

# **Hispanic Heritage Month Learning Resources**

## Sept./Oct. is National Hispanic Heritage Month

From September 15 to October 15 every year in the United States, we honor the contributions of Latino and Hispanic communities with the celebration of National Hispanic Heritage Month while highlighting their diversity, culture and traditions.

Beginning in mid-September, the celebrations coincide with national independence days in Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Mexico and Chile.

Three Interesting Facts About Hispanics and Latinos in the United States:

- 1. Hispanics and Latinos are not necessarily the same. Hispanics are descended from Spanish speaking populations. Latinos are people of Latin American descent.
- 2. Currently, the Hispanic population in the United States stands at more than 56 million, making it the largest racial or ethnic group in the United States.\*
- 3. It is estimated that by 2065 the Latino population in the United States will grow to 107 million people.\*


#### **Documentaries**
