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Red Carpet Romance

This years prom, Red Carpet Romance, will be held this Saturday, April 21, 2018. The Grand March will begin at 4:30 in the auditorium. Attendees need to be by the cafeteria by 4 pm to be lined up by at 4:15. The doors by the gymnasium will be open for the public at 3:30. The audience is asked to remain seated during Grand March as the couples will be using both aisles, and pictures can be taken afterward. Couples pictures will be taken in the choir room after Grand March. If you arrive early, you may have your pictures taken starting at 3:30. Prom will be held at the same venue as last year, The Orthodox Center, 8600 Grand Blvd, Merrillville. Doors open at 6 pm and attendees need to be checked in by 7 pm for dinner. The dinner will be Rosemary Herb Chicken, Fettuccine Alfredo, Greek style green beans, and mashed potatoes. When you arrive at prom, you will be able to vote for the Senior King and Queen and the Junior

Prince and Princess. The ceremony will be held at 10 pm and parents of the court are welcome to come at that time to view the coronation. Prom ends at 11:30. Police officers will be at the dance to conduct random breathalyzer tests when students arrive. Students may not bring their own drinks to the dance. The Hebron Hawks Boys Baseball team is off to a modest start to their season with a record of 3-3.

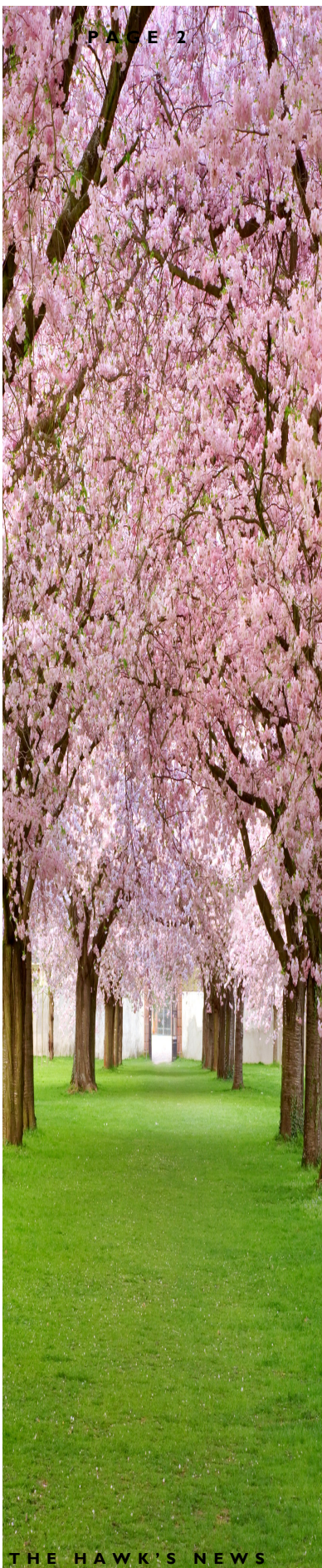
Their last two games they have beaten conference opponent Westville Blackhawks by a score of 10-0, and they also defeated sec-

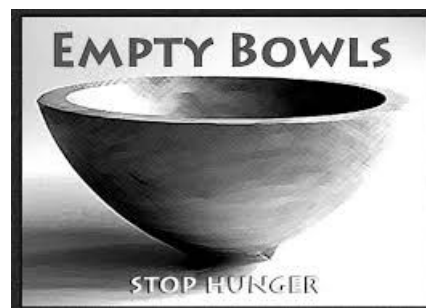




Ninth Annual Empty Bowls

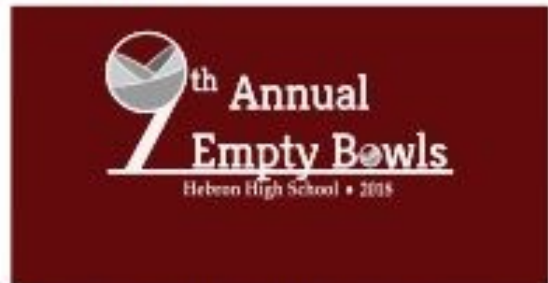
