


Jasper Schools Still "Making the Mark" in Student Achievement

Measures of student learning across the Jasper City School District during the 2010-2011 year show that JCS students continue to "make the mark" in student achievement.

2011 SAT10 Increases

- + 4.83 percentile points in math
- + 1.34 percentile points in reading



JCS students in grades 3-8 took the state-mandated **Stanford 10 Achievement Test (SAT10)** in Spring, 2011. The chart above shows that in math Jasper students scored a percentile of 70.83 in 2011, a 4.83 increase over the 2010 district performance. In reading, JCS students scored at a percentile of 65.5 in 2011, a 1.34 point increase over the 2010 district performance. Spring, 2011, marked Alabama's final administration of the SAT10. All the Ways We Learn in Jasper City Schools






Fifth Grade Seventh Grade







ARMT READING






Alabama High School Graduation Examination (AHSGE) - The percentage of twelfth graders passing each section of the Alabama High School Graduation Exam (AHSGE) is shown in the following chart. The AHSGE includes five subject-area tests students must pass to receive a high school diploma. The exam covers required high school core content. Once a student passes a subject-area test, the student does not have to repeat that test. No later than the spring of tenth grade, students have an opportunity to attempt all five tests.





American College Test (ACT) - ACT's annual release of assessment data for schools across the nation shows the average ACT composite score of students in the 2011 Walker High School graduating class was 21.2, which surpassed the national average of 21.1 and the state average of 20.3. WHS results continued a consistent trend since 2000, when all WHS average scores have been within a 1.0 range, from 20.6 to 21.6.

At Maddox Middle School, the *Duke University Talent Identification Program (TIP)* recognized 61 seventh graders who scored in the 95th percentile on the math or reading subtest of the *2011 SAT10*. These students can now take the *ACT* college entrance exam as seventh graders. The Duke program seeks to identify academically talented seventh graders based on standardized test scores and invites students to take the *ACT* or the *SAT* college entrance exam as seventh graders, which allows students greater insight into their future academic potential.

At **Memorial Park Elementary**, eligible fifth graders are inducted into the MPS chapter of the *National Elementary School Honor Society*. To be eligible, students must make grades no lower than an A during their entire fourth grade year. Students in the *National Elementary School Honor Society* perform many service activities, including mentoring students at North Highlands School.





Students at **North Highlands School** collected supplies to assist victims of the April 27, 2011, tornadoes. As "pick-up partners," they provided community leadership and learned through serving.



West Jasper Elementary students in grades 4 and 5 helped JCS elementary art teacher Justin Lyle paint Smokey and Sleepy, two members of the Walker County Arts Alliance's 50-Mule Team Public Art Project. The mules are now on permanent display in the courtyard at the school. Dr. Jan Westerman's Pulmonary and Sleep Associates and Rest of Your Life Sleep Evaluation Center sponsored the project.

Twenty-eight eligible **Walker High School** students participated in *Walker Workshop*, a flexible scheduling opportunity to take one class online during the second semester of the 2010-2011 year. Students were able to use a block of time several days a week to job shadow at a local business, volunteer in a community program, or take a college course. Anna Barrera, a 2011 senior, said, "I appreciate it because it gave me the opportunity to look into careers that I might want to pursue."

Fiscal Conservation Preserves JCS Programs

The annual report for the year ending 2010-2011 showed an ending balance of just over two-and-a-half months of operating reserve in the general fund. The school district has experienced four years of reduced funding from state and federal revenue sources. Proration has been declared by the governor in each of these years. It has taken a great deal of fiscal oversight to maintain an operating reserve at the reported level. The board members and staff of the Jasper City Schools are to be commended for this accomplishment, thereby allowing the students of the district to receive a consistent level of education void of great programmatic reductions.
