Rachel's Challenge has been implemented at Trinity High School and Trinity Middle School.

The THS Friends of Rachel Club's goal is to spread kindness, empathy, and compassion to students, faculty, and staff to create a more positive school environment. Seventeen year old Rachel Joy Scott was one of the first students killed in the 1999 shootings at Columbine High School. Shortly before her death, she wrote in her diary, "I have this theory that if one person can go out of their way to show compassion, then it will start a chain reaction of the same. People will never know how far a little kindness can go." Our goal is to start a chain reaction of kindness at Trinity. The club meets on activity "B" days. Club advisors are Mrs. Sagerer and Mr. Polansky. The kick-off activity this year was to send at least 2 emails of gratitude to another student, teacher, staff member, friend, or colleague.

All 5th grade students will serve as student leaders, role models, and ambassadors to their school. Each 5th grader was given a special "Kindness Matters" shirt to help all students remember to be kind. Rachel's Challenge has also found its way into elementary Teamology initiatives. Students will discuss ways to start chain reactions of kindness at school.















Rachel's super strength is REWARDING, and her symbol is the KIND BUCKET. Rewarding can be described as the satisfaction that you have done something important or did something well. Rachel likes to think of it as a good feeling of warmth that we may get in our hearts because we have done something kind or someone has been kind to us. Acts of kindness have the potential to make the world a happier place. In order to get that rewarding feeling, we need to be able to show kindness to others and accept kindness from others. Rachel uses her special rewarding powers to help others feel accepted, confident, happier and optimistic. The KIND BUCKET symbolizes how a person can fill others' buckets with kind acts, compliments, being respectful, showing someone you care, etc. Rachel likes to show others the value of that rewarding feeling by extending kindness.




We had a great visit from the Navy and we are looking forward to seeing the recruiters more throughout the school year.





















CONGRATULATIONS to Parker Gardner, a 5th grade student at Trinity South! His pig was the Reserved Grand Champion at the West Alexander Fair!

Trinity police typically interact with our students, staff, and parents daily to maintain a positive rapport and increase opportunities for communication to remain proactive. These positive relationships and ongoing communications help students feel safe at school and promote more opportunities for students to share safety concerns with us.
