OVERVIEW

Located amid the lakes and mountains of central New Hampshire, Holderness School is a traditional co-ed independent secondary school, serving grades 9-12. Holderness strives to create a balance in fostering the resources of the mind, body, and spirit: the mind through a challenging college preparatory curriculum, the body through outdoor activities and required interscholastic athletics, and the spirit through school and community service, ongoing anti-racism work, and affiliation with the Episcopal Church. Holderness remains, by choice, a small school where everyone plays an important role, and where students and faculty maintain close personal relationships.

ACADEMIC ADJUSTMENTS IN THE WAKE OF COVID-19

2020-2021 Academic Year: Students received in-person instruction from the start of the school year through Thanksgiving break, then completed the final two weeks of the semester via distance learning. Instruction was in-person throughout the spring semester. Courses ran Monday-Friday with new healthiness, social justice, service, and other grade-specific programming on Saturdays. Any students who were not able to join us for in-person instruction were accommodated with a similar and equally rigorous distance learning program, enhanced by improved technology infrastructure across campus. There was no change to our grading system.

Fall 2021–Present: We have been able to return to our regular pre-Covid schedule with full in-person instruction, family style meals, and chapels. **There continues to be no change to our grading system.**

JOB PROGRAM AND STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Students at Holderness play an active role in the daily management of the school. In a unique balloting system, student leaders are elected by all members of the community (including adults) on the basis of dependability, initiative, fairness, and empathy. Every student at Holderness participates daily in the Job Program, serving in myriad support capacities and learning important lessons of individual responsibility.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Each March, the school begins its two-week period of Special Programs. Students, grouped by graduating class, engage in activities that address lessons of mind, body, and spirit through hands-on experience:

- **PROJECT OUTREACH:** Leadership begins by knowing how to serve others, so in March, the ninth graders participate in community service projects around the local community including preparing meals at the food bank, fundraising for Special Olympics, and volunteering at non-profits.
- **ARTWARD BOUND:** Artward Bound is a nationallyrecognized program during which we invite working artists from all over the country to work closely with and perform alongside our tenth-grade students and faculty.
- OUT BACK: In March, the junior class disperses into the White Mountains for a ten-day hike, three days of which are spent alone. Generations of Holderness students have discovered endurance, resilience, and self-confidence through Out Back.
- SENIOR CAPSTONE: In this year-long course, students practice research and presentation skills with guidance from a class advisor and mentoring from adults with expertise within the students' field of interest. In March, they embark on selfdesigned, hands-on learning opportunities and in May present their theses to the school community.

CURRICULUM

All courses are college preparatory, seeking to prepare students for success at the highest levels in college. Honors courses are offered in Chemistry, Physics, Algebra 2, and Precalculus. Advanced Precalculus is a unique course that includes topics from the start of calculus to prepare students to go directly into BC Calculus.

- Please note 3 graduation requirements impactful to students' course selection. In addition to requirements in English, Math, Science, History and Foreign Languages, Holderness students are required to take:
 - 2 semesters of art
 - 1 semester of a Theology and Religious study course. This could be World Religions or a course cross-listed within the English or History departments. At times this requirement makes it difficult for a student to enroll in AP English their senior year.
 - 2 semesters, in the senior year of our signature Senior Capstone course (see Special Programs above).
- The Capstone requirement means students pursuing 4 years in the core curriculum will take 6 courses in a 7 block schedule during their senior year. Full-time course enrollment for a Holderness student is 5 courses.
 - While students get to pursue a topic of interest in their capstone research, it also at times limits students' ability to both pursue 4 years in the core disciplines and "double up" in a discipline of interest as our school practice limits students from taking 7 courses.

Holderness School policy requires all students to take the AP exam in lieu of a final exam for their course. If students fail to take the exam, they will lose the AP designation from their transcript and contact their enrolled college to notify them of a course change.

Advanced History of the West is an innovative two-year course, typically taken in the 10th and 11th grades. It combines the curricula of AP U.S. History and AP European History into an Atlantic history course. Students take both AP exams at the end of the two-year progression.
