2022 TECH LEVY RENEWAL

Funding for the next 10 years to ensure Orono students are ready for the future

On November 8, 2022, Orono Public Schools residents will vote whether to renew the district's Technology Levy. Because this is a straight renewal, there would be **no tax increase** if approved by voters.

Why now?

The district is grateful for community support over the last 20 years. This technology levy was originally approved by residents in 2002, renewed in 2011 and is now up for renewal again. If not renewed by voters in November 2022, the **levy will expire** and the district will **lose \$1.2 million** annually in local funding.

What is the tax impact?

There is **no tax increase** if voters approve the levy, because it is a straight renewal of an existing locally approved levy.

What is the levy for?

If voters approve the levy renewal, it would provide a predictable and dedicated funding stream for:



Classroom learning and support

Tools and teacher training to support excellence in teaching and learning and ensure Orono students are future ready



Reliable access

Regularly updated networks, systems and software to support classroom teaching and learning



Campus security, data privacy & technical support Campus security, visitor management systems, a secure

internet environment and technology support staff

What is the impact of a "no" vote?

If voters **do not approve the renewal**, the levy will expire and the district would be faced with **\$1.2 million in annual budget cuts**, impacting teachers, programs and technology districtwide.

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The 2021-22 school year was highly successful with many "firsts" and outstanding results in **academics, arts, athletics, activities** and **service**. The following achievements represent *only a few* highlights from the year, including state-level results in athletics. We celebrate the many outstanding achievements and performances along the way. Way to go, Spartans!

ACADEMICS

- Nolan Naughton, a rising thirdgrader, earned top honors as a Continental Math League (CML) National Champion.
- Luke Mitchell, rising sixth-grader, earned Grand Honors from Johns Hopkins University Center for Talented Youth for his exceptional performance in math.
- Gigi Martin '22 earned a Rising Star Award through the 2022 Minnesota Aspirations for Women in Computing Awards program.
- Class of 2022 National Merit Finalists were Angelo Fiataruolo, Nova Tseng and Martin Weiss.
- Reporters from *The Spartan Speaks* earned five awards through the **Minnesota High School Press Association Gold Medallion Awards** competition. The staff earned a first-place award for a multimedia story package. Individuals earning top honors were Mikayla Burns '21, Cate Challgren '21, Grace Hornbaker '21, and Lauryn Pietrzak '21.
- U.S. News and World Report published its "2022 Best High School" rankings. Orono High School maintained its ranking as #1 traditional high school in Minnesota and advanced one position to #4 overall.
- Readers of the *Wayzata Sun Sailor* once again selected Orono High School as the **Best Public School**.
- 92 students in the Class of 2022 were awarded \$101,450 in scholarships. Thank you to the generous donors who fundraise year after year to support Orono students!

ARTS

- Orono High School Chamber Choir participated in the State Solo and Ensemble competition. All 23 entries received a Superior rating–a first in school history.
- Mamma Mia! earned nine Honorable Mentions from the Hennepin Theatre Trust Spotlight Education program. Three students earned "Outstanding" honors: Actor Jakob Waller, "Outstanding Performance in a Leading Role"; set designers Gracie Stromberg and Amelia Shafer, "Outstanding in Technical Leadership."
- Aliza Botzet-Johnson's '24 ceramic artwork, "So Sweet," won top honors in

the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts K-12 Exhibition.

- Three of five pieces submitted to the Scholastic Art Awards earned honors: Natalie Shatzer '23, Silver Award for "Mother Nature's Eternal Hand," and Amelia Shafer '23, two Honorable Mentions.
- Two students were honored through the MSHSL art contest: Sydney Mathias '22 earned an Award of Excellence for her ceramic triptych, "Nocturnal Nature." Amelia Shafer's ceramic sculpture, "Melvin," earned a Merit Award, the second highest honor.

ACTIVITIES

- The Orono Elementary Chess Club K-3 Team won the State championship title at the School Chess Association statewide primary and elementary tournament.
- Isaac Hess, Maya Haugen, Sophie Middleton, and McKenna Monger competed at the Speech and Debate Association Junior National tournament. Maya Haugen earned 1st place and National Championship honors. McKenna Monger was a semifinalist in Drama and earned 3rd place in Program Oral Interpretation.
- 29 DECA members qualified for the International Career Development Conference. A longtime Community Giving project, "Care for Troncones, Mexico" raised \$11,000 – nearly double the goal – to help the community repair building damages, fund school transportation, and form a soccer club.
- The Boys Table Tennis team, through Orono Community Education, took home the State Championship title. The girls team placed second.
- The Orono High School Math Team finished first in the Metro Alliance

Division and 2nd of 53 AA teams. The team finished 4th in AA at State. **Michael Rascher** was the highest scoring individual in the division, qualifying for State.

- The Orono High School Novice Trap Team, through Orono Community Education, took 1st place at the Minnesota State High School Trap Shooting Championship. Individual honors went to Austin Pikula '23, Novice Overall 1st Place; Will Petrie '22, Novice Overall 3rd Place; Olivia Monger '24, Novice Female 3rd Place.
- 7th grade Orono Middle School Destination Imagination team, "Musical Mayhem," competed in the global finals and earned 8th place in their category.





CELEBRATING Points of Pride

ATHLETICS

- The **Boys Cross Country** team finished 4th at the Class AA State meet. All-state honors: Owen Chapman '25, Owen Hirt '24; and Angelo Fiataruolo '22.
- Varsity Football won the State Class AAAA quarterfinal game against Grand Rapids but fell to Hutchinson in the semifinal.
- **Boys Soccer** won the Class AA State Championship.
- Girls Swim & Dive team placed 4th overall at the State meet. All-state honors went to Mallory Knutson '25, Kaelyn Knutson '23, Skylar Thalhuber'23, Addison Thalhuber'23, Sydney Govrik '22, Caroline Close'22, Lila James'24, and Graycin Andreen '26. All-State divers were Makena Rasmussen '22, 3rd place; and Sophia Capece'22, 4th place.
- Carli Olsen '22 placed 5th in the State Class AA Girls Tennis Individual tournament.
- In Alpine Ski, four skiers qualified for State as individuals: Riviera Wock '22 (earning 6th place), J.T. Burns '25, Harper Randolph '22, and Jack Shideman '24.

- Nordic Ski sent Miles Miner '24 and Sindri Bonner '24 to the State meet. Miles placed 13th overall earning All-State recognition.
- The Orono Girls Dance Team finished their competitive season with the highest placements in school history. The Jazz team earned 2nd place at State and the High Kick team finished in 5th place.
- Girls Hockey team competed in the State tournament for the first time, finishing in 3rd place. Iyla Ryskamp '22 earned the Class A Herb Brooks Award and was a Ms. Hockey Semifinalist.
 Coach Sean Fish was honored with the 2022 MGHCA Class A Coach of the Year Award.
- Boys Swim & Dive team placed 8th overall at State. Individual top-10 finishers were Nick Fogle '22, John Fort '22, Owen Gagne '24, Walter Royal '24, and Kaden Starcznski '23.
- The **Boys Tennis** team advanced to the Class 2A State final for the first time in school history, defeating defending champion Edina to win the State title.

- In the Tennis Doubles competition, Matias Maule '22 and Sam Skanse '22 won the Class 2A State title. Preston Perrill '22 and Jack Tanner '22 also qualified as individual doubles at State.
- Jack Fischer '23 earned the Track & Field State championship title in the 300-meter hurdles. All-state Track & Field honors went to Estelle Atkinson '24, and Owen Chapman '25.
- Ava Hanneman '25 competed in her second State finals competition for Girls Golf.
- Three students in Orono's Unified Club brought home the gold (and other medals!) from the 2022 Special Olympics USA Games: Pierce Pennaz, gymnastics; Anna Stankevitz, gymnastics; Peyton Libby, 3x3 half- court basketball. Minnesota will host the 2026 Special Olympics USA Games. Orono High School graduates Jenna Perkins '22 and Danny Striggow '20 have been named Honorary Chairs.
- Class of 2023 athletes Nora Chouanard and Charlie Kraus were selected for ExCEL Awards.

SERVICE

- Custodial staff and Special Services teams filled 60 food baskets for local families in need, providing all ingredients needed for a full holiday meal.
- Orono High School Student Senate sponsored a "Month of Service" with a blood drive, service auction, and fundraising for TeamSeas and DECA's Care for Troncones project.
- Thank you to all organizers, representatives and volunteers who participated in the May Community Wellness Expo.

- Returning for the first time in two years, the Empty Bowls program raised \$2,000 for Interfaith Outreach & Community Partners (IOCP) and WeCAN.

FINANCE

- The Association of School Business Officials awarded one of four 2022 Pinnacle of Achievement Awards to Mr. Jim Westrum, Executive Director of Business Services. The award recognized Mr. Westrum's work, in conjunction with the Orono School Board Facilities and Finance Committee, negotiating a successful, cost-saving transportation contract.
- The district was issued a clean financial audit from Malloy, Montague, Karnowski, Radosevich & Co., P.A. the highest opinion an auditor can issue for school districts.
- Moody's Investors Service affirmed Orono Schools' Aa2 rating in November 2021, which places Orono in the top 2% of all Minnesota school districts.

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2022 ORONO SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION Candidate Filing Information

The Orono School Board has a long history of committed members representing the community in the district's mission to meet the needs of all children. This November, voters will elect three school board members to serve on the sixmember Orono School Board.

If you are interested in running for school board, please download the Affidavit of Candidacy form from the Minnesota Secretary of State website or request the form from the District Office (DO). You can submit your form and \$2.00 filing fee to the DO during the filing window: Tuesday, August 2 through Tuesday, August 16 (open 8-4 p.m. with extended hours 8-5 p.m. on August 16). Once you have submitted the Affidavit and fee, your name will appear on the ballot as an official candidate for a seat on the board. Early voting begins

September 23, 2022; election day is November 8, 2022.

Curious what the role entails? The district is hosting an information session detailing the roles and responsibilities of a school board member the evening of Thursday, August 25 at the DO. Additionally, candidates for school board will be asked to participate in an allcandidate forum—hosted by the League of Women voters—on Thursday, October 6 in the Orono High School auditorium. The time of the event will be set as soon as the number of candidates is determined.
