Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Trustees Bullard Independent School District Bullard, Texas

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Bullard Independent School District (the "District") as of and for the year ended August 31, 2012, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the District as of August 31, 2012, and the respective changes in financial position, and cash flows, where applicable, thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated December 11, 2012, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages iv though xi and page 31 are not a required part of the basic financial statements but is supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards, Exhibit K-1, is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and in our opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The introductory section and combining and individual fund financial statements, identified as Exhibits H-1 and H-2 in the foregoing table of contents, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund statements identified above have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The introductory section has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

The Texas Education Agency requires school districts to include certain information in the Annual Financial and Compliance Report in conformity with laws and regulations of the State of Texas. This information is identified in the Table of Contents as Exhibits J-1 through J-4. These schedules have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

This section of Bullard Independent School District's (the "District") annual financial report presents our discussion and analysis of the District's financial performance during the fiscal year ended August 31, 2012. Please read it in conjunction with the District's financial statements, which follow this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

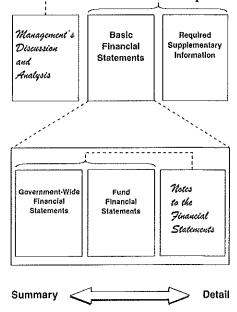
- The District's total combined net assets were approximately \$14.5 million at August 31, 2012.
- The General Fund reported a fund balance this year of \$6,014,126, which is a decrease in fund balance of \$388,762 from the prior year.
- The district continued with the next phase of technology immersion by purchasing Macbooks for all high school students. Before the year ended, the district decided to pay off the previous leases for middle school student and teacher Macbooks and for high school teacher Macbooks. The district also performed a PEIMS audit geared toward improving our PEIMS reporting and thus maximizing our state revenue. The district contracted to perform an upgrade of our lighting systems to utilize more efficient bulbs and ballasts, which in turn will save the district money on our utilities.
- By virtue of the windfall of the TRE election passing in the fall of 2010, the district was able to maintain the same fund balance despite the state budget cuts. The total fund balance was then divided into six areas: five committed fund balances and one undesignated fund balance. These five committee areas are Technology Improvement, Roofing Improvements, Traffic Improvements, Instructional Improvement, and Capital Outlay. The district anticipates staying within its budget during the 2012-2013 school year, even though it will be the most challenging budget to date.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements, notes to those statements, and other supplementary information. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the District:

- The first two statements are Government-Wide Financial Statements that provide both long-term and short-term information about the District's overall financial status.
- The remaining statements are Fund Financial Statements that focus on individual parts of the government, reporting the District's operations in more detail than the Government-Wide Statements.
 - The Governmental Fund Statements tell how general government services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending.
 - Proprietary Fund Statements offer financial information about the internal service fund used to report activities that provide services to organizations within the District.
 - Fiduciary Fund Statements provide information about the financial relationships in which the District acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of others, to whom the resources in question belong.

The financial statements also include notes that explain some of the information in the financial statements and provide more detailed data. The statements are followed by a section of required supplementary information that further explains and supports the information in the financial statements. Figure A-1 on page iv shows how the required parts of this annual report are arranged and related to one another.

Figure A-2 (below) summarizes the major features of the District's financial statements, including the portion of the District's government they cover and the types of information they contain. The remainder of this overview section of management's discussion and analysis explains the structure and contents of each of the statements.

Government-Wide Statements

The government-wide statements report information about the District as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The Statement of Net Assets includes all of the government's assets and liabilities. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the Statement of Activities regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two government-wide statements report the District's net assets and how they have changed. Net assets, the difference between the District's assets and liabilities, is one way to measure the District's financial health or position.

- Over time, increases or decreases in the District's net assets are an indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating, respectively.
- To assess the overall health of the District, you need to consider additional non-financial factors such as changes in the District's tax base.

The government-wide financial statements of the District include the governmental activities. Most of the District's basic services are included here, such as instruction, extracurricular activities, curriculum and staff development, health services, and general administration. Property taxes and grants finance most of these activities.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the District's most significant funds, not the District as a whole. Funds are accounting devices that the District uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending for particular purposes.

- Some funds are required by State law and by bond covenants.
- The Board of Trustees establishes other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes or to show that it is properly using certain taxes and grants.

The District has three types of funds:

- Governmental funds—Most of the District's basic services are included in governmental funds, which focus on (1) how cash and other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash flow in and out, and (2) the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the District's programs. Because this information does not encompass the additional long-term focus of the Government-Wide Statements, we provide additional information at the bottom of the governmental funds statement, or on the subsequent page, that explain the relationship (or differences) between them.
- Proprietary funds—Services for which the District charges customers a fee are generally reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds, like the government-wide statements, provide both long-term and short-term financial information.
 - We use internal service funds to report activities that provide supplies and services for the District's other programs and activities, such as the District's Self Insurance Fund.
- Fiduciary funds—The District is the trustee, or fiduciary, for certain funds. It is also responsible for other assets that, because of a trust arrangement, can be used only for the trust beneficiaries. The District is responsible for ensuring that the assets reported in these funds are used for their intended purposes. All of the District's fiduciary activities are reported in a separate statement of fiduciary net assets and a statement of changes in fiduciary net assets. We exclude these activities from the District's government-wide financial statements because the District cannot use these assets to finance its operations.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DISTRICT AS A WHOLE

Net assets. The District's combined net assets were approximately \$14.5 million at August 31, 2012. (See Table A-1).

The \$7.6 million of unrestricted net assets represents resources available to fund the programs and the remaining construction projects of the District next year.

Changes in net assets. The District's total revenues were \$21.5 million. A significant portion, 53%, of the District's revenue comes from taxes. Another 31% comes from state aid – formula grants, while only 5% relates to charges for services.

The total cost of all programs and services was \$21.4 million; 65% of these costs are for instructional and student services.

Governmental Activities

 Property tax assessment remained at \$1.47 which was comprised of \$1.17 for maintenance and operation and \$.30 for interest and sinking.

Table A-3 presents the cost of each of the District's largest functions as well as each function's *net cost* (total cost less fees generated by the activities and intergovernmental aid). The net cost reflects what was funded by state revenues as well as local tax dollars.

- The cost of all governmental activities this year was \$21.4 million.
- The amount that our taxpayers paid for these activities through property taxes was \$11.4 million.
- Some of the cost was paid by those who directly benefited from the programs (\$1.1 million), or through grants and contributions (\$2.4 million).

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DISTRICT'S FUNDS

Revenues from governmental fund types totaled \$21.3 million (See Exhibit C-3 of the audit report), a decrease of \$400 thousand or 2% less than the preceding year. The decrease in local revenues is a result of lower than expected property tax collection rates.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

Over the course of the year, the District altered its budgeted revenues and expenditures several times. As a result of the budget changes, the District's General Fund projected balance decreased approximately \$670 thousand.

Resources available were \$111 thousand below the final budgeted amount:

- Local and intermediate revenues were below the final budgeted amount by \$110 thousand.
- State funding was below the final budgeted amount by \$1 thousand.

Resources consumed were \$564 thousand below the final budgeted amount:

- Instruction costs were below the final budgeted amount by \$195 thousand.
- Debt service payments were below the final budgeted amount by \$11 thousand.

The resources from the net change in fund balance were \$281 thousand better than the final budget projections.

CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

At the end of 2012, the District had invested \$62 million in a broad range of capital assets, including land, equipment, buildings, and vehicles. (See Table A-4.)

The District issued bonds in the amount of \$701 thousand during the year ended August 31, 2012. Proceeds from these bonds and those issued in prior years have been and will continue to be used to construct school facilities. At year-end, the District had approximately \$37 million in bonds outstanding as shown in Table A-5. More detailed information about the District's debt is presented in the Notes to the Financial Statements on page 23. Additionally, the District paid in full the capital lease with Apple made in connection with their technology initiative in 2011.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

- Appraised property value used for the 2013 budget preparation will be up \$19.8 million, or 3%. The total tax rate will remain the same as last year at \$1.47.
- The District's 2012 refined average daily attendance is expected to be 2,023, up approximately 1.4% in 2012.

These indicators were taken into account when adopting the General Fund budget for 2013. Amounts available for appropriation in the General Fund budget are \$15,830,422, a decrease of \$1,175,637 over the final 2012 budget of \$17,006,059 million. Property tax revenue will increase due to increased property values. State revenue will decrease due to increased local tax revenue. The largest expenditure increases will be for payroll and technology expenses.

If these estimates are realized, the District's budgetary General Fund balance is expected remain the same at the close of 2013. The Board of Trustees has carefully planned to maintain the three month operating costs fund balance as suggested by TEA.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Bullard Independent School District (the "District") is a public educational agency operating under the applicable laws and regulations of the State of Texas. It is governed by a seven member Board of Trustees (the "Board") elected by registered voters of the District. The District prepares its basic financial statements in conformity with United States generally accepted accounting principles promulgated by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board ("GASB") and other authoritative sources identified in Statement on Auditing Standards No. 69 of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants; and it complies with the requirements of the appropriate version of Texas Education Agency's Financial Accountability System Resource Guide (the "Resource Guide") and the requirements of contracts and grants of agencies from which it receives funds.

A. REPORTING ENTITY

The Board is elected by the public, and it has the authority to make decisions, appoint administrators and managers, and significantly influence operations. It also has the primary accountability for fiscal matters. Therefore, the District is a financial reporting entity as defined by GASB in its Statement No. 14, "The Financial Reporting Entity." There are no component units included within the reporting entity.

B. GOVERNMENT-WIDE AND FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities are government-wide financial statements. They report information on all of the District's non-fiduciary activities with most of the interfund activities removed. *Governmental activities* include programs supported primarily by taxes, State foundation funds, grants, and other intergovernmental revenues.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates how other people or entities that participate in programs the District operates have shared in the payment of the direct costs. Program revenues include "charges for services" and "grants and contributions." The "charges for services" column includes payments made by parties that purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods or services provided by a given function or segment of the District. Examples include tuition paid by students not residing in the District, school lunch charges, etc. The "grants and contributions" column includes amounts paid by organizations outside the District to help meet the operational or capital requirements of a given function. Examples include grants under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Non-program revenues are considered general revenue available to support all of the District's functions. Taxes are always general revenues. In the government-wide statements, indirect expenses (like depreciation) are allocated to functions based on the character of the expense.

Interfund activities between governmental funds and between governmental and proprietary funds appear as due to/due froms on the Governmental Fund Balance Sheet and Proprietary Fund Statement of Net Assets and as other resources and other uses on the Governmental Fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance and on the Proprietary Fund Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Fund Net Assets. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from the government-wide statements, although interfund services provided and used are not eliminated in the process of consolidation.

The fund financial statements provide reports on the financial condition and results of operations for three fund categories: governmental, proprietary, and fiduciary. Since the resources in the fiduciary funds cannot be used for District operations, they are not included in the government-wide statements. The District considers some governmental funds major and reports their financial condition and results of operations in a separate column.

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

B. GOVERNMENT-WIDE AND FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, continued

Proprietary funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from nonoperating items. Operating revenues and expenses result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. All other revenues and expenses are nonoperating.

C. MEASUREMENT FOCUS, BASIS OF ACCOUNTING, AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT PRESENTATION

The government-wide financial statements use the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as do the proprietary fund and fiduciary fund financial statements. Agency funds, however, are unlike all types of other funds, reporting only assets and liabilities. Therefore, agency funds cannot be said to have a measurement focus. They do, however, use the accrual basis of accounting to recognize receivables and payables. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements use the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. With this measurement focus, only current assets, current liabilities, and fund balances are included on the balance sheet. Operating statements of these funds present net increases and decreases in current assets (i.e., revenues and other financing sources and expenditures and other financing uses).

The modified accrual basis of accounting recognizes revenues in the accounting period in which they become both measurable and available. It also recognizes expenditures in the accounting period in which the fund liability is incurred, if measurable, except for unmatured interest and principal on long-term debt, which is recognized when due. The expenditures related to certain compensated absences and claims and judgments are recognized when the obligations are expected to be liquidated with expendable available financial resources. The District considers all revenues "available" if they will be collected within 60 days of the end of the fiscal year.

Revenues from local sources consist primarily of property taxes. Property tax revenues and revenues received from the State are recognized under the accrual concept. Miscellaneous revenues are recorded as revenue when received in cash because they are generally not measurable until actually received. Investment earnings are recorded as earned, since they are both measurable and available.

Grant funds are considered to be earned to the extent of expenditures made under the provisions of the grant. Accordingly, when such funds are received, they are recorded as deferred revenues until related and authorized expenditures have been made. If balances have not been expended by the end of the project period, grantors sometimes require the District to refund all or part of the unused amount.

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

C. MEASUREMENT FOCUS, BASIS OF ACCOUNTING, AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT PRESENTATION, continued

The Proprietary Fund Types and Fiduciary Funds are accounted for on a flow of economic resources measurement focus and utilize the accrual basis of accounting. This basis of accounting recognizes revenues in the accounting period in which they are earned and become measurable and expenses in the accounting period in which they are incurred and become measurable. The District applies all GASB pronouncements as well as the Financial Accounting Standards Board pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless these pronouncements conflict or contradict GASB pronouncements. With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities associated with the operation of these funds are included on the fund Statement of Net Assets. The fund equity is segregated into invested in capital assets net of related debt, restricted net assets, and unrestricted net assets.

D. FUND ACCOUNTING

The District reports the following major governmental funds:

- The General Fund The General Fund is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. Major revenue sources include local property taxes, state funding under the Foundation School Program, and interest earnings. Expenditures include all costs associated with the daily operations of the District except for specific programs funded by the federal or state government, food service, debt service, and capital projects. The General Fund is a budgeted fund, and any fund balances are considered resources available for current operations.
- Debt Service Fund The District accounts for resources accumulated and payments made for principal and interest on long-term general obligation debt of governmental funds in a Debt Service Fund, which is a budgeted fund. Revenues include collections on property taxes and earnings on investments of the fund. The fund balance represents amounts that will be used for retirement of bonds and payment of interest in the future.

Additionally, the District reports the following fund types:

Governmental Funds:

• Special Revenue Funds - The District accounts for resources restricted to, or designated for, specific purposes by the District or a grantor in a special revenue fund. Most Federal and some State financial assistance are accounted for in a special revenue fund. Sometimes unused balances must be returned to the grantor at the close of specified project periods.

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

D. FUND ACCOUNTING, continued

Proprietary Funds:

• Internal Service Funds – Revenues and expenses related to services provided to organizations inside the District on a cost reimbursement basis are accounted for in an internal service fund. The District's internal service fund is an Insurance Fund. This is not a budgeted fund.

Fiduciary Funds:

Agency Funds – The District accounts for resources held for others in a custodial capacity in
agency funds. Fiduciary funds are reported in the fiduciary fund financial statements. However,
because these assets are not available to support District programs, these funds are not included in
the government-wide statements. The District's agency funds include a Student Activity Fund and
the Bullard Education Foundation.

E. FUND BALANCE CLASSIFICATION

In 2011, the District implemented GASB Statement No. 54, "Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions." This Statement provides more clearly defined fund balance categories to make the nature and extent of the constraints placed on a government's fund balances more transparent. The following classifications describe the relative strength of the spending constraints:

- Nonspendable fund balance amounts that are not in nonspendable form (such as inventory) or are required to be maintained intact. There were no nonspendable fund balance amounts as of August 31, 2012.
- Restricted fund balance amounts constrained to specific purposes by their providers (such as
 grantors, bondholders, and higher levels of government), through constitutional provisions, or by
 enabling legislation.
- Committed fund balance amounts constrained to specific purposes by the Board of Trustees, using its highest level of decision-making authority. To be reported as committed, amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the Board takes the same highest level action to remove or change the constraint.
- Assigned fund balance amounts the Board intends to use for a specific purpose. Intent can be
 expressed by the Superintendent or Business Manager, through which the Board of Trustees has
 delegated the authority.
- Unassigned fund balance amounts that are available for any purpose. Positive amounts are reported only in the general fund.

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

E. FUND BALANCE CLASSIFICATION, continued

The Board of Trustees establishes (and modifies or rescinds) fund balance commitments by passage of an ordinance or resolution. This is typically done through adoption and amendment of the budget. A fund balance commitment is further indicated in the budget document as a designation or commitment of the fund (such as for special incentives). When it is appropriate for fund balance to be assigned, the Board delegates authority to the Superintendent or the Business Manager (such as the purchase of fixed assets, construction, debt service, or for other purposes).

In the general fund, the District strives to maintain an unassigned fund balance to be used for working capital and a margin of safety to address local and regional emergencies without borrowing around \$3,800,000.

In circumstances where an expenditure is to be made for a purpose for which amounts are available in multiple fund balance classifications, the order in which resources will be expended is as follows: restricted fund balance, followed by committed fund balance, assigned fund balance, and lastly, unassigned fund balance.

F. OTHER ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Cash and Cash Equivalents

The District considers highly liquid investments to be cash equivalents if they have a maturity of three months or less when purchased.

2. Bond Premiums and Discounts

In the government-wide financial statements, and proprietary fund types in the fund financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities, business-type activities, or proprietary fund type statement of net assets. Bond premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs, are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the effective interest method. Bonds payable are reported net of the applicable bond premium or discount. Bond issuance costs are reported as deferred charges and are amortized over the term of the related debt.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

F. OTHER ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

3. Compensated Absences

It is the District's policy to permit some employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation and sick pay benefits. There is no liability for unpaid accumulated sick leave since the District does not have a policy to pay any amounts when employees separate from service with the government. All vacation pay is accrued when incurred in the government-wide, proprietary, and fiduciary fund financial statements. A liability for these amounts is reported in governmental funds only if they have matured, for example, as a result of employee resignations and retirements.

4. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include land, buildings, furniture, and equipment, are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the District as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000 and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets lives are not capitalized. Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Buildings, furniture and equipment of the District are depreciated using the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Land and Construction in Progress are not depreciated.

5. Internal Service Funds

Since internal service funds support the operations of governmental funds, they are consolidated with the governmental funds in the government-wide financial statements. The expenditures of governmental funds that create the revenues of internal service funds are eliminated to avoid "grossing up" the revenues and expenses of the District as a whole.

6. Grant Revenue

The District has reported restricted assets in the instance of grants received from a foundation to be used for restricted purposes.

7. Interfund Transactions

During the course of operations, transactions occur between individual funds for specified purposes. These receivables and payables are classified as "due from other funds" or "due to other funds" on the combined Governmental Fund Balance Sheet.

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

F. OTHER ACCOUNTING POLICIES, continued

8. Self-Funded Health Insurance Plan

All eligible employees of the District are covered by a partially self-funded health insurance plan with insurance premiums paid by the District. Employees may elect to pay for dependent coverage.

9. Encumbrance Accounting

The District employs encumbrance accounting, whereby encumbrances for goods or purchased services are documented by purchase orders and contracts. An encumbrance represents a commitment of Board appropriation related to unperformed contracts for goods and services. The issuance of a purchase order or the signing of a contract creates an encumbrance but does not represent expenditure for the period, only a commitment to expend resources. Appropriations lapse at August 31, and encumbrances outstanding at that time are either canceled or appropriately provided for in the subsequent year's budget.

10. Restricted and Unrestricted Assets

On the statement of net assets, when the District incurs an expense for which it may use either restricted or unrestricted assets, it uses the restricted assets first whenever restricted assets will have to be returned because they were not used.

11. Data Control Codes

The Data Control Codes refer to the account code structure prescribed by the Texas Education Agency ("TEA") in the Resource Guide. TEA requires school districts to display these codes in the financial statements filed with the Agency in order to insure accuracy in building a statewide data base for policy development and funding plans.

II. DETAILED NOTES ON ALL FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS

A. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

The funds of the District must be deposited and invested under the terms of a contract, contents of which are set out in the Depository Contract Law. The depository bank places approved pledged securities for safekeeping and trust with the District's agent bank in an amount sufficient to protect District funds on a day-to-day basis during the period of the contract. The pledge of approved securities is waived only to the extent of the depository bank's dollar amount of Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation ("FDIC") insurance.

At August 31, 2012, the carrying amount of the District's deposits (cash and interest-bearing savings accounts included in temporary investments) was \$303,456, and the bank balance was \$495,168. The difference between the District's deposits and the bank balance are outstanding checks.

The Public Funds Investment Act (Government Code Chapter 2256) contains specific provisions in the areas of investment practices, management reports, and establishment of appropriate policies. Among other things, it requires the District to adopt, implement, and publicize an investment policy. That policy must address the following areas: (1) safety of principal and liquidity, (2) portfolio diversification, (3) allowable investments, (4) acceptable risk levels, (5) expected rates of return, (6) maximum allowable stated maturity of portfolio investments, (7) maximum average dollar-weighted maturity allowed based on the stated maturity date for the portfolio, (8) investment staff quality and capabilities, (9) and bid solicitation preferences for certificates of deposit.

Statutes authorize the District to invest in (1) obligations of the U.S. Treasury, certain U.S. agencies, and the State of Texas; (2) certificates of deposit; (3) certain municipal securities; (4) money market savings accounts; (5) repurchase agreements; (6) bankers acceptances; (7) mutual funds; (8) investment pools; (9) guaranteed investment contracts; (10) and common trust funds. The Act also requires the District to have independent auditors perform test procedures related to investment practices as provided by the Act. The District is in substantial compliance with the requirements of the Act and with local policies.

The carrying amount of investments at August 31, 2012, was \$6,925,222, of which \$4,908,171 is held by Lone Star Investment Pool and \$2,017,051 is invested in certificates of deposit through Texas National Bank in conjunction with the Certificate of Deposit Account Registry Service. The portion invested with Lone Star investment pool is included with the District's deposits as the funds can be converted to cash within 90 days. Local government investment pools operate in a manner consistent with the SEC's Rule 2a7 of the Investment Company Act of 1940. Local government investment pools use amortized cost rather than market value to report net assets to compute share prices. Accordingly, the fair value of the position of these pools is the same as the value of the shares in each pool.

II. DETAILED NOTES ON ALL FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS, continued

A. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS, continued

Lone Star Investment Pool was organized in 1991 in conformity with the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code, and the Public Funds Investment Act, Chapter 2256 of the Texas Government Code. The Pool is administered by First Public, formerly known as Texas Association of School Boards Financial Services. Lone Star Investment Pool is governed by an 11-member board, all of whom are participants in the Pool. An independent, third-party investment consultant reports directly to the Board of Trustees. The independent consultants, RBC Dain Rauscher, Inc., Dallas, Texas, reviews the daily operations of the Pool, analyzes all investment transactions for compliance with the Investment Policy, monitors activities of the custodian bank, and compares the investment advisor's performance with benchmarks and a peer group of similarly managed funds. The Pool also employs an independent, third-party bank, The Bank of New York, headquartered in New York, New York, to perform custody and valuation services. The Lone Star Investment Pool is subject to annual review by an independent auditor consistent with the Public Funds Investment Act. Ernst & Young, 700 Lavaca St., Suite 1400, Austin, Texas 78701, performs the annual audit.

Policies Governing Deposits and Investments

In compliance with the Public Funds Investment Act, the District has adopted a deposit and investment policy. That policy addresses the following risks:

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits: This is the risk that in the event of bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District was not exposed to custodial credit risk since its deposits at year-end and during the year ended August 31, 2012, were covered by depository insurance or by pledged collateral held by the District's agent bank in the District's name.

Custodial Credit Risk – Investments: This is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty, the District will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. Investments are subject to custodial credit risk only if they are evidenced by securities that exist in physical or book entry form. Thus, positions in external investment pools are not subject to custodial credit risk because they are not evidenced by securities that exist in physical or book entry form. The District's securities are all in instruments backed by the United States of America and are not exposed to custodial credit risk.

Foreign Currency Risk: The District does not have any deposits or investments denominated in a foreign currency.

Concentration of Credit Risk: To limit the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of a government's investment in a single issuer, the District requires investments to be made in a manner that ensures the preservation of capital in the overall portfolio, and offsets during the 12-month period any market price losses resulting from interest-rate fluctuations by income received from the balance of the portfolio.

Interest Rate Risk: To limit the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of investments, the District requires any internally created pool fund group of the District to have a maximum dollar weighted maturity of 180 days. The maximum allowable stated maturity of any other individual investment owned by the District may not exceed one year from the time of purchase. All of the District's investments at August 31, 2012, had a maturity of one year or less.

III. DETAILED NOTES ON ALL FUNDS AND ACCOUNT GROUPS, continued

A. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS, continued

Other Credit Risk: There is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. To minimize credit risk, Lone Star Investment Pool invests only in investments authorized under the Public Funds Investment Act. As of August 31, 2012, Lone Star Investment Pool's investments credit quality rating was AAA (Standard & Poor's).

B. PROPERTY TAXES

Property taxes are levied by October 1 on the assessed value listed as of the prior January 1 for all real and business personal property located in the District in conformity with Subtitle E, Texas Property Tax Code. Taxes are due on receipt of the tax bill and are delinquent if not paid before February 1 of the year following the year in which imposed. On January 31 of each year, a tax lien attaches to property to secure the payment of all taxes, penalties, and interest ultimately imposed. Property tax revenues are considered available (1) when they become due or past due and receivable within the current period and (2) when they are expected to be collected during a 60-day period after the close of the school fiscal year. However, amounts collected during the 60-day period after year-end are not considered material to the financial statements and are not reported.

C. DELINQUENT TAXES RECEIVABLE

Delinquent taxes are prorated between maintenance and debt service based on rates adopted for the year of the levy. Allowances for uncollectible tax receivables within the General and Debt Service Funds are based on historical experience in collecting property taxes. Uncollectible personal property taxes are periodically reviewed and written off, but the District is prohibited from writing off real property taxes without specific statutory authority from the Texas Legislature.

D. INTERFUND BALANCES AND TRANSFERS

Interfund balances at August 31, 2012, consisted of the following amounts. All interfund balances are expected to be repaid within one year.

These interfund balances resulted from the time lag between the dates that interfund goods and services are provided or reimbursable expenditures occur, transactions are recorded in the accounting system, and/or payments between funds are made.

Capital Lease

In 2011, the District entered into a three year lease with Apple for computer equipment under which the equipment will become the property of the District when all the terms of the lease agreement are met. In 2012, the District satisfied the terms of the lease by paying off the lease early which amounted to \$597,681. No future minimum payments remain.

I. BONDS PAYABLE

On September 12, 1998, the District's taxpayers approved a bond issue of \$14,900,000. The bond proceeds were used to construct and equip new school facilities and to advance refund a portion of the District's Unlimited Tax Refunding Bonds, Series 1986. On September 17, 1998, the District issued \$8,682,030 of Unlimited Tax School Building and Refunding Bonds, Series 1998. Of that amount \$295,000 was used to refund the principal and accrued interest on the Series 1986 bonds. The remaining funds were used for the school facility construction. The remaining approved bonds were issued on October 4, 1999.

The Unlimited Tax School Building and Refunding Bonds Series 1998 issue includes capital appreciation bonds (CABs). The CABs portion of the bonds are issued at a discount. The interest on these bonds accretes each year but is paid with the principal at maturity of the bonds. The CABs for the 1998 Series mature in the school years ending August 31, 2004 through 2017.

On July 1, 2005, the District issued \$11,515,068 of Unlimited Tax Refunding Bonds, Series 2005. Of that amount, \$6,995,079 was used to defease a portion of the District's Unlimited Tax and Refunding Bonds, Series 1998, and \$4,520,000 was used to defease a portion of the District's Unlimited Tax School Building Bonds, Series 1999. The Unlimited Tax Refunding Bonds, Series 2005 include \$10,990,000 of current interest bonds and \$525,068 of capital appreciation bonds (CABs). The CABs portion of the bonds are issued at a discount. The interest on these bonds accretes each year but is paid with the principal at maturity of the bonds. The CABs for the 2005 series mature in the school years ending August 31, 2011 through 2014

On February 22, 2007, the District issued \$28,499,300 of Unlimited Tax School Building Bonds, Series 2007. The Series 2007 issue included \$6,635,000 of serial current interest bonds, \$21,905,000 of term current interest bonds (CIBs) and \$229,300 of capital appreciation bonds (CABs). The CABs portion of the bond issue are bonds issued at a discount. The interest on these bonds accretes each year but is paid with the principal at maturity of the bonds. The CABs for the 2007 series mature in the school years ending August 31, 2015 and 2016.

Refunding Bonds

In November 2011, the District issued \$700,533 of Unlimited Tax Refunding Bonds, Series 2011. In addition, the District contributed \$300,000 to reduce current debt obligations. Of those amounts, \$957,280 was used to defease the District's Unlimited Tax and Refunding Bonds and the remaining funds were utilized to satisfy the current interest obligations. The new bonds bear interest from 2.00% to 4.00% and are due in annual installments ranging from \$9,200 to \$779,200 through February 15, 2024. The new issue will decrease debt service payments for the District by roughly \$202,201 with an economic loss of \$77,007 or 7.63%.

Defeased Debt

The 1998 Series bonds were defeased by placing the proceeds of refunding bonds in an irrevocable escrow accounts held and managed by bank trustees, and invested in U.S. Treasury obligations, the principal and interest on which would provide amounts sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the defeased bonds in accordance with the schedule of remaining payments due. Accordingly, the escrow account and the defeased bonds are not included in the District's financial statements. During the year ended August 31, 2012, the amount of debt defeased was \$957,280. As a result, the amount of defeased debt remained outstanding, but not included in the District's financial statements.

There are a number of limitations and restrictions contained in the general obligation bond indenture. Management has indicated that the District is in compliance with all significant limitations and restrictions.

Bonded indebtedness of the District is reflected in the Statement of Net Assets and current requirements for principal and interest expenditures are accounted for in the Debt Service Fund. Effective interest rates range from 2.00% to 5.625%.

J. DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION PLAN

Plan Description. The District contributes to the Teacher Retirement System of Texas ("TRS"), a cost-sharing multiple employer defined benefit pension plan. TRS administers retirement and disability annuities, and death and survivor benefits to employees and beneficiaries of employees of the public school systems of Texas. It operates primarily under the provisions of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI, Sec. 67, and Texas Government Code, Title 8, Subtitle C. TRS also administers proportional retirement benefits and service credit transfer under Texas Government Code, Title 8, Chapters 803 and 805, respectively. TRS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the defined benefit pension plan. That report may be obtained by writing to the TRS Communications Department, 1000 Red River Street, Austin, Texas 78701, by calling the TRS Communications Department at 1-800-223-8778, or by downloading the report from the TRS Internet website, www.trs.state.tx.us, under the TRS Publications heading.

Funding Policy. State law provides for fiscal years 2010, 2011 and 2012 a state contribution rate of 6.64%, 6.64% and 6.00% respectively, and a member contribution rate of 6.40%, 6.40% and 6.40% respectively. In certain instances the reporting district (I.S.D., college, university, or state agency) is required to make all or a portion of the state's 6.00% contribution. Contribution requirements are not actuarially determined but are legally established each biennium pursuant to the following state funding policy: (1) The state constitution requires the legislature to establish a member contribution rate of not less than 6.00% of the member's annual compensation and a state contribution rate of not less than 6.00% and not more than 10.0% of the aggregate annual compensation of all members of the system during that fiscal year; (2) A state statute prohibits benefit improvements or contribution reductions if, as a result of a the particular action, the time required to amortize TRS's unfunded actuarial liabilities would be increased to a period that exceeds 31 years, or, if the amortization period already exceeds 31 years, the period would be increased by such action. The District's employees' contributions to the System for the year ended August 31, 2012 were \$742,501.71. State contributions to TRS made on behalf of the District's employees for the years ended August 31, 2010, 2011 and 2012 were \$590,565.00, \$657,496.67 and \$684,601.33 respectively. State contributions to Medicare Part D on behalf of Bullard Independent School District's employees for the years ended August 31, 2010, 2011 AND 2012 were \$24,206.00, \$24,244.00 and \$49,737.00 respectively. The District reports these TRS and Medicare Part D on behalf payments made by the state as revenues and expenditures in an equal amount in the general fund. The District paid additional state contributions for the years ended August 31, 2010, 2011 and 2012 in the amount of \$169,613.00, \$175,890.00 and \$160,257.00 respectively on the portion of the employees' salaries that exceeded the statutory minimum.

K. WORKERS' COMPENSATION AND HEALTH CARE COVERAGES

Workers' Compensation Coverage

The District participates in a partially self-funded workers' compensation pool administered by Claims Administrative Services, Inc. The District pays a contribution for the fund year to cover the servicing of programs administration, claims handling, loss control, and stop loss coverage. Provided the District remains in the pool, there are no additional fees for services. The District has retained the services of an independent plan supervisor experienced in claims processing. The agreement for formation of the Plan provides that the Plan will be self-sustaining through member premiums and will reinsure through commercial companies for claims in excess of \$225,000 for each insured event, with a \$5,000,000 aggregate limit.

For the year ended August 31, 2012, the District's fixed cost was \$35,485 and its loss fund maximum was \$99,031.

Health Care Coverage

During the year ended August 31, 2012, employees of the District were covered by a health insurance plan (the "Plan"). The District paid premiums of \$225 per month per employee to the Plan. Employees, at their option, authorized payroll withholdings to pay premiums for dependents. All premiums were paid to a third party administrator acting on behalf of the licensed insurer. The Plan was authorized by Article 3.51-2, Texas Insurance Code and was documented by contractual agreement.

The contract between the District and the third party administrator is renewable September 1, 2012, and terms of coverage and premium costs are included in the contractual provisions. Other Districts and/or their employees contributed to the self-insurance pool which was operated under contractual provisions of Article 4413(32c), Interlocal Cooperation Act.

Latest financial statements for the Blue Cross/Blue Shield plan for the year ended December 31, 2011, have been filed with the Texas State Board of Insurance, Austin, Texas, and are public records.

L. DEFERRED REVENUE

Revenues from local sources consist primarily of property taxes. The *Resource Guide* provides that Texas school districts record net tax levies initially as deferred revenue and convert those deferrals to realized revenue when the taxes are collected. A district may convert all delinquent tax collections expected to be made in the 60 days of the next fiscal year from deferred revenue to realized revenue of the current year. Deferred revenue at year-end as reported on Exhibit C-1 of the Funds Statements consisted of the following:

O. JOINT VENTURE / SHARED SERVICE ARRANGEMENTS

The District participates in the Cherokee County Special Education Cooperative for special education services with four other school districts. The District does not account for revenues or expenditures in this program and does not disclose them in these financial statements. The District neither has a joint ownership interest in fixed assets purchased by the fiscal agent, Rusk Independent School District, nor does the District have a net equity interest in the fiscal agent. The fiscal agent is neither accumulating significant financial resources nor fiscal exigencies that would give rise to a future additional benefit or burden to the District. The fiscal agent manager is responsible for all financial activities of the shared services arrangement. Presented below are the revenues and expenditures attributable to the District's participation.

Costs charged to the respective grant programs are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor agencies; therefore, to the extent that the District has not complied with the rules and regulations governing the grants, refunds of any money received may be required and the collectability of any related receivable may be impaired. In the opinion of the District, there are no significant contingent liabilities relating to compliance with the rules and regulations governing the respective grants; therefore, no provision has been recorded in the accompanying basic financial statements for such contingencies.

BULLARD INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT NOTES TO REQUIRED SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION AUGUST 31, 2012

A. BUDGETARY DATA

The Board of Trustees adopts an "appropriated budget" for the General Fund, Debt Service Fund and the Food Service Fund (which is included in the Special Revenue Funds). The District is required to present the adopted and final amended budgeted revenues and expenditures for each of these funds. The District compares the final amended budget to actual revenues and expenditures. The General Fund Budget report appears in Exhibit G-1 and the other two reports are in Exhibits J-3 and J-4.

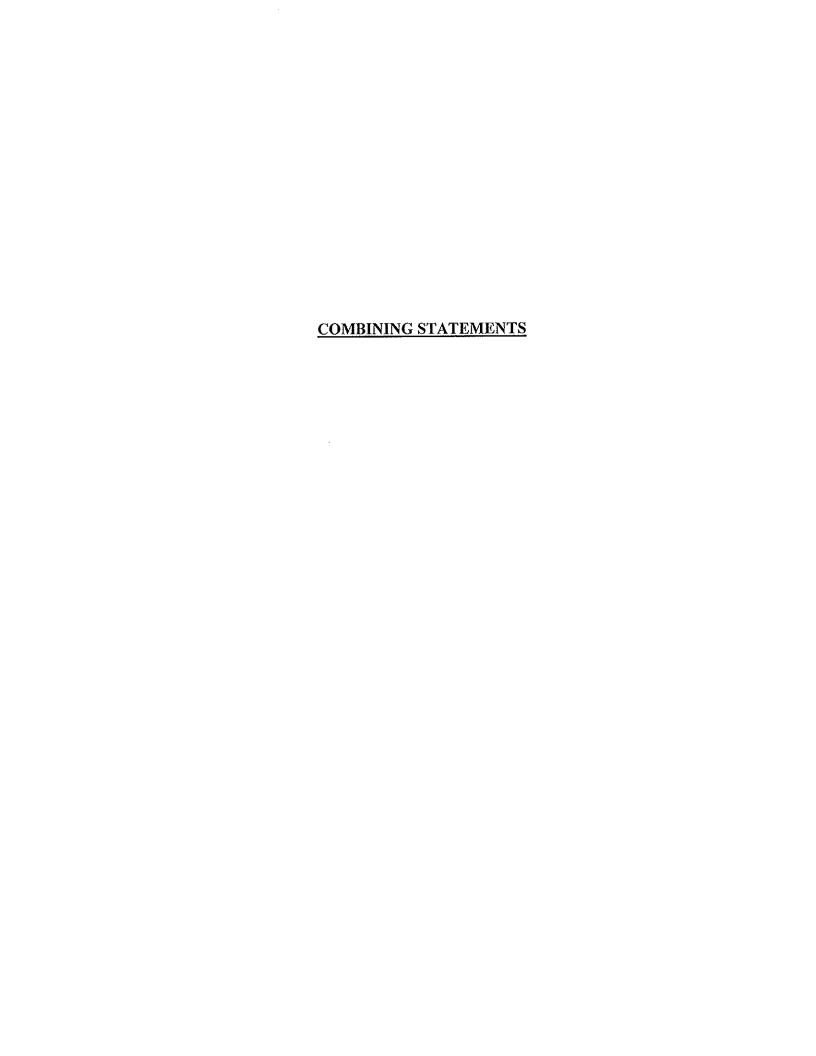
The following procedures are followed in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the general-purpose financial statements:

- 1. Prior to August 20, the District prepares a budget for the next succeeding fiscal year beginning September 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them.
- 2. A meeting of the Board is then called for the purpose of adopting the proposed budget. At least ten days' public notice of the meeting must be given.
- 3. Prior to September 1, the budget is legally enacted through passage of a resolution by the Board. After the budget for the above listed funds is approved, any amendment that causes an increase or decrease in a fund, functional spending category, total revenue, or other resources object category requires Board approval prior to the fact. These amendments are presented to the Board at its regular monthly meeting and are reflected in the official minutes. Because the District has a policy of careful budgetary control, several budgetary amendments were necessary throughout the year. The amendments reduced the overall General Fund budget by approximately \$670 thousand, with the most significant changes occurring in instruction, facilities maintenance and operations, and facilities acquisition and construction.
- 4. Each budget is controlled by the budget coordinator at the revenue and expenditure function/object level. Budgeted amounts are amended by the Board. All budget appropriations lapse at year end.

Excess of expenditures over appropriations

For the year ended August 31, 2012, expenditures exceeded appropriations in the following Exhibit:

• Exhibit G-1, function 51 for facilities, maintenance and operations exceeded appropriations by \$114,632 as a result of an audit adjustment related to an agreement to improve the efficiency of lighting throughout the District. The District originally budgeted the costs in function 81, capital outlay, but reclassified the expenditures to function 51, facilities maintenance and operations, as it was determined the items purchased were non-capitalized items.

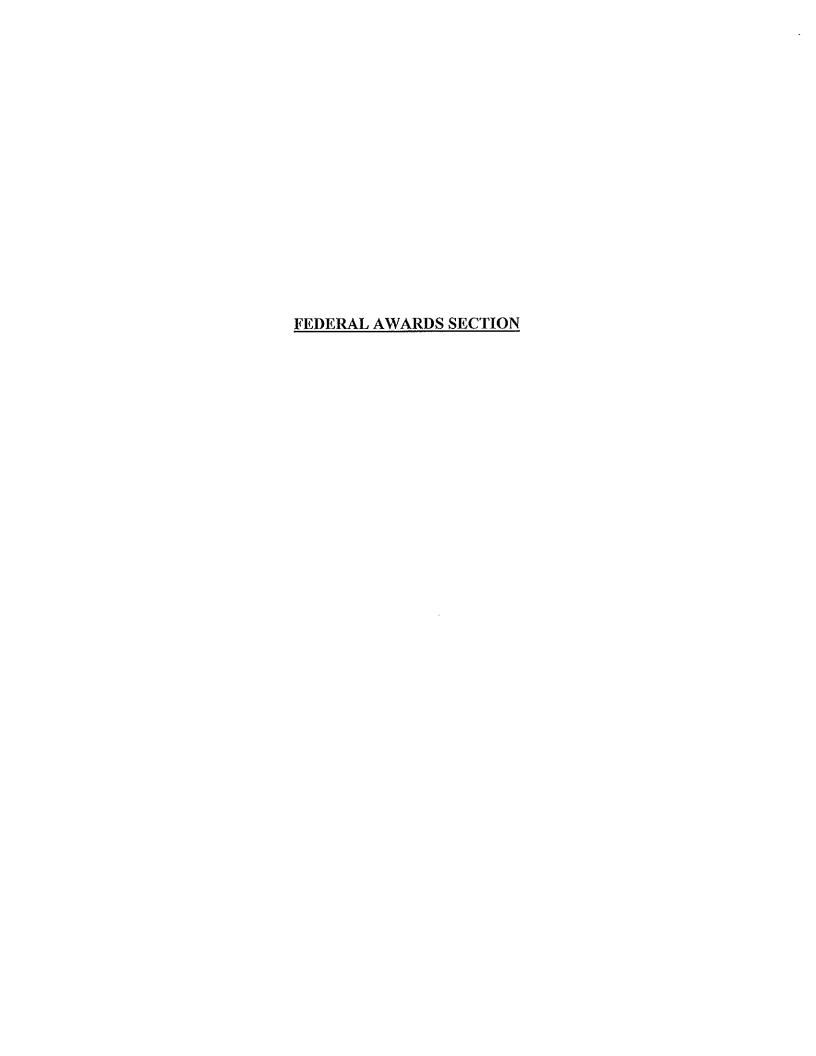

BULLARD INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT NOTES TO SCHEDULE OF EXPENDITURES OF FEDERAL AWARDS YEAR ENDED AUGUST 31, 2012

- 1. For all Federal programs, the District uses the fund types specified in Texas Education Agency's *Financial Accountability System Resource Guide*. Special revenue funds are used to account for resources restricted to, or designated for, specific purposes by a grantor. Federal and state financial assistance generally is accounted for in a Special Revenue Fund.
- 2. The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to a fund is determined by its measurement focus. The Governmental Fund types are accounted for using a current financial resources measurement focus. All Federal grant funds were accounted for in a Special Revenue Fund which is a Governmental Fund type.

With this measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities and the fund balance are included on the balance sheet. Operating statements of these funds present increases and decreases in net current assets. The modified accrual basis of accounting is used for the Governmental Fund types. This basis of accounting recognizes revenues in the accounting period in which they become susceptible to accrual, i.e., both measurable and available, and expenditures in the accounting period in which the fund liability is incurred, if measureable, except for unmatured interest on General Long-Term Debt, which is recognized when due, and certain compensated absences and claims and judgments, which are recognized when the obligations are expected to be liquidated with expendable available financial resources.

Federal grant funds are considered to be earned to the extent of expenditures made under the provisions of the grant, and, accordingly, when such funds are received, they are recorded as deferred revenues until earned.

3. The period of availability for federal grant funds for the purpose of liquidation of outstanding obligations made on or before the ending date of the federal project period extended 30 days beyond the federal project period ending date, in accordance with provisions in Section H, Period of Availability of Federal Funds, Part 3, OMB Circular A-133 Compliance Statement – Provisional 6/97.
