Standards of Behavior

Introduction

As members of the Colonial community, we believe that the standards governing our participation and behavior within Colonial should be clearly stated, reasonable and aligned with our mission. We, the students, faculty, administration, staff and families, commit to respecting and showing concern for:

- > one another and for oneself
- > shared spaces and materials
- > the academic, social and moral life of the school.

The Paws Pledge

As students mature and move from more supervision and structure in the lower grades to greater freedom in the middle and high schools, it is also recognized that greater responsibility accompanies such freedom. The Paws Pledge, Colonial's community agreement, follows these standards, specifies the behavioral expectations for the Colonial community and consequences for not achieving those expectations.

The PAWS pledge:

P – Pay Attention

A – Always be prepared

W – Work and Act Responsibly

S – Show respect

And remember to be a cougar with character.

Students who consistently follow established rules are happier children because they feel safe. In a school community, consistent expectations for behavior followed by students, parents and caregivers, faculty, and staff:

- > create a sense of order and predictability
- > create a climate of respect

- > create an environment where children can take risks and learn from mistakes
- > create an environment where children encourage the best in each other
- > serve as guidelines for behavior to help children learn self-regulation

The goal of the Paws Pledge is to create an atmosphere of learning in an environment that values safety, responsibility, and civility, while taking into consideration the developmental stages of our students. In addition, we hope to provide experiences for our students to learn how to be global citizens.

In the classroom, the Paws Pledge is a tool for teachers to support positive behavior. By using these expectations, teachers can work with students to determine what these expectations mean, not only in their classroom, but also in the larger community. This statement provides a shared language that reflects our goals for all individuals in our community. The Paws Pledge supports the home-school connection to create a clear understanding of what is expected at school, so parents and the school can work together to support children to make good choices. Kind, thoughtful, and responsible members of the community recognize that there are important expectations to follow and agree to adhere to the policies outlined in this handbook.

When the PAWS pledge is not followed, the child's actions will be addressed in the following ways:

- > reflecting on actions and impact with an adult (teacher, counselor, principal)
- > repeating the process in the appropriate manner
- > Time Out with student telling, writing, or drawing a plan of correction
- > making amends to those who were hurt or offended
- > restoring or making restitution for damaged or stolen property
- > notifying parents and caregivers of the behavior

All students are expected to conduct themselves in an appropriate and civil manner in accordance with the District's Code of Conduct. This includes proper regard for the rights and welfare of other students, personnel, other members of the school community, and facilities and equipment.

Dignity for All Students Act

Bullying, harassment, or intimidation are serious and will not be tolerated in the Pelham Union Free School District. In each of its schools, the District has designated at least one employee to serve as a Coordinator to implement the Dignity For All Students Act (DASA), which took effect July 1, 2012. In accordance with the regulations of the Commissioner of Education, each Dignity Act Coordinator has been thoroughly trained in the following areas: human relations; harassment, bullying, and discrimination; and exclusion, bias, and aggression in the educational setting. The Dignity Act Coordinators are charged with coordinating and enforcing the requirements of the Dignity for All Students Act and its implementing regulations and policies.

Any student victim, parent (person in parental relation) of a student victim, close adult relative of a student victim, or school staff member who wishes to report an incident of alleged bullying, harassment, or intimidation, should complete the DASA Report form found on the District website and return it to the school Dignity Act Coordinator at the student/victim's school.

Colonial's DASA Coordinator is Ilana Webster, the school psychologist. More information about DASA and the DASA Coordinators are set forth in the District's Code of Conduct, available [here](#).

Communication

Communicating with Teachers

Every Colonial teacher is dedicated to open communication with their students' families. The teacher will establish how they prefer to communicate with parents during Back to School night in mid-September, if not earlier. There are two parent teacher conferences during the school year to formally speak about your child's progress and performance, typically in November and March. Email Communications

There is no shortage of communication from the District and school. The Superintendent usually sends a weekly email, as well as additional email announcements when notable events and news occur. Colonial's Principal sends out regular email communications (usually 1-2 per month). Colonial's PTA also sends a weekly email called the Growl (see details below). If you are not receiving emails, please advise the School Office to make sure it has your updated contact information.

There is also a private [Colonial School PTA \(Pelham\) Facebook group](#) that parents and caregivers can join for updates and conversation about school happenings.

The Growl

The Growl Newsletter is the official communication channel from the PTA to its members. The PTA has a dedicated communications team responsible for sending a weekly email (usually sent Sunday evenings) with information about school news and upcoming meetings and events, District news and events, community announcements and useful links to purchase spirit wear, District Calendar/website, school lunch menu, school newspapers, social media, etc.

In order to receive the Growl, families must register with Membership Toolkit (MTK)—see more information about MTK below. Registration is free, and ensures that your family will be included in the Colonial directory. All families that register with MTK will automatically receive the GROWL. Access to the Colonial directory is reserved to families that have paid their PTA dues.

Snow/Emergency Closing Communications

Sometimes the start of the school day is delayed or school is closed due to inclement weather. Decisions about school closings are made as early as possible and take into consideration the safety of the students and staff. Should severe weather force us to close school, the District issues text notifications and an automated emergency call system to notify each household based upon parent/guardian contact information provided to the District. At the beginning of each school year, the school distributes forms to ensure that accurate contact information, and your preferred communication channels, are on file. Academic Communication

Back to School Night for Parents and Caregivers

Back to School Night is an opportunity for teachers to share their curriculum and classroom procedures to give parents and caregivers a sense of what their child's classroom life is like. It also allows parents to begin to get to know the teachers, administrators and staff who are very important in your child's life. Back to School Night follows a time schedule, and we urge you to attend for the entire time. **(Back to School Night is for parents and primary caregivers only).**

- **K-2 Back to School Night: September 28th (6:30-7:30)**
- **3-5 Back to School Night: September 29th (6:30-7:30)**

Parent-Teacher Conferences

Conference days are scheduled twice a year for students in Kindergarten through Fifth grades. Details to sign-up for a specific time slot are sent home by your child's teacher. Special area teachers are also available to meet on conference days. Additional conferences may also be scheduled whenever parents or teachers have a concern they wish to discuss.

In addition to specified conference days, we encourage informal talks. Parents should feel free to email teachers for the purpose of scheduling meetings to discuss student progress or concerns.

Teachers appreciate knowing about any major changes at home that may affect a child's behavior or attitude, such as the birth of a sibling, the serious illness of a family member, or a parent out-of-town. Parents should call the school office with respect to any same-day communication with the teacher (for example, to notify the teacher about a change in pick-up arrangements) as teachers do not regularly check email during the day.

Home-School Connection

Colonial PTA

The Colonial School PTA is committed to working closely with families, teachers and community leaders to enrich the learning experience for our students. As a member organization of the New York State and National PTAs, our hope is to be a powerful voice for all children, a relevant resource for families and communities, and a strong advocate for the education and well-being of every child.

Almost all non-academic programming and events at Colonial are organized and led by the PTA. School fundraising, diversity programming and education, cultural events programming, spirit wear and more all fall under the umbrella of the PTA. Some of the PTA's most popular activities include the Welcome Back Picnic, Pasta Night, Book Fair, Building Bridges, Spelling Bee, and Read-a-thon. The PTA also manages Membership Toolkit, the online portal with the school directory that provides sign-ups and information about school events and activities.

Colonial's PTA is made up of volunteer parents and caregivers who pool their talents to provide practical support for our school. The PTA is led by an Executive Committee that is elected at the final PTA meeting of the preceding academic year. The Executive Committee consists of a President, President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer and VP of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. Additionally, there are plenty of roles available for parents interested in chairing specific programs, events, and initiatives. There are also one-off volunteer opportunities and ways to get involved throughout the school year. **EVERYONE is welcome (and encouraged!) to join the PTA.**

All parents and caregivers, including those that don't have the time to volunteer, are encouraged to join the monthly PTA meeting (held virtually) to get the latest scoop on planned activities and events.

Class Parents

A unique opportunity to be involved with your child's classroom and the PTA is by volunteering to be a Class Parent. Each teacher relies on their Class Parents in different ways, however, serving as Class Parent is a great opportunity to get to know your child's teacher and get involved with the PTA in a way that directly impacts your child's experience. Class parent responsibilities include coordinating their class/grade's community service activity, assisting with class parties, and managing class funds/teacher gifts. Membership Toolkit

Membership Toolkit (MTK) is an online portal that is managed by the PTA and contains a school directory (with names of students and families who have opted to be listed in such directory) as well as information and sign-ups for school events and activities. Access to MTK is free, and all Colonial families can opt-in to be listed in the MTK directory. The weekly Growl newsletter is distributed using the contact information listed in the MTK directory. *Note, however, that access to the MTK directory is only available to families that have paid PTA dues.

SEPTA

Pelham's Special Education Parent-Teacher Association (SEPTA) is a district-wide organization of parents, administrators, and teaching staff, dedicated to the support and education of families with exceptional children. **All are welcome to join!**

SEPTA provides parent education through workshops and evening events, and works with parents, teachers, and administrators to help provide the best opportunities possible for all students. Parents and caregivers may contact SEPTA to:

Site Based Council

Each school in the District has a site-based council made up of parent and teacher representatives who work in collaboration with their building principal. The goal of the site-based team is to advise on issues pertinent to student culture and achievement, including hiring of faculty, specialized programming, and scheduling. At Colonial Elementary School, the Site Based Council is made up of the principal, three parents, and three teachers, each serving a two-year term. The parent representatives are nominated by the PTA Executive Board. The team meets once monthly. The Colonial Program

The academic curriculum runs on a 6-day cycle. Each class is staffed by one classroom teacher, and special area classes include Art, Library, Music, Physical Education, and FLES (Spanish). Homeroom and special area teachers frequently collaborate on multi-disciplinary projects that integrate learning in several subject areas.

Curriculum Enrichment

Colonial students have opportunities to participate in orchestra, band, student government, a variety of field trips, and in-school workshops/residencies. Some of the programs that extend beyond the classroom include:

The Colonial Times

The student newspaper is open to any student in 4th or 5th grade and they meet after school once a week. They publish online and a print edition two times a year. The paper is run by Ms. Agostino. Check out the [Colonial Times!](#)

Orchestra/Band

Orchestra starts in 3rd grade and Band in 4th grade. Lessons are free and take place once in each 6-day cycle. Students can choose an instrument to play and there are two recitals per year. The orchestra teacher is Ms. Marcia Bean (mbean@pelhamschools.org) and the band teacher is Mr. Andrew Dolgon (adolgon@pelhamschools.org). Students can opt to participate in both band and orchestra.

24 Club

Student Government

Colonial has had an active student government. It is facilitated by a staff member and historically included Fourth and Fifth Grade class representatives. Over the years they have raised money for charities, collected food for food banks, and honored staff members throughout the year.

Perennial Math

Perennial Math is a program available to students in grades 3, 4 and 5 that is designed to improve problem solving abilities by developing students' reading, reasoning and logical skills by giving students an opportunity to compete in four Perennial Math tests. The program runs Jan-April, and students meet once a month for practice sessions as well as tests. All students receive certificates for participating and special awards will be presented to individual students who score well compared to students around the world. *Grades 2-5 will have time slots for checking out books, and their library program will be integrated in their curriculum.

Report Cards

Colonial uses a Standards Based Report Card to measure student growth over the course of a school year in grades K-5. Students receive report cards three times a year—in November, March and June. The report card standards scale is available [here](#).

Academic Screenings

All incoming Kindergarten children are screened to provide the school with preliminary information about each child's strengths and needs as the school prepares for their kindergarten experience. The school uses the information from the screening, along with parent and preschool questionnaires to best create classes for the fall. In addition, all Colonial students are screened three times during the year with an informal reading assessment to determine how students perform according to grade level benchmarks. These assessment data are used to inform instruction in the areas of fluency, decoding, and comprehension.

Homework Guidelines

Homework reinforces skills learned at school by providing independent practice at home. It can also serve as an important vehicle for communication between the home and school, helping families to understand the learning that is happening in class. The District has a Homework Policy for K-5 that can be found [here](#).

Homework Expectations for All

Students: Homework should represent a student's best work. It will be completed with care and demonstrate student responsibility. It is expected that homework is completed and returned to school on time.

Teachers: Purposeful homework will be assigned to reinforce daily lessons and practice previously taught skills. Homework may be modified when taking into account student readiness. Homework expectations will be communicated to students and parents at the beginning of the school year.

Parents: Homework should be completed by the student with independence. Parents should communicate to the teacher via a note or email if a child needs extra support with the homework or if he/she is unable to complete the homework. As our school partners, parents will create and establish homework routines including a time and place to complete homework.

Nightly Reading

Reading provides students a number of significant benefits including improved concentration, vocabulary, language skills, and empathy. Reading teaches children about the world around them, providing mirrors to see themselves and windows to learn about others. Most importantly, reading is fun and a wonderful way to spend special time together!

K-2 students are expected to read independently (or be read to) for a minimum of 20 minutes at home each day. Students in Grades 3 through 5 should be reading independently for a minimum of 30 minutes a day. Of course, we encourage your child to read, read, read as much as possible!

Homework Time

Homework is generally assigned on Monday through Thursday nights. Below are recommended nightly assignment completion times on average. Let your child's teacher know if homework is taking your child much longer than these recommendations. Homework is intended to reinforce classroom instruction, not cause frustration.

Grade	Nightly Homework Assignment Time (on average)
K	Individualized /20 minutes
1	30 minutes
2	45 minutes
3	45-60 minutes
4	60 minutes
5	60-75 minutes

**Approximately half of the time listed should be devoted to nightly reading, however we encourage our students to read as much as possible!!

New York Assessments

Standardized testing provides one measure of student performance. Results of standardized tests are used to help teachers identify areas of instruction and curriculum to be reviewed closely. New York

State tests in English Language Arts and Mathematics are administered to students in grades 3, 4 and 5.

The School Day

School doors open at 8:15 am, the late bell rings at 8:25am, and instruction commences at 8:30am. Please note that the playground is not supervised prior to 8:15 am. Under no circumstance should students be left unattended prior to 8:15 am. We ask for family and students' cooperation in making the start of each school day as smooth, safe and peaceful as possible.

Attendance

When a student will be absent from school, the student's parent or guardian should contact the main office before 8:30am by calling (914) 738-2680 and emailing the teacher and the school nurse (dmccarthy@pelhamschools.org). If the Colonial Main Office does not receive notification of a student's absence before 8:30am, the school nurse or other representative will contact the student's parents or guardians by phone and/or email. As mandated by New York State, a student's guardian will be contacted if a child is excessively tardy or absent.

Arrival and Dismissal

Arrival

- > School doors open at **8:15am**, at which time the first bell is rung. At **8:25am**, the late bell rings and school officially begins. Classes and morning instruction begin promptly at **8:30am**.
- > Teachers arrive between 8:15 and 8:20, organize each classroom, and lead them inside.
 - Grades K and 2 line up through the Pelhamdale Avenue playground entrance.
 - Grade 1 lines up in the lower playground, and enters the building through the lower level near the Art Room.
 - Grades 3-5 enter through the main entrance on Highbrook Avenue.
- > Any student arriving after 8:30am must enter the school through the main entrance on Highbrook Avenue and will be marked Tardy.

Dismissal

- > Dismissal time is at **3:05pm**. Students are dismissed through the same entrance that they arrived (K-2 in the back; 3-5 from the main entrance). Students in grades K-3 are only

dismissed to a designated guardian. Students in Grades 4 and 5 that wish to walk home independently (known as “walkers”) may be dismissed without a guardian if a permission slip is on file with the school.

Arrival and Pick-up By Car

There is a designated drop zone in front of the school on Highbrook Ave that is recommended for students in all grades. Parents dropping off their child(ren) are advised to pull forward to the end of the drop zone directly in front of the school entrance, wait in the car until someone opens the car door to help their child(ren) unload, and then quickly but carefully exit the drop zone. There is no parking, stopping or standing on Highbrook from Boulevard to the cones. Children may only exit the vehicle on the sidewalk side of the car.

Drop-off on Pelhamdale Ave in the back of the school is only permitted on the northbound side closest to the playground—again, you must drop-off quickly and carefully exit. (Traffic on Pelhamdale Avenue is not restricted to school traffic so drop off in this area is less recommended.)

Parking

Parking for drop-off and pick-up is available on each of Highbrook and Pelhamdale Avenues one block north of the school, on Boulevard, and on Irving Place. You cannot park and leave your car immediately in front of or behind the school.

No Idling

Idling as you wait to drop-off or pick up is illegal. Students and neighbors get dosed with fumes, and in general it’s just a bad environmental move. Please do not idle.

Walking

Our lovely town was designed for walking, and there is perhaps no finer sight than seeing a steady stream of Cougars marching to school in the morning, eager to learn and definitely never whining. Crossing guards are strategically deployed at major intersections—make sure you say hello!

Biking

Children in grades 3-5 who have their parent’s permission may ride their bicycles/scooters to school. Bicycle racks are provided on the lower playground and by the south entrance on Highbrook. Students are responsible for locking their bikes. Helmets must be worn. Students may not ride their bicycles and scooters on school property.

Late Arrival Policy

Arriving at school on time helps students develop good learning habits and provides children an opportunity to transition from home to their daily school routine. It is important that children have time to settle into their classroom, check-in with their friends and teachers, and care for their belongings. Children who are late miss out on this important part of the morning routine. We ask for your help in getting your child to school on time.

Teachers greet their classes in designated locations and bring them into the building by 8:20am. Morning instruction begins at 8:30 am. ***Any student that arrives after 8:30 am must enter through the main entrance of the school (on Highbrook).*** The back gate will be locked.

Early Dismissal Policy

If a student has to leave school early, a note must be sent to the teacher or main office in advance. For safety, the school will dismiss students only to their parents, or to a person authorized by the parent and known to the school (caregiver, grandparent, etc.) who will sign the child out with the greeter. Under no circumstances may a child leave the school alone.

There is a Student Sign-In/Sign-Out Log in the main office. Students must sign in and out when:

- > Arriving after 8:30am
- > Leaving before 3:05pm

All parents, guardians, and caretakers should meet their child(ren) at the Greeter's Station (Mr. Raggo) for early dismissals and pick-ups.

Early Release

The academic calendar typically includes a few "Early Release" days which are designed to afford teachers and staff with professional development opportunities. On Early Release days, the dismissal procedures will be followed for a 1pm dismissal. Students will have lunch on these days in school. The early dismissal days for the 2022-23 academic year are as follows:

- October 19th
- November 2nd
- January 11th
- February 1st

- March 1st

Consistent with the District's past practice, Colonial students will also be released early **at noon** on the following dates:

- September 6 (First Day of School)
- November 23 ((Wednesday before Thanksgiving/Emergency Evacuation Drill)
- June 21st
- June 22nd
- June 23rd (Last Day of School)

It is common during the school year for the dates, times and places of events to change or for additional events to be added. As changes are made, the District will update the detailed, single-page/PDF iterations of the District Calendar that is posted to the website [here](#) as well as the digital calendar. If relying on the website iterations, it is important to check back periodically to see what has changed.

Lunch, Snack and Recess

Colonial students eat a snack in their classroom. Please pack a nutritious snack for your student(s) daily. All classrooms are nut free. Teachers will advise of any foods that may be prohibited in the classroom due to allergies.

Lunch/recess is a full hour each day from 11:15am - 12:15pm. Due to building constraints, the school is split into groups for lunch/recess. Students in K-3rd grade eat lunch in the gym, while Fourth and Fifth Grade students eat lunch outside at the PMS fields. (In the event of inclement weather, students eat at their desk.) Students are permitted to leave the building for lunch when a parent or guardian has signed them out of the building/back into the building following the late arrival/early dismissal policy above. A student that leaves for lunch cannot be brought back to the school building until the end of the lunch hour.

School lunch is available for purchase every day through Whitsons. More information about Food Services, including details on free and reduced meals, can be found on the District's Food Services webpage available [here](#). The daily lunch menu can be access from the Colonial website's homepage at: <https://colonial.pelhamschools.org/>

Recess happens daily for all Colonial students. Colonial students go outdoors throughout the year, so please make sure your child is dressed for the weather every day. The lunch hour includes thirty

minutes of lunchtime and thirty minutes of recess. In addition, teachers employ a variety of methods to give children brain breaks, such as dancing along to GoNoodle clips that get children up and moving

Recommended Attire

Students should wear clothing that will allow them to fully participate in the school day.

- > Appropriate clothing for the weather: winter gear should include hats, gloves, scarves, winter jacket, snow pants, and snow boots
- > Gym shoes for PE days (though sneakers are always a good idea, since activity is encouraged in the classroom and at recess everyday).
- > Children often get dirty playing and learning at school - dress accordingly! Reserve fancy or special clothes for special occasions :-)
- > Please be sure to label anything that comes into school - jackets, lunchboxes, water bottles - with your child's name and class to ensure that it is returned to your child instead of sitting in Lost and Found.

Lockers

Classrooms have student lockers assigned by the homeroom teacher to store personal belongings such as backpacks, lunches and extra clothes. It is the student's responsibility to keep their lockers clean. Lockers do not have locks, and students may not bring in personal locks.

Safety and Security

Building Access

Entrances to the building are open during arrival and dismissal times, and accessible during normal building hours with an appointment and proper identification. All visitors must enter through the main entrance and obtain a visitor pass from the security desk.

Before and After School Hours (supervision of students when school is not in session)

All homeroom doors open by 8:20 am. Colonial students begin classes at 8:30 am. Children may play before or after school in the Colonial playground provided that they **must** be supervised by an adult at all times. There is no supervision for students prior to 8:15am, so please do not drop students off before then.

Children are not allowed to remain after school unsupervised. They must leave the school at the close

of the school day or be enrolled in a specific program.

Lost and Found

A lost and found is set up outside of the principal's office when there's a need for it. Otherwise, families with missing items can contact the school secretary. Please be sure to label anything that comes into school - jackets, lunchboxes, water bottles - with your child's name and class to ensure that it is returned to your child instead of sitting in Lost and Found.

Fire & Safety Drills

In accordance with state law, the school conducts fire, lockout and lockdown drills on a regular basis. A flashing blue light at the front or rear of the building indicates that the building is in lockout or lockdown (either in a drill or otherwise). While the drill is underway, school phones are not answered and the doors will not be responded to when the bells are pressed. Exterior blue lights at the school's exterior doors will be flashing indicating that you should not come near the building. Parents are notified of any building emergency and at the start and conclusion of a lockout or lockdown drill.

Parents may opt-in to receive text notifications about the start and end of safety drills in real time. At the beginning of each school year, the school distributes forms to ensure that accurate contact information, and your preferred communication channels, are on file. Please contact the school should these change during the academic year.

Student Services, Health, and Wellness

The District's Pupil Personnel Services department strives to provide balanced support for every student to ensure equal access to the general education curriculum while addressing the whole student. Academic, health, social and emotional needs all fall within Pupil Personnel Services. The District's goal is to foster growth and independence in the academic, social and emotional domains for all students. Comments, questions and communications initiated from our families are always welcome as we value your participation and collaboration in supporting our students.

The District strives to make the Pupil Personnel Services Suite a welcoming and supportive place. Services that are offered include speech, OT, and other related services. Anyone who has concerns

about their child potentially having disabilities should always start with the classroom teacher, and then the principal. Depending on the concerns, there are building-level services when warranted whether it be academics or other areas. Parents are also welcome to reach out to Dr. Ribeiro (contact below) if they have questions about making a referral for services of programs.

School Nurse

Colonial's school nurse is committed to providing your child with the highest level of care possible and values a proactive approach to overall student wellness. Our goal is to assist and care for all students with any health related issues so they may enjoy and get the most from their educational experience. To that end, the school-parent partnership is vital. Please be sure to communicate any important information regarding your child's medical condition(s) and/or medication(s) directly to Denise McCarthy, Colonial's school nurse at dmccarthy@pelhamschools.org or 914-738-2680 ext. 1504. Please make sure Mrs. McCarthy has an updated health form on file for your child. These can be updated and submitted annually following your child's well visit.

Illness

In the event your child is absent from school, you must notify the school nurse. If your child has a contagious illness, it is appropriate to inform the school nurse. If your child has a temperature of greater than 100.0 in the previous 24 hours he/she needs to stay home. They can return to school after being fever free for 24 hours ***without the help of fever reducers***.

Administering Medications in School

In order for a school nurse to administer medication(s), NYS law requires that each student have a patient-specific order from a licensed prescriber and written parent/guardian permission for any prescription or over the counter medication, including topicals (i.e. ointment, Calamine lotion, Benadryl, skin lotions, Vaseline, etc.). All medications (prescription and over the counter) must adhere to these guidelines and must be brought in by a parent in the original container.

Additional permission is required for those students who request permission to carry their own medication on campus. Please contact Colonial's school nurse directly.

Medical Emergencies

If a serious medical emergency occurs at school, the school will call parents or the emergency contact person. If we are unable to contact someone, we will take the child by ambulance to the nearest emergency room. In the meantime, school personnel will continue their attempts to reach parents and emergency contacts.

Student Support During Medical Leaves

Depending on the nature and duration of a student's Medical Leave, they may need to take steps toward acquiring specific content knowledge and/or developing specific skills which were a part of the course(s) in which they were not a full participant. The school may consider a range of potential options to support students.

In addition, the student and their parent/guardian will need to have a meeting with the school administration and the school counselor prior to returning in order to ensure a successful transition back to school.

School/Parent communication

It is vital for families to discuss individual student allergy plans with the student's teacher and school nurse.

Traditions and Events

School Spirit

Colonial is not lacking in spirit! The Paws Pledge is recited every morning as part of daily announcements and Cougars are encouraged to wear school colors - red and white - First Friday of each month for Spirit Day. The PTA sells spiritwear through Membership Toolkit and in person at school events.

Town Halls

Assemblies are formal gatherings that have a special focus or theme and might include special performers or speakers from outside the Colonial community. Examples of Town Halls include special author visits, and other special guest speakers or cultural group performances.

Birthday Celebrations

Birthdays are celebrated in student homerooms, according to the tradition of that particular classroom. As a school, we want to continue recognizing our students' special day while being sensitive to our District Wellness Policy, student medical issues, and our school and district commitment to equity and access and creating a community of inclusiveness. Therefore, all elementary schools will be replacing edible treats with non-food celebrations. Any questions or suggestions regarding celebrations should be coordinated with your individual teacher.

Gifts of Appreciation to Teachers and Staff

The Colonial community values exhibiting kindness. While not an expectation, the act of recognizing a teacher or staff with a modest gift by students, families, and friends is welcomed. The District has a policy that teachers and employees are not allowed to accept any single gift in excess of \$75. This policy applies to both collective gifts (gifts collected by the Class Parents and presented on behalf of the entire class) and individual gifts given on behalf of a single student or family. There is no overall cap on the number of gifts a teacher is allowed to receive, just a policy that each gift stay under the \$75 cap. Gifts are traditionally given at the holidays, Teacher Appreciation Week, and at the end of the school year. Class Parents (through the PTA) will usually arrange to provide a class gift to the teacher utilizing class funds.

“Cougars Care” Grade-Level Spirit Events

To build community and encourage a commitment to service, each grade takes part in a “Cougars Care” project designed to engage the entire grade and give back to the school/surrounding

community. These projects can vary year-to-year, and are facilitated by the PTA and class parents with the support of teachers and Ms. Garcia.

5th Grade Traditions

Colonial Fifth Graders are celebrated all year long with a variety of field trips and full-grade experiences. In the Spring, Fifth Graders usually participate in a District-wide Field Day with the Fifth Graders from the other three Pelham elementary schools. It is a great way to start to get to know kids from other schools as they get ready for middle school. Other events that prepare them to move on to PMS usually include visits from guidance counselors, a PMS tour and Q&A with 6th graders about what to expect.

The school arranges a “Moving Up” ceremony that will be followed by a special celebration for all students and their families. Funds raised throughout the year are used for this party, plus a donation gift from the PTA. The students’ costs are usually covered and families pay for any other attendees.

Field Trips

Field trips are an integral part of the Colonial program. They may take the form of outings to museums, zoos, theaters, service opportunities, or simply a walk around town. These trips enhance studies that take place within the walls of the school by providing a level of authenticity and “real life” experiences that cannot be replicated in classrooms.

Field trips change year to year, taking into account many factors including changes to curriculum and venue availability. Some illustrative field trips that our grades have enjoyed in years past include the following:

- 1st - Bronx Zoo
- 2nd - Botanical Gardens
- 3rd - Pelham Palace lunch
- 4th - Picture House project/Norwalk Aquarium
- 5th - Boundless Adventures, Constitution Works

Kindergarteners tend to stay close to school grounds but have a number of traditions in which parents are invited into the classroom, including a weekly “Mystery Reader” and a Gingerbread-Building workshop in December. Regardless of what specifics are planned, know that the Colonial faculty and PTA are committed to ensuring a rich, dynamic, and memorable experience for

our students every year.

Holidays

As part of our program of learning about each other and the world, we welcome families into the classrooms to share important celebrations and holidays that they observe. Our DEI committee works tirelessly to ensure that all cultures and traditions are celebrated at Colonial. We've done everything from celebrating Cinco de Mayo with a history lesson and guacamole-making class to a Lunar New Year dragon dance and so much more. Pasta Night

Pasta Night is a 5th grade fundraiser event for the whole school to attend on the Colonial playground. It usually occurs in early spring and includes a pasta dinner, catered at a good price by a local restaurant (Villagios or similar) served by the 5th grade class, DJ/dancing and silent auction/raffle. Typical auction items include lunch with your teacher, principal for a day, funny teacher challenges and activities. The raffle items are donated toys/activities, numbers are called by the DJ and students go pick their prize. It is a student favorite!

Welcome Back Picnic

The Colonial school year kicks off with a "Welcome Back Picnic" each September. This is generally held within the first few weeks of school starting on a Friday evening at Prospect Hill Playground. While the details change from year-to-year, families enjoy a casual dinner, DJ and dancing, raffle, Spirit Wear sales, and more. The Welcome Back Picnic is hosted by the PTA.

Book Fair

Colonial celebrates reading at the PTA’s annual book fair every fall. Traditionally, Colonial’s library is converted into a “pop-up” bookstore that invites students and parents to explore the shelves to find the next book on their reading lists or that perfect gift. As one of the PTA’s fundraising events, the fair not only helps to raise funds but also cements the power and importance of reading in our community.

Building Bridges

Colonial students—across all grades—benefit from an annual training and learning experience called “Building Bridges: Understanding People with Different Abilities,” designed to encourage empathy and understanding amongst our students. Brought to the school in 2019 by Colonial mom Ashley Matts, the program allows children to experience first-hand what it feels like to live with disabilities through engaging, interactive classroom activities. Classroom workshops are followed up with a series of speakers who have real-life experience with the disability that each grade has covered. Students from K-5 learn about vision impairment, hearing impairment, autism, physical and motor impairments, and learning differences.
