Dear Parents and Guardians

How quickly the last week seems to have passed! It is a great joy to have everyone back in school and I had forgotten just how uplifting it is to hear the sound of laughing girls! While I suspect that no one is quite as excited to be back as I am, the rain doesn't seem to have dampened anyone's spirits and noise levels are definitely back to normal! We have much to celebrate and be grateful for, and so much to look forward to over the coming year, as we celebrate 150 years at Mayfield.

A great deal has been packed into the first few days, especially for those who are new to the school – both girls and staff. The school roll is at its largest for many years and it is a pleasure to welcome so many new faces. I am delighted at how well they seem to have settled in, and look forward to discerning the unique offerings and perspectives each person will bring to our community over the coming years. We are settling back into the rhythm of School life and want to ensure that we are back, more or less, to pre-COVID life or at least the best bits of it! Meeting together in person continues to be a novelty and a joy, so I look forward to seeing many of you at the evenings for parents of girls in Year 7 (**on Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup> September at 18:30**), Year 9 (**on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> September at 18:30**) and Year 12 (**on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> September at 18:00**). These evenings provide a great opportunity, not only for you to hear and understand more about how and what your daughter will be learning over the course of the year, but also to meet the parents of her new (and old) friends. I strongly encourage you to come along for what will be both an informative and jolly evening. Please don't worry if you feel you do not yet know anyone: this is your chance to make new friends, and there will be many who feel exactly the same!

This year we want to help girls begin to focus not so much on themselves, as on those who are less fortunate: providing more opportunities and encouragement for each member of the school community to be involved in action as well as words. As part of this, on **Friday 16<sup>th</sup> September** the Chaplaincy is hosting Debbie and Carol from the Sandra Jones Children's Centre and Malibongwe Primary School in Bulawayo, Zimbabwe, (this year's Whole School Charity). The SJC is a sanctuary for young girls in crisis, and is currently home to around 90 girls, from new-born to 20 years old. From **18:00-20:00** there will be an opportunity to meet the ladies and hear their Centre's story, which I hope will help the girls better understand and determine how best we can offer support.
