The students can watch from the comfort of home not concerned with graduation dress code, their hat falling off, shaving, and what to wear.

I am sure there will be laughs and tears, but mostly joy and relief that high school is finished and now it's on to the next thing.

It is time to move forward.

I am sure all of you remember your graduation from high school, college, graduate school and then trying to get your first job. Things these kids of 2020 all have to look forward to.

I bet some of you got that first job because somebody helped you. They made a call. They pointed you in the right direction. They gave you some good advice.

I am sure that some of you alums still help, still mentor, still give advice, still challenge the "youngins" to be the best they can be. Sometimes that requires helping them choose the correct life path. Maybe it was your own child, maybe a young employee where you worked, maybe a young person that you coached or taught.

I was lousy at taking advice. I probably still am. But once in awhile I listened. When I was in 10th grade, playing on the football team, I was stuck in a spot, a position, where my prospects of playing where not good. I was an average athlete to begin with, not very strong, skinny and trying to play defensive end. It was not working out. I spent most JV games flat on my back after being blocked.

Then one day after practice a coach walked up to me in the locker room. I was bruised, battered and bewildered. There was no time limit on hitting during practice in those days.

The coach's name was Dave Gleason, also a teacher at DePaul and one of the greatest student athletes ever to attend our school. Ever! He was a member of the Gleason family from Pompton Plains, and he was now talking to me!

He sat down on the bench and quietly and honestly told me that as a defensive end my chances of ever playing varsity were slim to none. I did not take it too well. I said, "then I should quit or something". He looked at me and said quietly,"so quitting is the answer"? He was very calm and he just looked at me. I asked, "then what is the answer"?

Coach said, "well, how about a job change, a position change?" I asked, "to what position?"

He told me to become a defensive back and he would work with me. He convinced me not to quit, and I changed positions. I was slow and still skinny, but he saw something in me. After 3 weeks I was running second team safety on the varsity. Now don't get me wrong, teams did not throw the ball much in those day so the pressure was less. The goal: just don't get beat deep and read the tight end for run /pass.

The following Saturday we were playing a varsity game and I got in because of an injury to the first team guy. I made a couple of tackles, but also got beat twice for touchdowns. I figured I was done.

We won the game and back at school I was moping around the locker room feeling sorry for myself and Coach Gleason walked over. He said in strong words, "stop sulking, we won the game. This is not about you, it is about being happy for the team win". That was the best thing he ever said to me. It's about the team and not me.

I was fortunate to stay in touch with Dave and his family over the years and I was heartbroken when he died a few years ago. My wife had grown up with Dave's sister, Jane. They are best friends.

Dave was a great man. He told me the truth, he gave me a chance, and he demanded that I do things the right way. All things.

I am glad I took his advice.

So when any of you alums see a young kid floundering, don't be afraid to offer some quiet advice. You never know how much that may mean to a young person.

The Class of 2020, just like all graduates everywhere, will always be grateful for a little help, a friendly nudge or a quiet compliment.

The kids may act like they know everything, but as graduates they are about to learn they still have a lot to learn.
