The Rankin County School District, the Rankin County Sheriff's Department, the Brandon Police Department, and the Florence Police Department share an interlocal agreement providing law enforcement which are staffed at each of the 28 campuses to protect students, staff, and families. The Rankin County School District is fortunate to have the very best in our buildings. It is much more than a badge to these officers. It is about building relationships, showing the students that they matter, and at the end of the day, just being part of a family, a team, and a community. This is one story of how these individuals are making a difference in our schools and how one act of kindness has multiplied.

Deputy Sheriff, Michael Gober is the school resource officer for McLaurin High School. Deputy Gober has over thirty years in law enforcement.

His career has taken him from Court Services to Campus Police at a university, Deputy Director of a County Emergency Management Agency, Emergency Response Coordinator with another state agency to becoming the Law Enforcement Director of a State Park agency. He always said he would give up his law enforcement administrator position if given an opportunity to be a school resource officer. Mike started his career in law enforcement in 1992. His wife of twenty-eight years has more than thirty years in education as an elementary school teacher. Their daughter is a sophomore at Mississippi State University.

When asked what got him into law enforcement, he stated that he had family members who were in Law Enforcement and worked in the Court Systems.

A day in the life of a school resource officer looks a little different for everyone, but for Deputy Gober he says that his primary duty is the safety and protection of students and staff at our assigned school. That consists of checking the building's door security, school traffic duties, keeping watch on all who enter and exit the campus, and finally being visible and available to all that come to the campus. However, for Deputy Gober it goes beyond that. Building relationships with school administration, teachers, students, and parents is what makes the real difference.

"The interactions and relationships that we build with staff who are here to educate and help our students grow into future leaders is one of the most rewarding aspects of the job. Building those same relationships with students is also an incredible opportunity for those of us who get to do this. Honestly, I think I learn more from the students than I could ever give back to them."

After being in the schools, Deputy Gober's perspective on law enforcement has changed since he started many years ago. In the school setting, an officer has the opportunity to show a positive side of law enforcement. Some students may not have had the opportunity to see an officer in a positive light. This can only be done by consistent positive interactions with students. By modeling through your actions, you can show them that they matter and that you believe in them.

One way that he has accomplished building those relationships and trust throughout his career is to keep a box of stuffed animals in his patrol vehicle to give out if the situation arises. "It's amazing to see a child's face light up with that small gesture. In some cases, the situation they are in is out of their control. Just a small act of kindness may be all it takes to completely change their outlook" stated Deputy Gober.

I have been given the opportunity by my department to be with our students whenever they might need and request me. If the Tigers are going, I'm there if they want me, and grateful for the opportunity to be part of the Tiger Family."
