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

### WHAT DO WE MEAN BY EXCEPTIONAL EDUCATION AND A SENSE OF PURPOSE?

Each day, our students are intellectually stimulated in the classroom with big questions, healthy debate, and thought-provoking conversations, enabling them to respectfully address global issues and everyday challenges.

To this end, SD is leading the way in redefining the metrics of achievement and graduating inspired students equipped to create a better world.



# Meaning and Purpose

From preparing for a Global Studies test to memorizing algebraic formulas, in academic activities it's easy to lose sight of the point. Our students' desire for more meaning and connection to the real world is spot on; Dr. Bill Damon, director of the Stanford Center on Adolescence, defines purpose as "the intention to accomplish something that is both meaningful to the self and consequential to the world." In short, he says, "Having purpose is fundamental to cultivating a meaningful life because it connects you to your raisons d'être, the things that matter deeply to you and which give your life direction." Partnering with Stanford University, SD has implemented the PROJECT WAYFINDER curriculum, which provides a framework for students to make connections between what they study in the classroom and the real world. In this context, learning takes on a deeper meaning, and when classes are both content and purpose driven, students are highly motivated and invested in their learning. SD's values-based education means that "purpose" is more than just choosing a path. We believe that "finding one's purpose" means seeing oneself in the greater context of humanity, bridging differences, and serving others.

To see how purpose, coupled with our values of **study**, **reflection**, **community**, and **service**, enhances the student experience, look closely below at the coursework in our Department of Philosophy, Ethics, and World Religions.



respect, and empathy for individuals and groups living both in our own community and globally. We begin with the question of why "where" matters, considering how human life has been shaped and altered by unique environments. We examine the distribution of the human population around the planet, investigate what contributes to migration, and assess how migration can impact language, culture, and religion. This sets the stage for a deep dive into the origins of race and ethnicity and an exploration of the unique histories of Native Americans, Asian Americans, Black/African Americans, and Chicanx/Latinx peoples.

GLOBAL STUDIES cultivates understanding,

During the first semester of MYTH AND MEANING, 10th graders study the philosophies in Hebrew and Christian scriptures, the Quran, the Bhagavad Gita, the Buddhist sutras, and the Tao Te Ching. The goal is to arm our students—the leaders of tomorrow-with the tools, empathy, and understanding to view the world more holistically. The second semester is dedicated to **Project Wayfinder**, a purpose-driven curriculum developed in partnership with Stanford University's d.school, wherein we examine "wayfinding" as a metaphor for connecting to intrinsic motivation. The toolkit draws upon psychological research and brain science as well as age-old practices from native traditions.

In **SOCIAL JUSTICE**, students delve into current and historical ideas that promote a just, diverse society and challenge injustice and inequality. Students investigate global issues such as discrimination, human trafficking, food insecurity, and climate change. Inspired by what they learn, students create a social justice initiative called their ROSE project (Real Opportunities for Service in Education) in which they can take actionable steps to make a difference locally, regionally, or worldwide. Upon completion, they present their final project to faculty, classmates, and families.

# College Prep

At SD, you'll embrace learning as an intentional and active process. You'll graduate with a **purpose-driven, scholarly mindset, prepared to pursue your college and career goals** with confidence. At its core, SD's college preparatory curriculum offers a robust choice of cutting-edge classes tailored to each student's unique educational path. With **110 courses and 31 Advanced Placement and Honors offerings** to choose from, students are inspired to learn through multiple lenses and to engage in a rigorous course of study that provides appropriate challenge, depth, and balance.

How do you learn? Today's digitally networked world puts a premium on independent thinking and creativity. As educators, we embrace this concept, knowing that the traditional educational paradigm of rote, standardized learning does not serve our students nor allow for their unique voices. At SD, you'll find that innovative, inquiry-based learning is the cornerstone of our academic program, preparing students for a quickly changing future.

This approach, driven by **STEAM** pedagogy (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math), sees not distinct fields of study but rather "interdependent" learning based on real-world applications. (For example, using a mathematical model to theorize how a vaccine might affect COVID-19 transmission.) Utilizing design thinking in both the classroom and in our 3D Makers Lab (a program with the apt tagline "Dream it. Design it. Do it."), students start with an essential question-"What is the goal?"-and then learn and design backward from there. Twenty students may propose 20 different solutions. Exploring through inquiry and experiencing the world through real problems to solve—that's where the learning happens. Every day our students research, design, write, equate, build, fail, try again, solve, discover, and drive innovation. This cutting-edge academic approach literally creates new neural links that optimize those aha moments and inspires our



students to love learning. As Daniel H. Pink, author of A Whole New Mind: Why Right-Brainers Will Rule the Future, writes, "The future belongs to a very different kind of person with a very different kind of mind—creators and empathizers, pattern recognizers and meaning makers."

**SCHEDULE** To optimize inquiry-based learning and to allow appropriate time for AP and Honors courses, our school week runs on a modified block schedule. Every class meets for 50 minutes

on Monday, Thursday, and Friday, with additional 70-minute blocks on either Tuesday or Wednesday. Students and teachers alike report that our thoughtfully conceived schedule provides time for deeper exploration, more creativity, the use of varied learning modalities, purpose-driven conversations, and the ability to successfully balance academics and extracurriculars. As a result, SD is definitively a college preparatory school, enabling students to hone their time management skills while broadening their minds and finding meaning.

# Student Support

Every day, we empower students to find their voice and develop agency in and outside the classroom. We prioritize both the emotional and academic well-being of each of our students, ensuring a balanced and enduring learning experience. The Student Support and Wellness Team, composed of our Assistant Head of School for K-12 Academics, Director of Learning Services, Director of Counseling, Director of Health Services, Academic Dean, Dean of Students, and Class Deans, collaborates closely to support our students, parents, and faculty. With teen wellness of paramount importance, the team meets each week to review coursework, student questions, and concerns and to collaborate on the best ways to support student learning and health.

The more students can understand, embrace, and articulate their learning profiles, the better they can execute on their individualized support plan. We work closely with families to arm students with the tools necessary to excel in our rigorous academic program.

### INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARS PROGRAM

We recognize that our international students' circumstances are unique, as they are learning and growing in an unfamiliar environment while speaking a new language. To support them, we provide wraparound services and create fun, meaningful experiences that allow full immersion into American culture. Advisory groups, sports teams, participation in the arts, leadership, and clubs are just a few of the ways students can connect and build community. To assure academic success, we place our Ninth Grade non-native English speakers in Literature & Composition and College Preparatory English Language 1, both of which are classes in the English Language Learning Program. Students entering Grade 10 are placed into English 10, and if needed, non-native speakers may also be placed into College Prep English Language Workshop (based on their proficiency level from their ninth grade coursework and/or testing). Additionally, all non-native English speakers can receive drop-in support for English reading and writing tasks in any subject, during weekly Writing Workshops.

# Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI)

We recognize that diversity is a relative and complex idea to define and quantify. We value the full representation and engagement of individuals whose differences include but are not limited to age, ethnicity, family makeup, gender, learning style, physical ability, race, religion, sexual orientation, and socioeconomic status. In addition, we embrace a diversity of thought, culture, philosophy, and all that may be unseen but may also subject a person to preferential or disadvantageous treatment.

As a community, we are steadfast in our commitment to modeling for our students how to advocate for social, racial, and environmental justice. Our faculty and staff continually seek to expand K-12 student understanding of the guiding principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion in developmentally appropriate ways. # College Counseling

### COLLEGE COUNSELING AT SAN DOMENICO

In 2022, our 86 seniors submitted over 860 applications to 227 colleges around the world. As a result of their intentional approach, 94 percent were admitted to at least one of their top five college choices, an outcome representative of SD's commitment


to both academic preparation and purpose-driven postsecondary planning. The Class of 2022 netted over \$4.7 million in merit or talent based scholarships, a testament to their academic, artistic, and athletic capabilities. Our comprehensive College Counseling Program spans four years, guiding each student through a mindful process of self-advocacy, identification of interests, and goal-setting. Each step of the way, students are encouraged to embrace their curiosity and seek academic and extracurricular challenges that will shine a light on their potential and their unique stories. In freshman and sophomore years, our college counselors form strong partnerships with students and parents and encourage students to develop their interests by joining clubs and engaging in intellectual challenges. In junior and senior years, students participate in individual planning meetings with our college counselors. These one-on-one sessions focus on identifying personal goals, developing a reflective college list, discussing and planning for standardized testing, and ultimately creating an application plan unique to each student's priorities. In addition, all juniors and seniors are

enrolled in a "College Application Process" course that covers topics including application review, planning college visits, developing interviewing skills, researching financial aid and scholarships, and essay writing.

### SD RELATIONSHIPS WITH COLLEGES

Our college counseling office hosts admissions representatives from more than 80 colleges and universities across the United States and beyond. As such, students have the opportunity to meet with members of college admissions staff to learn about individual colleges. Additionally, our college counselors foster relationships with college admissions offices through regular college campus tours and attendance at national conferences. As a result, colleges across the country learn about our distinctive programs, and our counselors gain insight into post-secondary educational opportunities and trends.

MINDFUL COLLEGE PLANNING is a natural extension of each student's San Domenico education. With our combination of rigorous academics, award-winning visual and performing arts, competitive athletics, and extensive extracurricular and service learning opportunities, we graduate students who understand the importance of the right college fit and who are well prepared for the demands of college and their future careers.





# SD Boarding

Welcoming 140 high school students from the Bay Area and around the globe, our residential life program (aka "boarding") differentiates SD as one of the most diverse and international high schools in the Bay Area. With students from 25 different countries enriching our community with their broad range of perspectives, meaningful discussions naturally unfold. We are proud that on a daily basis, formal classroom discussions and casual social interactions are changing the way our students see the world. When we discuss community, our students are able to see firsthand that the world extends far beyond Marin County. With our campus population's country and U.S. state count growing each year, our students develop rich, lifelong friendships and increased cultural competency, sensitivity, and awareness.

**Regional Boarding** has become a popular option for Bay Area families who want their students to delve into

their academic, artistic, and athletic passions in a safe and nurturing environment. Forty percent of our boarding students hail from cities within an hour of our front gate. With a transportation system that connects Marin, the East Bay, and San Francisco, regional boarders have the option to live on campus during the week and then return home for the weekends or even an evening if they choose. The flexibility of the regional boarding program, coupled with the quality programming and activities that define the boarding experience, are what make this option so appealing to Bay Area families.

Boarding students take full advantage of what campus offers—whether it's spending time after dinner in our Visual Arts studio, taking a dip in the pool after a game of outdoor basketball, or tackling one of the 20 miles of hiking trails originating from campus, boarding life is vibrant and FUN! Our three residence halls, North, East, and West,

are centrally located on campus and offer all the amenities of home, including common lounge spaces at the end of each hall and well-appointed double and individual rooms. Students develop camaraderie within their halls through friendly competitions, weekly meetings, and social activities. Further enhancing the dorm community, many of our day students participate in our popular "20 Nights" program. Day students are invited, at no extra cost, to spend up to 20 nights in the dorms throughout the school year. So whether you have a late basketball game, an intense play rehearsal, or a big science project, or you just can't say goodbye to your best friend who boards, our "20 Nights" program allows you to stay the night with schoolmates, either in their dorm room or in one of the spacious common areas. With breakfast, dinner, and a fully stocked "snack shack," day students find their place pretty quickly in the residential program.

### A longtime educational leader in sustainable practices,


San Domenico offers a comprehensive K-12 ecoliteracy curriculum. Our school and campus promote environmental stewardship by giving students the opportunity to work and learn outdoors and gain reverence and respect for the land.

### **TRANSPORTATION**

SD is an Emerald Green Award winner with the National Center for Safe Routes to School. As part of San Domenico's commitment to sustainability,



we provide one of the most extensive school bus systems in the Bay Area, including service to San Francisco, the East Bay, and Marin County. The bus is available to all students and riding is included in yearly tuition.



**GARDEN OF HOPE** A living laboratory for students and faculty, our Garden of Hope is home to a preeminent seed-to-table program, serving as a model for Bay Area schools. The garden includes a fully equipped outdoor classroom and kitchen, pizza oven, chicken coop, pond, and performance space and is the site of our beloved annual Garden Fair.





**ORGANIC FOOD** 

Locally grown, organic food makes student lunches and snacks both delicious and healthy. Our proximity to an array of local farmers, growers, and producers, as well as our very own garden, gives our chefs a bounty from which to prepare meals. A daily midmorning soup is a long-standing tradition at SD and is enjoyed by students and staff alike.



### FAIR TRADE SCHOOL DESIGNATION

Thanks to the dedication of and collaboration between our High School Social Justice Club,

our Green Team, and our campus culinary team, we recently enjoyed the honor of receiving a Fair Trade School designation. As a Fair Trade School, SD teaches students to drive demand for ethical consumption and to understand the connection between our food supply and the farmers and workers who grow our food. The designation provides a valuable framework to introduce the principles of fair trade, including the stance against child labor, and a chance to explore fair trade's impact on children and communities.



#### **SOLAR PANELS**

A San Domenico High School student's passion for renewable energy, inspired by her AP Environmental Science class and Senior ROSE project, led to the installment of the 2,358 photovoltaic solar panels that offset our campus energy consumption costs by approximately 70 percent each year. Our solar panels are a visible reminder of SD's commitment to sustainability and to the forward-thinking ideas of our students.



San Domenico is a

recipient of the prestigious U.S. Department of **Education Green Ribbon Award** for excellence in sustainability practices and the first Marin school to receive this award. This important recognition is the culmination of nearly 20 years of passion, persistence, and teamwork across our entire school to make sustainable practices an everyday reality on our campus.





## **Athletics**

At San Domenico, we believe the athletic playing field is an extension of the class-room—an environment where many of life's important skills are learned and nurtured.

**ACHIEVEMENT** In 2021-22, ten SD teams qualified for the BCL West playoffs and eight SD teams advanced to the NCS playoffs. In addition, a record 35 of our student-athletes received 43 All-League awards. And as if that's not enough, following in the footsteps of our men's basketball team who won the NorCal and State Division titles in 2019, our equally impressive women's basketball team won this year's NorCal and State Division titles, while our badminton team took home the BCL West League title, and one of our swimmers qualified for the state championship. It's an exciting time to be an SD Panther!

**COACHING** Our student-athletes have access to some of the best coaches in Northern California. All of our coaches have either coached or played at





the collegiate level. Coaching accolades include Positive Coaching Alliance Double Gold Standard, three State Championships, and seven BCL Championships. Additionally, 90 percent of our coaches work full-time on campus, so students enjoy access to them outside traditional practice times. Our outstanding coaching staff guides and supports each athlete at every level, which is one of the reasons over 70 percent of SD students participate in athletics.

### GUIDANCE TO THE NEXT

**LEVEL** In addition to communicating with our college counselors to help our student-athletes play at the next level, our coaches guide students to create player profiles, find the right college, and navigate athletic scholarship offerings.

### SPORTSMANSHIP At SD,

athletics offers positive, character-building experiences that support SD's core values. Our coaches are committed to the Double-Goal Philosophy, which holds that "winning is important, but teaching life lessons through athletics is most important." With this in mind, our student-athletes approach their athletic commitments and rigorous academics with balance, foresight, and dedication to holistic success.

# **OPPORTUNITY** San Domenico provides athletes the opportunity to compete in elite Bay Area leagues and clubs. As members of the Bay Area Conference (BAC) and the Bay Counties League (BCL) Western Division, with 29 teams in 14 sports, we provide students

with a wealth of athletic opportunities.

## The Arts



offers one of the most extensive Digital Arts programs in the San Francisco Bay Area, with classes in digital animation, digital music, photography, digital arts, and game design, and a four-year film program that offers college-level opportunities in narrative and documentary filmmaking along with advanced opportunities in 2D/3D visual effects, music composition, cinematography, and screenwriting. Through the use of the latest technology and by applying the grammar of digital media, students produce both individual works that convey

their personal interests and collaborative pieces that synthesize their learning into larger productions. Signature to this practice is our Children's Book & Animation experience, where students across grade levels and art disciplines collaborate to write, illustrate, and produce a children's book and accompanying animation, with original voice acting, editing, and music.

Digital Arts courses emphasize both core and personalized learning, teaching the concepts, skills, and nomenclature that professionals use in the field. While we are proud that our Middle and High School students frequently have their films accepted into festivals across the country, ultimately our students' personal growth, agency, and newfound creative expression are the greatest rewards of all.

VISUAL ARTS Our Visual Arts building is situated along the banks of a seasonal creek, affording painters, sketchers, and sculptors the opportunity to draw inspiration directly from nature. The Art department's unique curriculum explores art history, technique, individual style, and the important role of artists who reflect through their work current events, spirituality, beauty, politics, and more. Our four-year Visual Arts program, including AP Studio Art, allows students to find their unique creative voice and hone visual literacy skills in a supportive learning environment. As in a college art school experience, our studios are open after school, in the evenings, and on weekends to students looking for more time for their craft.

### PERFORMING ARTS AND MUSICAL THEATRE

We are proud to have one of the most respected and innovative theatre arts programs in the San Francisco Bay Area. We annually produce two plays, a musical, and senior-directed one-act plays and are intermittently among the select schools invited to perform at the renowned Fringe Festival in Edinburgh, Scotland. For students who cite theatre or theatre tech as one of many interests, we offer the flexibility of participating in productions without also committing to the drama course curriculum. With this range of opportunities, every SD student who has a desire to grow as a thespian will have ample opportunity to do so.



DANCE at San Domenico explores a wide range of techniques, from ballet to modern, hip-hop, flamenco, and jazz. With instruction offered during the school day or after school, opportunities for dance abound. Beyond technique, students gain significant choreography experience, learning to express themselves by creating their own pieces. Students of all interest levels and abilities learn to improve their pirouettes, flex their toes, ground their beats, or find their center in SD's renowned dance program.

### THE SAN DOMENICO MUSIC CONSERVATORY

is home to over 30 professional music faculty members, allowing us to offer an array of options, from our award-winning pre-professional classical strings program (Virtuoso Program) to our contemporary jazz, pop, and rock ensembles in our Band Workshop; from digital music, composition and theory, chorus, and a cappella ensembles to private and group lessons in strings, wind instruments, piano, voice,

guitar, and percussion.

Designed to serve a range of students, from those picking up an instrument for the first time to those striving for a career in music, our music program offers mentoring by accomplished faculty and master classes taught by guest artists. Our stateof-the-art facility includes multiple rehearsal studios and practice rooms, each fully equipped with a piano and some with keyboard labs or complete band setups, all available for

student use until 10 p.m.

Upon graduation, SD music students often matriculate to conservatory programs such as The Juilliard School, Berklee College of Music, USC Thornton School of Music, Oberlin, and Eastman School of Music.

### SD'S VIRTUOSO PROGRAM

offers a specialized track for advanced classical string studies. Focusing on an orchestral and chamber music repertoire, this by-audition program offers merit scholarships to high school students with the discipline and talent to pursue music at a pre-professional level in an academically challenging environment. VP students have the opportunity to master their craft both individually and in an ensemble, with ample instructional time and performance opportunities. Weekly, they participate in two chamber orchestra rehearsals, a sectional rehearsal, a quartet rehearsal, quartet coaching, and private lessons.



# Beyond the Classroom

### **CLUBS & PERKs**

Weekly PERKs (Passion, Engagement, Reflection, and Knowledge) are tailored to students' interests not otherwise covered in the standard SD curriculum. Classes range from Hip-Hop to Speech Club to Model United Nations. Students do not receive a grade in these courses, allowing the block to be purely experiential.

### **OUTINGS & EXPLORATION**

ORIENTATION TRIPS In keeping with one of our core San Domenico values, we begin building community before classes even begin. The orientation trips during the first week of school give students the opportunity to connect and reconnect with their classmates in preparation for a supportive and constructive year. While the SD campus is remarkable, our orientation trips allow students to see more of the stunning greater Bay Area. From exploring the beaches of Santa Cruz to rafting on the American River, these are bonding experiences students revel in.

SPRING DISCOVERY At SD, we recognize that learning occurs in a variety of ways, through multiple mediums. During our Spring Discovery Program students participate in immersive, project-based, experiential learning outside the classroom. These opportunities allow students to stretch their limits, deepen their sense of community, and broaden their knowledge through hands-on, real-world experiences. In the past, Spring Discovery trips have included San Francisco Bay Area service projects, outdoor adventures on Catalina Island, Marine Biology studies in Costa Rica, Performing Arts workshops in Ashland, Oregon, and introductions to the digital industry in Silicon Valley.


