n May 26 more than 420 members of the DeMatha community and assorted friends gathered at a University of Maryland ballroom to celebrate 75 years of history. The evening featured music, video presentations and talks. It was filled with a marvelous spirit and so much enthusiasm.

I was fortunate to be joined not only by my wife Donna, but by my parents--who sent me to DeMatha in the first place; all of our children (one son a graduate of DeMatha and both sons-on-law DeMatha grads) and my sister and brother-in-law who sent their son to DeMatha. That microcosm of family support was enacted over and over in count-



less interactions. I was struck not only by the myriad connections that people associated with DeMatha display but with the ease that flowed in conversation between our current students who acted as greeters and alumni dating back to the 1950s.

In other places I have mentioned that if a DeMatha student from 1947 was dropped down in 2022 he would recognize the same school--and vice versa. Though buildings change along with the schedule and the course offerings, those are merely physical and strategic ways of enacting the mission. While strategy changes, the mission and the core values don't. So the DeMatha student of any era is able to recognize the school through the people who influenced his life by developing relationships, instilling values and responsibility, and caring for his growth.

A central characteristic of a DeMatha man is to leave any place he goes better than it was when he got there. This ability to look forward in optimism, to want what is best for another generation, to be willing to support a generation that you may never meet forms a large part of DeMatha's remarkable success.

Mr. Jim Roper Retires After 40 Years at DeMatha

fter an incredible 40-year career teaching music at DeMatha, Director of Bands Mr. Jim Roper embarks on a well-earned retirement. Mr. Roper conducted the Wind Ensemble for the final time in May as part of the group's spring concert at the University of Maryland.

After graduating years ago from UMD, Mr. Roper first taught at Archbishop Carroll High School. But little did he know that the De-Matha connection would begin while he was still in college when he met DeMatha Director of Bands Emeritus, Mr. John Mitchell.

"(John) was good friends with the person whom I did my secondary level student teaching with," Mr. Roper said. "Since I didn't have a supervisor to observe me, I asked John if he would come over a few times during the year and watch me teach, and give me some feedback. I guess he was impressed because he later asked if I would be interested in coming to DeMatha. I interviewed with John Moylan, and the rest is history."

Mr. Roper said he had so many favorite memories during his time teaching at DeMatha that he couldn't narrow it down to just one. However, he and Mr. Mitchell often joked that they would write a book about their various Music Trip stories and experiences.

What made Mr. Roper stay at DeMatha for all of these years? Well, unlike the hit Kenny Rogers song 'The Gambler', Mr. Roper said he's never been someone who likes to gamble. While there could've been opportunities for him to leave and be in charge of another school's program, Mr. Roper believed that he already had everything he wanted on Madison Street.

"I can't think of another educational institution where everyone wants their programs to be the absolute best – and that includes the students, faculty and staff."

"I think I tried to be John Mitchell the first year I took over for him, but was called out by one of the students – and that student was right," Mr. Roper said. "And don't be afraid to change. I know Matt and Carlos have been trying to do some things differently with how to send out information to our students, parents, and prospective incoming students. While this pandemic has been difficult, it did offer us a chance to change some of the things we normally do."

But Mr. Roper has no doubt that they will be able to lead the music program to even greater places.


"Those guys are outstanding musicians and educators. They will continue the tradition of excellence, and perhaps bring a younger, more youthful, approach to our students."

Mr. Roper and his wife Leslie, who is also retiring this year after a long career herself as a music educator, will be moving to a cabin in West Virginia this summer where they can enjoy some peace and quiet in the mountains. They are also planning to do some traveling, and visit their son Christian '08 and daughter Megan.

Therman Hawkins III Reclaiming Tradition Through Leadership

n the spring of 2021, while classrooms hosted limited students in person, clubs met in online Google Classroom calls, and sports adapted to new rules and protocols, DeMatha held its annual Student Government Association (SGA) elections. Even with some uncertainty as to what the next school year would look like, one student, Therman Hawkins III, elected president of the SGA, was determined to give the DeMatha community a year that would not only solidify DeMatha traditions already established, but add more for the years to come.

When it was announced that DeMatha would be back in person at the start of the 2021-2022 school year, Therman was prepared to make an immediate impact for the student body.

"One of my biggest roles was unity and bringing everyone back together. This was my main goal when I was elected as the student body president and I already knew that a lot of students were not able to see their friends for a year and a half, so it was very important to start the year off strong with a bunch of events and opportunities for students to fellowship with each other and increase the brotherhood in the school," Therman said.

Homecoming week, the student bonfire, senior week, and a never-before hosted winter spirit week were just a few of the successful events that students were able to participate in. "I enjoyed my time as SGA president and what I was able to do for the DeMatha community," Therman concluded. "I know I will cherish these memories forever, and I hope my fellow classmates do as well."


A Celebration of Strength







After Fleeing Ukraine, Student Feels at Home at DeMatha

*The original story was published in May in The Catholic Standard and we are sharing an edited version for this issue of the Red and Blue Review.

s musicians in the Advanced
Percussion Ensemble of DeMatha Catholic High School
gathered on stage for a recent
concert at their Hyattsville, Maryland
school, one of the performers – a new
student there – didn't have time to get
a tux like the other student musicians
were wearing, so he donned a DeMatha
blazer and khakis.

Before performing their music, Dr. Michael Gatti, the chairman of DeMatha's music department and the percussion instructor, introduced that

student to the audience. He was Ivan Dmytriiev, 17, a Ukrainian refugee who had arrived in the United States with his 6-year-old little brother, Mykhailo, after a harrowing escape from his country just after Russia launched its invasion there. Ivan and his brother are living with their grandparents in Lanham, Olga D. Carlson and Ronald Carlson, and he started attending DeMatha in April.

In Ukraine, Ivan attended a music school and played the drums and xylophone. Before the DeMatha concert, he learned the piece of music that the ensemble would be performing, and he played the xylophone and cymbals in the performance.

"He got a huge ovation," Dr. Gatti said, remembering the audience's reaction after Ivan's introduction and his performance. After Ivan played that piece as part of the Percussion Ensemble, Dr. Gatti walked over to him, congratulating him with a fist-bump.

Interviewed on May 19 at DeMatha, Ivan said that concert was a fun experience for him. "I was happy. My band was very nice."

At the time of his interview, Ivan said he had been attending DeMatha for about three or four weeks and was in his junior year there, taking classes in algebra, geometry, Advanced Placement language, Christian ethics and an engineering course involving 3-D modeling. Mykhailo has been attending Catherine T. Reed Elementary School in Lanham.

"I'm really happy being here (at DeMatha)," Ivan said. "The





teachers, they're very good and kind. They are people who want to talk, and teachers I want to learn from. They have an aura that makes me happy and (inspires me to) want to stay here more."

Ivan added, "When I came here, in a couple of days, I already had a lot of friends... I'm really happy I met them. They helped me emotionally to stay and be more optimistic."

The teen, who is a member of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church, said, "When everything was happening in Ukraine on the 24th of February I was actually praying and asking that everything would be fine."

Now he continues to pray for the safety of his family back home in Ukraine and to hope for a return to peace in that country.

"At night before I go to bed, I thank God for everything he's given me, for giving me the opportunity to leave and be in another country. I'm thankful I'm here in a safe place," he said.

The Ukrainian youth added that "being here and watching the news is hard... It's hard to think about studying and everything else because of the bad things happening there."

As for the future, he hopes that the war will end, and Ukraine will remain free, and he will return to his country and have "children there, and make sure when they grow up, nothing will happen to them that happened to me."

He dreams of possibly becoming an actor some day, and bringing happiness to people and making them smile. The teen expressed admiration for Ukraine's president Volodymyr Zelensky, a former actor and comedian. "I really love him," he said. "A lot of people were thinking he would leave and wouldn't handle it. As we can see, he showed his bravery and showed that the Ukrainian people will never surrender, and (they will) finish what they started."

Reflecting on his experience at DeMatha Catholic High School, Ivan said, "Right now, I can actually say coming here makes me feel free... I have an opportunity to become better, with the students and the teachers I have here."

Seniors **Rodney Rice** and **Tyrell Ward** were both named First-Team All WCAC, while Rodney was named a First-Team All-Met, with Tyrell earning All-Met Second Team honors. Other key seniors included **Jerrell Robeson, Aaron Robeson**, and **Bryson Hill**.

Special recognition to **Pete Strickland '75**, who served as interim coach and guided the Stags through a season with many twists and turns. The season ending championship was special for a team that overcame much adversity.

The Stags placed in the top 6 in every event at the league championship, which is typically the fastest league in the country. They were invited to the Scholastic National Championships, where they placed 16th in the nation in the Varsity 8+ event and 12th in the nation in the second Varsity 8+ event. The program continues to grow and be successful at the local and national rowing regattas.

LACROSSE



TENNIS

Under head coach Mark Dalzell, the varsity tennis team had one of the most successful seasons, coming just short of winning the WCAC final against Gonzaga. Senior Charles Wood also claimed the first individual champion award in the first flight, becoming the first individual champion at DeMatha since 2009. Jacob Poole '24 also won the fifth flight and Charles Wood '22 partnered with Antonio Santos '23 to win doubles in the first flight. Other notable placements include Graham Fenn '24, who finished as a finalist in the fourth flight. The team now looks forward to next year where the competition does not show any sign of slowing down!

TRACK

The varsity track team won its third straight WCAC championship this May. While DeMatha had many strong individual runners, they dominated the team events. The Stags finished with 184 points, led by first-place finishes in three relays, to beat Archbishop Carroll (134 points) and St. John's (132 points).

The Stags also set two meet records. Gavin Weddington, Christopher Toomer, Dawson Grogan, and Daden Grogan set a meet record in the 4x800-meter relay with a time of 7:52.03. Dawson Grogan also set a meet record in the 800 with a time of 1:55.34, won the 1600 (4:21.63), and placed 6th in the 3,200. His performance saw him named the Outstanding Male Track Performer of the Meet.






