

ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE PROGRAM (ESL)

The English as a Second Language Program (ESL) is designed for non-native speakers of English who need to improve their English proficiency. The program develops reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills through a variety of instrumental methods designed to meet the learning needs of each student. There are four levels of ESL instruction: beginning, pre-intermediate, intermediate and advanced. Placement is determined by a test administered in the fall to incoming students and in the spring to returning students.

Beginning and pre-intermediate students concentrate on communicative competence, basic grammar, and writing skills. They also take sheltered history and science courses that offer vocabulary support and an American cultural component. Intermediate and advanced students focus on developing more sophisticated language skills in literary analysis, test-taking, speaking, and listening courses in preparation for success on the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language). In all other subjects, students in the ESL program are mainstreamed into the regular curriculum.

The goal of the ESL program is to immerse non-native speakers in the English language and American culture to prepare them for academic and social success at The Phelps School and at an American college or University. Exemption from the ESL program is determined by the Phelps Academic Council and the student's TOEFL score.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The Phelps School boasts a chapter of the National Honor Society. Students in grades 10 through 12 who meet the scholarship requirement (cumulative, unweighted grade point average of B+ or 3.25 on a 4.0 scale for grade 9 through their current grade) will be invited to apply for membership. Candidates are then eligible for consideration on the basis of service, leadership, and character. Completion and submission of the candidate form does not guarantee selection in the National Honor Society.

THE ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAM (ASP)

The Academic Support Program (ASP) was established over 40 years ago at Phelps, making us a pioneer in the development of supplemental programs for boys who have learning differences. The Phelps School's leadership in helping boys to realize their full potential begins with our ability to recognize their individual needs. The operating premise of the ASP Program is to meet the student at his instructional level so growth may occur.

In order to assist the student in reaching his potential, small group instruction is provided in Reading, Writing, and Math. Wilson Training in reading can be provided to students who need instruction in decoding to improve reading fluency. Support in his regular curriculum and continual monitoring of his progress are essential components of ASP. The development of organizational and study skills is integrated within the total curriculum and provides a structured, repetitive base for learning.

In addition to academic support, the ASP staff believes that many other factors contribute to a young man's self-esteem and ultimate satisfaction with his life. Every opportunity is taken to encourage a student to affirm his individuality and to urge him to reach out to help others. The ASP staff is dedicated to finding an approach that replaces failure with success.

As students encounter academic growth and improvement in their personal goals, the staff and students celebrate their accomplishments.

STUDENT INFORMATION SYSTEMS

Our Student Information System (Sycamore) provides parents, students and faculty direct access to school related information through an online platform. Sycamore provides easy access to the entire academic process including; grades, homework assignments, report cards, teacher contact information, the school calendar, school news and events. Sycamore facilitates and encourages communication within the school which strengthens academic and disciplinary accountability. In order to stay up-to-date with the latest educational technology and enhance direct engagement between parent, student, and teacher, Phelps is pleased with the infusion of Sycamore into the curriculum.

Tuition and Fees

Some schools have many additional fees that can increase tuition significantly. Our tuition is comprehensive and includes the majority of expenses a student incurs. Our tuition includes instruction (with an average student/teacher ratio of 7:1), room and board (breakfast and dinner optional for day students), the technology and activity fees, college counseling, daily afternoon tutorial, evening proctored study hall (as needed), transportation as members of athletic teams and basic health center services.

The non-refundable tuition deposit is due upon the execution of the enrollment agreement and will be applied towards tuition.

The incidental account deposit is applied to a student's personal fees and expenses such as books (estimated between \$500-\$700), supplies, trips, PSAT/SAT/TOEFL exams, score reports, college application fees, SAT/TOEFL prep courses, certain sports/activities, doctor visits, non-standard health center fees, medications and damages. When the initial deposit is depleted, additional payment will be required as shown in the monthly statements.

PAYMENT PLAN OPTIONS

The Phelps School offers three payment plan options. One payment due by August 1, two payments — 60% due by August 1 and 40% due by December 1, and monthly payments starting May 15 and ending February 15 (monthly payments are not available to students with F-1 Visa's). 60/40 payments and monthly payments require registration with FACTS. FACTS is a tuition management company utilizing automated payments from a bank account (ACH) or credit card.

TUITION REFUND PLAN ("TRP")

The enrollment contract is binding after execution. Parents can purchase the Tuition Refund Plan (TRP) to protect against an instance in which their son needs to withdraw from Phelps, and the family would face no refund of tuition. The plan provides for a pro-rated refund of unused tuition. The cost of tuition insurance is the equivalent of 6% of tuition.
