TEACHER of the Year



Betsy O'Neill, the special education teacher at Shepaug Valley Partnership, was honored to accept the 2021-2022 Teacher of the Year accolade and addressed her colleagues at convocation in August with the following message.

Think back to when you were younger without a care in the world. Middle school snuck up on us and shortly thereafter it was high school. During middle and high school, we were asked to think about our future. Our parents, family members, teachers and counselors wanted us to have some sort of an idea. Most likely you were asked several times, "What do you want to do when you graduate?" We avoided that question because it was a tough one. At 13, we may have had a slight idea and by the age of 17 we were supposed to know exactly what we wanted for our future.

Did you know what your future held for you? This is my story. I'm a 70's kid. It was a generation that was all about tube socks, shag rugs, Jaws, Schoolhouse Rock, and Atari. My nickname in the neighborhood was "Honey" because the young kids flocked to me like bees to honey. We played school for hours in my front yard. Back then my future occupation was pretty much a given. I knew what I wanted to be when I grew up. I wanted to be a teacher because it seemed fun to me. It was around that time in my life that I realized my passion was to work with children. It was then that I set my sights on going to college to become a teacher.

Sometimes things happen that put a kink in our life plan. When I was 13, my father passed away unexpectedly at the age of 37. My mother was thrown into the workforce. I still remember what a challenge it was. My sister and I helped with the bills, chores, and watched our brother. Money was tight, so college didn't seem like a possibility. Mom sat us down one day and told us that we would go to college, it wasn't an option NOT to go. She wanted us to have the security that she was struggling to find. I remember her saying, "We will figure out the money", and told us not to worry. I knew that \$4,300 for my first year at Southern [Connecticut State University] was eight mortgage payments. Mom was right; we figured it out. Sometimes the worst things that happen in life can put you on a path that leads you to the best things.

My question for you is what is your why? Why did you become a teacher? Was it because of your love for children or maybe it was because you have a love for learning? When you think about your why, I would guarantee that you think back to that one teacher that made an impact on your life. The teachers that we remember when we were younger are those that let us be ourself, inspired and believed in us. My inspiration was my sociology teacher at New Milford High School, Ms. Vallombroso. Ms. Val, as we fondly called her, was enthusiastic and compassionate. She was always happy and had a forever smile that welcomed us into her classroom. When participating in class, she allowed us the opportunity to draw from our own experiences which made learning exciting and fun.

Our purpose is to take what's inside of us and focus our efforts on each student. This gives us the determination to move forward and take risks which means we become our best selves. We take each child into our classroom at the beginning of the year and move them to where we know they can be at the end of the year and this is how they become their best selves. Be that teacher with purpose and take on challenges that inspire you. Be who you needed when you were younger.

When I think about my why, it's always been about making a lifelong impact and making each student feel important and good about themselves. My biggest wish is that my students share with me that I made a difference in their lives and made them laugh a little. Our personality is our greatest asset! When you're feeling overwhelmed, overstressed and overworked, remember your why. Be proud about the path you have chosen. It's a powerful one, you hold great influence and the ability to impact lives.

Maybe you're wondering what became of my neighborhood group. Recently I found out that all three kids in my little school group went to college; two went into education, one a university professor, the other a middle school teacher. In July we were out to dinner with our son's future inlaws when I heard, "Hey Miss A, what's up?" I glanced to my left and standing there was a student that I taught at Washington Primary School. He's now 32; looks exactly the same, just a little taller! He looked at everyone and said, "This lady made school fun!" That, my friends, is what makes it all worthwhile.

Be sure to laugh with your students. Regardless of what life hands you; be strong, follow your heart, and always remember your why. Here's to a great year!

2021 AP Scholars

Advanced Placement (AP), through the College Board, provides students the opportunity to take college level courses and earn credit at the collegiate level. Of our 57 graduates, 43 or 75% of the class completed one or more Advanced Placement (AP) courses and, additionally, 21 or 37% completed four or more AP courses during their high school career.

After another successful AP testing season, 16 students in the Class of 2021 were recognized as AP Scholars.

The AP Scholar program recognizes students who have met benchmark scores on multiple AP exams taken in the same year. There are four levels of recognition:

- AP Scholar status is awarded to students receiving scores of 3 (out of 5) or higher on three or more exams.
- AP Scholar with Honors is awarded to students receiving an average score of at least 3.25 on all exams taken and scoring a 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.
- AP Scholar with Distinction is awarded to students earning an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP exams taken and a 3 or higher on five or more of these exams.
- AP National Scholar is granted to students in the United States achieving grades of 3 or higher in at least eight full-year AP exams, and whose average AP exam is at least 4.0.

Answering a Call to Citizenship

Despite significant limitations during the Spring of 2020 and much of the 2020-2021 school year due to COVID-19, the Class of 2021 contributed significant community service hours. The graduating class of 57 students contributed just under 3,000 hours of service. Whether volunteering at local art exhibits, elementary schools in the district, or through mission trips to near and far, these Spartans were a selfless, compassionate group of individuals who always looked to give back. This year's Community Service Award recipient, Spencer Herron, accrued over 300 hours of community service.

National Merit Scholars

Approximately 1.6 million high school students enter the National Merit Scholarship program each year by taking the PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Exam in October of their junior year of high school. The top 50,000 scorers on the qualifying exam are eligible for awards and the 7,500 students are eligible for National Merit Scholarships.

John-Paul Gordon was recognized as a National Merit Scholarship Semi-Finalist for 2020-2021. Only 16,000 students across the country receive this honor. The celebration was a culmination of hard work and determination.

PROM

The uncertainty of health conditions at the start of the 2020-2021 school year put the Shepaug prom in jeopardy. The town leaders of Bridgewater, Roxbury and Washington decided to sponsor the prom to give back to students who sacrificed social opportunities to support community health. With the support of students, staff, and parents, the 2021 prom became one of the most memorable events of the year.

The evening of May 22nd, seniors and juniors attended prom at Spring Hill Farms in Washington for a night of dancing and celebrating under the stars. A special thank you to local residents, Tim and Stephanie Ingrassia, for their generosity of donating their magnificent outdoor space for the prom venue.







Senior Projects

Senior Project at Shepaug is a year-long culmination of a student's educational experience. Each senior selects his or her own project to create, manage and implement. Using the Shepaug Core Values and Guiding Beliefs, students address real-world issues and concerns in their individual project. Senior Projects have ranged from rescuing animals, constructing a treehouse, creating a cookbook with family heritage recipes, learning programming languages and coding applications, repurposing a Land Rover to a functional camper, creating a photography business and everything in between.

Senior Projects with Excellence and Distinction

Each year, Shepaug recognizes and awards Excellence and Distinction in Senior Project to students who have demonstrated commitment, diligence, and passion toward their senior project. This year, six award winners were recognized for their project.

Save the Stray

Rachel researched what it would take to rescue animals from another country. Throughout the year, she worked with various shelters in Exuma, Bahamas to coordinate this effort. Due to the travel restrictions of COVID, Rachel was not able to travel, but pivoted the focus to fundraising for these animals as well as for local shelters.

Constructing a Tree House

Lily completed construction on a treehouse she had framed out in 2017 on her family's farm. Working 20 feet in the air, she installed new siding, windows, and solar-powered amenities, all stabilized by an exterior support "deck" which she adjusted as the project progressed. Additionally, she learned new welding techniques to fabricate the metal ladder needed as a sturdy and stable access feature to the treehouse.

Cooking Through My Heritage

Using the results of a genetic analysis test, Claire learned more about her family's heritage. She then explored the culinary traditions of those cultures which included Italy, Ireland, and Iran. Claire planned and led cooking classes within the agriscience curriculum. She researched and developed criteria for others to evaluate her dishes. Claire also interviewed a professional chef about his journey. Incorporating principles of graphic design and building on her photography skills, she created a cookbook of the recipes she perfected.

Hello World: An Introduction to Coding

Billy researched programs for beginners like himself to learn code. Billy found an online course that allowed him to be proficient in Python-3 and later HTML coding. Billy used his learning to access a website and pull out search information data. Additionally, Billy provided lessons to share his coding skills with others. Billy now utilizes the skills gained from the senior project as a Computer Science major at UCONN.



Rover Rebirth - Junkyard Bound to Rolling Camper

Mark resuscitated a Land Rover, saving it from the junkyard. He modified the vehicle to fit an economically scaled version of a camper. In the process, he learned design, upholstery, cabinetry, wiring, and carpentry skills. He installed a countertop that he cut from soapstone found on his family's property, outfitted the vehicle with basic plumbing, and made sure the lighting and sound were good enough for relaxing getaways. Mark completed the entire project on a shoestring, repurposing as many found materials as possible.

Sydnie turned her love of photography into a viable business. She spent the year researching how to set up a business, creating a website for that business and then taking photos. These photos were primarily portrait photos similar to senior photos. Sydnie also explored different software to edit photos for the best possible pictures.

Meet Our Shepaug Principal Donald Schels

Donald Schels is very excited to join the Region 12 community as Shepaug's new principal. After studying history, law, American studies and education policy, he hopes to blend these disciplines into the foundation for his current position. Mr. Schels practiced law in New Jersey for eight years, focusing on civil and commercial litigation. Moving to Connecticut in 1998 served as an opportunity for introspection, drawing him into the field of education. He taught history for five years at Danbury High School,

then at Wilton High School for eight years before becoming the assistant principal at Wilton High School in 2013 and later the associate principal in 2016. Admiring Region 12's reputation for intellect and compassion, which he calls a "winning combination", touring the campus with its wonderful vistas, facilities, teachers and students, sealed his decision to lead Shepaug Valley School. Mr. Schels lives in Newtown. His stepson, Tyler, lives in Vermont, and his daughter, Kaitlyn, is a senior at the University of Vermont. His hobbies include gardening, cooking, reading, watching movies, playing tennis, jogging and hiking. Mr. Schels was a classical trumpet player up through graduate school, when someone finally told him the Philharmonic would never be in the cards. Mr. Schels jokes and shares that someone encouraged him to make a lamp out of his trumpet. He assures Shepaug he wants to be its "listener in chief," asking everyone to "tell me more."

Planetarium

Starting January 2022, the Shepaug planetarium will be opened at the same site as the original location but the experience will be completely different. Region 12 has purchased a state-of-the-art Digistar projection system featuring a digital theatre platform capable of transporting the audience through 3D, ultra high-definition maps of the universe.




- Digistar facilitates content sharing with a vast network of planetariums around the globe including cutting edge astronomy labs such as the Griffith Observatory, Adler Planetarium, U.S. Air Force Academy, and the Denver Museum of Nature & Science.
- The platform features an intuitive "free flight" control system which allows 'pilots' to use a game controller to navigate the audience through galaxies at the speed of light.
- The Digistar Astronomy Atlas will be capable of displaying interstellar visualizations such as black hole renderings, the creation of a star, or the ability to tour planets inside and far outside our solar system.

Science Labs

Shepaug's renovated science labs offer a space capable of seating an increased number of students as well as plenty of room to conduct laboratory tests.



- Two of the four newly constructed labs are designed with fume hoods capable of local ventilation for fumes, vapors and dust.
- Ceiling mounted 360 degree cameras create a virtual environment for students to view, record and experience the entire classroom space from the web.
- The labs come complete with gas supply lines that can connect to Bunsen burners which will allow students to safely conduct experiments using an open flame.
