Thanksgiving Break is on the horizon, and is approaching quickly! It will be taking place from November 25th to the 27th.

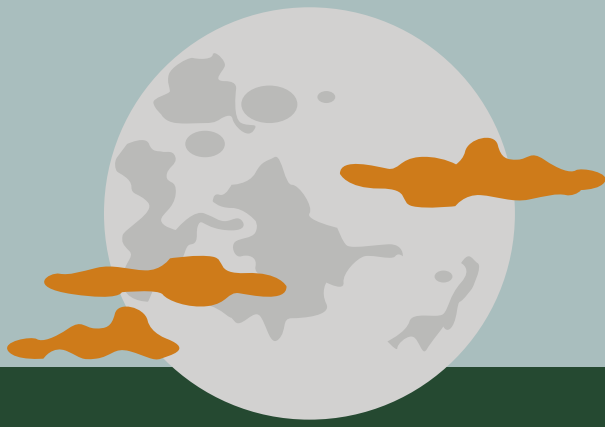
The nationwide election is taking place on November 3rd. To those who can get out and vote, make your voice and opinions heard!

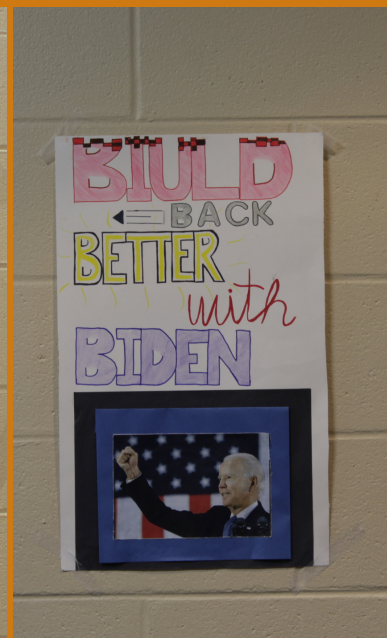
Hebron students host elections class

NHS Inductions

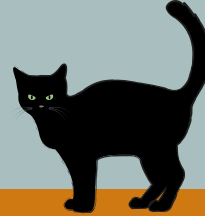

He encountered a stress fracture just simply by running more than usual. With all injuries, comes difficult and lengthy recoveries. He still is in recovery, and has been wearing an ankle brace for the past 3 months. "The main struggle was getting back into being a fast cross country runner. It was a slow process, but this was to make sure I didn't do more damage to my ankle." Robert managed to recover for the season and also was able to make it to regionals as a freshman! He wasn't sure how he was going to be able to break the 25 minute barrier, but ultimately succeeded. "Going from a 26:57K to a 19:15K is some very good progress, and I hope to make some more progress in the future," he explains. This was a very exciting moment for Robert's high school cross country career and hopefully gets better with years to come.
