Since that day, the words "Be kind and do your best" have rung through the hallways of CMS. Every morning, for nearly 20 years.

Within two decades of teaching many you-have-to-see-it-to-believe-it moments have happened. As they happen Mr. Fahler has learned it is best to adjust to the situation and do whatever you can to help.

Not only does he strongly believe in it, but Mr. Fahler also shows us this value everyday, whether we see it or not. During COVID, there were multiple times when students didn't have access to the supplies they needed, so Mr. Fahler dropped them off himself.

We often don't realize how much he does around our school and community. Since October, Mr. Fahler has been working on getting his bus driver's license amidst the shortage ready to step in to help serve our school and its students. He is currently subbing in for two math teachers because no subs are available. He has even picked up a child to bring them to school after they overslept and missed the bus.

He does all of this, not for the recognition, but because he cares.

"If you don't love kids, you are probably in the wrong profession," he said, which couldn't be more true.

At the end of a busy day Mr. Fahler has often looked at his to-do list and checked off not even half the boxes, before adding twice as many. Most nights, he's at school far into the evening, cracking open a can of Chef Boyardee for dinner, simply so he can power through with the work he wants to get finished.


He has said that this job keeps him constantly busy, but he couldn't be more grateful for it.

Before Covid, Mr. Fahler used to walk almost 10 miles a day, a habit he would love to get back to. If needed, Mr. Fahler has said he would love to tutor kids in his free time, because he will miss helping kids after his last day at CMS.

But he said that he will miss the community he has built the most.

In his last days at our school, Mr. Fahler shared with us the most important advice he needs us to know. First, have patience; if something doesn't work out the way you want, have faith—you cannot control everything in life, and it will all work out in the end.

"I never would have thought that I would end up being a Middle School principal in a district an hour from where I grew up, but it has been one of the greatest blessings of my life," he said.

What has helped him more than anything else in his years here, and a lesson we should all learn, is to always be receptive to feedback—learning to accept that other people truly do want to help you.

For many of us, Mr. Fahler has been with us our entire middle school career, and whether we realize it or not, he has made a difference in our lives in more ways than we can or could count.

He has shared with us his life experiences, watched kids in our school grow from small insecure 6th graders to high schoolers, to college students, to adults, to parents, and even some to teachers. And he has helped us in every way he could.

So on that last day of school, when the words "Be kind and do your best" come through the loudspeakers one last time, let's take heed.

Let's carry on the beliefs, and ensure the legacy that Mr. Fahler has left behind.

#### The Not-So-Great Pacific Garbage Patch


The Pacific Garbage Patch is two times the size of Texas, three times the size of France, and is 1.85 times smaller than Australia.

The Great Pacific Garbage Patch. This patch is already huge and growing rapidly. Read more to find the size, how it is made, if there are more of them out there, and how to slow the size.

What is the Great Pacific Garbage Patch?

The GPGP (great pacific garbage patch) is a 1.6 million square kilometer sized garbage patch in the middle of the North Pacific Ocean. The patch is actually made of the Western Garbage Patch, located near Japan, and the Eastern Garbage Patch, located between Hawaii and California. If you thought the GPGP was big then, did you know It is estimated that 1.15 to 2.41 million tons of plastic are entering the ocean each year from rivers? More than half of

this plastic is less dense than the water, meaning that it will not sink once it encounters the sea. That's a lot of trash! And so



much of it is entering the GPGP!

How was the GPGP made?

You may be wondering: how was this made? The answer is: Gyres. What are gyres? Well, gyres are a large system of swirling ocean currents. This is what the GPGP is surrounded by. The area in the center of a gyre tends to be very

calm and

stable. The circular motion of the gyre pulls debris into the center, where it becomes trapped.

For example, a plastic water bottle thrown off the coast of California takes the California Current south toward Mexico. There, it may catch the North Equatorial Current, which goes across the Pacific.

Near the coast of Japan, the bottle could travel north on the Kuroshio Current. Finally, the bottle travels eastward on the North Pacific Current. The calm rolling vortexes of the Eastern and Western Garbage Patches gradually pull in the bottle.

## Are there more garbage patches out there?

Yes! There are five gyres in the ocean. One in the Indian Ocean, two in the Atlantic Ocean, and two in the Pacific Ocean. Garbage patches of varying sizes are located in each gyre. Each is as bad as the rest. They all happen the same way as the GPGP. Gyres force the garbage into a small confined space and it piles up.

## How are we cleaning it up?

Cleaning up marine debris is not as easy as it sounds. Many microplastics are the same size as small sea animals, so nets designed

to scoop up trash would catch these creatures as well. Even if we could design nets that would just catch garbage, the size of the oceans makes this job far too timeconsuming to consider.

The National Ocean and Atmospheric Administration's Marine Debris Program (or NOAA MDP) has estimated that it would take 67 ships one year to clean up less than one percent of the North Pacific Ocean. Scientists and explorers agree that limiting or eliminating our use of disposable plastics and increasing our use of biodegradable resources will be the best way to clean up the Great Pacific Garbage Patch.

#### **Overall**

Overall, the GPGP is just absolutely terrible. I mean, all that trash in the ocean, causing so many animals harm. You do your part to stop this from growing. Spread the word over the summer. Clean up rivers and streams. Donate money to Ocean cleanup projects. Together we can make a difference.



We lost many people last year. Here's a recap of the last 11 icons we lost in 2021.

Larry King was born November 19, 1933, in Brookland, New York he was a widely known American television and radio host from 1978 to 1994. Over King's 43 year long career he won many awards including 2 Peabodys, an Emmy and 10 Cable ACE Awards. And throughout his career, he hosted over 50,000 interviews. However the Television Legend Larry King died of sepsis on January 23, 2021. He was 87.

Irv Cross was born in Hammond, Indiana in 1939. He was the first African American sports analysis on national television. In the 1961 NFL draft he was drafted by the Eagles in the seventh round. Five seasons later he was traded to the Rams, and he stayed there for three more years. Then finally returned to the Eagles for a season before retiring. After retirement he

wasn't done with football and coached the defensive backs for the Eagles. Unfortunately, at the age of 81 he passed away on February 28th 2021 due to heart disease.

Sabine Schmitz was born May 14, 1969 in Adenau, Germany at the age. At the age of only 17 Schmitz started racing. At this time she had no license or her parent's permission, however she raced in her mother's BMW. In 1996 Sabine became the first and only woman to win the Nürburgring 24 Hours. This would not be her first time winning either. And after winning nearly 50 career races the race legend on March 16, 2021 she lost her battle with cancer and sadly passed away.

Samuel Wright was born on November 20, 1946 in Camden South Carolina, he was most well known for being the voice of Sebastian in *The Little Mermaid*. He was also in *Bird* and *Dinosaur*. Samuel was nominated twice for Tony's, and he ran his own drama school in Walden, New York. In 2001 he played Mufasa in the Broadway musical *The Lion King*. On May 24th 2021 he sadly

passed away at the age of 75.

**Ned Beatty** was born July 6, 1937, Louisville, Kentucky when Beatty was 19 his acting career started. He was very successful and though his career had a reputation of being depicted as "The busiest actor in Hollywood". Ned Thomas Beatty was an American actor who was best known for Tov Story 3 in which he voiced Lotso. Beatty's 50 year career included 160 films. Some of his more notable films were, Superman and Superman II, Captain America and many more. However Beatty's successful acting career ended in 2013 after his work on Baggage Claim and the beloved actor passed away on June 13th 2021 at the age of 83 the legend died of natural causes.

Lisa Banes was born in Chagrin Falls, Ohio on July 9th 1955, she was in many movies and Broadway plays. In 2009 she played the headmistress in *Legally* Blondes not to be confused with Legally Blonde. She also starred in Gone Girl in 2014. She won a Theater World Award for Look Back In Anger. On June 4th in 2021 while she was crossing the street in Manhattan, New York she was hit by a motorized scooter. She suffered bad brain damage from the collusion, and she passed 10 days after the accident. She was 65 years old.

**Janet Malcome** was born July 8, 1934 in Prague, Czechia. Malcolm was an American writer who started writing for the New Yorker in 1963. Janet Clara Malcome spent her entire career writing. Starting as a journalist for the New Yorker. Although she never stopped working for the magazine in the year 1980. She was the author of Psychoanalysis: The Impossible Profession, In the Freud Archives, and The Journalist and the Murderer,

among other books. The beloved journalist and author worked until her death on Wednesday, June 16, 2021. She died of Lung cancer at the age of 86.

Peter Avkrovd was born on November 19, 1955 in Ontario, Canada, he was a producer and writer in many movies such as, My Stepmother Is A Alien, Spies Like Us, and Nothing But Trouble. Peter can trace his ancestry back to the 15th century, and his grandfather was a mountie (basically like police in the early 20th century). He was an alumni of the Second City comedy troupe in Toronto, and he even was a physic researcher. He passed away on November 6th, 2021 due to a septicemia at the age of 66.

**Stephen Sondheim** was born March 22, 1930 in New York. Stephen Joshua Sondheim was an American composer and lyricist. Among the most important figures in 20th-century musical theater, Sondheim was praised for having "reinvented the American musical". Many of his outstanding works include, *Into the Woods*, the 1961 West Side Story, the remade 2021 West *Side Story, Sweeny Todd,* Company, and Gypsy. However the award winning composer passed away on November 26, 2021. The legend was 91 and had cardiovascular disease.

Joan Didion was born in Sacramento, California, on December 5th 1934, she was an amazing American writer. Her career started in the 1950's after winning a contest sponsored by Vouge. She is most known for writing the screenplay on the 2018 A Star is Born, and the 1976 A Star is Born. She had a bestselling memoir in 2006 called, A Year of Magical Thinking. This cultural icon passed away on December 23rd, 2021 due to Parkinson's at the age of 87.

Sam Jones was born June 24, 1933 in Wilmington, North Carolina. Samuel Jones was an American professional basketball player who was a shooting guard for the Boston Celtics in the National Basketball Association. Especially during the NBA playoffs, the five-time NBA All-Star was known for his quickness and gamewinning shots. The HBCU legend died on December 30, 2021 from natural causes at the age of 88.

#### Where Might Russia Go Next?

On February 24th, 2022, Russia officially launched a large offensive invasion into Ukraine. Russia's influence over the world was slowly fading, and Russia considered a war with Ukraine to try to gain influence over Europe once more.



About 8 years prior to the attack, Russia occupied the Ukrainian regions of the Donbas and Crimea, and has set up two puppet states in the region: Donetsk and Luhansk.

It is currently unknown who the war will favor, but if the war favors Russia, there is a heavy chance that they could continue their advance into other smaller nations. First, we will go over the two most likely countries to be invaded by Russia: Georgia and Moldova. Belarus isn't included in this article because Belarus has a more likely chance to be integrated into Russia rather than being invaded.

Next, we will go over some unlikely countries that, on the surface, may seem like Russia might not care about invading, yet have solid reasoning as to why Russia could invade them. Note that this article may not be completely up to date with the current events of the war by the time of publication, as new incidents and events may happen after the time of publication that

could render some things as false in this article.

Georgia (the country, not the U.S state) is a very likely candidate for being annexed by Russia. Georgia was a territory of Russia during the times of the Soviet Union and Russian Empire, and Russia has already invaded Georgia after independence once, in 2008. The Russo-Georgian war of 2008 was a war between Russia and Georgia. The main outcome of the war was that Russia would occupy two Georgian separatist countries: South Ossetia and Abkhazia.

Recently, Russia has made a referendum on whether South Ossetia should be integrated into Russia. As of now, it seems like the vote is pointing to a strong yes, most likely because of rigged votes and propaganda. Georgia has a lot of unique culture in the country, and a Russian occupation of the country could mean disaster for many important artifacts, such as the first wine, the first thread, and the oldest gold mines in the world. Georgia has been trying to enter into NATO for security from Russian attacks.

Russia has only had Moldova for a little less than 2 centuries, yet the Russian influence on the previously Romanian country has been heavy. On September 2, 1990, pro-Russian separatists declared independence from Moldova, breaking away with the self declared country of the Pridnestrovian Moldavian Republic, commonly known as Transnistria. Transnistria's right border runs along the Dniester River next to Ukraine. The government of Transnistria hopes to be integrated into Russia in the future, and the Russian invasion of Ukraine may only further strengthen Transnistrian integration into Russia. Recently,

Alexander Lukashenko, the "president" (dictator) of Belarus, released a battle map picture of how Russia and its allies will invade Ukraine. Looking closely at the image, you can see Transnistria in red, with an arrow hovering above it



pointing to the strategic Ukrainian city of Odessa.

This meant that there was (and possibly still is) a plan for Transnistria to invade Ukraine.

The Russian and Transnistrian government could potentially be working together to strengthen diplomatic ties between the two, with the Russian invasion of Ukraine being a chance to potentially integrate Transnistria into Russia. If Moldova can be dragged into the war, then Russia could launch an offensive invasion into the country. This could lead Moldova in the same situation that Georgia is currently in: political instability with a self proclaimed separatist state. In this case, it is Moldova with Transnistria.

Like Georgia, Moldova is currently trying to join the EU and NATO for better economic opportunities and for protection from Russia.

#### Where Might Russia Go Next?

We have discussed the likely candidates for an invasion of Russia, but what about the unlikely candidates? On the surface, there may seem like there is no reason for an invasion by Russia, but under the surface, there are many reasons why Russia could invade these countries. Note that as mentioned earlier, this won't be completely up to date by the time that this article is published.

One unlikely candidate that may seem like Russia may not invade is Finland. One reason why Russia could invade Finland is because of previous ownership and wars with the country. Finland was a territory of the Russian Empire before declaring independence in 1917, when the Russian Empire collapsed. The most notable war

tried to invade Finland to get a better ground against Nazi Germany.

The Soviet Union, despite having 2x more troops than Finland, collected a minimum of at least 321,000 casualties compared to Finland's 70,000 casualties. This means that the Soviet Union suffered 4.6x more losses than Finland. Despite this, Finland still had to cede 11% of its territory to Russia, so the idea of having

another invasion terrifies Finland as it could cause them to cede more land to Russia. Finland also has natural environmental protection from invaders.

In the North, there are blizzarding winds and arctic-like conditions. The rest of the country is showered in thick forests and taigas that can slow down Russian advance into the country. However, this also leads to the second reason why Russia may invade Finland: Finland's geopolitical place in the world. The exact reasons why Finland is able to slow down Russian offensives are also the exact reasons why Russia wants Finland. Russia is able to build and hide plenty of military bases and nuke silos within the comfort of the taigas. A Russian occupied Finland could also serve as a natural defense for Russia if any countries try to attack through Scandinavia. However, Finland has applied for NATO membership and it will most likely join soon as a means to protect itself from a potential Russian invasion.

For quite some time, people in Finland didn't really want to join NATO. public support for this was almost always around 20%. But in recent weeks, that percentage has gone up about 56% and now rests at 76% percent for public support for Finland joining NATO. Recently, Finland and its neighbor, Sweden, both applied for NATO membership. The United Kingdom has also promised to support Finland if attacked, so this could be a Russian repellent for Finland's sovereignty.

Another unlikely candidate that could be invaded by Russia is Kazakhstan. One reason why Russia may invade Kazakhstan is because of previous interventions in the country. Russia has already intervened in Kazakhstan to crush civil unrest recently this year, although to

Kazakhstan's consent. Russia killed off the protesters, which strengthened Russian-Kazakh relations. This newfound trust in Russia could make Kazakhstan further dependent on Russia, simply for Russia to backstab them. Another reason for Russia to invade Kazakhstan is because Kazakhstan is a resource and agricultural goldmine.

Most students dread summer reading. They're more interested in friends, summer camp, vacationing, and non-reading related activities. And when students hear the words "required reading," it often <code>zaps</code> the joy they used to find out of reading for pleasure. While some students this year may find reading a bore, they should also know there's research behind why teachers make students read over the summer.

In 1978, researcher Barbara Heyns followed 3,000 kids in 6th and 7th grade in Atlanta's public schools and tracked their summer reading. She found that, "children who read at least six books during the summer maintained or improved their reading skills, while kids who didn't read any saw their skills slip by as much as an entire grade level."

In 1982, another study completed by researchers at the Johns Hopkins Center for Summer Learning discovered that not only do children get ahead when they read, but they can also fall way, way behind. They found that, "by the end of fifth grade, students who didn't read during the summer lagged two years behind their book-reading peers and that summer learning loss accounted for most of the achievement gap."

Some critics have proven some of the information above false and argue that there are other factors, besides just reading, that impact a student's ability to do well in school. But what they all agree on is that **reading over the summer helps you**.

So when you're complaining you're bored this summer or "there's nothing to do," or if you keep putting that summer reading off until the last minute, try to remember the joy you felt when you were younger—or maybe still feel—when you got lost in a good book, and try to pick one up. The results may surprise you. Here are some places to get started if you're interested in reading but don't know where to find good books:

## Why CMS Needs 13! In 2022!

13! The Musical by Jason Robert Brown is a comedic, heartfelt show about true friends, and "Becoming a Man". 13! is the only Broadway musical to ever feature a fully teenage cast, and band. The show follows soon-to-be 13-year-old, Evan Goldman who awaits his Bar Mitzvah the coming October.



His excitement deflates when his dad files a divorce, and Evan is forced to move to Appleton, Indiana, with his mother. Evan gets a tour of the "Lamest Place in the World" from his new neighbor, Patrice, who's developed a crush on him. We then meet Brett, the quarterback of the football team, and his wingmen, Eddie and Malcolm. Brett wants to ask out Kendra, but Lucy, Kendra's best friend, doesn't approve. Brett isn't the only one with eyes on Kendra. Archie, Patrice's best friend, is dying to go out with Kendra.

Evan decides on the perfect plan to get both Brett, and Archie what they need. Evan uses Archie's "Terminal Illness" to convince his mom to buy their whole class tickets to "The Bloodmaster". After things don't go according to plan, Evan is forced to grapple with what it means to mature, and how he can truly become a "man."

13! the Musical is inherently different from anything produced at CMS. For one, it is not produced by Disney Theatrical Productions and/or written before the 1970s. But what sets this work apart is its understanding of the stage of life young teens exist in, and its effect on their future perceptions of the world. As a character, Evan sees nothing more important than his popularity, because that, in turn, dictates the validity of his Bar Mitzvah.

Though this may seem stupid or absurd, what playwrights Dan Ellis's and Robert Horn understand, Evan is a child of divorce, trying to build connection with others because it is all he has lacked his entire life.

Evan is struggling with true, universal issues, and yet travels through the heightened backdrop of Junior High to ensure that the audience understands what it is actually like to live with the unwanted pressure of middle school. What makes 13 truly special is that it understands who it's talking to, reaches them on a succinct level, and uses that to build a narrative that leaves a lasting impression and theme. Ellish, Horn, and Brown don't look at students as stupid, dramatic, and emotionless caricatures, but instead see people attempting to forge connection and safety in an environment of compromise and hidden truth.

This story has the potential to truly reflect CMS students in ways that are neither idealistic nor ironic, but genuine, fluid, and contextual. We just need our department to try something new and work on a piece tailored to truth and understanding.

#### Why CMS Needs 13! In 2022!

13! humorizes the teenage experience through its score, prime examples include "Hey Kendra" and "Being a Geek", "Hey Kendra" mocks the absurdity of jocks, and their "cool guy" approach to, say, asking a girl out. It mocks the idea of being "smooth", with clichés like going on a date to the movies, holding hands in popcorn, etc. Near the end of the song, the focus shifts from Brett and his friends to Kendra (left) and Lucy( right).



Lucy is furious at the idea of Kendra going out with Brett, and does everything in her power to stop it. On the other hand, "Being a Geek" show's both Evan's battle with his wish to become popular, and the underlying implications of that quest, given his need for community and a stable group of people as he recovers from

his parents unexpected, ugly divorce.

The score uses the strength of Brown's music and lyrics to allude to depth of the challenges teens face, and uses the music to give them an outlet to their struggle, both genuine and fabricated. Because of the variety, from comedic and dizzy to calm and introspective, we are able to understand the rollercoaster that comes with the lives students live, and its effect on their world perception, no matter its true value in their

adult life.

13! utilizes a fly system, which is a series of ropes and weights that — in 13!'s case — aid scene changes. Conveniently, CMS's new theater contains a fly system, making the set change from the New York City skyline to Appleton in "13/Becoming a Man".

The costumes of 13! could easily be replicated for a school production. Most male characters wear khakis, denim, and simple t-shirts. The costumes in 13! are reflective of the mid-to-late 00's era in which the show was written. Not only are these costumes representative of the era they were made in, but they are also symbolic of the characters wearing it. Kendra and Lucy are

prime examples of this symbolism.

Kendra wears pastels, long skirts, and headbands, reminiscent of her "good girl" persona. Lucy's color palette is much darker. She wears leather, and boots, showing her mean, and malicious intentions. Patrice, the antisocial, quirky girl, dresses as such. Bell-bottoms, a white camisole, and a corduroy vest throughout the majority of the show. She looks out of place compared to the rest of the cast.

13's power does not come from flashy sets or lighting, name recognition, or big brand attachment, but rather it's empathetic and understanding approach to life as an adolescent. It meets young people where they are, and uses that as its ammunition to build upon real-world issues through a teens lens.

Because of this, 13! is a rare theatrical treat, combining both fun and depth to create a musical sure to delight all audiences in a way CMS has not experienced in its history.


We've given women rights, we've created a lot of handicap accessible places and created handicap parking spots. Why are we drawing the line at creating a single stall bathroom that isn't gendered?
