



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JCS 1:1 iPad Initiative Enters Second Year in Jasper Schools

Following the 2013 launch of the JCS 1:1 iPad Initiative in the Jasper City Schools, students and teachers continue to expand use of iPad technology in Jasper schools. During the 2013-2014 year, students in grades 3 through 8 experienced online benchmark assessments taking place on their own iPads. While the State Department of Education made possible the *Performance Series* and *Achievement Series* assessment options to determine student placement and diagnose student learning for appropriate instructional planning, the Jasper City Board of Education made possible the technology devices that allowed students to test individually in their own classrooms.

Veteran WHS teacher Beth Kennedy has just moved into the role of Technology Integration Specialist for Jasper City Schools. She recently shared just some of the ways iPads have revolutionized the teaching of Advanced Placement Biology at Walker High School.



iPads are incorporated into the science classroom during AP Biology experiments to collect and analyze data. The students are able to use a Bluetooth connection to interface their iPads with Pasco scientific probeware to measure the changing levels of carbon dioxide and oxygen during a cellular respiration experiment. The data is gathered and placed in tables and graphs for the students to examine and analyze the results of their experiments.

2014 Seniors Offered More Than Three Million Dollars in Scholarships

2014 Walker High School Seniors were offered more than three million dollars in college scholarships. The group included 190 graduates who received their diplomas on May 23, 2014. Academic scholarships were awarded to 66% of the class, and 92% indicated plans to pursue postsecondary education. Honors diplomas were awarded to 27 students. Three students were ranked #1 in the class: Madison Redmill, Jacob Runyan, and Dustin Steffan. The class also included 21 students with GPAs of 4.0 or above.

T.R. Simmons Elementary Students Spell Way to Success




Sixteen excellent spellers from T.R. Simmons

ACT's August, 2013 release of composite scores for the nation's schools, districts, and states showed the 2012-2013 composite score among the 124 Walker High School students who took the ACT was 21.5, which was slightly higher than the 21.3 composite posted by WHS students in 2011-2012. The 2012-2013 composite was also higher than the national composite of 20.9 and the state composite of 20.4.


ACT 30+ Students Recognized at WHS

After a thorough examination of the Jasper City Schools on February 2-5, 2014, a five-person AdvancED district accreditation review team presented a positive report to the Jasper City Board of Education at a 2PM meeting of the Jasper City Board of Education on February 5. Lead evaluator Mary Anne Hipp of Lake Charles, Louisiana, told the Board, "You have done extremely well." The school district was recommended for continuing district accreditation.
