## FOOTBALL

Solid Season Prepares Warriors for Big 2022





DESPITE BEING YOUNG AT KEY SPOTS ON THE FIELD, THE WOODLANDS CHRISTIAN ACADEMY ENJOYED A SOLID YEAR ON THE GRIDIRON IN 2021, GOING 7-4 AND FALLING TO PERENNIAL POWER AUSTIN REGENTS IN THE FIRST ROUND OF THE PLAYOFFS.

The Warriors made the postseason for the ninth time in the last 11 years. It was the first season for head coach Chris McClanahan, who took over for Randy Hollas in December 2020.

The Warriors were led offensively by junior running back Roric Hawkins Jr., who compiled 1,309 rushing yards and 15 touchdowns. Junior Ryan Leslie added to what was a potent ground game for TWCA with 794 yards and nine touchdowns.

The core of TWCA's offense will return next season with Hawkins, Leslie and quarterback Josh Johnson. The junior completed 58 percent of his passes for 1,090 yards and 14 touchdowns to 12 interceptions. He also rushed for 595 yards and six touchdowns.

Defensively, the Warriors were led by senior linebacker Sean Kane, senior linebacker Austin Veldekens, junior defensive back Jacob Rios, senior lineman Ezekiel Jurado and senior defensive back Dereck Felder.

THE RETOOLED WOODLANDS CHRISTIAN ACADEMY ONCE AGAIN FLEXED ITS STRENGTH ON THE CROSS COUNTRY COURSE IN 2021.

The Warriors boys and girls each finished fourth at the TAPPS 5A state championships, once again earning trips to the award podium.

TWCA was the only 5A school to put both of its teams on the awards stand at state.

The Warriors girls now have 10 consecutive podium wins. The boys have eight.

The TWCA girls won the District 5 championship for the seventh consecutive year. The boys also won the District 5 title.

Even more impressive, 2021 was a sort of reloading year for the Warriors after they graduated star runner Ben Shearer (University of Arkansas) and three boys who finished in the Top 10 at State in 2020. The TWCA boys had only one senior in 2021 in Will Bennett.

The TWCA girls were paced by seniors Lindsay Worthington and Ellie Johnson. Sophomore Zoe Calimani is also a promising talent who is expected to emerge as a leader in 2022.

















































## **IRONS SHARPEN IRONS**



### GREATNESS CAN BE TAKEN FOR GRANTED AT TIMES.

For TWCA, the current Warriors golf team will go down as the best-ever collection of talent in school history. Not just at TWCA or TAPPS, but possibly the city of Houston.

The five-some of Jack Usner, Aaron Pounds, Ethan Bridges, Jake Maggert and Sam McClure are wildly talented.

Just last year, the Warriors won its firstever TAPPS state men's golf title. They won by 33 strokes over two days. Usner was the individual champion, while Pounds finished third. Bridges earned an eighth-place finish putting three in the Top 10. Maggert and McClure were Top 20 finishers. Maggert is the son of longtime PGA player Jeff Maggert.

"We are going for another state title this year," Pounds said. "We are so good because we are always competing against each other. That makes us better as a group. It's fun to play tournaments because we have that edge trying to beat the other team and each other."

On the national junior golf circuit during the summers, the Warriors are also making some noise.

Usner and Pounds are both Texas A&M commits and look forward to playing together for years to come.

"It was a dream come true for me,"
Pounds said. "I grew up going to Texas
A&M football games and I have had
much of my family go there. When they
offered me and I committed, it was
incredible."

Pounds has a sister, Taylor, who also plays soccer for the Aggies.

"It's going to be a blast (playing with Pounds at Texas A&M)," Usner laughed.


"We've always been great friends and now I'll be stuck with him for our college years."

The Warrior headliners found golf at an early age.

"My dad put a club in my hand at two years old and I'd hit around the backyard," Usner said. "I started playing tournaments pretty early on and just fell in love with the sport. I love the thrill of competing and I can't get enough of golf."

"I played multiple sports growing up that were more team-oriented," Pounds said. "I was drawn to golf because you are competing by yourself. You have to figure it out on your own."




### WHAT THEY SAY






# THUNTING FOR BIRDIES

#### LEIGH-ANN TREPANIER CHALKS HER HANDS AND APPROACHES A COMPETITION BAR.

It's loaded with a weight that normal athletes, let alone humans, wouldn't consider lifting above their heads, but Trepanier isn't a normal athlete.

In her mind, she repeats the phrase "see a little, see a lot. See a lot, see nothing," to help her focus on the task at hand. She bounces on her toes three times, kneels, sets her hands, moves the bar up and back to herself and then... everything goes silent except her coach's voice.

He gives her a cue. Muscle memory takes over. She lifts.

Trepanier, the head tennis coach at TWCA, has a history of being in the foundation of Olympic Weightlifting that goes back to college. She started powerlifting - squats, bench, deadlifts, etc. — as a collegiate tennis player at Grove City College in Pennsylvania. At first, though she enjoyed it, it was more of a requirement.

After she graduated and moved to The Woodlands, she was immediately recruited by TWCA Strength Coach Tim Walker to enter into a brand new sport for her - Olympic Weightlifting - in December of 2019.

Then, Covid hit, and Trepanier's journey took off.

She purchased a women's competition bar - 35 pounds - and in June of 2020, she started Coach Walker's program and began learning the "snatch" and "clean and jerk" lifts.

Her workout schedule included five days on, two days off. She did this for an entire year before her first competition.

In May 2021, Trepanier's first competition arrived - online through the United States Weightlifting Federation (USAW). She came in third overall in her weight class (59 KG ~ 130 lbs.) with a snatch of 68 KG (148 lbs.) and clean and jerk of 85 KG (187 lbs.).

These lifts qualified her for the U-25 US Nationals and the American Open Series 2. Her and Walker decided to not go to nationals with the goal in mind to compete in the US Nationals as a senior athlete, rather than a U-25 athlete.

At AO2 in September, Trepanier snatched 75 KG (165 lbs.) and clean and jerked 95 KG (209 lbs.). Again, she finished third overall, which qualified her for US Nationals as a senior athlete and the American Open Finals in December.

"It's amazing how God designed our bodies to be able to handle such heavy weight under such grace," Trepanier said. "I never had a female lifter to look up to and I think that's something I love and I hope I can do here at TWCA."

Once she started competing, Trepanier's training schedule was upped to six days a week, with two or three two-a-days. The work paid off.

At the AO Finals, she totaled with a 175 KG lift - 75 KG snatch, 100 KG (220 lbs.) clean and jerk. This was good for a seventh-place overall finish against the top lifters in the nation.

"It's okay to be strong," she added. "It's okay to want to lift heavy weights as a female, which is not common. I love that at TWCA I've had the opportunity to push specifically the female athletes by showing them that they can do this. That they can be confident and feel comfortable in the weight room.


"I love when they come up to me and tell me 'I love this!' or 'I hit this number!"," Trepanier said. "I love being able to be more of an example which wasn't always the case. I'm more confident and I want to help athletes new to the sport."

Up next for Trepanier will be the US Nationals held in Las Vegas in late June. She will be competing against hundreds of the best Olympic Weightlifters in the country.

Considering that when she started, Trepanier was lifting 22.7 KG (50 lbs.) in the snatch, and 37.7 (83 lbs) KG in the clean and jerk, it's safe to say that no, she is not a normal athlete.









If Coach Leigh-Ann Trepanier's beast-mode mentality can rub off on her team, the sky is the limit for TWCA's tennis team. The Warriors have a tough district but that should get them prepared for the postseason tournaments.















### WHO MAKES THE BEST COACHES IN THE GAME OF SOFTBALL? YEP, YOU GUESSED IT, THE CATCHER.

They see all aspects of the game from behind the plate. They are usually the team leader and they are mentally and physically tough. They have to be.

Meet new Warriors' coach Kate Maddock, who is coming home... sort of.

She was a varsity catcher for The Woodlands High School for three seasons before playing her college ball at Houston Baptist University. She was four-year starter and a two-time All-Great West selection.

"Right after college, I was out of the game," Maddock said. "I missed it so much and am so happy to have returned. Coming home to the area is awesome too. Being at TWCA is like being a part of a team. Everyone has each other's back."

I'm very big on hustle, heart and effort.

Back in the dugout are first-team, all-district selections Mackenzie Morris at shortstop and Ashley Darilek, the catcher. Outfielders Reagan Harris, Mattie Hopkins and Katelyn McGrath will patrol the outfield after all-district selections. In the circle will be Katie Wise, a second-teamer.


"I'm looking for the girls to come out here, have a good time and work on their mental game," she said. "Softball is a game of failure and we will learn to fail well. Most teams who can do that will have success in the long run.

"I'm very big on hustle, heart and effort. If you are trying your best, I'm happy with that. We have so many multi-sport athletes who also really bring some competitiveness to the dugout."






















## **FUELED by the FEELING**

"We are going to get a bunch of kids some reps before district play and see who emerges."



The district will be tough with defending champs Lutheran South, Second Baptist School and Fort Bend Christian Academy all vying for the district title, but the Warriors will be a favorite.





