Thanksgiving Day: A Time of Gratitude, Optimism, and Grace in the Midst of the Pandemic

As Thanksgiving Day approaches and many people may be wondering how on earth we are going to celebrate our traditions this year away from family and friends due to COVID-19 related travel restrictions or safety concerns, I want to invite you, all our DePaul family and friends, to see this Thanksgiving Day as an opportunity to think outside the box and reflect on the great meaning of gratitude, optimism and grace of this holiday. We have heard the story again and again. It was the fall of 1621 in Plymouth, Massachusetts, when the pilgrims who had survived the first year in the New World, after a big harvest, gathered for a feast to offer thanks. One of the pilgrims wrote at the time:

*"By the goodness of God, we are so far from want."*This meal left us with an enduring tradition: a gathering around the dining table with family and friends, giving thanks for surviving in an uncertain and difficult new place.

Let us think that the first pilgrims were people who lived their lives in wonder and hope, grateful for everything: the hard storms and deep snow, the frightening evenings and hopeful mornings, the time of sickness and the blessing of health, the long journey that had taken them to a new place. This meal leads us to say that they knew how to express gratitude. Some people have suggested that maybe that is what enabled them to thrive and flourish: a humble appreciation for whatever God gave them, trusting that He would

give them what they would need. It's an optimistic message, really, and gratitude, I think, carries a spirit of hope and optimism. Maybe that spirit can teach us something as we celebrate Thanksgiving Day this year in the midst of this pandemic, and endure our own hard storms and deep snows, the storms of our own lives.

I am just as sure this spirit of optimism and grace, although in a different way, will be present this year as well. The grace of gratitude. The grace of thanking God for whatever gift He gives. And in the giving, and in the receiving, and in the thanking, there is something that transcends time and place. There is love. Love for those around us, love for what we have, and love for what we have been given. And love for the God who gives it. Because no matter how violent the winds, at least on this day we all remember that God is near, walking this journey with us and helping us carry our own crosses. The cross of being sick or feeling lonely and worried about the future. The cross of losing a loved one and not being able to say good bye, and I love you, and thank you. The cross of not having a job or being depressed about what is going on in the world. Once again, no matter how unforgiving the storm, God is with us.

The pilgrims knew that. And so did the Samaritan leper in the gospel that we proclaim at Mass during Thanksgiving Day. He lived a life of deformity and shame. But he trusted, and he listened, and he was healed: changed forever, made new. He could have gone on his way. But he did not. He could not. He had to thank The One who made his miracle possible. Two thousand years later, that anonymous figure left us a legacy, and a lesson: a beautiful example of what it means to have an "attitude of gratitude." It is an attitude we all need to nurture, not just today, but every day.

To all our teachers, staff, students, families, benefactors and friends I wish for you a very meaningful Thanksgiving. May the healing power of Jesus bless us and protect us every day of our lives.
