SENIOR DRIVE UP



Q What are your favorite memories from LSA?

A That's tough because I was at LSA from kindergarten until I graduated so it was kind of like a second home to me. My favorite memories are probably just being in class with my best friends and joking around during free periods or in between classes. I also loved my time doing sports at LSA and having gamedays.

Q Why did you choose the University of Texas, and how did LSA prepare you for UT?

A I chose the University of Texas because when I went on my official visit, I just absolutely fell in love with the campus, the team, its academic programs and most importantly, I felt at home. LSA helped prepare me by having a good curriculum along with helping me time manage between sports and school. Most importantly, I learned that if you have any sort of questions, ask them and that goes for both school and sports.

Q What did you major in at UT? What do you think about college after your four+ years of experience?

A I majored in corporate communications with a minor in business and I am currently doing a fifth year to finish out my track and field eligibility. I love my time at UT, and I know that it will be some of the best years of my life and that is something I cherish. Being able to be a student athlete at one of the best schools is something that not everyone gets to do and for that I am so blessed and grateful.

Q Did anyone at LSA have a substantial impact on your college path?

A From all the classes we take, it definitely helped me narrow down what I wanted to major in, but I wouldn't say that there was one specific person. Since I was there from age 4 to 18, everyone there helped shape and make me the person I am proud to be.

Q What does a college athlete's life look like?

A It's definitely very busy but I personally enjoy that. A typical day for me would be weights at 8:30AM, class after that until around 12 or 1, quick lunch, outside practice at 2:30 or 3 until around 4 or 5, do some recovery, dinner after that, and then finally go home and do homework. It's a full day but it is cool to see how all the hours you put in and hard work pay off. There is almost nothing better than seeing your strength increase or your technique improve.

Q What accomplishments are you most proud of from your time at UT?

A The accomplishment that I am most proud of is breaking my personal record and jumping a new one of 5' 10.5" (1.79m). The excitement that rushed over me after that bar was crazy, and it is what makes me want to push myself even harder.

Q How did you incorporate your faith into your college experience and into your life now?


A When I first got to campus as a freshman, I joined FCA (Fellowship of Christian Athletes) and that helped me so much grow in my faith and remain in my faith. Every year, there is an FCA camp where athletes from all over Texas go and just worship and be in God's presence while relating it to sports. It is always the best time and so humbling because it makes you realize that none of this would be possible without God. In sports specifically, God gave us athletes such an incredible talent so that when we go out and perform, all the glory should go to Him. When I'm in practice and it's getting tough and I'm just so tired, something that helps me push through is remembering that my sweat is an offering, and my soreness is a sacrifice. He gave everything for us so why wouldn't we give some back to Him. Since COVID happened, I don't go to in person church anymore, but I watch sermons once a week on YouTube and that really helps me keep my focus and reminds me who I'm doing everything for.

Q What are your future plans? **A** Right now, I am finishing out my extra year of eligibility and if I happen to do crazy well, I might consider continuing high jump after college. If that does not happen, after this school year I will find a job. My dream job would be an event planner/communications director of a sports team (collegiate or professional). I look forward to beginning my next journey!

Q Did any specific teachers at LHA motivate your career path or leave a lasting memory for you?

A It was too long ago to actually remember the names of specific teachers, but I do remember Coach Gilmore from all those years of playing football and running track.

Q Why did you choose your career path in Physics?

A It chose me. I started at Baylor intending to transfer to Texas Tech to study engineering. I did transfer to Tech but found out I could get a master's degree in physics for the same time as a bachelor's degree in engineering.

I completed my PhD requirements by taking the written exam and oral exam to be certified as a Radiological Physicist by the American Board of Radiology, a medical board.

Q How did you start your career?

A I went into the US Public Health Service to avoid the draft for Vietnam. I planned to move to Australia then and was offered a position at the Cancer Institute of Victoria with the understanding that, upon completion of a residence program, I would take a position in the cancer center in Launceston, Tasmania.

Q What are some career highlights you would like to share with us?

A I formed a physics, dosimetry, and accelerator service group while in Atlanta. At the time it was one of the largest such groups in the US.

Q How did your faith play a role in your life during your career and now?

A I came to realize that science and faith were linked, not in opposition. For example, many particles exhibit three characteristics. They are particles, they are energy packets, and they are e-m waves depending on their interactions with their environs. As Christians, we believe in the Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Same thing.

Q What are some words of wisdom you would like to share with our current Pioneers?

A God will guide you through life, all you have to do is just listen to Him.

A Playing a baseball game at Minute Maid Park my senior year was something I will never forget. Also, going to sophomore retreat with my classmates, hanging out with my friends at football games, and Spirit Week each year.

Q Why did you choose to attend Texas A & M and how did LSA prepare you for your college career?

A I toured Texas A&M my senior year at LSA and loved the atmosphere and the campus. I took dual credit courses at LSA which I felt really prepared me for what a college class would be like and gave me a head start going into my freshman year of college.

Q What did you major in while attending Texas A&M and why did you choose that direction?

A I majored in Economics with a minor in Sports Management. I completed an Economics course my freshman year at A&M that ended up being my favorite class I ever took and decided to declare Economics as my major. I loved how it was a major that has such a wide variety of classes that all relate to the real world. I always knew I wanted to work in the sports field and felt like the analytical and quantitative skills I learned as an Econ major would prepare me for a job in professional sports someday.

Q Did anyone at LSA have a substantial impact on your college/career path?

A My first year at LSA was not the easiest and Mr. Brumm deserves a ton of credit for making me feel comfortable as the new kid in school. I may not have stayed at LSA if not for him. Also, my coaches: Coach Schneider, Coach Psencik, and Coach Riveness all had a huge impact on me becoming the person I am today. They taught me much more than just how to play on the court and on the field but the importance

of hard work that I have taken with me throughout my career.

Q What is your career and how did you get started?

A I am the Manager of Major League Video with the Los Angeles Angels. After graduating college, I applied for any job I could find in professional baseball until I was fortunate enough to receive an Internship offer with the New York Yankees. I spent a year in Trenton, New Jersey, working with their AA team. After that season, I worked with the Astros for 2 years in the Minor Leagues before starting with the Angels in 2019.

Q What are some career highlights or career accomplishments you are proud of that you would like to share with us?

A Being a part of the Astros organization in 2017 when we won the World Series and being able to hold the World Series trophy was a dream come true. This year, I was promoted to a Major League team with the Angels. As a kid growing up, I wanted to play professional baseball so being up here working with some of the best players in the world is something I am very

proud of. Lastly, having the opportunity to travel with a Major League team and visit places like Yankee Stadium, Fenway Park, and even back home to Minute Maid Park has been the most fun part of my career to this point.

Q How did/does your faith play a role in your life during college and your current career?

A Throughout my college and professional career, I have done my best to leave everything up to God's will for me. I have been unbelievably blessed to be in the position I am, and I know none of this would be possible without all of the people that God has put in my life to help me get here. an audience for the first time since Christmas of 2019. Mr. Jenkins is extremely proud of the growth and direction of this wonderful program and can't wait to see how it continues to bless the LSA community for years to come.

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

The class of 2021 has helped establish LSA soccer as one of the best programs in the state. During the last four years the Pioneers have accumulated an overall record of 88-32-9 averaging over 20 wins each season. Those results have led to 3 district titles, 3 regional titles, 3 state final four appearances, 1 state championship, and 2 VYPE private

Only seven years ago the soccer program had just one varsity team. Presently the program averages 40 players that come out allowing the program to fill a full roster for a varsity and JV team. During that same time Lutheran South

players have named to the TAPPS all-state team over 20 times. It has become the new standard coming into the program that every year the team will compete for championships at the district and state levels. The bar has been set high and our players know what is needed to achieve success. They are looking forward to have another great year for Pioneer Soccer.



LSA Baseball: Champions for Life

When Aaron Schneider took over the baseball program at Lutheran South Academy in 2013, he knew one thing: his Pioneers were capable of big things. His expectations and lofty goals seemed excessive given the Pioneers were 10 years absent from the playoffs and had only one previous Final Four appearance in its baseball record books. Fast-forward to 2021 and the Pioneers have four state championships (2015, 2018, 2019, & 2021), are the current defending state champions, have produced 32 college baseball players, and a 2015 MLB draft pick in Paul Salazar. So, what's the secret to success for Pioneer baseball? Ask Coach Schneider, and he will tell you that it's great people. "Our success as a baseball program is built around working with great people. It starts with great kids that are willing to work hard, that buy in to our vision and understand that we truly want them to be successful. These types of kids come from great families that support our coaching staff, help to provide us with the tools that we need to accomplish

our goals, and put their faith and trust in us to simply do our jobs."

The Pioneers have built a winning tradition around program values that

The Pioneers have built a winning tradition around program values that they call their three "C's": Character, Competition, & Consistency. They believe that maintaining focus on these three areas produces champions not just on the field, but in life. As a program, the Pioneers focus on being champions in three specific areas of player's lives: on the field, in the classroom, and out in the community. Over the past decade, baseball players have put these values into action through their Christmas service project appropriately dubbed "Champions Caring for the Community". Through the project, players donate various amounts of their own money and have that amount matched by family and friends. Typically, in a given year, the Pioneers raise between \$3,000-\$4,000 dollars. Players then take this money and go shopping for local families in need. After purchasing gifts, players, with the help of a wonderful group of mothers, wrap the presents before

delivering them, as a team, to the families in need just

need just before the Christmas

vacation. In the classroom, the Pioneer baseball team currently boasts a 4.36 cumulative GPA. Through it all, the Pioneers strive for humility and to glorify God through everything they do. In the words of senior Garrett Coiner, "As baseball players, we want to leave a positive legacy at Lutheran South and in the community, a legacy that honors God. We want people to be able to look at our program and understand that in order to accomplish high levels of success, it takes commitment and hard work. That it takes unity and us being a family." Perhaps it is that last part that encapsulates Pioneer baseball: being a family. In the words of Coach Schneider, if we love our players, commit to working hard, and try to always do things the right way, the winning will take care of itself". So far, the recipe seems to be working.

Chris Williams ('22) joined the team and found great pleasure in discovering a way to become part of the fabric of the extra-curricular community at LSA. mr. GARRABRANT: Why did you join the Esports team? **CHRIS:** I joined the Esports team so I could be included in a school organization. MR. GARRABRANT: What do you enjoy most about Esports? **CHRIS:** Esports is relatively easy. I can do it here or at home. It fits well in my schedule so life is not too hectic throughout the year.

mr. Garrabran'T: A lot of people may not understand what Esports is. Is it just simply gaming or is round 3 wins the game. there more to it?

CHRIS: So, Esports is mostly gaming, but players also collaborate as a team. If you already have a team online, you can bring that team in so everyone can be part of the esports program.

Esports competes in competitions against other schools. Colleges are now offering esports which opens doors for people like me.

mr. garrabran't: Sweet! individual but a team setting. Tell me a little bit more about that.

CHRIS: In the team setting, we play a game, called Overwatch, which takes six people on each side. Your objective is to capture a point and get the most points at the end of the game. The points are scored by round, so if you win round 1 you go to round 2. If you win round 2 you win the game. If you lost round 2, you proceed to round 3. Whoever wins

MR. GARRABRANT: As a coach, it is always important to practice and develop a strategy. We consider our opponent for our next competition and plan accordingly. Do you do that

in Esports or do players just show up? How does that go?

CHRIS: Strategy is very, very important in the gaming world. Quite frankly, you are probably competing against a team on the other side of the United States who you have never met in real life. Esports requires a lot of strategy. The maps in the game are different for each place you go. The team needs to know about the different secrets and hiding places to be proficient at the game being played. These are things we work on in practice.

MR. GARRABRANT: On

your team, do you have different teammates with different skills? How does a team work together as it games?

CHRIS: As far as that goes, you have different people that name certain characters. Once a character is named that player typically competes with that character. Depending on that character's abilities, different jobs are assigned within the game.

For example, if you were to play a "junk rat," those characters sabotage people. The "junk rats" would be placed in the main mix so the action continues as the team attempts to mess up other characters from the opposing team.

mr. Garrabrant: Cool! If someone were to ask you whether they should join Esports, what would be the reason for them to join Esports at LSA?

CHRIS: I would say you should join the Esports team at LSA because it is a welcoming feeling, and the room is open for after school almost every day. We practice, have fun, and take things we already know to build up each time we walk into the room for gaming.

mR. GARRABRANT: I noticed that you have green lights in the gaming room. Does that really make a difference?

CHRIS: Well, it does make a difference. The lights help make you feel like you are there inside the game with all the action. It helps you feel immersed within the virtual world.

mr. Garrabrant: Awesome! Is there anything else that you want our LSA family to know about Esports? **CHRIS:** Esports at LSA provides opportunities that were previously offered here. For people who are more introverted or have a physical challenge Esports is the perfect opportunity to be active in the school community, have fun, talk to people, and make new friends.

ma. Garrabrant: Do you think you will do anything with Esports beyond high school?

CHRIS: I want to, but it depends on how much time I have.

mR. GARRABRANT: What are your plans after high school? **CHRIS:** After high school, I want to become a bioengineer. To achieve that goal, I will need to focus on either mechanical engineering or chemical engineering for my bachelors and then get my masters in bioengineering.






COMD Hessings

I wanted to share a personal experience





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
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
