



Superintendent's Message



Welcome Back to the 2014-15 School Term!

The MSD of Boone Township Board of School Trustees and Administration want to welcome back to school every family and the students of those families to the 2014-2015 school term. All 150 staff members of this district hope this year will be the best school term your student will experience in his/her educational career. Below are a few of the major academic challenges for the 2014-2015 school term.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS RECEIVE TABLETS

Besides several new staff members due to retirements and maternity leaves there will be other changes at MSD of Boone Township this term. One of these changes is the inclusion of computer devices used by each student in grades 9-12. Every student will receive an Acer C7 Chromebook (tablet) which he/she will bring to class and also take home to do his homework. Our goal is to enlighten our students to fulfill the components of assignments which will require them to understand the process of problem solving: seeking data from many sources, creating a solution to a problem and communicating that solution (writing, speaking) to others. Today's students, when they leave Hebron High School, will most likely have a tablet in their hands including military duty, apprenticeships or college. Our district has planned for this change for our students through professional development of staff members, curricula review, hardware updating and connectivity.

COLLEGE-AND-CAREER READY INDIANA ACADEMIC STANDARDS


Our teachers and instructional aides will also be implementing this fall the new College - and - Career Ready Indiana Academic Standards for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics adopted by the State Board of Education this spring. These standards replaced the Indiana Common Core State Standards which were approved by the Indiana State Board of Education in 2010. The state will test students in 2015 (grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8) on these new standards and in 2016 (grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10) with a new version of the ISTEP+ assessment. Our staff will now review our curriculum maps (based on the Indiana Common Core Standards) completed during the past three years with the new College - and- Career Ready Indiana Standards to note not only differences in the substance of the new standards but also the location of those standards within a course (algebra) or grade level (second grade) which is vertical/horizontal articulation.

NORTH CENTRAL ASSOCIATION 2012-2017

Our accreditation with North Central Association/ AdvancED continues as we accomplished the first phase of our assignment by completing four tasks recommended by the "exit committee" of educators who visited our school district in October of 2012. We have two district-wide committees: curriculum/instruction and technology which both meet regularly to plan the district's actions, not just for the current year but for several years into the future. Along with these two committees the corporation developed a "strategic plan" which projects its agenda three to five years into the future and is reviewed periodically. This year we will be implementing plans developed last school term for curriculum articulation both horizontally and vertically, a mentoring program for new teachers, consistent grading principles, and tweaking the strategic plan. A report as to the success of these plans will be given to North Central in November. The North Central Association/ AdvancED process has allowed our district's staff to plan for the future since we began our relationship with this organization in 2011.





Registration Process

1. A parent/guardian is required to be present to register his/her child(ren).
2. An information/emergency form needs to be updated and a nursing information form filled out and signed for each student. Please include the student's Social Security number, parent's e-mail address, cell phone number and at least one local emergency contact other than the parent(s) listed.
3. Book rental fees are expected to be paid in full at registration. If you are planning on applying for the free or reduced lunch program, this needs to be done at registration.
4. You also will have the opportunity to add money to existing lunch accounts, purchase sports passes and pay class dues.

SENIOR PORTRAITS

Joselyn Photography will be taking our school's Senior headshot pictures on **Monday, August 11, 2014 in the high school auditorium from 8:00am - 11:00 am and 12:00 pm - 3:00 pm**. DRIVING REGULATIONS

Driving motorized vehicles to school will be permitted providing:

1. The student must follow all school regulations when operating a motor vehicle on school property.
2. The student's vehicle is registered with the office, has a valid parking permit and only parks in student parking areas.
3. Once parked on school property, the vehicle is not to be entered until the student is ready to leave school grounds for the day.
4. Student obeys the posted speed limit of 10 MPH.
5. The only acceptable mode of student transportation on school property during school hours are cars and pickup trucks.
6. Only the entrance/exit beside DeMotte State Bank is to be used between 7:00 AM and 3:15 PM or other exit/entrance as designated by school personnel.

Violation of driving regulations could result in loss of driving privileges for a period of time to be determined. The school will not be responsible for damages to vehicles on the school grounds.

IMPLIED CONSENT is granted school officials to search a vehicle on school grounds for contraband, drugs or any stolen items. The use of automobiles by students for transportation purposes to and from school premises is a privilege. This privilege is not to be abused by using an automobile in any way that would cause, or could reasonably be foreseen to cause an interference with school purposes or educational functions, or which is forbidden by state law or school rules. The school corporation retains the right to inspect any automobile and its contents to insure that the vehicle's use is in accordance with its intended purpose. An authorized school official may inspect any automobile without a warrant if there is a reasonable belief that the student responsible for the vehicle has violated or is violating school policy.

Professional Qualifications of Teachers

As a parent/guardian of a student of the MSD Boone Twp., you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for certain information about your child's classroom teachers, and requires us to give you this information in a timely manner. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

1. Whether the Indiana Department of Education has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and/or subjects he or she teaches.
2. The teacher's college major, whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of these degrees.
3. Whether the Indiana Department of Education ruled that a teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulation because of special circumstances.
4. Whether any teacher's aids provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.
