SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Parkland Community,

Welcome back for the 2022-2023 school year. We were so excited to kick off our year with all 1,500 staff! Like healthcare, grocery store workers, and many others, we celebrated our ESSENTIAL staff in a big way by welcoming them back from summer break with a pep rally style SUPERHERO themed event in our Orefield Football Stadium. Our leadership team welcomed back all staff with an Opening Day Convocation Celebration that included cheerleaders, the PHS Trojan Marching Band, the Orefield Middle School Take a Stand faculty and student band and senior class officers Siddhant Khandelwal, Anshul Dadayyapally, Anna Lorenzo, Alexa Bartman and Noah Oxfeld. We also had surprise food truck treats and Parkland SUPERHERO T-shirts for staff to enjoy.



I truly believe that everyone in this District is a superhero. When future historians look back at the pandemic, I believe they will be amazed at what was done in the field of public education for the sake of our children. We could not have offered all these goodies to our staff without our amazing sponsors. We truly value business and community support and thank everyone who helped make Opening Day so special!

LEADERSHIP TEAM - Our leadership team said goodbye to Dr. Rodney Troutman, Assistant Superintendent, who spent 35 years in public education, the last 27 at Parkland School District, where he fulfilled many leadership roles. It was bittersweet to say goodbye, and I am truly thankful that I was able to spend my first year as Superintendent with Rod by my side. We all wish him much happiness in retirement! Filling Rod's role is Mr. Timothy Chorones who got started this summer in the midst of transitioning out of his role as Principal at Fogelsville Elementary School. Tim is already an excellent addition to our team and Dr. Michelle Minotti, the District's other Assistant Superintendent, and I, are looking forward to future planning with Tim and the year ahead.

SUMMER PROJECTS - This summer also included many capital improvement projects. This entire past year, we have been in the midst of a large renovation project at Schnecksville Elementary School. The last phase of this project included the demolition of the oldest section of the building which dates back to 1929. When that building opened, most of the one room schoolhouses in North Whitehall Township closed and grades 1-8 began attending Schnecksville Elementary. The school district and architects are making every effort to preserve the original ornate pillared entrance of the school to be incorporated into the gates of an outdoor learning courtyard that will be constructed this fall on top of the site of the original building. This work is complicated and they are working to ensure the structure is safe and secure. A new addition that was constructed last year includes classrooms and office space. Interestingly, the project manager for the Schnecksville Elementary addition project, Peter Schneck, is a descendent of

Adam Schneck, who is one of the founders of Schnecksville. In May, Peter Schneck took alumni Darlene Schneck (age 65) and her father, Paul Schneck (age 91), on a tour of the original 1929 building after it had been permanently vacated. As they walked the old hallways, Paul and Darlene reminisced about their teachers and school years. Paul had classes in the 1929 building from 1936 to 1944, and Darlene had classes there from 1962 to 1968. You can view the video on YouTube by scanning the QR code to the right.



Another large project we are working on is an addition at Kratzer Elementary after a feasibility study showed that additional classroom space is needed to support growth. You will see that steel has been erected onsite and the project will continue throughout this school year with planned completion in Summer 2023. Other summer projects included the replacement of the HVAC equipment at Ironton, replacement of flooring in small sections of Cetronia and Parkway Manor, reconstructing the parking lot at Cetronia, milling and overlaying of the playground at Kernsville, and construction of a restroom for a new kindergarten classroom at Ironton.

SCHOOL SAFETY - In July, our Director of District Safety and Security, Dr. Anthony Naradko, helped us conduct a parent reunification drill. The scenario included a chemical spill at one of our elementary schools and our administrative team practiced their roles in helping to re-unify students with their parents and guardians by following a detailed plan that Dr. Naradko constructed for our community. I wish to thank all who were involved in the drill that day and I am proud to say that while we never hope to have to implement the plan, it is essential to practice drills that are designed to keep staff and students safe as well as the communication that is involved during an emergency.

GOOGLE - In June, our Technology Department migrated our hosted Microsoft Exchange email, contacts, and calendars to Gmail. Working in the Google space has been a huge shift for our staff. We see the long-term benefits of this change and we are supporting each other as we navigate all of the wonderful things that Google workspace has to offer.

ACTIVITIES/ATHLETICS - Our fall sports teams have already started competing and our students' energy is contagious. Don't miss a home event! 

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT: KALI HURST



Kali Hurst, a rising senior at Parkland High School, was named the Distinguished Young Woman of Lehigh Valley. She competed for the title of Distinguished Young Woman of Pennsylvania. The girls were judged in many categories, including spirit, interview, selfexpression, talent, fitness, and academics. The girls also had to submit an essay prior to the competition explaining how they exemplify the five elements of the "Be Your Best Self" Program (Be Healthy, Be Involved, Be Studious, Be Ambitious, and Be Responsible), and how they are reaching out to young people encouraging them to make a commitment for setting high goals and striving to attain them.

While Kali did not become the next Distinguished Young Woman of Pennsylvania, she did walk away with \$800 in College Scholarship money and won three Awards, including the Scholastic Award (for academics), the Spirit Award, and the Be Your Best Self Essay Award! She also learned many valuable skills and met other talented young and older women.

This summer, Kali also attended an 11-day STEM camp called Operation Catapult at Rose Hulman Institute of Technology in Indiana. She and three teammates designed and created a Juggling Machine that won the BEST PROJECT Award. They had to work through the Design Process, causing them to continuously redesign their Juggling Machine until it worked. Kali stated that what she learned from Mr. Wacker, her PHS Engineering teacher, and Mrs. Miller, her PHS Physics teacher, helped her with the challenges at the camp. Congratulations, Kali!

BEST WISHES IN YOUR NEW POSITIONS!

SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES AND PROGRAMS, SERVICES FOR PROTECTED HANDICAPPED STUDENTS, AND SERVICES FOR GIFTED STUDENTS In compliance with state and federal law, notice is hereby given by the Parkland School District (PSD) that it conducts ongoing identification activities as a part of its school program for the purpose of identifying students who may be in need of special education supports and services (PA Code Chapter 14), services via section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (PA Code Chapter 15), and/or gifted education services (PA Code Chapter 16)

Special Education Services: If your child is identified by the District as possibly in need of such services, you will be notified of applicable procedures. Individualized services and programs are available for children who are determined to need specially designed instruction due to the following conditions: Autism; Deaf-blindness; Deafness; Emotional disturbance; Hearing impairment; Intellectual disability; Multiple disabilities; Orthopedic impairment; Other health impairment; Specific learning disability; Speech or language impairment; Traumatic brain injury; Visual impairment.

Section 504/Chapter 15 Services: Parkland School District will provide each protected handicapped student, without discrimination or cost to the student or family, those related aids, services or accommodations which are needed to provide equal opportunity to participate in and obtain the benefits of the school program and co- and non-curricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate to the student's abilities. In order to qualify as a protected handicapped student, the child must be of school age with a physical or mental disability which substantially limits or prohibits participation in or access to an aspect of the school program. These services and protections for "protected handicapped students" are distinct from those applicable to all eligible or exceptional students enrolled (or seeking enrollment) in special education

Chapter 16: While gifted is not included as one of the disabilities categories under the IDEA 2004, the Pennsylvania State Board of Education's regulations as set forth in Chapter 16, Special Education for Gifted dents, provide that gifted students are considered to be children with exceptionalities and are in need of specially designed instruction. If you believe that your school age child may be in need o education services and related programs, Section 504/Chapter 15 services, Chapter 16 services, screening, and evaluation processes are available to you at no cost, upon written request. Whether or not your child is enrolled in the district's public school program.

Consent: School entities cannot proceed with an evaluation, or with the initial provision of special education, Section 504/Chapter 15, Chapter 16, and related services, without the written consent of the parents. 
Requests for school-age evaluation and screening should be made in writing to the Director of Student Services, 1210 Springhouse Road, Allentown, PA 18104.

Preschool Services and Programs: Children age three through the age of admission to first grade are eligible for Early Intervention services if they have developmental delays and, as a result, need Special Education and related services. A child is considered to have a developmental delay when one of the following exists: (i) The child's score, on a developmental assessment device, on an assessment instrument which yields a score in months, indicates that the child is delayed by 25% of the child's chronological age in one or more developmental areas; or (ii) The child is delayed in one or more of the developmental areas, as documented by test performance of 1.5 standard deviations below the mean on standardized tests. Developmental areas include cognitive, communicative, physical, social/emotional and self-help.

Parents of young children with concerns about their child's seeing, hearing, learning, talking, moving about, manipulating objects, understanding, showing emotions, getting along with others, playing with toys, taking care of himself/herself, should contact the Carbon Lehigh Intermediate Unit – Project Connect at (610) 769-4111. Project Connect can provide information to parents about evaluations, programs, therapy, parent supports, and referral to community agencies at no cost to the parent.

FOUNDATION AWARDS 83 GRANTS TOTALING \$195,789 FOR 2022-2023 THIS IS THE MOST AMOUNT AWARDED TO DATE FOR A SINGLE YEAR OF GRANTS

As a culminating activity in the eleventh year of the Parkland School District Education Foundation's existence, the Foundation Board of Directors awarded 83 *Celebrate Innovation* grants totaling \$195,789 to the Parkland School District with the intent of enriching the current curriculum to benefit a wide range of students, staff and community members.

In total 83 grants were awarded, 24 were given to the 9 Elementary schools, 22 went to the 2 Middle Schools, 24 were awarded to Parkland High School, and 13 grants will serve the District at large.

A few examples of the grants awarded are:

- String Guest Artist *Time for Three* will do a workshop with orchestra students culminating with a community concert.
- Hydroponic gardens at Schnecksville third-grade students at Schnecksville will be given a hydroponic garden for each classroom to learn how to care for and observe the growth of plants.
- Biomedical Spring project The PHS Project Lead The Way Biomedical students will be given supplies to carry out a community service project for Parkland High School.
- Parkland TV Live for Groundhog Day PHS Parkland TV Productions students will go to Punxsutawney, PA, to report on Groundhog Day festivities. This is
 a valuable hands-on experience for our students interested in pursuing a career in TV, Film, Journalism and/or Communications.
- Camp Fowler for Middle School Students All 8th grade students will get to experience team building activities in preparation for high school.

Funding for the grants was made possible by staff contributions and by local businesses and community-wide support for the school district. In September, our staff pledged \$31,000 via payroll contributions and in May, our Distinguished Alumni event raised \$84,000 in support of the Foundation's mission. This is an exciting time for the Parkland Education Foundation to be investing in grants that enrich the teaching and learning for our staff and students. **The Parkland Education Foundation has given back more than \$1,538,267.74 to the Parkland School District since 2011**.

ABOUT THE CELEBRATE INNOVATION GRANT PROGRAM

The *Celebrate Innovation* grant program was introduced at the start of the 2011-12 school year to the Parkland staff. In January, the opportunity for staff to apply for a *Celebrate Innovation* grant occurred with a deadline of April 1. The Superintendent's Cabinet scored the grants for "need," the Teaching and Learning Department scored the grants for "fit" and a committee of Foundation volunteers reviewed the grants for clarity, purpose, measurable benefits, collaboration between parents, teachers and other community members, sustainability, and the range of people that the grant would benefit. The rubric offered the possibility for a grant application to score a total of 100 points. In total, 99 grant applications were filed by staff this year.


