#### **Course Description**

American Literature is a literature-based course which is generally engaged in 11<sup>th</sup> grade. The usual prerequisites are mastery of Literature II and Writing II outcomes or the equivalent. In exceptional cases, students may engage in American Literature if the Writing II and/or Literature II outcomes are not mastered.

The content of American Literature encompasses a historical examination in chronological order of American literature. This includes the study of journals, personal narratives, documents, speeches, short stories, plays, poetry, and novels.

Mastery of the course requires the completion of ten units. There are eight "Essential Units" and two "Selective Units", which are chosen by the teacher.

In addition, in order to prepare students adequately with college-level writing and speaking skills, many Essential Outcomes include specific writing and speaking outcomes in various genres.

### Course Grading

**Assignment Grading** There are two types of assignments:

- 1) Formative assignments to help the student learn will be graded as "Complete" or "Incomplete"
- 2) Summative assignments that will be used to determine whether the student has= mastered the necessary skills for that unit. These will be marked as "A-level mastery" for those mastered at a high level, "B-level mastery" for those mastered at the standard level, or "Attempted" for those assignments submitted but not yet at the mastery level.

# **Unit Grading**

Units are graded at A, B or D. An A or B will be based off of the rubrics at the start of each unit. A student may receive a D for a unit grade if they have plagiarized material (please read further on this in the QVS handbook) or if they have failed to show sufficient effort to complete the unit.

# **Grading Turn Around Times**

My goal is to provide you with timely feedback on your work.

1) During the week, I will endeavor to provide feedback/grades within 24 hours.

2) If you submit an assignment Friday, over the weekend, or during a QVS break, I will return it after 24 hours of a working day. (Keep in mind that we may be in different time zones so this may impact when you receive feedback).

3) If you submit a large amount of work or many students happen to submit at the same time, this may not be possible. In this instance, I will communicate this fact with you and keep you updated on my progress on getting you feedback.

# **June Grading**

Because Mastery Learning allows students to upgrade their work and, to some extent, work at their own pace, there may be opportunities to turn work in after the initial due date. However, in order to ensure that teachers can provide sufficient feedback and have time to grade all work before final grades are due, students may not complete more than 2 units in June.

# **Course content**

Essential Units:

Below are the major, summative assignments for each unit. There will be additional assignments to help instruct and reinforce the content of each unit. These are brief descriptions. Within the course, the student will see full instructions.

**E01** – Early American Writing: Native American Literature, Literature of Discovery, and Puritan Literature

**Summative Assignments:** Analyses of written and oral pieces of literature, presentation comparing myths, poem written in the style of Puritan poetry with analysis

- **E02** \*The Age of Reason: The Revolutionary War and The Enlightenment **Summative Assignments:** Essay, speech, journal entry regarding aphorisms
- E03 \*Celebrating the Individual: Romanticism and Transcendentalism
  Summative Assignments: Literary analyses of essays and poetry, essay on Romantic ideals
- E04 The Dark Side of Individualism: (Gothic Literature)

Summative Assignments: Presentation on Poe's work

- E05 \*An Age of Transition: Civil War Literature, Realism, Naturalism, and Regionalism
  Summative Assignments: Analyses of various literature, personal narrative, journal entry Regarding values of Realist and Naturalistic writers
- E06 \*A Changing Awareness: The Harlem Renaissance and Modernism
  Summative Assignments: Analysis of various pieces of literature, project (student choice) on the development of Harlem Renaissance, literary analysis essay
- E07 \*In-Depth Study: (American Author, Work, and/or Literary Movement)
  Summative Assignments: Independent research, essay, presentation (all of these will be connected to the same, student-chosen topic)
- **E08** Contemporary Literature: (Modern American Drama, Responses to War, Civil Rights and Protest Literature)

**Summative Assignments:** Chronological survey of American literature, analysis of various pieces of literature, presentation of this information (student-chosen format)

Selective Units:

**S01** – Puritan Based Fiction/Study

Summative Assignments: Literary analysis essay on The Crucible

**S04** – Focus on American Fiction

**Summative Assignments:** In-depth study on specific author of student choice (with choice in final presentation format)
