Cross country is the sport to play! It has lots of great impacts on your physical and mental health. This season has many high hopes for new record breaking runners. The length of the cross country course that is ran is 5000 meters for the boys and girls. That is approximately 3.1 miles. The impact that has on your body could be good and bad. The Hebron boys cross country team has yearly statistics and the most recent is from 2021. These people are still actively running cross country and these are their statistics from 2021. Robert Summerville ran a total of 11 meets and scored 112.5 points as an individual runner. Aidan Bowgren ran the same number of meets and scored 103.5 points, his fastest time in a meet was 17.49. The fastest time during the 2021 Dave Walker Invitational was run by Cody Noel for a total time of 18:21. Aidan Bowgren had a time of 19:17 at the Terre Haute South Valley Invite. At the highland invitational Robert Summerville had a time of 18:23.

The Hebron girls cross country team was started in the fall of 1990 and was led by coach Dave Walker. From 1990 through 2006 the girls ran 4000 meters. In 2007, the courses were lengthened to 5000 meters to match the boys. Since the mid 1980's the Porter County Conference has separate races for the boys and girls at the PCC meet. Returning 2021 girls statistics, Ava Scheeringa ran 11 meets and had a total of 119.5 points. Ava scored 1st place in 2 runs out of the 11. Sidney Elijah ran a total of 8 meets with a total score of 83.5 points. Sidney got first place 3 times out of those 8 runs.

Cross country can have a very big impact on mental and emotional feelings, we asked cross country runners how it impacted them. Axiel Rodriguz said "It makes you feel motivated to do other stuff in your life." Makala Chang said "It's a very big team sport and it makes you feel included." A lot of people have different motivators in life for what they do, so we had decided to see what motivated people to run. Aidan Bowgren said "winning" encourages him to run. Makala Chang said "Winning plays a big role in encouragement and makes you feel good, less stressed, and more relaxed." Many people have a sport that they love and when they do they have lots of commitment towards it, both runners have been committed for years. Makala Chang and Aidan Bowgren have both been commited to XC for 5 years. "I think cross country is my therapy to life!" - Makala Chang

The Comfort Closet is a service that is offered to any student. Started by Mrs. Kiner, the idea was inspired by a similar idea at Laporte High School, where there were amenities available to students that were in need. Though previously run by Mrs. Kiner, the Comfort Closet is now under the leadership of Mrs. Allen with the NHS. The NHS members help supply and add new products to the closet when they seem fit. When the closet first opened many people didn't know about it, considering that Covid hit almost 2 months after it opened. The closet offers many products including Shampoo, Conditioner, Body Wash, Toothpaste, Toothbrushes, Soap, Deodorant, and other hygiene products. The products are gathered from drives and a collection bin at the salon in town. The products are offered for free so they are extremely accessible for many students. Located in the Nurse's Office. the closet is organized, clean, and available to all. The Comfort Closet is **not** set up like to the Hawks Nest in the sense that you can come in and look around to pick out what you want.
