AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN/CONTINUITY OF SERVICES

FACIAL COVERINGS/MASKS

Effective June 2, 2021, Governor Dewine's mask mandate expired. South Point Local Schools will continue to follow the Governor's orders as well as the orders of the state and local health departments. If at any point during the 2021-2022 school year the mask mandate is reinstated, all staff and students will be required to follow the directives and guidelines for facial covering while at school or at school related functions. Training and informational handouts on proper mask wearing will be provided to students and staff. South Point Local Schools provided two masks to every student and staff member.

SOCIAL DISTANCING

South Point Local Schools will make every effort to maintain 3-6 feet physical distance in the classroom setting and at all other times throughout the school day. Hallways and stairwells will continue to be one way to ensure proper distancing. Barriers will remain on the cafeteria tables during lunch to provide an additional layer of protection during lunch.

HANDWASHING/RESPIRATORY ETIQUETTE

South Point Local Schools will provide training and handouts to students and staff on proper hand washing and respiratory etiquette. Staff will be provided further COVID-19 training on safety measures through online modules provided by Public School Works. Students and staff will be reminded to wash their hands for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol before touching their eyes, nose, or mouth, before eating, before touching their mask, after entering or leaving a public place, touching an item or surface that may be frequently touched by other people. They will be instructed to wet, lather, scrub, rinse and dry their hands when washing. Sanitizing stations will be placed in high traffic areas as well as in each classroom. Students will be reminded to cough or sneeze into their elbow and to wash or sanitize their hands after each occurrence.

HEALTHY FACILITIES

Each building will be disinfected nightly and backpack sprayers will be utilized. High traffic areas will be cleaned and disinfected regularly throughout the school day. Disinfectant wipes will be made available in each classroom as well.

CONTACT TRACING

In the event that a student or staff member becomes exposed to someone with Covid 19, South Point Local Schools will work with the Lawrence County Health Department to identify and notify those exposed. The Lawrence County Health Department will notify any person who must quarantine and specify the duration of the quarantine period.

VACCINATIONS

South Point Local Schools has partnered with the Lawrence County Health Department for use of our gymnasium as the main vaccination hub for Lawrence County. Teachers as well as eligible students have had the vaccine made available to them. The gymnasium continues to be an active vaccination site. The district has issued and continues to issue notifications about the availability of vaccines. Many students and staff ages 12 and above have been vaccinated.

HEALTH SCREENINGS

Parents should evaluate students for the following Covid 19 symptoms each day before they attend school:

Fever or Chills

Cough

Shortness of Breath or Difficulty Breathing

Fatigue

Muscle or Body Aches

Headache

New Loss of Taste or Smell

Sore Throat

Congestion or Runny Nose

Nausea or Vomiting

Diarrhea

If your child displays any of these symptoms they should remain home until evaluated and released by a doctor. If a student develops symptoms while at school parents and guardians will be contacted and they will be immediately sent home.

VISITORS

Visitors will not be permitted in the building during the school day unless otherwise allowed by the building administrator. Meetings and conferences may be held virtually whenever possible.

LUNCH

Lunch will be socially distanced to the best of our ability. Barriers will be placed on the cafeteria tables as an added layer of protection. Students will be reminded to wash or sanitize their hands before and after lunch.

TRANSPORTATION

South Point Local Schools will maintain two students per seat on the school bus. Occasionally three to a seat may be necessary depending on the age and size of the students. The district will try to place siblings and members of the same household together to limit exposure. Seating charts will be maintained and bus cameras used to aid in contact tracing if need be. Masks may be required on some buses due to lack of space and social distancing on the school bus.

On February 9, 2021, Governor DeWine asked schools and districts to work with their communities and educational stakeholders to help students continue to advance academically and to make up for any learning that may have been lost or delayed due to the coronavirus pandemic and related disruptions.

“This once-in-a-lifetime pandemic has impacted all of us, so it should be no surprise that it has impacted our children. But we should not panic, nor should we be surprised by the results of assessments,” said Governor DeWine. “Instead, we should do what Ohioans have always done when facing a challenge – stay calm, roll up our sleeves, and work to solve the problem.”

Governor DeWine has requested that schools and districts design plans that address learning recovery and extended learning opportunities to meet the needs of students that could include, but are not limited to, extending the current school year, beginning the new year early, extending the school day or instituting summer programs, tutoring, remote options, and other remedial or supplemental activities.

Plans should address, but are not limited to, the following key components:

- **Impacted Students:** How will schools and districts identify which students have been most impacted by the pandemic in terms of their learning progress (with a focus on the most vulnerable student populations)?
- **Needs Assessment:** How will schools and districts identify the needs of those students?
- **Resources and Budget:** What resources are available to address those needs? Generally, what is the budget for the plan?
- **Approaches:** What approaches can best be deployed to address those needs? (This may include approaches such as ending the school year later than scheduled, beginning the new year early, extending the school day, summer programs, tutoring, and remote options.)
- **Partnerships:** Which local and regional partners (such as Educational Service Centers, Information Technology Centers, libraries, museums, after-school programs, or civic organizations) can schools and districts engage in supporting student needs?
- **Alignment:** How can this plan reinforce and align to other district or school plans? This may include but is not limited to Student Wellness and Success Fund plans, remote learning plans, improvement plans, CCIP-related plans, graduation plans.

Each district or school should consider its unique needs and issues and prepare its plan in a way that responds appropriately and leverages the assets of its unique partners including their Educational Service Center and other regional and community-based partners. Each district or school should consider a wide range of representation and voices from district and community stakeholders in planning for learning recovery and extended learning opportunities.

The governor asked schools and districts to provide their plans to the public and General Assembly no later than April 1.
