Once completed the project will go out to bid, hoping to start early winter or early 2023.



#### CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAM POLICY

#### **MISSION STATEMENT:**

The Milford School District Board of Education is committed to promoting and enhancing the health and well being of the students. All Milford Schools participate in the National School Breakfast and Lunch Programs. The Child Nutrition Programs are an integral part of the school environment. This belief is based upon the demonstrated relationship between food, nutrition and learning to achieve excellence in education for all children. The Child Nutrition Program will provide meals that are nutritious and well balanced. Meals will be provided based on the Nutritional Standards mandated by the USDA guidelines.

The Milford Child Nutrition Programs are managed in accordance with the regulations and policies from the Department of Education, State Division of Purchasing, the United States Department of Agriculture, the State Board of Health, and the Milford Board of Education. Continuous goals and objectives of the programs are pursued in a professional, efficient, and fiscally sound and responsible manner.

The Milford School District's Child Nutrition Program Policy shall provide:

- I. School Meals that meet the USDA Nutrient Standards by:
  - Providing whole grain products, low and fat free milk, and fresh fruits and vegetables.
  - Minimizing saturated fats, total fats and eliminating trans fats.
  - Minimizing sodium according to USDA guidelines
  - Offer versus serve options for the student's preference of food choices.
- II. All efforts will be made to maximize meal participation by:
  - Serving all meals to all students in the Milford School District at no charge, based on the requirements of the Community Eligibility Provision
  - Placing priority on school meals over sales of ala carte foods.
  - Preparing and presenting healthy foods in a manner that will encourage their consumption.
  - Excluding the sales of foods of minimal nutritional value as defined by the Food & Nutrition Service, USDA 7 CFR Part 210, Appendix B.
  - Working collaboratively to provide students with adequate time to consume school meals.
  - Participating in a closed lunch. All students must eat at school.
  - Prohibiting the sale of competitive foods until the conclusion of the student school day.

- Opportunity to pre-pay for a la carte and second meals by credit card via the internet.
- III. Financial Assistance:
  - One free breakfast and/or free lunch will be available to all Milford School District Students at no charge as required through the Community Eligibility Provision.
- IV. Cafeteria Credit:
  - Students will not be able to charge for extra entrée's, sides, snacks or second meals.
  - Students/parents/guardians may put money in My School Bucks for additional meals, entrees, sides, and snacks.
  - Returned checks on customer's accounts will be assessed a minimum fee of \$30.00 plus the check amount. The parent or guardian will not be permitted to pay by check for the remainder of the school year.
  - Charging for meals by adults is prohibited.
- V. Meal Prices:
  - Children will receive one free breakfast and/or one free lunch at no cost to the child or family. A second breakfast will be charged at the adult price of \$2.60-3.00
  - Additional meals will be priced at the adult meal price of \$3.90 4.75 as required by the USDA. No federal reimbursement is available for second meals.
  - Prices for additional entrees, sides and a la carte items will be set by the Milford School Board with the recommendation from the Child Nutrition Department.
- VI. Meal Services for Students During the School Day:
  - Meals or snacks served or sold during the school day separate and apart from the non-profit meal program shall reflect the Child Nutrition Program Policy by ensuring meals and snacks are nutritionally sound and adhere to the Nutrition Guidelines mandated by the USDA NSBP/NSLP Guidelines and snacks adhere to the USDA Smart Snacks Guidelines, including vended options.
- VII. Purchasing practices ensure the ese of quality products:
  - Purchasing practices for food, equipment, and related services shall be conducted in accordance with Federal and State Law and according to the Milford School District's policies.
  - Purchasing decisions for the Child Nutrition Program will include products of high quality and cost effectiveness.
- VIII. Discipline:
  - No student may be denied meals as a disciplinary action.
- VIII. Nutrition Education:
  - Nutrition education will be an integral part of the curriculum from pre-school to grade twelve.

- Good nutrition is recognized as a key factor in health promotion and chronic disease prevention.
- The child nutrition personnel will encourage and assist in activities that promote proper nutrition and will encourage lifelong healthy eating habits.

#### POLICY 5415

#### K-12 SCHOOL DRESS CODE POLICY

Milford School District School Dress Code Policy Statement:

This school dress code policy will supersede any and all previous dress code policies. The required style of dress must be worn to enter the building on a normal school day from entry to dismissal unless otherwise authorized by Administration.

Approved dress code bottoms include: Solid color khaki style pants, jeans, walking shorts, capris, skorts, skirts (no slits), jumpers or dresses.

- 1. Cotton, denim and/or corduroy are acceptable.
- 2. Stretch apparel, leather or sheer materials are not permitted.
- 3. Dress code bottoms must be to the knee or longer in length.
- 4. Cut-off pants and pants with holes are not permitted.
- 5. Clothing items must be worn at the natural waist.
- 6. Solid color leggings, tights or nylons may be worn under skirts that are no shorter than the knee.
- 7. Chains and spiked jewelry are not permitted.

#### Approved dress code tops include: Solid color collared shirts.

- 1. Dress code tops must be short or long sleeve. No sleeveless dress code tops are permitted.
- 2. Button down shirts are permitted. Only the top button of dress code tops can be unbuttoned.
- 3. Solid color collared shirts may have a **small** emblem on the chest or sleeve. Milford School District issued collared shirts may also be worn.
- 4. Solid colored crewneck sweatshirts or hoodless polar fleece jackets may be worn over the collared dress code top. Hooded apparel is not permitted.\*
- 5. Pullover v-neck, crewneck, button down or zippered cardigan sweaters may be worn over the collared dress code top.
- 6. Athletic gear and presentation of lettering or an emblem associated with Milford School District, schools of the Milford School District or colleges/universities are acceptable on approved dress code tops.
- 7. Turtlenecks (mock and regular) or t-shirts (short sleeve and long sleeve) solid in color may be worn **underneath** polo shirts.
- 8. Anything designated as an undergarment (except t-shirts) cannot be revealed. No skin or undergarments should be visible between the waistband of the pants and the bottom of the shirt.
- 9. Cut-offs, frayed seams, and holes are not permitted on clothing.

10. Hats, head coverings (except for religious practices), visors, bandanas, combs, and sunglasses (except with a doctor prescription) may not be worn in the building. Scarves, ties, and bowties are acceptable.

\*For Milford High School students only: Approved solid colored hooded sweatshirts, pullovers or polar fleece jackets may be worn as acceptable dress code tops. Milford High School students Students wearing approved hooded apparel must keep the hood down, and off of their head, while in the school building.


#### Footwear:

1. Students must wear appropriate footwear at all times. No shoes with wheels or slippers are permitted. Elementary students are not permitted to wear flip flops and need to have a closed toe shoe secured to the foot by a strap or shoelaces.

#### **Other Dress Code Considerations:**

- 1. New students who have not been previously enrolled in the Milford School District shall have up to 10 school days to comply with the dress code policy.
- 2. Appropriate physical education attire is determined by the school's physical education teacher and administration.
- 3. Clothing or other personal adornments or embellishments that are disruptive, unsafe or interfere with the regular operations of school are expressly prohibited during school hours and during school functions. Clothing, footwear, jewelry, or adornments must not be obscene, vulgar, nor ethnically, culturally, or sexually offensive. Sacrilegious prints, gang-related identification, apparel, or paraphernalia, suggestions or depictions of violence, drug or alcohol use, tobacco/smoking and/or illegal activities may not be worn or displayed.

### PROMOTION POLICY: KINDERGARTEN TO GRADE EIGHT (K-8)

#### I. KINDERGARTEN THROUGH GRADE 1 STUDENT PLACEMENT AND/OR PROMOTION

A. Promotion will follow the procedure stated below:

Students are expected to perform in the regular curriculum on grade level.

There are grading standards for reading, math and writing at each grade level. The final grade is determined by an average of marking period report card grades. When a student does not meet the promotion criteria, he/she will be retained or assigned remediation through interventions such as summer school, Rtl interventions, or school tutoring, at the principal's discretion. The principal, in consultation with a child study committee, may promote a student under certain circumstances (i.e. IEP recommendation) and/or develop special unique alternative programs which are deemed to be in the best interest of the child, except where this is not allowed by state law. Likewise, the principal in consultation with a child study committee may retain a student who has been processed during the school year for truancy court due to excessive absences.

The fundamental purpose of standards-based grading is to compare student performance to established levels of proficiency in knowledge, understanding and skills. The intent is to evaluate student work in relation to pre-established learning standards as indicated by the achievement scale listed below. The promotion of each student will be determined individually, and the decision to promote a student is made on the basis of multiple factors including progress toward meeting English language arts, math, social studies, science standards and school attendance. When a student does not meet the promotion criteria, the student will be retained or assigned remediation through interventions at the school administration's discretion. The school administration, in consultation with a student support team, may retain/place/promote a student under certain circumstances, including excessive absences.

(a) Reading: Final grade of "D" or higher or proficiency on state assessment at the principal's discretion

(b) Math: Final grade of "D" or higher and 3 or proficiency on state assessment at the principal's discretion

# I. GRADE 2 THROUGH GRADE 5 STUDENT PLACEMENT AND/OR PROMOTION

Students are expected to perform in the regular curriculum on grade level. There are grading standards for reading, math and writing at each grade level. The final grade is determined by an average of marking period report card grades. When a student does not meet the promotion criteria, he/she will be retained or assigned remediation through interventions such as summer school,-Rtl Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS)-interventions, or school tutoring, at the principal's administration's discretion. The principal administration, in consultation with a child study committee student support team, may promote or place a student under certain circumstances (i.e. IEP recommendation) and/or develop special unique alternative programs which are deemed to be in the best interest of the child, except where this is not allowed by state law. Likewise, the principal administration, in consultation with a child study committee student support team may retain a student who has been processed during the school year for truancy court due to excessive absences.

# **Promotion Requirements:**

Demonstrate evidence of consistent progress towards meeting grade level standards in English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies

From 1<sup>st</sup> to 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup>, and 5<sup>th</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> Grade:

Criteria:

(a) Reading: Final grade of "D" or higher or proficiency on state assessment at the administration's principal's discretion

(b) Math: Final grade of "D" or higher or proficiency on state assessment at the administration's principal's discretion

# II. GRADE 6 THROUGH GRADE 8 STUDENT PLACEMENT OR PROMOTION

A. Promotion will follow the procedure stated below:

Students are expected to perform in the regular curriculum on grade level. There are grading standards for English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies at each grade level. The final grade is determined by an average of marking period report card grades. When a student does not meet the promotion criteria, the student will be retained or assigned remediation through interventions at the school administration's discretion. The school administration, in consultation with a student support team, may retain/place/promote a student under certain circumstances, including excessive absences.

## **Promotion Requirements:**

Demonstrate evidence of consistent progress towards meeting grade level standards in English language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies

3. From 6<sup>th</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> Grade

Criteria:

(a) Final grade of "D" or higher in four core content courses: English Language Arts, Math, and a passing grade in Science and Social Studies combined or proficiency on state assessments and at the principal's administration's discretion.

# III. <u>ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMS SPECIAL POPULATIONS</u>

A. <u>Retention or Remediation</u>

Remediation will be based on the diagnosis of the individual child. The child will work on his/her own objectives which will focus on skills not yet acquired.

#### B. Special Education Program

(1) Assignment to special education programs shall be made only in compliance

with IDEA, as amended by the Individuals with Disabilities Improvement Act

of 2004. Promotion is to be determined by the principal and IEP team.

- A. Any student with an IEP, 504, or Multilingual Learner needs will continue to receive the accommodations for which they are eligible.
- B. Teachers will continue to provide appropriate instructional supports and interventions.
- C. Students will continue to receive quarterly progress updates which provide information pertaining to the progress made by students towards achieving their individual goals and objectives.

- A. Elementary School Kindergarten to Grade 5 5 6 years
- B. <u>Central Academy</u> Grades 6 to 8 3 years
