MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT



The 2017-2018 school year was an exciting time for the Deer Park Community City School District. We were patiently and anxiously awaiting the construction and renovation of Amity Elementary School. Our students and staff at Amity Elementary persevered through an entire school year of demolition and construction all the while working tremendously hard on academics and not letting the distractions get in their way!

We embarked on a 5 year strategic planning process that will guide our district work over the next five years as we pursue academic excellence. We had over 650 students, teachers, parents, and community members provide feedback through our surveys, listening sessions, and focus group meetings. We are excited about where this process will lead our district and we look forward to Deer Park Schools rising to the top and being a being a model of excellence.

We continued to expand our one of a kind Deer Park Career Academies. We completed the curriculum writing process for two new career academy courses. We developed a Sports Medicine 301 course in partnership with Mercy Health as well as a first ever Manufacturing 101 course in partnership with Monti Inc. Both courses will be launched during the 2018-2019 school year. We also officially signed a partnership with the University of Cincinnati which will allow Deer Park students to begin taking IT courses in high school and then transfer those courses for credit at the University of Cincinnati upon graduating from high school. This will allow our students who are interested in the rapidly growing IT industry to complete courses for free while in high school and then go directly into a paid internship out of high school before completing their course work on the UC campus.

We also had a highly successful year outside of the classroom. Our Deer Park Marching Wildcats reached the state competition for the 25th consecutive year, the boys' basketball team were State Champions, the boys' bowling team were CHL champions, the baseball and softball teams both made it to the district tournament, and the girls' soccer team had the most wins in school history!

Deer Park Community City School District is on the rise! We can't wait to see what the future has in store for our schools and our community. We hope you take the time to read through our Quality Profile and see all the great things that Deer Park Schools has to offer.

School Safety



A.L.I.C.E.

The Deer Park School teachers were trained in a lockdown procedure called A.L.I.C.E. This stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. The City of Deer Park Police Department continues to work with district administration and staff to complete multiple safety drills per year.

SCHOOL SECURITY UPGRADES

Several upgrades were made to Deer Park Schools during the course of the 2017-18 school year regarding student and staff safety. Two School Security Officers were hired – one at each district school – to work collaboratively with the Deer Park Police Department to keep our buildings safe and secure at all times. At the Jr./Sr. High School, all doors were rekeyed and sensors will be added to all exterior doors to alert when the doors have been left open, whether it be intentional or unintentional. A new visitor check-in system will also be implemented at both the Jr./Sr. High School and Amity Elementary. Amity Elementary will now have a new secure vestibule entrance. Amity also now has surveillance cameras combing almost every square foot of the inside and outside of the building.

DID YOU KNOW?

During the 2017-18 school year, the Department of Homeland Security, the United States Secret Service, the Transportation Security Administration, the Greater Cincinnati Fusion Center, the Hamilton County Police Department, the Deer Park Police Department, and the Deer Park / Silverton Joint Fire Department all visited Deer Park schools, touring the grounds of both the Jr./Sr. High School and Amity Elementary. The purpose of these tours was to identify vulnerabilities in our current security processes and to receive feedback and recommendations for correcting those vulnerabilities.

Deer Park Schools host annual arts and music events at all grade levels. Every November, the 2nd Graders put on a Veterans Day Program for the community. Every spring, the Amity Elementary students host the Amity Fine Arts Night where all artwork is displayed throughout the entire school and the band and choirs entertain the crowds. In 2017-18, our band and choir programs performed at the holidays, the Ice Cream Social, Back to School Bash, at Brookdale Senior Living and in OMEA competitions. There are 92 high school (9-12) students in the marching band and guard. That's 20 percent of the student body. Half of those students are active in at least one additional school group such as a sport, club, or membership in National Honor Society.

DID YOU KNOW?

Since the 2013-14 school year, Deer Park Schools has collaborated with IBM, the Greater Cincinnati STEM Collaborative (GCSC), members from the University of Cincinnati, the Talent Pipeline Initiative -Partners for a Competitive Workforce, and Deer Park Community members on the IBM MentorPlace Program. Deer Park is the first Ohio school district to work with IBM on this program. Twenty-five IBM employees meet weekly with Deer Park students in grades 7-9, one-on-one, via an online web portal curriculum. This personal interaction with a mentor, supported by the insightful and engaging curriculum, provides students with the decision-making skills and thought process needed to excel in future endeavors.

In 2017-18 Deer Park signed an MOU with the University of Cincinnati to join the UCIT program. The program will offer first-year college courses in the IT track to Deer Park students, beginning as soon as their freshman year in high school. The program allows students to finish all of their college freshman IT course during high school, accelerating their college track in order to complete a master's degree—along with co-op experience—in four years after graduating high school.

Fifth grade students at Amity Elementary attend a three-day adventure trip to Camp Kern.

- 2017-18 was the final year for K-2 students in Holmes Elementary, before those students make the transition to Amity Elementary. Holmes Elementary offered many fun and exciting student activities that also provide parents the opportunity to volunteer and stay involved with their child's education. Graduates of the music program have gone on to careers as music educators, technical, theatre, and production professionals, performing musicians (6 local and 2 national), and have performed with local opera companies, at the Aronoff Center for the Arts, and other professional groups.

Students in grades one through two are in arts courses two hours per week. The second grade students host the Veterans Day Program every fall and the first grade students perform in a music concert in the spring.

Beginning in sixth grade, students can choose to participate in band and chorus. Often times the students perform at Brookdale Senior Living during the December holidays.



Service Learning



SENIOR SERVE

Determined to carry out the mission of a focus on service learning while also filling a gap week for seniors while the rest of the high school students take statemandated tests, the Deer Park Guidance Office created the idea of Senior Serve. During its inception year in 2016-17, the senior class participated in daily trips to carry out the mission of service each morning, before returning home to take part in a seminar discussing college transition and issues such as sexual assault on college campuses. The Deer Park Community Service program received a \$1250 grant through the Mayerson foundation to be used for the senior serve event.

QP QUALITY PROFILE

The Wildcats Boosters raised approximately \$800,000 for the school athletic programs, bringing a synthetic turf field to the Deer Park Jr./Sr. High School. Unlike many area schools, the Deer Park Community City School District's PTO, Athletic Boosters, Band Sponsors, and K.I.D.S. Organization collaborate under one umbrella: the Deer Park Wildcat Boosters. This organization brings a unified awareness to the needs of the district, students, and parents.

The Athletic Booster motto is to support the 15 student athletic programs financially, materially, and emotionally. By lending their support, the Boosters help carry on the Deer Park Wildcats long tradition of academic and athletic excellence. The Boosters know being a Deer Park athlete means being a student first.

The PTO helps oversee the needs and development of each school. The PTO raises funds to provide a wide range of programs to our students, such as bringing COSI to Amity Elementary. Many of their fundraisers are engaging and involve the students such as the Mother's Day Flower Sale, regular skating parties, and the Be the Difference Program at the Deer Park Jr./Sr. High School. Several other activities such as Mother/Son Date Night and the Father/Daughter Dance are hosted by the PTO.

The Band Boosters make sure we celebrate our music programs year-round. The Band Sponsors work hard to provide the funds needed to supplement all the activities and trips our members take throughout the year. In 2016, the Marching Band travelled to Walt Disney World. This trip was made possible through many Band Booster fundraisers such as the Mattress Sale, Tag Day, and the Cake Walk.

The K.I.D.S. Organization (Keep Improving Deer Park Schools) is a group that works together to create ideas and ways to fund various improvements to the school district. Since 1997, the K.I.D.S. organization has generated over \$150,000 to the Deer Park Community City School District.

Our partnership with Kenwood Baptist Church, Trinity Church, and Childhood Food Solutions ensured regular food distributions to the entire community and our partnership with Cincinnati Church of Christ allowed us to launch **Whiz Kids**, an after school tutoring and mentoring program at Amity Elementary. These partners have collaborated to provide snacks for students participating in after school homework help, instructional supplies for classrooms, and even landscaping efforts to beautify our grounds. The community's support of our schools has led to a many opportunities for the families of Deer Park.

One Deer Park is the collaboration of Deer Park City Schools and

our faith based communities. The school district works so hard to serve, equip and encourage the students and families of Deer Park, but the thriving of our students depends on the whole city! 
DID YOU KNOW?

AMITY PROJECT

Over the course of the 2017-18 school year, Amity Elementary received a facelift, as a \$25 million renovation and addition turned the more than 100-year-old school into a state-of-the art facility for our kindergarten through 6th graders. **Renovations and additions include:**

Financial Stewardship



Deer Park Community City Schools continues to focus on aligning resources to district goals while demonstrating responsible financial stewardship.

Financial Summary from our Treasurer:

The 2017-2018 school year was a big year financially for Deer Park Community City Schools! The bond issue that was approved in November 2016 came online with the sale of the notes in July 2017. The district made the financially responsible decision to invest the bond money with RedTree Investments. Our financial position with the bonds is better than expected because of this investment decision.

Deer Park and RedTree were able to work together to increase the amount of interest earned throughout the life of the project. This increase in income is attributed to the rising rate environment and increased communication between the Treasurer and RedTree. Initially, the funds were projected to earn \$277,000 gross of fees. Currently, the funds are projected to earn \$375,000 gross of fees, an almost

six figure increase! The funds have been invested in a mix of U.S. Treasury and Agency Securities, Commercial Paper, and



Certificates of Deposit. Although the time horizon was quick, RedTree and Deer Park's ability to stay in coordination attributed to the positive investment results of the project. The Treasurer's office and RedTree Investments continues to work hard to get the highest return for the use of dollars that were approved by the community for Amity's \$25 million dollar building project, which is projected to come in under budget.

The Treasurer's Office received the Auditor of State award this year for the 2017 Audit due to exemplary financial reporting.

2018 also marked the 5 year promise that was given to the community when the 2013 levy was passed. We are monitoring the Five-Year Forecast but remain in the positive this school year and projected to remain in the positive for Fiscal year 2018 with our revenues and expenditures. The Treasurer's office is committed to responsibly aligning funds to create successful learning for every student attending Deer Park and to demonstrate responsible financial stewardship.
