

## **General Scholarship Information**

## \*\*\*\*Start keeping a file now that includes: your extra-curricular activities, community service, awards and recognitions, and leadership experience.\*\*\*\*

### **TYPES OF SCHOLARSHIPS:**

• ACADEMIC - Scholarships are based on students GPA and ACT score (index number). Index numbers for scholarships vary in each college and for each award.

•**TALENT** - Scholarships awarded in several areas such as music, dance, marching band, arts, forensics/debate, newspaper staff, rodeo and varsity athletics. Each department has individual criteria. Amounts for talent scholarships vary. Applicants should complete a scholarship application and make arrangements with department heads for auditions.

• LEADERSHIP - Scholarships for students who have shown outstanding leadership in high school and the community. Students should be prepared to serve on leadership committees.

• DEPARTMENTAL - Scholarships are awarded to students excelling in specific areas who show potential for academic success in a chosen major. Students apply to their chosen department.

• ACHIEVEMENT - Most schools offer scholarship money to Regional and State Sterling Scholar winners. Most schools offer scholarship money to students who have achieved National Merit winner status which is determined by a score on the PSAT/NMSQT.

• AMBASSADOR - Many schools offer one year tuition waiver, student fees and stipend, renewable up to 4 years. Students assist with recruitment, orientation and student life functions.


