We will help you to develop and share your individual gifts and talents, and to learn from others and to reach your full potential as both a student and a person, preparing you for a successful future.

WHY ENGLISH?

When Gerard Manley Hopkins was at Stonyhurst, he wrote,

"What you look hard at seems to look hard at you."

The study of English is an opportunity to learn how to look hard at both external and internal influences on language and literature. Both of the English courses offered at Stonyhurst allow you to compare the ways in which a range of writers' work can be analysed. You will have the opportunity to develop skills of interpretation and argument, analysing the way meaning is influenced by language, form and structure, in addition to



considering how cultural context can support different readings of literature.

During both of the courses, we will give you opportunities to:

- Read widely, independently and critically, a range offiction and non-fiction texts.
- Become familiar with the traditions of Englishliterature.
- Learn to express your literary response in speech andwriting.
- Develop as a confident, independent and reflective readerand speaker.
- Use critical concepts and literary and linguistic terminology with understanding.
- Understand, appreciate and evaluate the interpretations of others.
- Use your knowledge and understanding ofindividual texts to explore comparisons between them
- Appreciate the significance of cultural and historical influences on and context of texts and writers.

Overall, we provide essential training in the skills of close reading, analysis and essay-writing. This will give you a firm base of skills and knowledge if you intend to study Arts or Humanities at a higher level; or add much-valued breadth to your study of the Sciences. A strong emphasis on class discussion encourages the independent exploration of ideas, which will prepare you for studies at college or university.

WHAT COURSES ARE ON OFFER?

A LEVEL ENGLISH CIE (CAMBRIDGE INTERNATIONAL EXAMINATIONS)

- Component 1 Drama and Poetry
 One play and one collection of poems
 (Examples include Shakespeare, Arthur Miller, Wole
 Soyinka; and for poetry, Robert Browning, Gillian Clark,
 Owen Sheers.)
- Component 2 Prose and Unseen
 One prose text (novel or short stories) and one close reading exercise
 (Examples include Andrea Levy's Small Island, EM
 - Forster's Howard's End, and Stories of Ourselves (anthology).
- ✓ Component 3 Shakespeare and Drama
 - Two drama texts, one of which will be Shakespeare (Examples include The Winter's Tale, Richard II, Athol Fugard's Township Plays, Tennessee Williams' The Glass Menagerie and Tom Stoppard's Indian Ink.)
- ✓ Component 4 Pre- and Post-1900 Poetry and Prose

A variety of texts for both poetry and prose. One of each will be studied.

(Authors include Chaucer, Dickens, Emily Dickinson, Austen, Milton, Hardy, Woolf, Atwood, Spender.)

INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE (STANDARD / HIGHER LEVEL)

- External Assessment Paper 1 Guided Textual Analysis
- An analysis of unseen literary passages, from two different text types, each accompanied by a question.
- External Assessment Paper 2 Comparative Essay A comparative essay based on two pieces of literature studied in the course.
- Internal Assessment Individual Oral.
- A 10-15 minute prepared oral response to one two literary texts, which you will study in class.
- Internal Assessment Essay (Higher Level only).
- An analytical essay on one text by one same author, or a literary text or work studied during the course. The essay must be 1,200-1,500 words in length.
