Lab this fall for a design thinking orientation where students prototyped solutions to challenges they experience in their own day-to-day Brentwood life, such as, "How might we stay safe under the sun during recess?" The purpose of these introductions,



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along with the grade-level projects that followed, was to introduce students to the design thinking process. Students learn what it means to ideate, practice protocols for giving feedback, and get experience sharing original ideas to classmates. Each grade level returned to the Idea Lab over the course of the year for projects related to their curriculum. Topics ranged from ocean conservation to mining and sustainable agriculture to Antarctica clothing.

"We had such an amazing time making our Gold Rush prototype as a team. Our project was to make a mining and gardening tool. We made a long tom that could water a food plant to help feed the miners. Our favorite part of our experience was

to present our prototype to our entire grade and teachers. Our biggest challenge was our time management. Personally, we think that we could have made our prototype better if we had made it sturdier. Overall, this has been an incredible school experience."

East Campus Applied Science Lab

The BCIL Applied Science Lab repurposed one of the breakout spaces within the BCIL Hub in the Eagles Center. In this space, students work alongside Dr. Aidyl Gonzalez to propose and implement original research projects. Dr. Gonzalez refers to the students who join her in the lab as "world changers in action," and they, in turn, call her "Dr. G." If you spend any time in the BCIL Applied Science Lab, you will witness students celebrating the number of offspring of zebrafish, discussing the social justice implications of applied science, or analyzing the soil composition for the next simulation of growing plant life on Mars. In all of her work with students, Dr. G encourages students to think about how science can make the world a better place.

From their research in this Lab, three teams racked up wins at the Los Angeles County Science Engineering Fair and the California Science and Engineering Fair. A project entitled "An escape from Global Worming (Warming)" by Alex K. '23 and Huck A-J. '23 won the prestigious invite to compete at Regeneron Science Talent Search, which honors and empowers our nation's most outstanding world changers in STEM. They also earned 2nd place in the Earth Space Division at the Los Angeles County Science Engineering Fair and 3rd place in the Southern California Paleontological Society competition. Two other teams earned Honorable Mentions at the Los Angeles County Science Engineering Fair.

The impact of this space has extended beyond the BCIL Applied Science Lab as well. Students in the 5th Grade participated in a Citizen Science project with Dr. G. They collected soil samples on campus, analyzed the pH along with other data for input into an international database, and used a microscope to search for nematodes. Dr. G also explained to the students how research and involvement in science projects such as this could lead to real world change related to social justice and the environment.

"This year, Max W. '23 and I have been working on an experiment in the BCIL Lab using C. elegans, a microscopic worm. Along with Dr. Aidyl Gonzalez, we have researched the effects of these nematodes on plant growth. We were lucky enough to enter into the BCIL Innovation Challenge, present an idea, and win the 2022 competition. This has been such a meaningful experience for both of us because we have not only learned essential lab skills but have also made important, impactful discoveries that inspire us to help our planet. We were so lucky to get this opportunity to work in the BCIL Lab and look forward to continuing our research and someday turning our ideas into reality." —RUBY C. '23


East Campus BCIL Fabrication Lab:

When I visited John Wan's Design and Engineering class this spring, students were busy finalizing prototypes for a unit on public transportation in Los Angeles. Students identified challenges specific to Los Angeles and then proposed original solutions, ranging from motorized disposable seat covers, to designs to make female riders feel safer, to better lighting and ventilation to increase rider comfort. I was extraordinarily impressed with the level of detail and originality in each design and asked the students how they had all proposed such creative and specific solutions. "It was the process Mr. Wan taught us!" one student explained. "He had us each come up with 4-5 ideas, gave us extensive feedback, and then encouraged us to keep refining our ideas until we had the best one." This process is one the students repeated during several units throughout the semester.

Projects that use the Fabrication Lab often connect to other courses on campus. Teachers collaborate with Mr. Wan on their project ideas which usually involve research and class discussions before students set foot in the lab. For example, 8th graders studied water sanitation connected to their science curriculum and interested students created protoypes in the Fabrication Lab; 9th graders created clay pots to relate their study of the novel Circe in a way that was relevant to their own lives. After 6th Grade students participated in a multi-week BCIL project introducing them to the design thinking and invention process, many students continued to work on developing their prototypes in the BCIL Fabrication Lab for their 2050 Science Project. In any lessons we do in the Fabrication

"I came up with the HydroTab in my 8th Grade science class while researching the Sustainable Development Goals. After reading about each one, I quickly realized that Goal 6, Clean Water and Sanitation, stood out to me the most. Until then, I never knew how many people lacked access to clean drinking water, and I thought many other people should get informed about it. "What is the challenge you are trying to address?" "How do you know your customers actually want what you are creating?" "If you had one week to build your idea and minimal resources, what would you build?" These are the questions you would hear Zach Chien asking his students as they sit in the HUB discussing business ideas, whether for independent studies, Middle School exploratory, the Innovation Challenge, or his Entrepreneurship II class. The HUB is a space on campus where students can come together to collaborate on projects and share ideas, and BCIL classes also meet in this space. Seniors in our Peer Leadership program meet regularly in the HUB to practice BCIL Core Leadership Skills and prepare lessons for outreach with 9th graders every week. Topics can range from silly ice breakers to how to facilitate difficult conversations with real world challenges many 9th graders face.

After lessons from Mr. Wan on graphic design, students created a poster to raise awareness and also prepared a PSA announcement. Final presentations in the HUB included some Q&A with classmates and members of the BCIL Team.

Sixth-12th graders also gather in the HUB for our BCIL Speaker Series, and this year students heard presentations on topics such as Social Impact through Gaming and Launching a Startup. Derek Smith, founder of Plug in South LA, highlighted the importance of working with teams and joining collaborative experiences to help prepare for the world of business. In the live challenge, students simulated the hiring of a Product Manager for a growing company that is hoping to have a global impact. In teams, students reviewed three resumes and discussed each candidates' strengths and growth areas before making a recommendation for hiring. It was fascinating to see the spirited debate in the room as each team had compelling reasons for selecting their candidate.

"The best part of my independent study project was the meetings with the BCIL team in the Hub. The faculty would all ask me questions and empower me to keep going. Ms. Lewis-Adams was my cheerleader the entire time and she was also there to give me guidance on how to improve. She was able to give me the best feedback that allowed me to reflect and create ideas that were outside the box." —MERLOT G. '24

For those who may not have had the privilege to know this extraordinary man, Mr. V has been an iconic member of our school community since the day he arrived as our Director of Admissions in August 1980.







amaranth 40 A Look Back


n 1982, when we inaugurated a new Upper School magazine of literature and the arts, our goal (as it had been with an earlier school publication, Mayic, which came out in the late 1970s) was to provide a forum for the creative spirit and talent of Brentwood students. Forty years later, amaranth still reflects our desire to celebrate those gifts. We started out very simply, typing on typewriters, literally cutting and pasting, handapplying borders on all black and white pages, and driving down to the press at The Printing Plant in Culver City. Now, of course, the layout is done on the computer, making it possible to have a much more sophisticated look, to scan large artwork or photos and to reproduce work in color. We have instituted a now long-standing tradition of co-sponsoring, with our school library, the Banned Books Reading in the fall and the Poetry Reading in honor of National Poetry Month every spring as well as the Six-Word Story Contest and the Short Story Contest—both of whose winners are featured in our issues. These are all ways of bringing attention to the beauty of language and the importance of the freedom of artistic expression.

It is an honor and a delight to work each year with a talented staff of dedicated students who share these goals and who, in addition to our meetings during activity period, also spend many hours of their own time choosing work and putting together the layout. Seniors Annabelle F. and Julia F. served as staffers in 9th Grade and then, for the past three years, as Editors-in-Chief. My faculty co-sponsor, Timothy Haehn, and I have been inspired by and grateful for their remarkable leadership, enthusiasm, and loyalty.

Over the years, all the past staffers and editors-in-chief, faculty co-sponsors, the Art Department, Office of Communications, and Heads of School—Charles Downes, Hunter Temple, Michael Pratt and Michael Riera—have supported and encouraged our vision. The 40th anniversary issue contains a special section, "A Look Back," which focuses on our magazine's history and legacy and contains a sampling of past work as well as comments from editors-in-chief and some Brentwood alums who have gone on to have noted careers in the arts.

The Brentwood Fund is our school's top philanthropic priority because it provides 10% of the school's annual operating budget. Funds raised are spent the same year in which they are donated, going to work immediately.
