Teachers can apply for mini grants through MRSPA

Classroom teachers can apply for one of six mini grants offered by the Maryland Retired School Personnel Association (MRSPA).

The mini grants — awarding up to \$300 per teacher — may be used on special projects or activities that are not funded through the school system, PTA or PTSO.

Last school year, Emily Leedy, a teacher at Malcolm Elementary School, was awarded a mini grant from MRSPA that she used to fund a pen pal program between Malcolm students and their peers in another Maryland school system.

The award helped pay for postage and stationery.

Mini grant applications are due by Nov. 1 with winners notified in January.

The funds will be sent directly to the teacher at their school for use during this school year.

Barnhart students go 'buy' the book

Students at C. Paul Barnhart Elementary School are encouraged to visit the vending machine in the school's office. It doesn't take change, there's no card reader.

For that matter, it isn't stocked with chips or sweets.

Instead, the machine's contents are meant to nourish a child's mind, not serve up empty

calories. The vending machine housed in the main office is stocked with books for students in prekindergarten through fifth grade at various reading levels — "We like to provide a choice," Ronnita Cannon, the school's parent liaison, said.

Earning points for displaying character traits and good behavior that are tracked by teachers using a schoolwide Class Dojo system, students receive one token for the machine for every 30 points gathered.

"It's kind of motivating for students to earn a book and select one that interests them," Principal Brian King, Ed.D., said. Students can also use their Dojo points to "purchase" items from the school store.

The school bought the vending machine

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— which can hold between 200 to 300 titles
— with proceeds of last year's Boosterthon, and it was delivered earlier this month, Cannon said.

The school purchases the books for the machine and students get to keep the books they have earned. On a recent morning, Cannon was adding more books thanks to a rush of students who recently turned their Dojo points into I Love Books tokens.

As she finished, three first-grade students arrived in the office to select a book. After each student plunked in a coin, the machine whirled to life, lighting up with a recorded voice calling out, "One book, coming right up," as the book is released from the spiral holders.

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Principal of the Year nominations

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is looking for nominees for its annual Principal of the Year award. The award honors exemplary leaders for not only their leadership, but for their commitment to providing an exceptional learning environment for students. The principal chosen for the honor will also represent CCPS as the county finalist for *The Washington Post* Principal of the Year award.

Each year, *The Post* selects an overall award recipient for its Principal of the Year award from among finalists in the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area. Principals can be nominated by staff, students, parents, colleagues or community members, but are not eligible if they have received the honor in the past.

Criteria for nominees includes five years of experience as a principal, three of which are required to be with CCPS, and a commitment to maintain their position as a principal with the school system for the 2023-2024 school year.

- Additional nomination criteria are:
- Manage effectively.
- Demonstrate and encourage creativity and innovation.
- Foster cooperation between the school and community.
- Maintain a dialogue with students, parents and staff.
- Keep up to date of developments in the education field.
- Encourage team spirit.
- Demonstrate leadership and exemplify commitment.
- Continue to play an active role in the classroom.

Nomination materials must be submitted electronically. Materials should include a nominee career summary, 200-word biography, minimum of four statements of support, descriptions of contributions in each criteria area and headshot photograph.

Nominations for Teacher of the Year

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is accepting nominations for *The Washington Post* and Maryland Teacher of the Year awards programs. Nominated teachers will be considered as honorees in either one or the other awards program. Schools and centers should submit one teacher nominee annually.

Nomination criteria include a minimum of five complete years of teaching and must be a full-time classroom teacher in prekindergarten through Grade 12. Nominees must also commit to maintaining their teaching position with CCPS for the 2023-2024 school year. Criteria also include — but are not limited to — demonstration by the teacher of the following:

- Instills in students a desire to learn and achieve.
- Understands the individual needs of students, encourages their talents and fosters their self-esteem.
- Demonstrates a thorough knowledge of subject matter and the ability to share it effectively with students.

Nominations are submitted by school principals to CCPS staff who oversee the awards programs.

Submission suggestions can be made by teachers, students or community members. Anyone interested in suggesting a teacher for nomination should contact the school in which the teacher works. Nominees who have received either *The Post* teacher finalist award or were named Charles County Teacher of the Year in the past three years are not eligible. One CCPS teacher will be selected from the pool of nominees by a committee of school system staff to represent Charles County as the Charles County Teacher of the Year and finalist for the Maryland Teacher of the Year award. The Charles County Teacher of the Year announcement will be made by CCPS in Spring 2023.

One CCPS teacher will also be selected from among the nominee pool as Charles County's finalist for *The Washington Post* Teacher of the Year award. *The Post* names one finalist from districts in Maryland, Virginia and Washington, D.C., as its Teacher of the Year. *The Post* will announce its overall winner in Spring 2023.

Students can earn the state Seal of Biliteracy

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is helping to prepare students for the Maryland Seal of Biliteracy Program by hosting upcoming student and parent/guardian information sessions, one held each month in September, October and December. The topics will cover reading strategies, writing strategies, and speaking and listening strategies. The program is geared toward high school students.

The Seal of Biliteracy is an award given by a school, district or state in recognition of students who have studied and attained proficiency in two or more languages by high school graduation.

A student can receive the Seal if he or she can demonstrate full proficiency in language learning as measured by rigorous proficiency assessments across a range of language skills.

Students who are interested in the Maryland Seal of Biliteracy Program should plan to attend the online information events through Zoom.
