The 100th graduating class of Boardman High School received their diplomas on June 4, 2017. This landmark event is proof of the long-standing tradition of excellence that has been established in the Boardman Local Schools. 



INSTRUCTION

Math

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Providing an effective, consistent math experience for our students between grade levels and buildings is important and the newly implemented Everyday Math Program accomplishes this goal. This K-6 program emphasizes the application of mathematics to real world situations. Students participate in whole group, small group, partner, and individual activities. Hands-on activities and games get all students involved and they are encouraged to explain their mathematical thinking. As a result of Everyday Math, the home and school partnership is strengthened since all K-6 students have online accounts from which they and their parents can review class lessons, play games, and find math resources. The program also gives teachers access to a database where they can track student progress and make decisions about intervention or enrichment for students.

Language Arts

Our district is now in its second year of implementing the Reading/Writing Workshop model, which cultivates young scholars into passionate, skilled readers and writers. Through this research-based curriculum, students who were at one time perhaps reluctant to read are inspired to independently pick up a book. The daily mode of instruction includes grade level mini-lessons, independent reading and/or writing time, focused individual conferencing and teacher-directed, small group, differentiated guided reading lessons. This style of teaching gives students the tools for selecting and comprehending a variety of different types of literature. In addition, this program incorporates the use of mentor texts, authentic works written by accomplished authors, to show how powerful the written word can be. As a result, our Boardman students are developing a sense of responsibility for their own learning as well as a sense of belonging to a supportive reading/writing community that fosters life-long readers, writers and thinkers.

District Leadership Team

Boardman's District Leadership Team focused its efforts in 2016-2017 on exploring, developing and implementing Tier 1 of the PBIS Framework. As a district team we decided on the acronym S.H.I.E.L.D. (Support, Honesty, Involvement, Excellence, Love, Determination) to guide us. Our goal was to spread the vision that "Students expected behaviors are the responsibility of all employees in all areas of the school community as measured by a reduction in discipline referrals." Though PBIS is a school wide systematic approach, each building implemented the research based program in a way that best addressed the needs of their specific students. PBIS will once again be a district initiative in the 2017-2018 school year with the goal of moving to a more comprehensive program (Tier 2).

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STUDENT SERVICES

Special Education and Student Services

Boardman Local Schools serve approximately 783 students with disabilities in the district. Services are provided in all 7 district buildings, as well as St. Charles Catholic School. Boardman has been awarded a School Psychologist intern for the 7th straight year through a fully funded ODE grant. This opportunity provides Boardman students an additional school psychologist to assist with diagnostic testing and identification as well as some counseling.

Exciting News on the Preschool Front

After 20 years of programming at our Lockwood site, N we are fortunate to bring those four half-day classrooms into our neighborhood elementary buildings for the first time. These classrooms provide all special Т education services and therapies to our preschool students identified with a disability. Full day Δ programming will be available at Market St. Elementary in partnership with the Alta Head Start Program. R Boardman currently has 52 students participating in the Autism and Jon Peterson Special Needs Scholarship Programs. These are state mandated programs that provide families of children with disabilities a choice to attend a state-approved service provider.

Each year Boardman Local Schools are rated on the performance of our special education program for procedural compliance. Boardman's 2016 Special Education Rating is "Meets Requirements" with 28 points out of a possible 28 points. (Highest Rating)

Search for Children with Disabilities

Local school districts have the responsibility to identify and evaluate all children with disabilities. A preschool child between the ages of 3-5 is defined as having a disability if she/he has a documented deficit in one or more of the following areas:

Communication, Hearing Impairment, Vision Impairment, Motor Functioning, Social-Emotional, Behavior Difficulties, or Developmental Delay(s).

For school age children ages 5-21, a child may qualify for special education services if she/he has a disability in one or more of the following areas:

Autism, Intellectual Disabilities, Behavioral/ Emotional, Speech/Language, Multiple Disabilities, Specific Learning Disabilities, Traumatic Brain Injury, Health Impairment(s), Orthopedic Impairment(s) or Vision/Hearing Disabilities.

Early observation and records help an evaluation team find appropriate programs and services prior to the child entering school. If you have a child 21 years of age or younger who has, or is suspected of having a disability , please contact:
